

A HEALTHY INFANT

The Ottawa Citizen suggests that now is the time for the highly protected steel interests of Canada to make a substantial refund to the Dominion treasury against the bounty of \$17,202,550 they have received from 1896 to 1913. Our contemporary estimates that between the bounties and tariff protection the total cost to the people of Canada of maintaining this fat "infant industry" has been over \$40,000,000.

According to the Department of Trade and Commerce report, Census and Statistics monthly. the value of Canadian iron and steel products totalied \$119,-036,755 during the year 1915. Out of this total, the share paid in wages to labor amounted to \$27,022,793. This portion, less than 25 per cent of the total value, paid the wages of 53,182 toilers in the steel and iron mills; so the Canadian steel workers drew an average wage! of \$508 per year, or.\$43.33 per month, or about \$9.75 per week!

How did the privileged few parents and foster parents of the infant industry, the financial groups so delicately called Capital, come out on the year? asks the Citizen. The following table from the official report might tell approximately: Cost of materials .. \$58,924,280 Wages 27,022,793 Salaries 6,799,117

.. Total \$92,746,190 Value of products \$119,636,755 Surplus 26,890,565

The profits for 1916 were even larger.




