CALIFORNIA INCIDENT MAY CAUSE BREAK

ANOTHER AMERICAN CITIZEN KILLED—BRITISH MAKE IMPORTANT GAIN IN WEST

BRITISH MAKE FURTHER GAIN ON WEST FRONT

Important Position Taken—Many Prisoners Taken—Activity on Macedonian and Russian Fronts.

London, Feb. 9.—The drive on the Somme front, which was renewed with vigor and good results yesterday, continues and the British forces have captured an important German position situated on the highest point of the Sully Sailisil Hill.

Further progress has been made in the Grandcourt region, where the greatest successes were scored yesterday, and the Bailliescourt farm has been secured, after a stubborn resistance by the Germans. The British also carried a German trench and entered the enemy lines south of Bouchavesnes, where several Germans were killed; dug-outs destroyed, and numerous prisoners were captured.

Macedonian Front.
The Teutonic forces on the Macedonian front are renewing their activities along the entire front.

Russian Gain.
In the Carpathians, the Russians captured first-line German and Austrian trenches.

Italian Front.
Italian artillery smashed the Austrian batteries in several sections in the Sugana Valley.

AUSTRIANS FIGHT WITH TABLE OUTLERY

Two Austrians, brothers of the name of Wozny, were arrested last night for assaulting a fellow-countryman of the name of Mike Twanicha. The assault took place at a boarding house on First Ave. at supper-time. Mike was rather severely cut about the head and face, the wounds having been inflicted with knives and forks, evidently grabbed from the supper table. The Wozny brothers were remanded until Monday.

SOLDIERS IN WRECK
Winnipeg, Feb. 9.—A train, carrying the 233rd Battalion, went over an embankment east of here yesterday. There were two fatalities and forty were injured.

CALIFORNIA INCIDENT MAY CAUSE BREAK

Breach Widening—Wilson Waiting for Details of Sinking of Liner—Gerard Held in Germany.

Washington, Feb. 9.—It is considered here to be only a matter of time when the signal for war on Germany will come. The breach is growing wider every hour since the sinking of the Anchor liner California, with United States citizens aboard. It is generally conceded that the sinking of this liner in nine minutes, with the loss of forty-one lives, clearly violates the rights of the United States.

President Wilson is determined not to plunge the country into war on a technicality and is awaiting the receipt of the complete evidence regarding the outrage before acting.

Gerard Held Up.
Germany requires guarantees that Von Bernstorff and the men on German vessels in the United States be permitted to leave before Ambassador Gerard and other American citizens shall be permitted to leave Germany.

On account of Germany detaining Ambassador Gerard and other American representatives, Washington has notified Berlin that German sailors on ships in the harbors of the United States have not been seized, but that German sailors on the United States coast guard ships have been dismissed. Great Britain and France have formally granted Washington safe passage through the Allied blockade for Count Von Bernstorff and his suite.

BISHOP HELD SERVICES AT KITKATLA MISSION

On Wednesday last, Bishop Du Vernet visited the Indian village of Kitkatla on Dolphin Island and held baptism, confirmation, and communion services. He went out on the "Western Hope," accompanied by Rev. James Gillett, who assisted in the services. The candidates were presented by Mr. George Oliver, who is in charge of the mission.

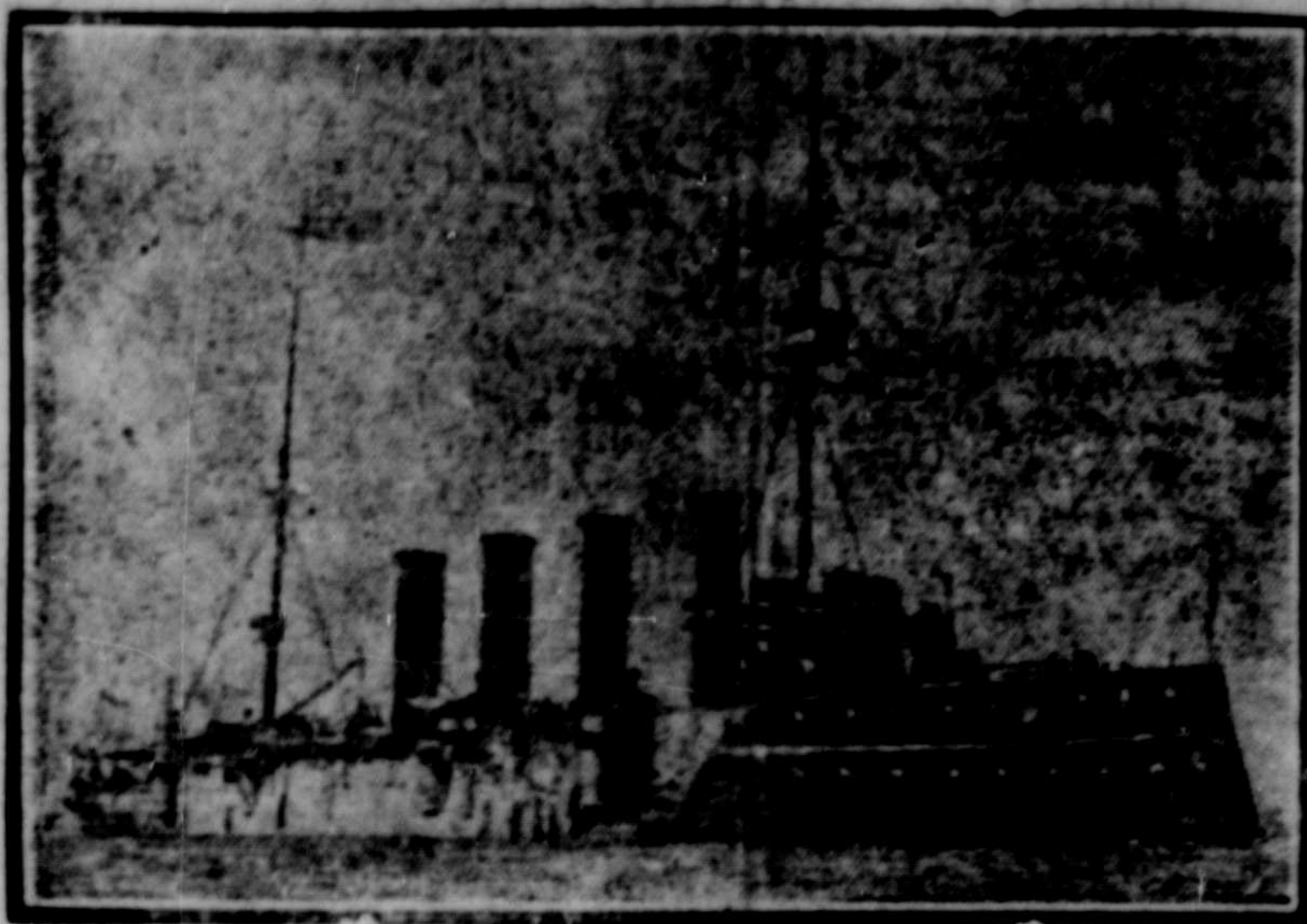
SEAL COVE RED CROSS

RENEWED CONFIDENCE IN FUTURE OF THE CITY

The members of the fisheries delegation, who arrived this morning, were not delayed long by the slide at mile 48, the line being cleared an hour after they reached that point. George Morrow says he returns to the city with renewed confidence in the future. Though Mr. Morrow has been a resident in the district since years before the city of Prince Rupert was dreamt of, this is the first occasion on which he has travelled across the continent over the Grant Trunk Pacific and he has nothing but praise for the road and the service maintained. The delegation arrived in Ottawa just half an hour behind schedule time, when trains of other lines were many hours overdue.

The deputation interviewed the Premier, Chairman Flavelle, of the Imperial Munitions Board, and several other prominent members of the House as well as the Fisheries Advisory Board, and Messrs. Morrow and Nelson went on to Montreal, where they had an interview with E. J. Chamberlin, president of the Grand Trunk Pacific, regarding the drydock. Mr. Morrow says that the war is the one subject of importance discussed in Ottawa but probably the next subject of importance is the railway situation. When that is solved, he is satisfied that Prince Rupert will come into its own, and after the war is over and steel is to be had in quantity, he is satisfied that the drydock will go ahead as it was intended it should.

BRAZIL WILL HOLD GERMANY RESPONSIBLE

Rio de Janeiro, Feb. 9.—Brazil's reply to the German submarine note, which was despatched today, declares that it is the intention of the Brazilian government to hold Germany responsible for any consequences resulting from the submarine warfare.

A German wireless station has been discovered five miles east of Rio de Janeiro, which has been established in order to communicate with the German ships which are detained in the harbor.

GREGORY RASPUTIN SHOT IN PETROGRAD

Gregory Rasputin, the Siberian peasant monk, who for years, and particularly since the outbreak of the war, exerted an evil influence over the lives of many prominent Russians, was murdered in Petrograd during the night of the last day of the year. He was shot in the garden of one of the most aristocratic houses in Petrograd and his body taken away in an automobile and dropped through a hole in the ice on the River Neva. A Reuter despatch says: "The names of those who took part in the deed are generally known. It is no exaggeration to say that the whole of Russia breathes more freely for the removal of a most baleful influence recognized as one of the pivots of the Germanophile forces in Russia. This hideous mediaeval nightmare is now dissipated, and no purpose would be served by recapitulating its horrors. One may leave history to marvel at the power wielded by the uneducated Siberian peasant, with his notorious depravity, whose name is so execrated throughout the length and breadth of the Empire. His unlimited sway over certain personalities is generally ascribed to hypnotic powers." The body of the murdered "monk" was discovered some days later near the Petrovsky Bridge on the Neva. The police hushed the matter up and no effort was made to bring the murderers to trial, the general opinion being that they had performed a service for Russia.

KEPT LIVE GROUSE

E. Chyber was brought up at the police court this morning on a charge of having a live grouse in his possession, contrary to the game laws. Accused said that he found the bird wounded across the harbor and brought it home. He had been very kind to the captive, feeding it along with his chickens. He was fined \$1. The game warden consented to his keeping the bird, as it is now unable to fly and is being taken care of.

CANADIAN LUMBER CAMP IN SCOTLAND

In the midst of a forest of Scots Pine, out of the beaten track of the tripper, away from the ruck of factory life and unknown to other war-workers only a few miles away in a great Scottish city, is a Canadian lumber camp.

Like some exposition side show this camp might have been transported, lock, stock and barrel from the wilderness of Canada on to the heather-floored hills of Scotland. It is there, complete, working and productive.

You will find them there—an army of big, hefty fellows cross-cutting and felling the stately pines with the same tools and almost under the same conditions as those men have accustomed themselves to in the great Dominion.

Near by the camp is the birth place of William Davidson, who, in 1769, first opened a contract to supply masts for British ships of war from the pine forests of Canada. His initiative developed into the great lumber industry of the West. No longer are wooden masts needed for the British navy. But the British army calls for planks, props and timberings for its engineers. So the lumbermen of the West "carry on" with their "hewing and sawing of wood."

The far-seeing authorities, realising that Scotland has the trees, have brought the lumbermen over from Canada, established a camp among the Scots pine forests and the work is done right on the spot.

These men know their job and know, too, that every swing of the axe deals a blow for their soldier comrades in France, that every piece of sawn timber added to the stack means a nail in Germany's inevitable coffin.

Little did our old Scots lairds dream, when they planted their thousands of tiny saplings, so many years ago that the giants of the forests which sprang from that beginning would be shaped by the saws and axes of Canada for war material.

In this busy camp, far from the land of the Maple Leaf, these "children of the forest" retain their native characteristics and love of country just as did their pioneer forefathers who first blazed the trail to the Rockies.

Their camp dining-hall is built of rough hewn timber, red of bark and "bleeding with ripeness." It has its name too and is called the "Chateau Frontenac" after the palatial caravansary of that name in Quebec city. The bunk house is also similarly dignified, while the barber's shop is a model of up-to-dateness in tonsorial equipment. It has one "tip-up" chair so that the lumber jack can be shaved and hot-towelled while he sleeps in true Western fashion. The chair is not a nickelled piece of furniture—not exactly what the auctioneer would term a "lavish appointment." It is just a "chair," that's all, made of spare timbers and balanced seesaw fashion on a stump round which the barber's shop has been built.

Even the officer's quarters are given a Western touch by a well constructed veranda or "porch," as it is known to the habitants. The village natives look upon it all as "a sad waste o' siller" but there it is. These Canadians have made their colony as much like home as possible and they are justly proud of their achievement.

It is all so realistic that only one feature makes exception. And that is the heather patches that give a new and out-of-the-ordinary coloring to the scene. Yet even the heather is in keeping

NEGRO KILLED WHEN STEAMER IS SUBMARINED

George Washington's Death May Hasten Hostilities—Peru Claims Compensation For Lost Ship.

London, Feb. 9.—The British ships Dauntless, Hollinside, Turino and Boyne Castle have been sunk, while a French steamer; the Macarena, a Spanish ship, and the Norwegian steamer Varing are amongst the latest submarine victims. The crew of the Hollinside left in the ship's boats and the captain's boat has landed. The crew of the Turino have landed and report that an American negro fireman named George Washington, had been killed when the vessel was submerged. Out of a crew of twenty-three on the Dauntless, six have made land and two of these have died since being brought ashore.

Peruvian Claim.
Lima, Feb. 9.—The Peruvian government has instructed its minister at Berlin to demand compensation for the sailing vessel Lorton, which was sunk by a German submarine.

Nine Liners Out.
New York, Feb. 9.—There were nine Entente passenger liners within the danger zones yesterday.

PENSION BOARD HAS BRANCH OFFICES

Ottawa, Feb. 5.—The Dominion government have appointed a board of pension commissioners for Canada with offices in Ottawa. As this board wish to cause as little delay as possible in dealing with communications with regard to pensions, they wish the public to correspond directly with the board of pension commissioners, Ottawa.

A great deal of delay may be caused by communications being sent through other departments of the government.

The Patriotic Fund Association and the Military Hospitals Commission have kindly consented to give information and assistance to those wishing to write direct to the board of pension commissioners. These societies have offices in certain localities throughout Canada.

In addition, in order to facilitate the granting of pensions, the board is opening branch pension offices in Vancouver, Calgary, Edmonton, Regina, Winnipeg, London, Hamilton, Toronto, Barrie, Kingston, Ottawa, Montreal, Quebec, St. John and Halifax. All information with regard to pensions may be obtained from these offices.

"BOB" SORE

"Bob" Rogers is in a hole and all his scrambling to get out only emphasizes the fact that he is in deep. In the House on Wednesday he tried to show that the reason why the Ottawa Citizen criticised him so severely in regard to his connection with the Manitoba Agricultural College building was that the owners of the paper had failed to persuade him to buy a post-office site in Montreal. Be the actions of the newspaper proprietors what they may, and "Bob" in the past has not shown any great resentment towards buying post-office sites, the Honorable Robert cannot get away from the report brought in by the investigation committee along with which Mr. Justice Galt sent a communication stating that he could place no credence in the evidence of the Minister of Public Works of the Borden government. There is evidence that the minister had refused to buy anything from Judge Galt, as a matter of fact the judge owed his appointment to Mr. Rogers. Mr. Justice Galt's report was not made out of any feeling of soreness at Mr. Rogers but simply as an honest opinion of the type of evidence Rogers produced at the enquiry. The minister cannot deny that the tender of the Carter Company was increased; he cannot deny that the firm contributed largely to the Conservative campaign fund to keep a government composed of men who were capable of misappropriating the public funds in power, and he cannot deny that the buildings cost several millions more than they should have done. We have not perused the criticism of the Ottawa Citizen but it could not possibly be too strong, even if it called for the expulsion of Robert Rogers from the public life of Canada forever, and branded him as a man who should never have been trusted with the management of the public works department of any government.

With regard to "Bob's" statement regarding his anxiety to prevent the despoiling of his

department by the purchase of a post-office site in Montreal, does he know how much his department allowed to be spent on a post-office site in Prince Rupert? Does he know who got the money paid for that site? Does he know that it costs a considerable sum every month to keep it pumped out? Does he know that the excavation cost an enormous sum, considering the work done and the yardage moved? Does he know that it is still only a site, with no sign of a post-office ever being erected on it? The lack of a building is not due to the war, but to the fact that the Tory patronage committee own the building which is being rented by the government.

Judging by the work of "Bob's" department in this line it will be hard to make the people of Prince Rupert believe that he ever refused to buy a site out of any respect for the cost to the public purse. There must have been some other reason. There must have been someone else who had a stronger "pull," or it may be that, by the time the purchase was discussed the site purchase debauchery had reached such a pitch that the cabinet had to step in and call a halt. "Bob's" post-office site story will be received here with a grin and a memory of our hole in the ground on Third Avenue and the general opinion will be that Mr. Justice Galt, by saying plainly what he thought of Mr. Rogers' evidence, did a great service to the people of Canada.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

Denmark is evidently anxious to remain strictly neutral. It is hard to conceive of any nation remaining neutral in face of the German submarine menace. Under the circumstances, there can be no such thing as neutrality. Inaction means concurrence in German methods.

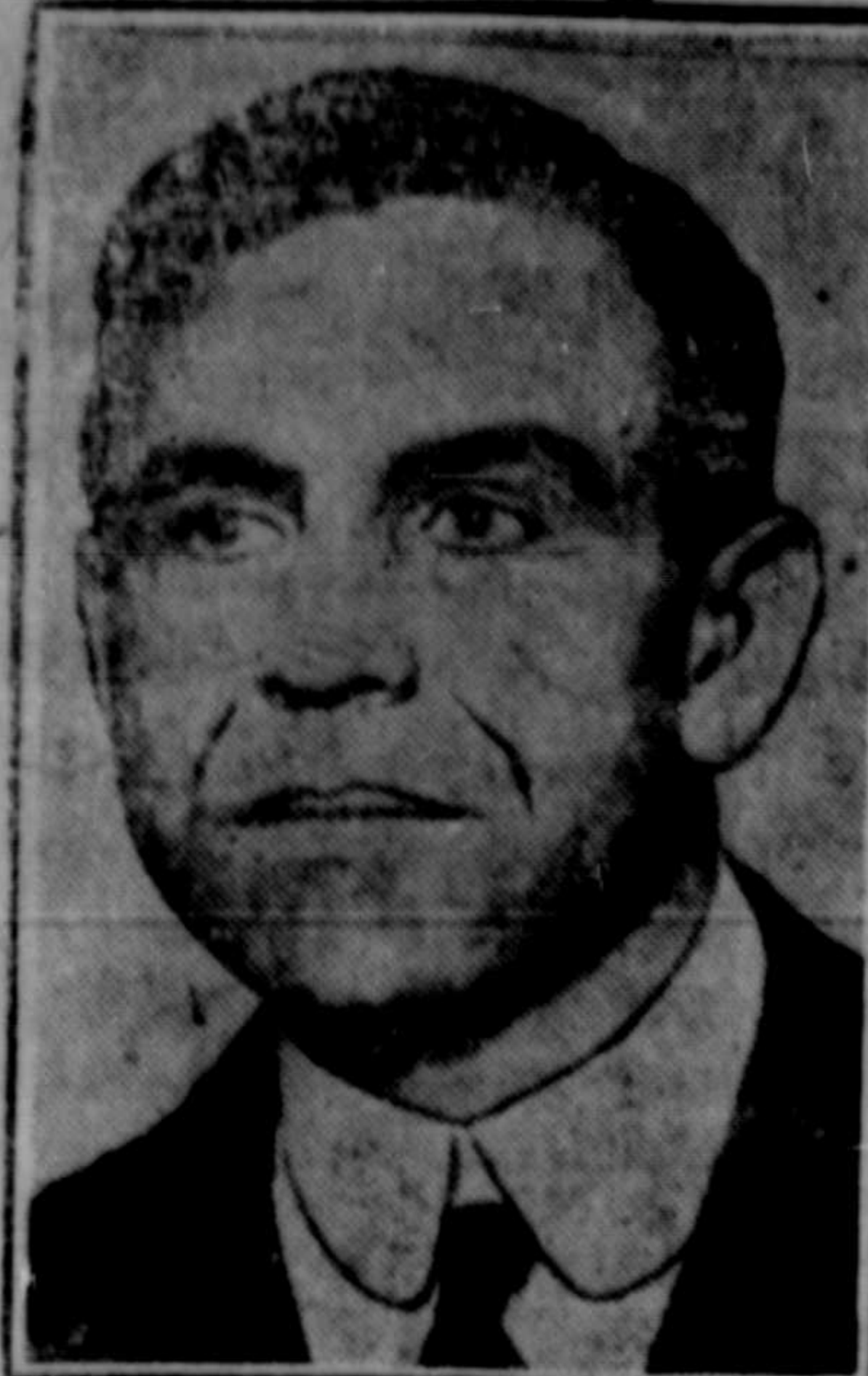
