WILSON AWAITING GERMANY'S NEXT MOVE

BRITAIN OFFERS SAFE CONDUCT TO BERNSTORFF -- NO BREAK WITH AUSTRIA

BRITAIN GIVES BERNSTORFF SAFE CONDUCT

Wilson Wants Nothing Done Which Will Bring Reproach — Congress Records Official Break in Relations.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Washington, Feb. 6.—While awaiting the result of Germany's published intentions, which will determine the United States in its policy of peace or war, President Wilson is anxious that nothing shall be done which is not fully justified by the law of nations and humanity. He wants no word spoken and no deed done which will merit reproach even from Germany.

Congress went through the formality of recording Wilson's action in breaking off relations with Germany and the Republicans promised their support in whatever line of action the President might see fit to take.

The British government is willing to grant safe conduct to Count Von Bernstorff and the three hundred German consuls in the United States, through the British blockade by the shortest and most direct route.

The Swiss legation here is arranging the details of the departure of the officials who will presumably go through Holland and Denmark.

DAUGHTERS OF EMPIRE HOLD ANNUAL MEETING

TOPICAL BUDGET

VIENNA AND WASHINGTON ARE FRIENDLY

No Break in Relations Between Austria and the States—Liners Arrive Safely—Relief Ship Sunk.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Vienna, Feb. 6.—Following the news of the severance of diplomatic relations with Germany, Ambassador Penfield, on behalf of the United States, conferred with the Austro-Hungarian Foreign Minister here. After the conference, he notified President Wilson that relations between the United States and Austro-Hungary had not been affected by the change.

Shipping Movements.

New York, Feb. 6.—The American steamers Philadelphia and Finland have reached Liverpool safely, and the arrival of the St. Paul at New York, leaves the Kroonland and the New York as the only American passenger vessels still at sea. The St. Louis will probably sail from New York for Liverpool today.

It is reported that the crews of the interned German and Austrian vessels in New York harbor wrecked their engines, doing damage to the extent of \$4,000,000.

Spanish Note.

Madrid, Feb. 6.—Spain's note to Germany, in reply to the notice of the new submarine campaign, will be delivered in Berlin today.

Relief Ship Sunk.

London, Feb. 6.—The Belgian relief steamer Lars Jurse, which was sailing under Danish registry, has been sunk. The vessel had a cargo of wheat on board. The British steamer Hurstwood has been sunk without warning.

REPEAL WANTED FOR PLURAL VOTING CLAUSE

At the city council meeting last evening, the following resolution, passed at a meeting of the Trades and Labor Council on January 23rd, was read:—

Whereas, it is found that the present provisions of the Municipal Clauses Act, which provides that incorporated companies have votes as companies, and that also the members of said companies have individual votes, thus giving a plurality of votes to one business concern, is not in harmony with true democracy and is a menace to just representation.

Therefore, be it resolved that the council petition the Mayor and Aldermen of the city of Prince Rupert to use their best endeavor to have this clause in the Municipal Clauses Act duly repealed.

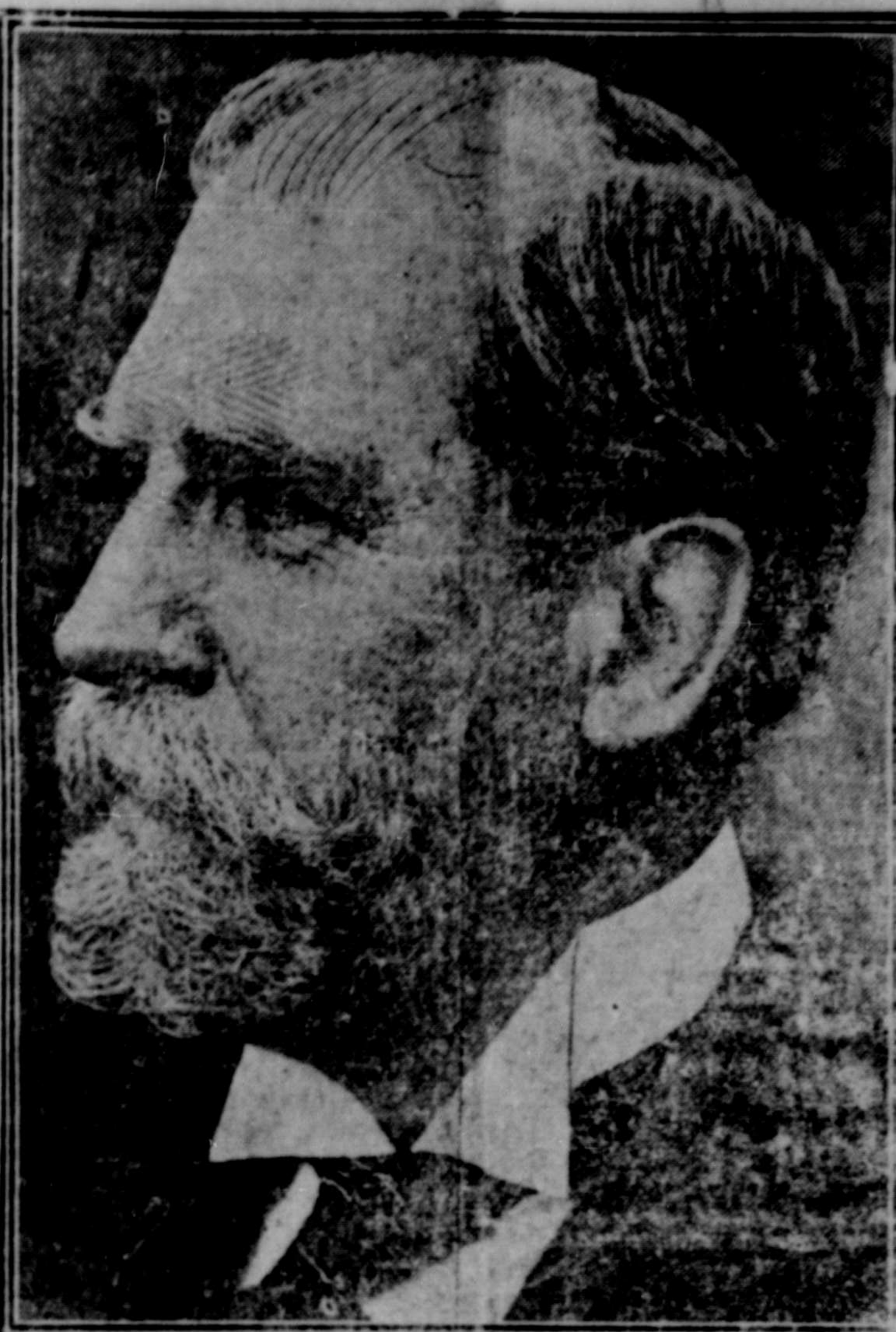
Ald. Casey, seconded by Ald. Montgomery, moved that the resolution be concurred in and that the city solicitor be instructed to petition the provincial government requesting that the particular clause be repealed. This carried unanimously.

President Wilson's opponent in the presidential campaign, who made his first public appearance since the election as the guest of honor at a university banquet on Thursday last, Mr. Hughes said: "We are all Americans tonight, standing behind our president, on whom this great responsibility rests. It is not a time to em-

barrass in any degree with private utterances those charged with this responsibility. They have the facts; they have the duty to perform. They have the sincere loyal co-operation of every American. The exigency of no nation can fix the limits of American rights." Mr. Hughes' speech brought the students to their feet singing "The Star-Spangled Banner."

MAYOR WANTS WATER POWERS FOR THE CITY

Mayor McCaffery presented to the city council last night a report on his trip south. He placed before the government the following legislation which the city desires enacted during the coming session:—

To bring down legislation whereby the provincial government would pay the local improvement and other taxes on the lands in the city of Prince Rupert in which the government holds an equity.

The mayor reported that he believed that the government would agree to pay these taxes.

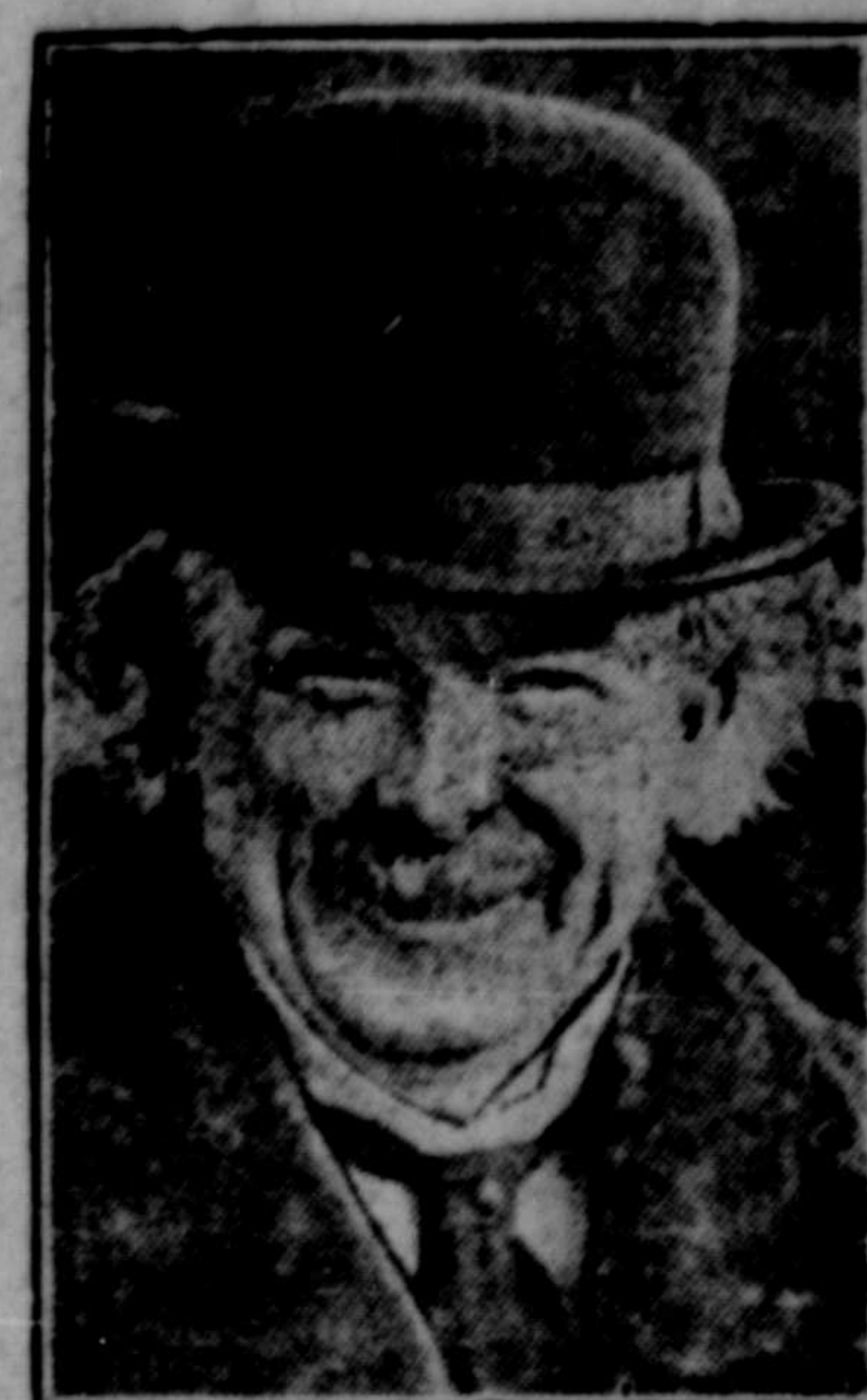
He also asked for special legislation in regard to the having of the Reserve Fund bylaw made legal. This he also believed would be granted.

He also urged the government to place a reserve on the Wark Channel water power, and any other water powers tributary to this city, and, in addition to placing a reserve on same, to hold such powers without payment until such time as the city had developed same. The mayor said he would be able to report on this fully at a later date.

While in the south, Mayor McCaffery had a consultation with J. D. Ross, head of the Electric Light Department in Seattle, regarding the plant at Shawatlans. On this matter he will report fully later.

MAYOR SUGGESTS THAT CITIZENS GET TOGETHER

Ald. Casey, at the city council meeting last night, drew attention to the action being taken by the Board of Trade in regard to the drydock, and said that it was likely that the retail merchants would take similar action. He thought that the council should co-operate with any public bodies which showed a desire to get things moving along this line. The Grand Trunk Pacific had signified a willingness to lease the plant and had made arrangements with Mr. Cotton to this end. Everything seemed favorable to the closing of the deal until it came to Sir Robert Borden and he did or said something which caused the whole matter to stop. "We have waited patiently for the outcome of Sir Robert's blockade," said Ald. Casey, "and I think that the mayor should consider the merits of the whole case and submit some plan of procedure to the council at the next meeting." He said that, by co-operating with the other bodies they might at least find out why Sir Robert Borden blocked the business and what the government or the G. T. P. intends to do in the matter.

The mayor said that the council could not follow the lines of the Board of Trade in regard to the making of this port the headquarters for the G. T. P. steamers, as the council as a body could not take any such action. However, individually and collectively, he had no doubt that the members were willing to get together with any body which planned to bring business to the city. He thought the citizens as a whole should get together in the matter. They saw, in the report from Ottawa recently, how much good it had done to get together on fishing matters and he felt that united action in regard to other matters would have as good results.

GOVERNMENT TO BUY MORE ROSS RIFLES

McLean Wants Public Arsenal Established—Sam Hughes Says Gen. Alderson Knows Nothing About Rifles.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Ottawa, Feb. 6.—The Government has decided to purchase more Ross rifles. A. K. McLean objected to the government doing business with a private company and advocated the establishment of a public arsenal. He claimed that the people favored national factories for the making of munitions and the manufacturing of material for war. This scheme would bring about the elimination of huge profits to private manufacturers out of the Empire's life and death struggle.

The Premier refused to accept an amendment to this effect proposed by A. F. McLean.

Sir Sam Hughes declared that the Germans controlled certain British rifle factories and stated that General Alderson, who commanded the first Canadian division and was the first to condemn the Ross rifle, did not know the first thing about a rifle.

THE SNOW PLOW CREW HAD STRENUOUS TIME

Passengers who arrived on the delayed train yesterday afternoon were, to put it mildly, glad to see Prince Rupert. They had spent practically three days in snow-drifts and in the latter part of that time they did not have too much to eat, as supplies were running short and there was no possibility of getting fresh stocks of food. The men on the snow-plow had the toughest time they ever experienced on this division. At one time they had three engines attached to the "stuck" plow and were unable to move it. Oil fuel got low in two of the engines and had to be borrowed from the others, while the only water available was from the melting of snow. Three men were kept busy shovelling snow to fill the boilers and it seemed as if it required several tons of snow to make a quart of water. Latest reports are that shortly after the plow came through, with the passenger train behind it, slides came down as heavily as ever. There is some doubt as to whether the train due to arrive this evening will get in. The snow-plow crew, after such a long spell of strenuous work, were given a rest spell which they had certainly earned.

GERMAN FREEDOM

In the light of the happenings of the past two years and a half, the letter from Von Bernstorff to President Wilson accompanying the note regarding the new submarine campaign, makes amusing reading. There are but two conclusions to be drawn from this letter—either that Germany has gone quite mad, or her diplomats are so filled with the idea of Germany's vast superiority, mentally and every other way, that they cannot imagine any member of another nation having wit enough to read the message aright. The latter is probably the fair conclusion. The rest of the world has some slight responsibility for the German viewpoint, as German scholars and thinkers have, for the past twenty years, been accepted as the leaders in the world's thought. Before German thought became fashionable, Thomas Carlyle was a great student of German literature, if not of the German mind, speaking collectively. He was a great admirer of Goethe and Schiller and was to a certain extent responsible for the introduction of much that is German into British literature. Having shown appreciation of the German, Carlyle was naturally read widely in certain circles in Germany. This cranky Scotchman, greatly misunderstood by many of his own countrymen and contemporaries, once remarked that the population of England was some forty millions, more or less fools. May it not be that "Tammias" is in part to blame for the estimate Germany has made of the British, and which has evidently been arrived at in regard to the Americans? Crass stupidity is so apparent in the German character that this might well be the partial explanation of German diplomatic methods.

After what happened in Belgium in the days following the outbreak of the war, and while the Germans are taking tens of thousands of Belgians away into captivity, Bernstorff calmly tells the president of the United States that Germany wishes

only to be neighborly and friendly to the Belgians and that the using of Belgium as a means of creating intrigue against Germany must be brought to an end. This is given as an explanation of why Germany feels justified in murdering human beings of neutral as well as belligerent countries wholesale.

Bernstorff also naively reminds Wilson that the United States is all for freedom and independence and suggests that it would be a good thing if such freedom could be given to India and Ireland, and that, by murdering every human being afloat, except those on a red and white striped American steamer sailing strictly according to German instructions, Germany will give the world freedom of the seas, which is one of the things asked for in President Wilson's peace proposals. The German Ambassador's letter would have been an insult to a fourteen-year-old school-boy's intelligence, much less that of the president of the United States. Imagine Ireland and India under a free government, the terms of which are to be dictated by Germany. The people in Germany are not free. They are slaves, and the only idea of freedom in the Prussian Empire is the license which is enjoyed by the military classes. Germans, until they leave their own land to live in the United States or a British colony, do not understand the meaning of freedom, as it should be understood.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

Bernstorff wept and asked how he would ever reach home, when he was handed his passports. He had better apply to his old friend Von Tirpitz for a red and white striped pass.

Von Bernstorff, in his letter to President Wilson, tried, by using the language of arrogant Prussianism, to hide the fact that Germany is beaten and that she knows she is beaten.

anxiously for news of the American liner New York, which left Liverpool on Saturday for New York, ignoring the German instructions to Washington. The probability is she will be allowed to come through scatheless.

Wilson's action is probably a huge disappointment to Germany. The likelihood is that Berlin had sized up Woodrow as a man of such peaceful attitude that he would stand for anything, even murder.

Sir Gilbert Parker says that the war will end in the fall. This was said before the United States fired Bernstorff. Sir Gilbert may have to revise his estimate now.

WAR MAY NOT FOLLOW DIPLOMATIC RUPTURE

The breaking off of international relations does not necessarily mean that war is bound to follow, though the situation which has arisen is usually so serious as to lead to hostilities. The recall of an ambassador usually accompanies a declaration of war, following an ultimatum, the terms of which have not been complied with. The situation which has arisen between the United States and Germany is not of the ordinary type of international dispute. The two nations have no quarrel, but have reached a deadlock over Germany's new methods of conducting war against the Entente Allies, methods which interfere with the freedom of the United States in controlling their own commercial affairs.

Washington refuses to be dictated to by Germany as to the number of vessels American shipping lines will send across the Atlantic and refuses to paint her vessels in any particular way prescribed by Germany. The United States holds to her rights as a free nation and as a neutral, with no interest in the war and with no intention of allowing Germany to sink her ships simply because they do not sail strictly according to German instructions.

If Germany does not infringe upon the neutrality of the United States and if America does not do anything which may be taken as an infringement by Germany, Washington may still remain strictly neutral. If German submarines sink an American vessel, simply because that vessel is not complying with a ruling laid down by Berlin, but not agreed to by Washington, that act would be taken as an act of war. Action, however, would not be taken until the United States had made a thorough investigation into the case and had satisfied herself that a definite breach of neutrality had actually taken place. On the other hand, Germany may look upon the seizure of her interdicted ships as an act of war, and may immediately declare war on this score. The breaking off of relations is the laying of the fuse and the act of war is the match which sets everything in a blaze.

EXTRA WORK FOR SHORT TIME MEN

At the council meeting last night, Ald. Casey asked if it would not be possible for the outside departments to give more work to the men on the garbage wagon, who were working only four days a week. One of these men had six children to support and, at the present cost of living, he could not see how he could make out.

Ald. McRae said he heartily concurred in Ald. Casey's suggestion, but he believed that five days per week was the shortest time any of the men worked.

Ald. McClymont said that in going over the payrolls he noticed that the lowest wage was \$80 per month, so that the men must be working more than four days.
