CHINA BREAKS OFF DIPLOMATIC RELATIONS

LANSING REFERS GERMAN TO SUSSEX NOTE—GERMANY DETAINING AMERICANS

CHINA BREAKS OFF RELATIONS WITH GERMANY

Important Move in the Far East—German Influence Gone—German Troops Threaten Holland.

New York, Feb. 13.—China has broken off diplomatic relations with Germany because of the unrestricted submarine campaign.

Japan Approves.
Tokio, Feb. 13.—Japan approves of the attitude of China toward Germany, on the ground that it will aid in uprooting German influence in the Far East and will be a benefit to the Entente Powers.

Dutch Situation.
Copenhagen, Feb. 13.—Five German army corps are concentrated on the frontier of Holland. Germany's explanation for this action is that the Dutch government has failed to adopt the policy toward Germany recommended to President Wilson, in regard to the new submarine campaign.

Ships Sunk.
London, Feb. 13.—Four more British steamers have been sunk by German submarines, amongst them being the Netherlee, of 4,270 tons. Three men were killed on one of the other vessels. Thirty Americans, who were aboard of the Japanese Prince, have been safely landed.

PETITION ASKING NEW EARLY CLOSING BYLAW

A petition, signed by over fifty merchants of the city was presented to the city council last night calling for the repeal of bylaws 261 and 263, covering early closing. Mr. Peters explained that the petition was the forerunner of a petition for a new bylaw covering all the retail stores of the city, some of which did not come under the old bylaw. On the motion of Ald. Dybbavn, seconded by Ald. McRae, the matter was referred to the finance and general committee.

LANSING WILL NOT DISCUSS THE SITUATION

Secretary Refers Germany to the Sussex Note—Mexico Sends Note to Neutrals—Gerard Blamed.

Washington, Feb. 13.—In a note today to the Swiss minister, who on Saturday presented orally the German proposal for a discussion of the submarine campaign, Secretary Lansing said that the United States would not discuss the submarine warfare against the neutrals until the German government renews its assurances of May fourth, in regard to the sinking of the Channel steamer Sussex.

Seventy-two American sailors from the German prize ship Yarrowdale are being held prisoners in Germany until definite assurance is given that the crews of German vessels in American harbors are not held or imprisoned.

Mexico Busy.
Mexico sends an identical note to all neutral nations urging joint efforts to end the war, failing which they recommend the cutting off of all exports of munitions and supplies to the warring nations.

Gerard Blamed.
Berlin, Feb. 13.—The Berlin newspapers have little praise for Ambassador Gerard. They say that had the United States been represented by a man who appreciated their difficulties and had kept his government correctly informed respecting the submarine campaign, their relations would never have reached the present deplorable stage.

Guns Wanted.
New York, Feb. 13.—The America Line has applied to the United States government for guns with which to arm all its passenger steamers.

ATTORNEY-GENERAL TO CLEAN UP THE PROVINCE

That the new government is going to do its utmost to clean up the affairs of the province in more ways than one is evident from the fact that the attorney-general's department has issued a circular letter to the civic authorities throughout the province calling for a vigorous enforcement of the law, particularly in regard to social offences. The letter is couched in drastic terms and it is clear that a determined effort is to be made to stamp out the evil. The department asks to be informed as to what steps are being taken by the local authorities and states that all reasonable assistance will be given in backing up local effort.

PREVENTS PROBATE OF ALIEN ESTATES

Victoria, Feb. 8.—Tonight's official Gazette contains a notice of the passage by the executive council of an order that during the war no probate of administration of any estate of alien enemies shall be granted without the express license of the crown and in all cases where probate or letters of administration are granted, the grant shall be on condition no portion of the assets disbursed shall be to any alien enemy, whether resident in this province or elsewhere or on behalf of any such. The minister of finance, however, in cases deemed by him proper may sanction the payment of moderate sums to alien enemies resident in Canada in probate and administration cases.



GENERAL ROBERT GEORGE NIVELLE

This is a new and striking photograph of the Commander-in-Chief of the French armies on the western front. General Nivelle has had a meteoric career, being little known until he was placed in command of the defensive on the Verdun front, in succession to General Petain, when he achieved brilliant successes. That he is just as brilliant in attack as in defence was shown in the sudden advance on that front when the French gained in a few hours what it had taken the Germans weeks to take. General Nivelle will likely be heard from with considerable emphasis this spring.

DELEGATES DISCUSSED DRYDOCK SITUATION

Ald. Nelson and George W. Morrow reported to the city council last night on their trip to the east. Ald. Nelson said that the delegation would present a written report on the fisheries question on the return of Mr. Williams from the east.

With regard to the drydock, he said that he and Mr. Morrow, after getting in touch with the G. T. P. representative at Ottawa, had interviewed Mr. Chamberlin in Montreal. They got a good reception and the president of the company read to them correspondence regarding the drydock. Armed with information from Mr. Chamberlin they returned to Ottawa to press the claims of Prince Rupert in regard to the drydock plant. They found three objections to placing work here, first, the difficulty in getting raw material, next a shortage of labor, and then the question of doing work in winter. Both gentlemen dissipated all fears on these three counts and, in an interview with Mr. Norcross, the head of the Canadian Steamship Lines Limited, who is interested in building wooden schooners in Vancouver, made a strong plea for the starting of shipbuilding here. Mr. Norcross, who had the same fears as the others in regard to climate, labor and material, promised to send an engineer from Vancouver to look over the plant.

Ald. Casey asked Ald. Nelson if he did not ask Mr. Chamberlin what had come between the company and the Cotton deal. Ald. Nelson replied that he did not ask.

G. W. Morrow covered pretty much the same ground as Ald. Nelson, adding that he felt confident that they had been able to see the right parties and that he had great hopes of good results, either now or in the future. He was greatly impressed with the

frank way in which they were met by Mr. Chamberlin. He had had the idea that the president of the G. T. P. was a hard man to approach, but he had been agreeably surprised at the frankness with which Mr. Chamberlin laid the whole situation before them and had discussed the subject freely, throwing open to them his correspondence files.

Ald. Montgomery said that the delegation had done what they could and he was satisfied.

Mayor McCaffery congratulated the delegates on their having taken up the matter of the drydock in addition to the business on hand.

SCHOOL ESTIMATES

The city council last night passed the school board estimates for ordinary expenditure for the year of \$32,434. The finance and general committee had a conference during last week with the members of the board regarding the increase of about \$7,000 in the estimates over last year. The committee pointed out that it was their business to endorse the estimates for ordinary expenditure by the board, the members having been elected by the ratepayers. The additional expenditure is in connection with the domestic science classes and manual training.

HIGH COST OF LIVING

At the council meeting last night, letters from Sir George E. Foster and H. S. Clements, M. P., were read acknowledging receipt of the council's resolution in regard to the high cost of living. Sir George E. Foster said that the matter would have his personal attention and H. S. Clements said that he would give it careful consideration and both pointed out that they would refer the matter to the Minister of Labor, under whose department the question comes.

HON. RALPH SMITH DIED SUDDENLY IN VICTORIA

Victoria, Feb. 13.—Hon. Ralph Smith, minister of finance in the Brewster cabinet, passed away suddenly last night. Mr. Smith had been confined to the house for several days suffering from an attack of la grippe, but his friends did not think his condition serious.

The deceased minister was born at Newcastle-on-Tyne, Northumberland, England, on August 8th, 1858. He was educated in the Newcastle district and went to work as a miner in 1869. He came to British Columbia in 1892. In 1895 he was appointed agent for the Coal Miners' Association of British Columbia. He was president of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada for five years and was closely associated with the outstanding Labor-Liberal members of Parliament.

He represented Nanaimo in the British Columbia Legislature from 1898 to 1900, resigning his seat to contest the Dominion seat, which he carried. He was re-elected to the House of Commons in 1904 and 1908.

When the Brewster government was elected recently, Mr. Smith was looked upon as one of the certainties for a cabinet appointment and there was an expression of general satisfaction throughout the province when he was appointed minister of finance. He leaves a widow, four sons and a daughter. One of his boys, who was recently wounded, performed distinguished service at the front and was mentioned in despatches. The deepest sympathy will go out to Mrs. Smith and family.

WORK OF UNION OF B. C. MUNICIPALITIES

When the question of considering the paying of a fee of \$40 to the Union of B. C. Municipalities came up at the city council last night, Ald. Casey asked if the history and work of the union warranted its being kept up. He wanted to know if the union was of any real service to the municipalities of the province.

City Solicitor Peters pointed out that the union had been very useful in many matters, particularly in having the Local Improvement Act amended. The act passed by the late government was unworkable and the Union had been able to get an amendment passed which relieved the situation considerably. Now the union was apt to become a debating society, which wanted every municipal question in the province referred to it.

Ald. Dybbavn supported the city solicitor in his contention regarding the Local Improvement Act of 1912, which would have put this city out of business. He thought it was a good thing that representatives of the province should meet together and discuss these matters for their own welfare. The matter was referred to the general and finance committee for report.

CARRUTHERS RETURNED WITH AN INJURED MAN

The James Carruthers, which left port on Sunday for the banks, had to put back owing to the cook, E. M. Macdonald, having slipped in going down the companionway, severely bruising his side and spraining an ankle. In the short time she was out, the Carruthers made a good catch. Mr. Macdonald is now in hospital here and making a good recovery.

GERMANS HOLD AMERICANS FOR RETALIATION

German Foreign Office and Military Party Have Different Aims Regarding America—Military Want War.

Berne, Switzerland, Feb. 13.—Germany is delaying the departure of a large number of American citizens. They are being held in Berlin that they may be used in any retaliatory measures in case of war with the United States.

The German Foreign Office is striving to keep America out of the war, but the German military party long ago prepared for American hostilities and is only lukewarm in its support of the efforts of the statesmen in the Wilhelmstrasse.

German Statement.
London, Feb. 13.—Dr. Gustave Stresemann, a member of the Reichstag, in an address delivered at Wilhelmshavn, stated that the German bluejackets in the United States will have seen to it that the German steamers held in American ports will not be useable for some time.

FULTON QUALIFIES TO MEET WILLARD

New York, Feb. 13.—Fred Fulton, who aspired to meet Jesse Willard for the heavy-weight championship and was told that he must first defeat Charles Weinert, met the latter last night at Madison Square Gardens and knocked him out in the second round.

Tomorrow evening, in the Railwaymen's Hall, the Returned Soldiers' Association will hold its first annual ball. The boys made a lucky hit in selecting a date for the event, as it is the anniversary of the departure of the 30th Battalion from Victoria for overseas. This event is worthy of every support from the citizens of Prince Rupert, both in itself, and because of what it represents. In the years to come, the annual ball of the Returned Soldiers' Association of Prince Rupert will be a much bigger and more important function. Meantime, the boys who have returned are paving the way for the big things to come.

CANADA DISGRACED

Hon. Robert Rogers, in the House of Commons, made a characteristic attack on the Galt report and the Ottawa Citizen, which had taken the same view as Mr. Justice Galt of Mr. Rogers' part in the Manitoba college graft.

Mr. Rogers stated that he was attacked by the Ottawa Citizen because he had refused to buy from Messrs. Southam, owners of that newspaper, a piece of ground in Montreal which they wished to sell to the government at a big figure.

This is the form of defence invariably favored by Mr. Rogers when attacked. It is the crude strategy of the squid, which always tries to create a diversion on the approach of an enemy. When Mr. Justice Galt brought upon himself the animosity of Mr. Rogers, the minister of public works replied that he had obtained for him his appointment to the bench. Either the critics of Mr. Rogers attack him because he refused his favors to them, or because they were the recipients of his favors. In either case the method is the same.

It is a method that fails to favorably impress the public. It does not dispose of the serious charges of which Mr. Rogers was found guilty by Mr. Justice Galt, in whose decisions the public have every confidence. Mr. Rogers' attacks on the character and motives of Mr. Justice Galt are without effect.

Mr. Rogers has a record that is impossible to explain away. The Canadian public have viewed with perturbation the bare possibility of this minister being one of those who will accompany Premier Borden to the Imperial Conference at London. This feeling is changing to dismay as the possibility appears likely to become a reality.

Rogers is a crooked politician of the type developed in the back alleys of American politics. His ideas of political expediency are those of the rough-neck political gunmen and bosses of the Tweed and Tammany and Cox machines. Is a

man of this type to be allowed to be one of those who represent Canada at the most transcendent council in history, set apart to the sacred uses of patriotism and honor to be participated in by men of the highest qualities and fair name and the leaders in thought and intellectual ability in the Empire?

Are there not enough men of principle and character and honorable self respect in the Conservative party to prevent this burlesque which would bring opprobrium on the party and dishonor and humiliation to Canada? Sir Robert Borden has no right to lower the Imperial Conference by subjecting it to such an indignity. Are the iniquities of Rogers to be condoned and absolution given to him by Sir Robert Borden in this way? Cannot Sir Robert Borden and the other members of the government discern right from wrong? Are there no Ten Commandments at Ottawa? Have they no decalogue in the cabinet? Have they no moral principles regulating their affairs? Is Sir Robert Borden under no obligation to exercise right conduct?

The power of machine politics in Canada has waned. Decent people are tired of crooked politics and crooked politicians. Provincial machine governments and bosses have been swept out of office. If Sir Robert Borden sacrifices the self respect of Canada and the dignity of the conference by allowing Rogers to go he will deserve the obloquy that will be heaped on him by all sorts and conditions of Canadians. It is entirely a moral question. All eyes will be turned on the conference and on those who attend it. It will be a public disgrace which will be felt by every decent, honest Canadian if the conference is defiled by the presence of Rogers. If Sir Robert Borden has regard for the honorable reputation of Canada he will not put her to shame in this way.—Sun.

Washington despatches state that the United States cannot enter into discussion with Germany so long as vessels continue to be destroyed in violation of international law. Washington may remember that Germany has not since the start recognized international law.

The United States mildly climbed down when the Lusitania was sunk and she must find it difficult to take a very strong stand today. Nothing to compare with the Lusitania incident has been perpetrated since the unrestricted campaign was begun.

With regard to the United States, Wilhelm is pretty much in the position of the man who went out hunting squirrels and met a bear. Meantime, the bear is not inclined to do any hunting on its own account but is waiting to see if a shot will be lodged in his hide.

Washington is finding it just as hard to get into the war as to maintain her neutrality. President Wilson has passed up so many German acts which warranted action that he will have difficulty in picking out one now which warrants war.
