WILSON HANDS BERNSTORFF PASSPORTS

GERMANY RUNS AMUCK—UNRESTRICTED SUBMARINE CAMPAIGN STARTS TODAY

WASHINGTON NOW FACES VERY GRAVE SITUATION

UNRESTRICTED SUBMARINE CAMPAIGN FORCES THE UNITED STATES TO TAKE ACTION—GERMAN AMBASSADOR MAY BE HANDED PASSPORTS—PORT OF NEW YORK CLOSED

(Special to The Daily News.)
Washington, Feb. 1.—Through cables delivered to Ambassador Gerard in Berlin, the State Department at Washington is informed that, commencing today, Germany intends to inaugurate an unrestricted and ruthless submarine warfare within defined limits.
New York Closed.
New York, Feb. 1.—The port of New York, where twenty-four German and three Austrian steamers have been interned, was closed last night and a torpedo boat stationed at the entrance to maintain American neutrality. Vessels of every description were turned back at the quarantine station.
The general opinion throughout the country is that Count Von Bernstorff, the German Ambassador, should receive his passports and diplomatic relations between the United States and Germany should cease immediately. It is believed that there should be no further procrastination on the part of Washington and that matters should not be allowed to go on until the end of the United States is forced

by Germany through premeditated murder and depredations.
French Losses.
Paris, Feb. 1.—It is officially announced that eighteen French vessels were sunk between January 18th and 25th.
Later.
Ottawa, Feb. 1. 4 p.m.—Despatches from official Washington sources indicate that President Wilson has furnished Ambassador Von Bernstorff with his papers and that he has ordered the recall of Ambassador Gerard from Berlin. In official circles here it is believed that the information is correct.
Chicago Excited.
Chicago, noon.—The wildest panic in history rages in the stock markets, on rumor that the United States will declare war on Germany. United States Steel has gone below par and other stocks are being thrown on the market.
After Raiders.
New York, Feb. 1.—It is reported that the British government has assembled a large fleet of small fast cruisers to be used as submarine chasers. Four thousand of these craft are now available to clear the sea lanes of raiders and submarines and to act as convoys for Allied vessels.

UNRESTRICTED SUBMARINE CAMPAIGN BEGINS TODAY

GERMANY WILL SINK EVERYTHING AFLOAT, INCLUDING ALL HOSPITAL SHIPS—BERLIN CLAIMS HOSPITAL SHIPS USED AS TRANSPORTS—BRITAIN THREATENS TO MAKE REPRISALS

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, Feb. 1.—Germany intends to at once start a ruthless and unrestricted submarine campaign, sinking Allied vessels, including hospital ships. The Germans seek to excuse their action in regard to hospital ships by stating that the British are using these ships for the transportation of troops and munitions to France.
The British authorities most emphatically deny the truth of the German allegations in regard to the using of hospital ships as transports and the war office officially announces that it will take immediate steps to make reprisals if the German threats are executed between a line drawn between Flamborough Head, on the Yorkshire coast, and Ter-schelling, in Holland, and Land's End, in Cornwall, and Quessant, in France.
Berlin Instructions.
Berlin, Feb. 1.—An annex note has been delivered to American Ambassador Gerard permitting regular American passenger steamers to operate unmolested, provided Falmouth is the only port of destination and that a

certain route is followed in each direction between England and the United States.
The note states that the hulls and superstructures of the vessels must be painted in vertical stripes, three metres broad, alternating white and red and that, on the masts, a large flag of checkered white and red and that the American national flag be carried at the stern.
One steamer will be allowed every week in each direction, arriving at Falmouth on Sundays and departing on Wednesdays. Guarantees and assurances are required from the American government that the steamers shall carry no contraband.
McBRIDE MAY ENTER IMPERIAL POLITICS
Victoria, Jan. 29.—A persistent rumor here has it that Sir Richard McBride has either been offered a London constituency by one of the British parties, or he is after one, being ambitious to enter the political arena of the mother country. Oppositely, it is heard that efforts are being made to get Sir Richard to return to British Columbia to again lead the Conservative party.

J. M. SANDELS DIED SUDDENLY YESTERDAY

W. J. M. Sandels, local manager of Kelly, Douglas & Company, limited, passed away at the General Hospital about 9:30 last evening, after but a few hours' illness. About 3:30 yesterday afternoon, Mr. Sandels had a paralytic seizure in his office. Dr. Argin, who was called, had him removed to the hospital and all that was possible was done but deceased never regained consciousness.
Mr. Sandels was born at Innisfallen, Ireland, fifty-two years ago and came to the United States while a young man. For a number of years he was connected with large firms in the cured meat business, travelling regularly between New York and England. Later, he came to British Columbia, locating in Vancouver, where he travelled for the Hudson's Bay Company and later for Wilson Bros. When Dawson was at the height of its prosperity, the Kelly, Douglas Company sent him to the Yukon to open a branch, which was for several years highly prosperous, thanks to the energy and business ability of Mr. Sandels. Leaving the north, he was sent to open a branch for the same house in New Westminster. This established, and railroad construction beginning here, Mr. Sandels came to Prince Rupert and opened up the present business of Kelly, Douglas Company in 1908. Later, he carried out a similar piece of work in Victoria. Always having a keen interest in the north and

SUFFRAGIST PLOT TO MURDER PREMIER

London, Feb. 1.—Mrs. Alice Wheeldon; her two daughters, one of whom is a school teacher, and all suffragettes residing in Derby, and Mrs. Wheeldon's son-in-law, Alfred George Mason, a chemist of Southampton, and a conscientious military service objector, were charged at the Guildhall yesterday morning with conspiring to murder Premier Lloyd George and Hon. Arthur Henderson. The defendants denied all knowledge of any such conspiracy and declined to make a statement. The case was adjourned until Saturday.

MRS. GODENRATH WILL LECTURE ON TUESDAY

Captain and Mrs. Godenrath returned to the city yesterday, the captain to continue his recruiting work and Mrs. Godenrath to carry on her splendid work for the boys who are wounded at the front. On Tuesday afternoon, at 4 o'clock, in the Presbyterian Church, Mrs. Godenrath will tell of her experiences at the front. The lecture is under the auspices of the I. O. D. E. and is in aid of the Daughters of the Empire Hospital in London. There is an urgent call for supplies and the demand will increase shortly when activity on the western front increases and all who can should be present at the lecture on Tuesday. Mrs. Godenrath has established quite a reputation as a lecturer and recently addressed a large audience in the Hotel Vancouver under the auspices of the Women's Canadian Club, many being unable to gain admittance. The Presbyterian Church should be filled to overflowing on Tuesday afternoon, not only because the cause is worthy but because the address will be something not to be missed.

RED CROSS FRIDAY

Mrs. Jenns and Mrs. Jennings will have charge of the Red Cross sale in the rooms on Third Ave. on Friday. The latest reports of the British Red Cross show that our efforts must be redoubled as the burden in France is steadily getting heavier and the increase is falling almost entirely upon the British Red Cross Society. A call has been sent out to the Dominions for redoubled enthusiasm and effort and no doubt it is only necessary to notify Prince Rupert citizens of this fact and they will gladly respond, as in the past.

RECRUITING MEETING IN EMPRESS THEATRE

The very stormy weather kept many people away from the war lecture in the Empress Theatre last evening. In introducing Lieut. Gordon, of the Irish Fusiliers, Rev. Canon Rix, who presided, dwelt upon the splendid record of the 11th Irish and pointed out that many of the men in its ranks had gone from here and had distinguished themselves. He impressed upon those present the necessity of doing everything possible to win the war, as the Germans were not yet beaten. Referring to President Wilson's speech, Canon Rix said there could be no peace without victory. There must be a decided victory and he favored the conscription of the wealth as well as the manhood of the Empire. He said that no man should be getting rich at the expense of his country; that every man should go that possibly could go and that the rest should give until they were able to give no more.

Lieut. Gordon congratulated Prince Rupert upon the splendid work done. After dwelling upon the distinguished service of the 7th Battalion, which consisted mainly of the 11th Irish, the lieutenant said that he did not believe that the National Service cards had anything to do with conscription but he personally believed that there should be more equality of service. It was not right that one family should give three sons and another none. Dealing with the idea that this is not Canada's war, he said that (Continued on Page four.)

BOB'S EVIDENCE

Bob Rogers' chickens are coming home to roost, as chickens will, and it is particularly unfortunate for Sir Robert Borden that he allowed himself to be forced to admit the "election wizard" of Manitoba to his cabinet.

The report of Mr. Justice Galt regarding the kind of evidence given by Mr. Rogers before the commission of enquiry into the construction of the Manitoba Agricultural College requires little comment. It speaks for itself. The worthy "Bob" has got himself into several political "serapes" but he is now in a very awkward predicament. Here is a judge, appointed at the instigation of Hon. Robert Rogers, forced to admit that he cannot accept the evidence of that minister as being anywhere near the truth. What will "Bob" do about it? He cannot have another commission appointed, as was done in regard to Dr. Bruce's report on the Canadian Hospitals in England, when the report of the famous surgeon was found to state the naked truth.

The well from which the Honorable Robert drew his election wizardry has been uncovered, and to put the matter mildly, it gives off an odor with which no cabinet minister, and no honest, self-respecting man, should be connected.

What is Sir Robert Borden going to do about it? Get "Bob" to write him an impertinent letter which will occasion a request for his resignation?

It is perhaps fortunate that the Federal Government decided to postpone the construction of the Parliament Buildings, on account of the war expense requiring all the available capital. With the Manitoba gentleman as Minister of Public Works, it is not unlikely that the cost of construction would have required just as much capital as the war. Perhaps the building was postponed so that "Bob" might have full scope for his powers. It would have been a shame if such a magnificent spender and builder had had to restrain

himself when given the opportunity of a life time. Probably the plan was to get the war finished and then to let Robert be given a free hand with the finances of the Dominion, just to see what he really could do when he set his mind to spending. The plans which he formulated, against the opinion of the Liberal minority on the rebuilding committee, were eloquent of expense. Millions were to be thrown about in battalions in massed formation, and "Bob" was going to have the time of his life. What he did in Manitoba was probably simply by way of preliminary practice, in order to be ready for anything that might crop up. The Ottawa fire cropped up and Robert did his best to grasp the opportunity, but, unfortunately for "Bob," and fortunately for Canada, the war was costing too much and he had to postpone his great building "spree."

Now that Mr. Justice Galt has given his legal opinion of the kind of evidence submitted by the minister of public works surely the Premier will do what he should have done when that evidence was first given—call on Hon. Robert to depart from the ranks of the Government, which he should have never adorned.

HARRY LAUDER'S SON KILLED IN ACTION

Captain John Lauder, Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders, son of Mr. Harry Lauder, the well-known comedian, has been killed in action. He had been wounded twice previously. He became engaged to be married before he went back to the trenches. He was educated in the City of London School, and was at Cambridge when war broke out. He had taken his B. A. and intended entering the legal profession. The blow comes to Mr. Lauder at a time when he had crowned all his achievements in vaudeville by his successful appearance at the Shaftesbury Theatre, London, as an actor in the new revue, "Three Cheers."

Many stories are told of the comedian's devotion to his son (says a Manchester Guardian correspondent). Some years ago, when he was acting in the Manchester pantomime, he made a lightning week-end journey to Dunoon to see "Jack," who was lying ill. Harry Lauder arrived at Gourrock early on the Sunday morning, and as there was no boat available to take him over the Clyde he hired a fisherman's

boat, and made the crossing home. The world heard also of the thousand pound motor car which Mr. Lauder bought for his son out of the earnings of his American tour in 1907, and of the coming-of-age banquet at Dunoon, attended by public men and Harry Lauder admirers from all over the country.

It was the dream of his life that his son should settle down with him on the estate which he bought in Scotland. "When my son comes home from the wars," he wrote once, "I'm in hopes he'll take kindly to the thoughts o' sheep farming and gie the thoughts o' sheepskins and legal processes the go-by." "I hope to see him established in the North as a decent Scots laird growing the nation's meat, and as the years go by, growing the nation's men." Harry Lauder visited his son at the front, and delighted the Scots soldiers with his songs. Nothing touched him more than to find that someone had christened his son's billet "Lauder Vale." It made him think of "home"—the word that meant "our cause" to him.

Just before Christmas, Mr. Harry Lauder, in a message to a London paper, said in his direct and touching way that he would give anything to know that his boy would come through safe and sound.

RECRUITING MEETING IN EMPRESS THEATRE

(Continued From Page One.)

The battles of Canada were being fought out in Europe just as surely as if they were fighting on the Pacific coast. "If Canada is worth living in, Canada is worth fighting for," urged the speaker. He also criticised our immigration policy, pointing out that too many men who had none but a purely selfish interest in Canada had been brought here. He favored the idea of Canada for the Canadians and thought that a much more careful sifting of our immigrants should be made in future. Lieut. Gordon said he believed in freedom for all men, but he did not believe that it was fair that, at this time, Austrians and Germans should be employed in hundreds along this coast at \$4 and \$5 per day while our boys fought in the trenches. He thought that a heavy tax should be put upon their earnings and the proceeds devoted to the welfare of our soldiers' dependents. After making a strong appeal for every available man to join the colors, he paid a compliment to the ladies of Prince Rupert for the way in which they had assisted the returned soldiers in furnishing their quarters.

Sergt.-Major Matier gave a short address in which he told of some of his experiences in India, Egypt, Turkey, Greece, France and Britain. He had been sent to Vancouver by the Indian government in connection with the Komagata Maru trouble, and, later, in Marseilles, he found some of the Hindus from Vancouver making their way to Germany. He firmly believed that the whole scheme was of German origin. The High School Glee Club rendered patriotic songs during the evening, the Marseillaise being rendered in French. The accompaniments were played by Miss Marguerite Kilpatrick. At the close, Lieut. Gordon showed some pictures from the front, but was unable to give the whole series as the movie machine was out of order. A collection was taken on behalf of the soldiers' fund in Vancouver.

FROM FAR AND NEAR

It is reported that Hon. J. D. Hazen and Hon. Robert Rogers will accompany the Premier to London.

The Empire Resources Committee, consisting of many of the most prominent men in England, has a scheme to purchase 200,000,000 acres of Canadian land for settlement after the war. The idea is that by the cultivation of this land the war debts may soon be liquidated.

The German merchant submarine Deutschland, which left Bremen for New London, Conn., on January 2nd, is now long overdue. Captains arriving in New York state that the Deutschland has been captured by a British cruiser.

Sir Sam Hughes says that were he Minister of Militia again he would enforce the Militia Act and call up every available man for overseas service.

Before undertaking a raid on the German trenches, the Canadian boys blacken their faces with burnt cork. The raids are made with clock-like precision, the bombing parties and following companies following out their plans to the second.

Joe Martin has decided to shake the dust of British Columbia from off his feet and return to London, where he will once more contest St. Pancras division.

Washington is looking for the Kaiser to make the next step towards peace. It is believed that a definite move towards peace will be made by Berlin.

An old country newspaper, in telling of the early days of Sir Max Aitken, now Lord Brunswick, says the new peer is the son of a Presbyterian minister and was born "at New Brunswick, Nova Scotia."
