ALTERATIONS IN FISHERY REGULATIONS

REPORT OF FISHERY DELEGATES TO OTTAWA

The report of the delegation recently returned from interviewing the government in Ottawa regarding fishery matters was presented last evening at a public meeting held in the city hall. The mayor presided. The report is as follows:

Prince Rupert, Feb. 15th, To His Worship the Mayor, and the City Council of the city of Prince Rupert, the Prince Rupert Board of Trade and the Citizens of Prince Rupert:—

"The delegation which you sent to Ottawa in connection with the fishery interests of northern British Columbia herewith encloses a copy of the resolutions setting out your requests together with the answer of the deputy minister of the naval service thereto. We are very pleased to inform you that your delegation acting under your instructions has succeeded in getting several important changes in the fishery regulations affecting District No. 2 in British Columbia, and which should be of substantial advantage to the fishermen and fishing interests of this district.

We are also pleased to report that the reception accorded to your delegation by the Fishery Advisory Board, the Honorable Mr. Hazen, minister of marine and fisheries, and Mr. Clements, M. P., was very cordial and courteous, and that they gave us a careful and sympathetic hearing and every opportunity to present our views and the arguments adduced by us in favor of the changes sought, and we believe that the results warrant the conclusion that these arguments impressed them deeply and brought about a better understanding of the conditions in District No. 2, and an appreciation of the necessity for the changes which we consider were far too long in coming.

Your delegation would further recommend in the interest of uniformity and in order to avoid misunderstanding, and that the regulations of the local government may be speedily brought to conform with the amended regulations of the Dominion government that a copy of these resolutions together with a copy of the reply of the deputy minister of marine be forwarded to the Hon. Mr. Brewster, premier of British Columbia, and to the Hon. Minister of Fisheries for British Columbia, with a request that the provincial government concur in and see that provincial regulations be made to work harmoniously with the Dominion regulations.

Your delegation also desires to express our appreciation of the attention and assistance accorded us by Lieut.-Col. Cunningham, chief inspector of fisheries for British Columbia, and Lieut. McIntyre, deputy minister of fisheries.

In conclusion your delegates wish to thank you for the confidence placed in them and trust that the results achieved may assure you of the sincerity of our efforts to serve you."

The resolutions passed in Prince Rupert and taken to Ottawa by the delegation and the replies accorded thereto by the government are as follows:—

Clause 1.

That the license for the taking of herring by gill-nets or seines

be made an open license; to cover all of District No. 2, and to be granted to all applicants who are British subjects, or bona fide pre-emptors who have made a declaration of their intention to become British subjects, and also Indians. The charge for such license not to exceed ten dollars for a seining license and one dollar for a gill-net license per annum.

Answer.—The importance of doing everything feasible to make it easy for those engaged in the deep sea fisheries, to be assured of a bait supply when needed is fully realized. As it appears that it will facilitate the procuring and supplying of bait if herring gill-net fishermen were allowed to operate in any part of District No. 2 it has been decided that hereafter licenses authorizing herring gill-net fishing will be good for any part of the district. It has also been decided to comply with the request to reduce the fee on gill-net licenses to \$1.00.

In view of the nature of purse-seine fishing, and the importance and necessity for properly controlling it, it is not regarded that it would be in the public interest to make any change in connection therewith at the present time.

Clause 2.

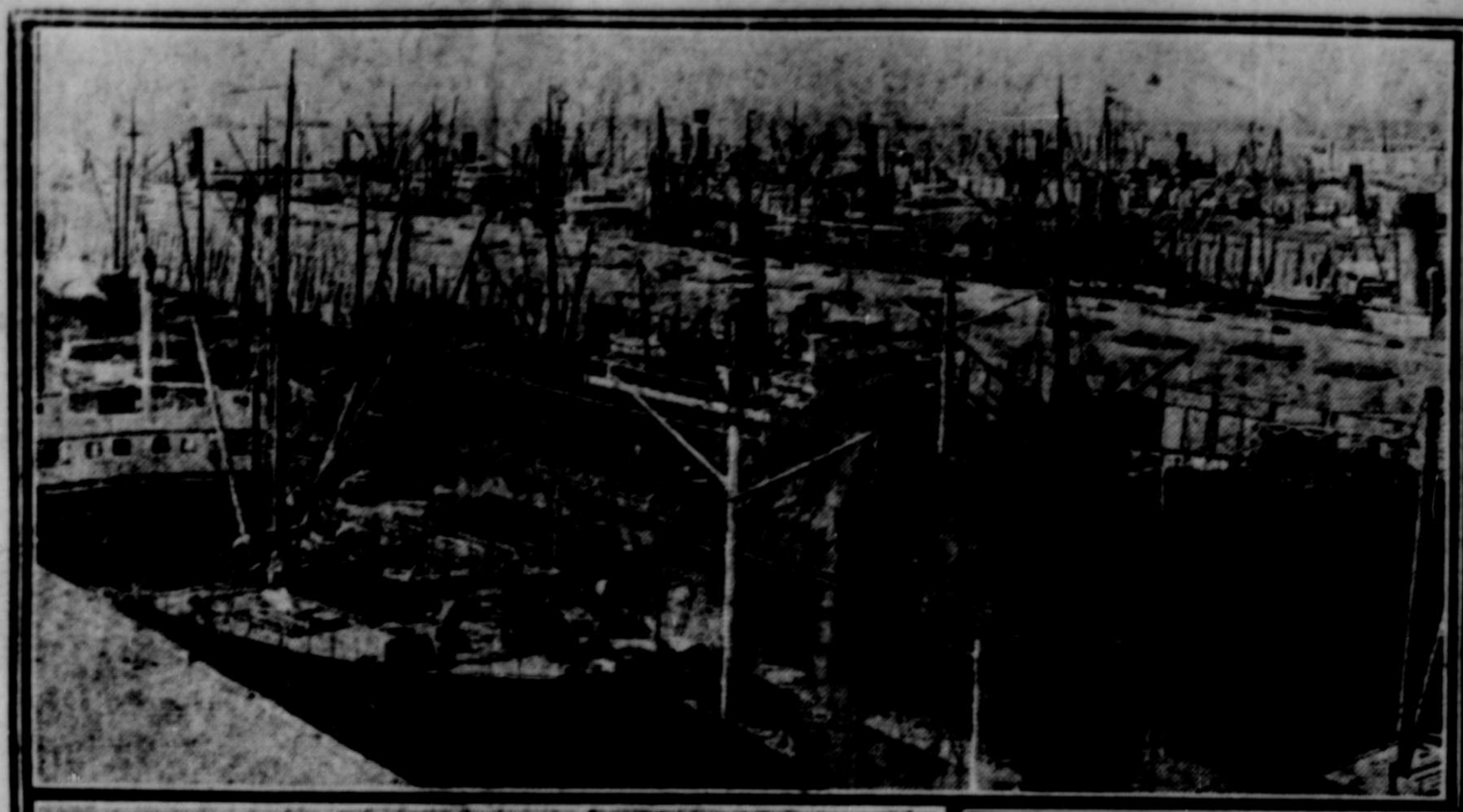
That bona fide halibut fishermen fishing in Canadian bottoms be permitted to take dog or humpback salmon, for the purpose of bait alone, anywhere and at any time, having due regard for the spawning ground, close seasons and in accordance with present or future fishery regulations.

Answer.—As a general thing, those engaging in deep sea fishing are not fitted out for the capture of bait and would rather purchase bait if they can do so, than depend upon catching it for themselves. If licenses were granted to halibut fishermen to capture dog and humpback salmon for bait purposes, such would be almost certain to result in these vessels at times going into the salmon fishery, as they would catch more salmon than they would require for bait. This would not only make the object of the resolution in view miscarry, but would result in the speedy depletion of the various smaller streams to which these varieties of salmon resort. It is not, therefore, considered wise to authorize such fishing.

It should be possible, however, for the halibut fisherman to procure such salmon as they may require for bait at a reasonable price from the salmon canneries at any time that salmon are on hand in the canneries, and to assure this being done thereafter, it will be made a condition of salmon cannery licenses that cannery managers will be required to sell to bona fide Canadian deep sea fishermen, such quantities of salmon as such vessels or boats may require for their own particular purposes, at the price that the salmon are worth for canning purposes at the time.

Clause 3.

That licenses for the taking of salmon be issued to all applicants (Continued on Page Three).

SERIOUS FREIGHT CONGESTION IN STATES

New York, Feb. 16.—The most serious freight tie-up in the history of the United States prevails on all railroads carrying food-stuffs and other commodities between the east and west. Thousands of loaded cars are on the sidings, movement being impossible owing to the congestion on the Atlantic seaboard, brought about by the German submarine menace having limited shipping movement from Atlantic ports.

DUAL PERSONALITY OF PRUSSIANIZED GERMANY

What makes the tragedy of Germany in this war the thing which puzzles even those who are fighting against it is the fact that Germany is acting on a doctrine stranger and more terrible than Paganism itself. It undertakes to be both Christian and Pagan at the same time—Christian in the individual life, Pagan as a nation. It has two eternally hostile codes of ethics—one for the individual and the other for the State. As a private citizen the German may be a Christian, and ought to be one; but the moment he puts on a spike-helmet or sits at a government desk he strips himself of all Christian morals—vice and virtue change their names for him. As a soldier he can clothe himself with "frightfulness"; can rape, plunder, kill, burn, with the entire approval of his official—that is to say, his Paganised—conscience. As a diplomatist he can lie and cheat and forswear himself, and leave his Christian self-respect untouched. For Germany acts on the theory that the State is a non-moral, predatory entity, for which the distinction between good and evil does not exist. It stands in no relation to God; it has no more morals than a tiger; it acts on the law of the jungle. Might, in its dreadful code, is right.

In the Prussianized Germany against which we are fighting we have, in brief, a double personality. When it acts as a nation it undergoes a transformation more terrible than that in R. L. Stevenson's tale when Dr. Jekyll turned into Mr. Hyde. All the separate individualities of Germany melt into one gigantic Mr. Hyde—Mr. Hyde in a spike-helmet. Or, to change the figure, they become the "great blond beast" of Nietzsche, lawless, predatory, invincible, the superman, a non-moral monster.—Dr. W. H. Fitchett in the Cornhill Magazine.

RESOLUTION TO THE PROVINCIAL GOVT.

At a public meeting in the city hall last night, the mayor presiding, the delegation recently appointed to visit the powers that be in Ottawa regarding the fisheries, presented their report. The success of this delegation in getting what they went after has already been reported in these columns. The following resolution was moved by Captain Rorvig and seconded by Mr. Harry Hoffman:

Be it resolved by this public meeting assembled, the mayor presiding, that a copy of the resolutions presented to the Department of Fisheries, Ottawa, by the delegates sent by this city for that purpose and a complete copy of the department's answer granting certain changes, alterations and concessions be immediately forwarded to the Hon. Premier, H. C. Brewster, and the provincial minister of fisheries at Victoria, B. C., and that the Hon. H. C. Brewster and his government be requested to concur in and agree to the said changes in so far as they may concern the province of B. C., so that no further questions or complications may arise in connection with the Fisheries District No. 2 from any source that will in any way interfere with the recent regulations agreed to by the Department of Fisheries at Ottawa or to any further concessions that may hereafter be obtained, contained in the said resolutions.

GERMANY ADMITS RETIREMENT

London, Feb. 16.—Berlin admits that the German troops between Serre Hill and the Somme have withdrawn from their advanced positions.

Eastern Front.

Petrograd, Feb. 16.—The Teutons have attacked the Russian positions near Zlottahof, on the Galician front. So far, the Russian troops have had no difficulty in repelling the enemy advance. The battle is still in progress.

A HEALTHY INFANT

The Ottawa Citizen suggests that now is the time for the highly protected steel interests of Canada to make a substantial refund to the Dominion treasury against the bounty of \$17,202,550 they have received from 1896 to 1913. Our contemporary estimates that between the bounties and tariff protection the total cost to the people of Canada of maintaining this fat "infant industry" has been over \$40,000,000.

According to the Department of Trade and Commerce report, Census and Statistics monthly, the value of Canadian iron and steel products totalled \$119,036,755 during the year 1915. Out of this total, the share paid in wages to labor amounted to \$27,022,793. This portion, less than 25 per cent of the total value, paid the wages of 53,182 toilers in the steel and iron mills: so the Canadian steel workers drew an average wage of \$508 per year, or \$43.33 per month, or about \$9.75 per week!

How did the privileged few parents and foster parents of the infant industry, the financial groups so delicately called Capital, come out on the year? asks the Citizen. The following table from the official report might tell approximately:

The profits for 1916 were even larger.

It is true, the Citizen points out, the steel infant has been fulsomely praised for its patriotism by a cabinet minister, and it has not responded by asking the government to enlist its surplus wealth into the Dominion treasury for national service. But Sir Thomas White need not be shy because the infant has not found its voice in

favor of conscription of wealth. He might look up what W. Lorimer, L. L. D., chairman of the Steel Company of Scotland, said at the annual meeting of the British company in 1915, and say it for the Canadian companies.

Giving hearty approval to the policy of the British budget, of taxing war profits in the early months of the war, Dr. Lorimer said:

To my mind there is something absolutely revolting in the idea of anybody making profits out of the nation's agony—and especially so in the case of a man or a company who have had no extra labor or anxiety, but whose opportunity has come solely because of an artificial scarcity created by the government on account of the nation's need. . . . When we think of those splendid men of ours in Belgium, France and the Dardanelles and elsewhere, how—with that cheerfulness and dignity to which we pay the homage of proud admiration—they have sacrificed home, kindred, health, comfort and ease—ay, and many scores of thousands of them have given the last and greatest of all sacrifices—when we realize these things then we must feel how paltry and insignificant is any monetary sacrifice which we must remain at home can lay on the altar of patriotism. This war, God knows, will bring untold suffering in more than one form to millions who have had no war profits to collect, and no war bonus to receive, and, therefore, I have felt in my own mind, long before this proposal was made, that in that direction the government would be entirely justified in asking those who have made profits to assist those who are less fortunate. It may be, indeed, that before the war is ended the government may find it necessary to take not 50 but 100 per cent of those extra profits, and if they do I hope that none of us will complain. As I have said before, sacrifice is demanded all round, and there are hundreds of thousands of others who are making infinitely greater sacrifices than is possible to us.—Victoria Times.

GERMANY LACKING IN VALUABLE ORE

M. Jean de Bonnefort, in the Paris Journal, continues the results of his inquiries among the repatriated on the subject of the international situation in Germany. He says:—

The officers admit that Germany is especially lacking in Wolfram, an essential material in steel work. The Germans had accumulated during the last ten years large stocks of it, but had apparently not foreseen the length of the war, for their stocks have run out. They are offering a prize of 100,000 marks to any savant who can find a substitute. (Note.—Wolfram is the ore from which Tungsten powder is made. Without Tungsten it is impossible efficiently to manufacture high-speed steel.—Ed. S. C.)

who are British subjects or bona fide pre-emptors who have made a declaration of their intention to become British subjects and also Indians; and that the cannery boat rating be abolished.

Answer—The department is not satisfied with the information before it, that it is practicable to issue licenses without limitation in number for salmon fishing. If the number of licenses in the different areas, and particularly in some of them, were considerably increased, it would be necessary to largely increase the weekly close time. If this were done beyond a certain limit, it would make it impracticable for boat fishermen and cannery.

Clause 4.

That all British subjects making application be granted a drag seine license for the purpose of fishing all salmon streams in District No. 2, having regard for spawning grounds and close seasons, and in accordance with the government fishery regulations as may be enforced; and that the exclusive drag seine licenses granted to the canneries be abolished.

Answer—Keeping in view the comparative ease with which the fall salmon runs to the smaller streams could be depleted, it is not regarded as desirable to issue drag seine licenses to all who may apply for such.

Clause 5.

That a cannery license be granted to any applicant. That the Dominion government be requested to ask for a ruling from the Privy Council of Great Britain as to the rights of the provincial government of British Columbia to refuse to issue a provincial license to any applicant or applicants who have been granted a Dominion cannery license previously.

Answer—Last year, it was decided that licenses for new canneries would be issued. The department feels that business conditions, and business conditions only, should determine the number of canneries that may operate in any area; but it is realized that if a number of licenses were

granted at one time, embarrassment would result, and the likelihood is that no new canneries would be built. The course decided upon, therefore, was, to grant, should application therefor be made, one new license for each area each season till all applications are met.

Clause 6.

That a chief inspector be appointed for No. 2 District with headquarters at Prince Rupert.

Answer—While Prince Rupert is the centre of the largest deep sea fishing industry on the coast, the fishery requiring the major amount of the attention of the chief inspector of fisheries and his assistants, is largely centred in the southern portion of the province.

It is therefore not considered desirable to change the headquarters of the chief inspector. It is considered, however, that the time has come when the permanent headquarters of the district inspector of fisheries should be at Prince Rupert, and this is being arranged.

Clause 7.

That District No. 2. have an independent representative on the Fisheries Advisory Board at Ottawa, residing in Prince Rupert.

Answer—As I have already advised you, the minister has authorized an increase in the membership of the Pacific committee of the advisory board, by the inclusion of a representative from Prince Rupert.

Clause 8.

That no limit be placed upon the number of salmon trolling lines to be operated in the taking of salmon from one boat, and that all restrictions as to the number of lines be removed.

Answer—As you were informed when you appeared before the committee, the regulations were amended before last season's operations began so as to do away with the limit of the number of lines that might be used for trolling for salmon.

Clause 9.

That the government be asked to assist in the prospecting for halibut banks, herring and other fish grounds, by the furnishing of

funds for the purpose of operating one or more fishing boats, in charge of practical fishermen in northern Pacific waters, such boats to be operated out of the port of Prince Rupert for that purpose.

There can be no question of the desirability of such prospecting, as this resolution contemplates, and it is hoped that it will be found possible to arrange during the coming fiscal year for the starting of such investigations.

Clause 10.

That in the opinion of this committee the holding of a seine gill net or other net licenses should entitle the holder of the same to catch any kind of fish without any further license fee within the province, according to fishing regulations.

Answer—The arrangement recommended would not be feasible or practicable. It is not in operation in any part of Canada, and (continued on Page Four.)

GUYNEMER FIGHTS THRILLING AIR DUEL
 Lieut. Guynemer, the famous French aviator who has earned the title of the "Fokker-Killer" and who recently brought down his thirty-first aeroplane, has had many thrilling experiences. In bringing down one of his victims, he fought a duel at an altitude of two miles, and after a chase of 43 miles.
 While flying behind the German lines, he sighted two enemy aeroplanes, with an escort of two fighting machines, heading for the French lines.
 There was nothing to prevent him giving immediate battle except that if he should be forced to land he would fall within the German lines. He therefore took refuge behind some clouds until the squadron should pass ahead, and then started the pursuit from behind, closing up sufficiently so that if seen by the German anti-aircraft gunners from below he would be taken merely for one of the escort. For several miles he kept up the pursuit, concealing himself as much as possible by keeping behind clouds.
 Then, when the French lines appeared below, he emerged and began the fight. The machine nearest him chanced to be an observation plane, and darting down on it he opened machine gun fire at an altitude of just two miles.
 He killed the observer with his third bullet, and with the tenth the pilot shot out from the machine, killed, the plane at the same time beginning its whirling course down towards the French lines. Although the machine was the second Guynemer had brought down that day, he at once started after the other three, but they had all disappeared, having apparently turned back at his very first shot.

REPORT OF FISHERY DELEGATES TO OTTAWA

(Continued from Page Three)
 it would result in confusion, and, in many instances, making it impossible to properly administer the fisheries.
Clause 11.
 That the department permit the use of gas boats in the salmon fishing industry in District No. 2.
 Answer—This resolution may be considered in connection with the concluding portion of resolution No. 3., to the effect that the boat rating be abolished.
 It is realized that conditions have so changed in the north as to make it desirable to change the method of issuing fishing licenses and there seems to be no sufficient reason for preventing the operation of motor boats. However, such change would be radical and should not be made without reasonable notice therefor having been given. The canners will have already made the most of their preparations for the coming season in the light of the existing regulations and policy. It is, therefore, not considered well to make any sweeping change apply to the coming season.
 In order, however, to assure the Tuck Inlet cannery, as well as the cannery of the Gosse-Miller Packing Company having a reasonable chance of success this year, it has been decided to deduct twenty-four attached licenses from the canneries on the Skeena to which the boat rating applies, and to issue these, together with fifty-six Indian licenses, equally between the two canneries above-named. It has further been decided that this is the last year in which any attached licenses will be issued, so that thereafter all those receiving licenses will be in a position to dispose of their catches as they may see fit.
 It has also been decided that after the present year motor boats will be allowed in all parts of District No. 2.

Clause 12.
 That the Advisory Board recommend the establishment and erection of hatcheries for salmon in all suitable streams in District No. 2.
 Answer—The erection of new hatcheries is in line with the department's policy, and such will be followed as speedily as conditions generally will permit.

Clause 13.
