SAFE CONDUCT

In guaranteeing safe conduct to Count Von Bernstorff and the three hundred German consuls who are to be sent out of the United States, Britain is playing the game as she knows it and has always played it. No matter how far Germany may sink in her methods of waging war, Britain plays the game. There is nothing to Britain's credit in doing this; she would be false to her history and false to posterity if she did not. For Britain to depart from the usages of war between nations would be a much greater injury to Britain than it would be to Germany. Britain cannot afford to stoop to a low level any more than a reputable citizen can afford to break into his neighbor's house. Germany has broken all the laws of nations and the common law of humanity, but she has not fallen from any national height: she has merely shown the world that she has been living for generations in the depths.

There will be many who will suggest that Bernstorff and his fellow conspirators should beallowed to pick their way across the Atlantic as best they can, and, if a German submarine sends them to the bottom, so much the better. B. SMITH has a dry goods store in a certain Canadian city. He does a good business, but wants to do more. He believes that Advertising in his local newspaper is the way to get more business. So he advertises -every now and then.
