## WILSON SEVERES RELATIONS WITH GERMANY

### BERNSTORFF HANDED HIS PASSPORTS AND AMBASSADOR GERARD RECALLED

#### WILSON SEVERES DIPLOMATIC RELATIONSHIP WITH GERMANY

BERNSTORFF HANDED HIS PAPERS—GERARD RECALLED FROM BERLIN—PRESIDENT WILL GIVE DETAILS TO CONGRESS TODAY—PRECAUTIONS TAKEN AT NEW YORK

(Special to The Daily News.)

Washington, Feb. 3.—(Flash; on). The United States has severed diplomatic relations with Germany. Count Von Bernstorff has been handed his passports and Ambassador Gerard has been recalled from Berlin.

President Wilson, in a detailed address to a joint session of congress at two o'clock this afternoon, will explain the circumstances attending his decision. The strictest secrecy is being observed regarding the details.

President Wilson presented his completed message to Congress early this morning when arrangements for his appearance at a joint session this afternoon were immediately made. The decision to break with Germany was reached yesterday afternoon after the president's confidential conference with his cabinet and the members of the Senate, when the conclusion was arrived at that the country would stand solidly behind him in severing diplomatic relations.

It is doubtful yet as to whether the break with Germany will be accompanied by a similar course as to Austria-Hungary. At such action is expected, as it is understood that Austria endorsed Germany's decision to inaugurate an unrestricted submarine campaign.

#### New York Precautions.

New York, Feb. 3.—A large number of special inspectors on board police boats and four tugs have been added to the coast-guard cutter service, under the command of Chief Malone, the collector of the port, who has been in conference with representatives of the police department and the department of justice. The harbor police are acting under instructions from Washington and the reason for the movement is understood to be that a close watch may be kept on the international German and Austrian steamers.

#### CONCESSIONS MADE BY FISHERIES BOARD

The following telegram regarding the outcome of the visit of the Prince Rupert fisheries delegation to Ottawa was received by Mayor McCaffery this morning:—  
Ottawa, February 2nd.

Mayor McCaffery, Prince Rupert. The following resolutions were passed yesterday by the Fisheries Advisory Board, affecting the northern district. Forty additional attached licenses have been granted, along with forty attached licenses for the Gosse-Millard Cannery (Sunnyside). Twenty-eight of these must be given to Indians and twelve otherwise, the same as applies to the Cold Storage Company's Cannery.

That independent licenses be granted to all bona fide white applicants. That managers of salmon canneries be required at any time they have fresh salmon on hand to sell on application to a Canadian fishing vessel such quantity of salmon as may be required for actual bait purposes and at the price salmon are worth for canning purposes.

That the fee for herring gill net licenses be reduced to one dollar and that hereafter in district one authorized fishing in all parts of the district.

It was further resolved that, after the coming season, the issuing of attached licenses in district two be discontinued. All canners will have equal chance to share in catches of fish and that power boats will also be allowed after this season. Trust general public will be satisfied.

#### GERMANS HONOR CANADIAN DEAD

This monument, designed by a famous German architect and carved by a noted Teuton sculptor, has been erected at Giessen to the memory of those Canadian and British soldiers who have died while interned in this prison.

#### BIG DEVELOPMENTS IN ALICE ARM DISTRICT

Corroborating previous reports as to coming activity in Alice Arm, Mr. R. B. McGinnis, of San Francisco, who is general manager of the Dolly Varden mine in the Alice Arm district, stated that the company which he represents are prepared to put this mine on a heavy producing basis. They have already spent \$300,000 in preliminary work, consisting of diamond drilling, shafts, tunnels, the construction of a wagon road eighteen miles in length, and other details connected with the opening up of a mine in a new district.

Reports have been published in various mediums that control of the Dolly Varden is owned by the Marshall Field estate, of Chicago. This, said Mr. McGinnis on Monday night, is a mistake. The Marshall Field estate has nothing to do with the property. It is owned by the Chicago Exploration Company, a close corporation composed of a group of capitalists who have their engineers in the field all the time and are prepared to take up any mining or industrial proposition which appears to be capable of producing a profit.

The Dolly Varden group consists of a consolidation of fifteen claims and, although not the first discovery of the district, it has been, more than any other property, responsible for drawing attention to this section on account of development work done. Some of the samples which have been exhibited in this city are heavily impregnated with native silver, ruby silver and black sulphides, but Mr. McGinnis explained that the district has been subjected to a violent faulting movement, which was followed by a secondary enrichment in mineral values, and the cabinet specimens are obtained almost always from the vicinity of the fault lines cutting the leads.

He believes that, taken as a whole, the Dolly Varden will be a concentrating proposition, and one of the plans now being worked out is the installation of a floating concentrator, with an initial capacity of 200 tons.

Although the Chicago Exploration Company built the wagon road to the mine, it is necessary for them to receive permission from the provincial government before they can lay steel along the route for a railroad. They wish to build a narrow gauge road for general purposes, which would in its initial stages at least, be run by steam power, with the probability of using electricity later when the water power of the camp is developed.

The company with which Mr. McGinnis is associated do not believe in delays, and it is their intention to put the Dolly Varden on a paying basis this year.—Vancouver Sun.

#### MERCHANTS ASKED TO BOYCOTT GRAND TRUNK

The Board of Trade, at their meeting last evening, passed the following resolution: "That this Board of Trade go on record as recommending that the merchants and shippers of the city of Prince Rupert route their steamship freight over lines other than the Grand Trunk Pacific, unless that company makes this the headquarters of its steamship business and also takes steps to develop the company's other interests in and about this city. That a copy of this resolution be sent to Messrs. Chamberlin, Donaldson, Hinton and McNichol, of the G. T. P. Company. That the chairman appoint a committee to interview the other local mercantile associations with a view to obtaining their co-operation and that a committee interview Mr. McNichol and express the board's views in presenting the resolution previous to his departure for Winnipeg on February 3rd."

#### BOARD OF TRADE AND COPPER REFINING

In the absence of G. A. Woodland, who is in Vancouver, H. S. Wallace presided at the meeting of the Board of Trade last night. The action of the mining committee was endorsed in sending a resolution to Sir Thomas White in connection with his proposed legislation to refine copper, zinc, and other metals within the Dominion, and pointing out the particularly favorable facilities which Prince Rupert affords. Mr. F. W. Hart withdrew from the association.

The question of ore sacks being placed on the free list was brought up and discussed.

#### DUKE AND DUCHESS TO VISIT WINNIPEG

Winnipeg, Feb. 3.—Premier Norris announced in the Legislature yesterday that the Duke and Duchess of Devonshire will arrive in Winnipeg at the end of this month and that their visit will last for one week.

#### FOUR BRITISH AEROPLANES ARE MISSING

Warmer Weather Brings Increased Air Activity on the West Front—British Take Prisoners.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Feb. 3.—The British attacked the German trenches northwest of Guedecourt last night and captured prisoners. British forces also repelled with machine guns an enemy attack near Gommecourt.

Warmer weather prevails along the western front, the result being that there is increased aerial activity. There were several air engagements yesterday and four British machines are missing.

The fighting on other fronts is confined largely to encounters between the rival patrol parties and reconnoitering expeditions. The usual artillery bombardments which have been to a large extent suspended on account of the severity of the weather, are being resumed.

#### Spain Anxious.

Madrid, Feb. 3.—The Spanish premier had a consultation last night with the American Ambassador regarding America's action in regard to the unrestricted submarine campaign. The conference lasted from midnight until two o'clock this morning.

The Spanish ministers of the interior, of the navy, and of war have given instructions to the naval and military authorities, made necessary by the gravity of the international situation.

#### Americans at Sea.

Washington, Feb. 3.—There are hundreds of United States citizens on board liners which have entered, or are about to enter, the German submarine zone.

Entente diplomats, who have seen the British submarine and torpedo boat fleets at work, claim that it is impossible for Germany to inaugurate an effective blockade of Britain.

President Wilson last night sent instructions to Ambassador Gerard to do all he can to mitigate the sufferings of American citizens in Germany should a break occur.

#### ALBERTA ORGANIZES PROVINCIAL POLICE

(Special to The Daily News.)

Edmonton, Feb. 3.—An order-in-council has been passed by the provincial government to organize a provincial police force, as a result of the withdrawal of the Dominion Northwest Mounted Police from Alberta on March 1st.

#### SOME IDEA

An Irish engineer has conceived the idea of laying a huge pipe under the Atlantic, through which petrol could be pumped from the transatlantic oil fields to Great Britain. The estimated cost of laying such a pipe-line is \$50,000,000. A pipe of 18 inches diameter would deliver seven hundred gallons per minute from shore to shore.—Tit-Bits.

#### ROSS RIFLES STILL BEING SENT ABROAD

Sam Hughes Defends Rifle and Puts Blame on Ammunition—London Press Blams Sir Sam Heavily.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Ottawa, Feb. 3.—The Ross rifle was the chief theme of discussion in the House of Commons yesterday. Frank Carvell enquired why the factory continues manufacturing large quantities of the discarded arm. The Premier explained that they were being sent to England to be used by the home defence forces and by marines.

#### Hughes Defends Rifle.

Sir Sam Hughes vigorously defended the Ross rifle, claiming that it had proved superior to the Lee-Enfield. The weapon used by the British forces, in every test made and that the entire trouble was due to defective ammunition.

#### London Criticism.

London, Feb. 3.—The Star, commenting upon Sir Sam Hughes' speech in the Commons yesterday, which has just been printed here, says Hughes is more loyal to the Ross rifle than to the men who are fighting for Canada and the Empire. The Star points out that Canadian equipment was not thrown aside through war office prejudice in favor of our weapon, but by the Canadians themselves. That should be sufficient even for Sir Sam himself.

## THE ROSS RIFLE

A few weeks ago the Hon. Arthur Meighen, solicitor-general, in a public speech, declared that the reason why the present government continued to arm Canadian soldiers with the Ross rifle for a year after it was found that this weapon was useless for active service was that it was bound by a contract between Sir Charles Ross and the previous administration. This apparently was the best defence Mr. Meighen, the government's champion defender, could make. Sir Chas. Ross at once retorted that not only was the government not bound to any particular rifle, but pertinently pointed out that even if it was it had the power to set aside the contract if it involved the safety of its men in the field. Discussing the matter the Ottawa Citizen says: "Sir Charles Ross is apparently prepared to prove that he did not bind the government to the Ross rifle in particular, although the loquacious solicitor-general, in his recent apologetic campaign, distinctly affirmed that the government was bound by the terms of its contract with the Ross company to use only the rifle manufactured by that company and officially known as the Ross rifle—an explanation that was faithfully echoed, with much abuse for any other contention, by the local government organ. It was asserted by the party press that the government would have laid itself open to suits for immense damages had the contract been departed from by the militia department. "Sir Charles Ross puts the issue squarely before the solicitor-general. He is evidently prepared to stand by his guns—and his gun. Sir Charles, it is worth noting, takes virtually the same position as that conjectured by the Citizen in answer to the claim of the solicitor-general, viz., that the government could not be morally bound to accept a weapon which did not suit the men at the front. It is exceedingly doubtful if it could be legally forced to accept an unsatisfactory arm. In any event the

consent of the crown would have to be obtained were a suit to be taken against the government, so that the entire situation was in the hands of the government.

"The explanation of Sir Charles Ross comes at a time when it should do much to clear the air and definitely fix responsibility for the persistent equipping of the troops at the front with the rifle against the use of which there was much bitter complaint from those apparently in a position to know. Men risking their lives for the Empire would probably be in a better position to give an impartial opinion regarding the merits of the Ross as a military rifle than all the experts in the country.

"The country demands the facts regarding the equipping of the troops with the Ross rifle and will not be put off by 'explanations' like that of the solicitor-general. In the meantime, that gentleman would seem to be in an unenviable position. It is difficult to see how he can repudiate his Montreal speech without admitting that he did not know what he was talking about. If he presumes to answer Sir Charles Ross the country is in for some interesting revelations. In any event it is clear the government will be put on its defence in this matter during the coming session."—Victoria Times.

## NOTES AND COMMENTS

Woodrow is again pounding the typewriter. It is to be hoped that his new note is worthy of a man who occupies the seat of Abraham Lincoln and that his views are expressed in unmistakable language.

The United States is looked upon by the smaller neutral nations in Europe as the leader of the neutrals. It is to be hoped that President Wilson, feeling the responsibility of his position, gives them a strong lead.

Shipping as usual is the order in Great Britain. Germany has already done her worst and has



been able to get only one British transport. With the big liners guarded as carefully as transports have been, the latest German threat will prove as idle and futile as the rest of the Prussian boasting.

Von Bethmann-Hollweg says that Germany stakes everything on the outcome of the submarine campaign. She has already staked, and lost irretrievably, her name as a civilized nation. Though she were even yet to win the war, she has lost what untold victories on the field can never give her again.

The American liner St. Louis has left New York without complying with the German regulations. How dare the Americans refuse to be ruled by the Germans? If a German submarine sinks the St. Louis, the fat will be in the fire.

The provincial government has passed an order-in-council exempting the wholesale merchants from the half-holiday act.

### IMPORTANT INVENTION BY MINING ENGINEER

An American mining engineer has come to England with an invention for using nitrogen as an energy-producer in place of coal, at a fraction of the cost. He is offering it, in the first place, to the British government.

In an interview with a representative of the Observer, he pointed out that there are in the atmosphere nearly four thousand billion tons of nitrogen available for use in the new power, and unlike the use of hydro-carbon fuels, which are destroyed, his method of using nitro-power converts the fuel back into its elemental state.

"It can be used," he said, "for every purpose for which coal and crude oil are now used, even to smelting. With the apparatus I have invented one ton of nitro-energy is equivalent to thirteen hundred tons of coal, and it is safer than petrol. From it electricity can be made for a fifteenth of the present cost, and five or six generating stations, with trunk lines radiating to all parts of the country, will turn every wheel in the kingdom, light and heat the homes, and do the cooking.

## BRITAIN AS BANKER FOR ENTENTE POWERS

The striking manner in which history repeats itself is illustrated by an article published in a recent issue of "Country Life."

When the long wars with France began in 1793, the only force Pitt had available consisted of about 30,000 men. This "contemptible little army," by strenuous exertions, he managed to increase in a year's time to 140,000, including the militia, but exclusive of the 40,000 men composing "the foreign legion" serving in Flanders. These numbers Pitt described as "unparalleled, and such as could hardly be expected." Today again the government is following in Pitt's footsteps and training an army after war had begun.

During the campaigns of last century, "Pitt's gold," as the French dubbed the wealth of Britain, enabled the troops of Russia, Sweden, Austria, and Prussia to march; the money was paid back in victory alone. Once more Britain is playing the role of banker to the Entente Powers, as well as training, arming, and transporting her own huge bodies of men.

To meet the drain on the country's resources during the wars with France, Pitt, in 1798, trebled the assessed taxes. It was Pitt who introduced taxes on windows, mules, horses, dogs, clocks, watches, and even cocoanuts, in order to raise money for his fighting men.

## PAYS BACK PURCHASE PRICE IN ONE SEASON

Montreal, Feb. 1.—Grand Trunk Pacific officials in Montreal are receiving reports indicative of the prosperous conditions which prevail in the great agricultural territory served by the line in western Canada. One correspondent at Holden, Alberta, states that with good crops and high prices received for grain, the price of raw land is keeping up to about twenty dollars an acre. This is considered cheap, however, as many farmers are reaping from the soil in a single season the whole purchase price of their land.

A settler in this Holden district of Alberta bought a quarter section of raw land in 1915 for \$16.50 an acre. He broke up fifty-three acres and last year sowed it to wheat, threshing \$2,960 worth of grain. The price of the farm was \$2,640, so that the one crop off fifty-three acres paid for the one hundred and sixty acres of land and gave the farmer about three hundred dollars in addition. With such opportunities awaiting the man who is willing to work on the land, the railroad authorities believe that tens of thousands of the best type of settler can be readily attracted to Canada when conditions become normal again.
