MORE & MORE MEN REQUIRED SAYS DERBY

BRITISH ADVANCE THOUSAND YARDS—TURKS ARE DEFEATED IN MESOPOTAMIA

BRITISH TAKE MILE AND HALF HUN TRENCHES

Large Number Dug-outs and Machine Guns—Many Germans Killed—Turks Again Defeated.

British Headquarters, France, Feb. 19.—Hundreds of Prussians were captured by the British in the Aisne region. Several companies of their best regiments were completely wiped out.

Paris, Feb. 19.—The French troops invaded and successfully held German trenches on the River Moselle. The situation is quiet on the French front, only patrol encounters being reported.

Rome, Feb. 19.—Increased activity of the Italian reconnoitering parties resulted in several encounters in the mountain valley localities. There were considerable artillery activities on the Carso.

Mesopotamia.

Mesopotamia, Feb. 19.—The British advance was hundreds of yards in the Tigris District. Very severe casualties were inflicted on the enemy, as well as two thousand prisoners being taken. Immense quantities of war material was also captured including twenty-five hundred rifles. The Turks only made half hearted counter attacks which were easily repulsed.

More Vessels Sunk.

London, Feb. 19.—The following British steamers are reported sunk: Valdes, Worcestershire and Romsdalen.

Western Front.

London, Feb. 19.—The British captured the German positions on a front of a mile and a half north-east of Grandcourt. The enemy defences were penetrated to a depth of a thousand yards. Very large numbers of German dead were left on the ground. The British losses were comparatively small.

Northeast of Ploegstreet many dugouts and machine guns were destroyed as a result of British bombing operations. German raiding parties were repulsed with great losses in each instance to the west of Lens.

At La Basse the British effectively exploded several mines, doing great damage to the German defences.

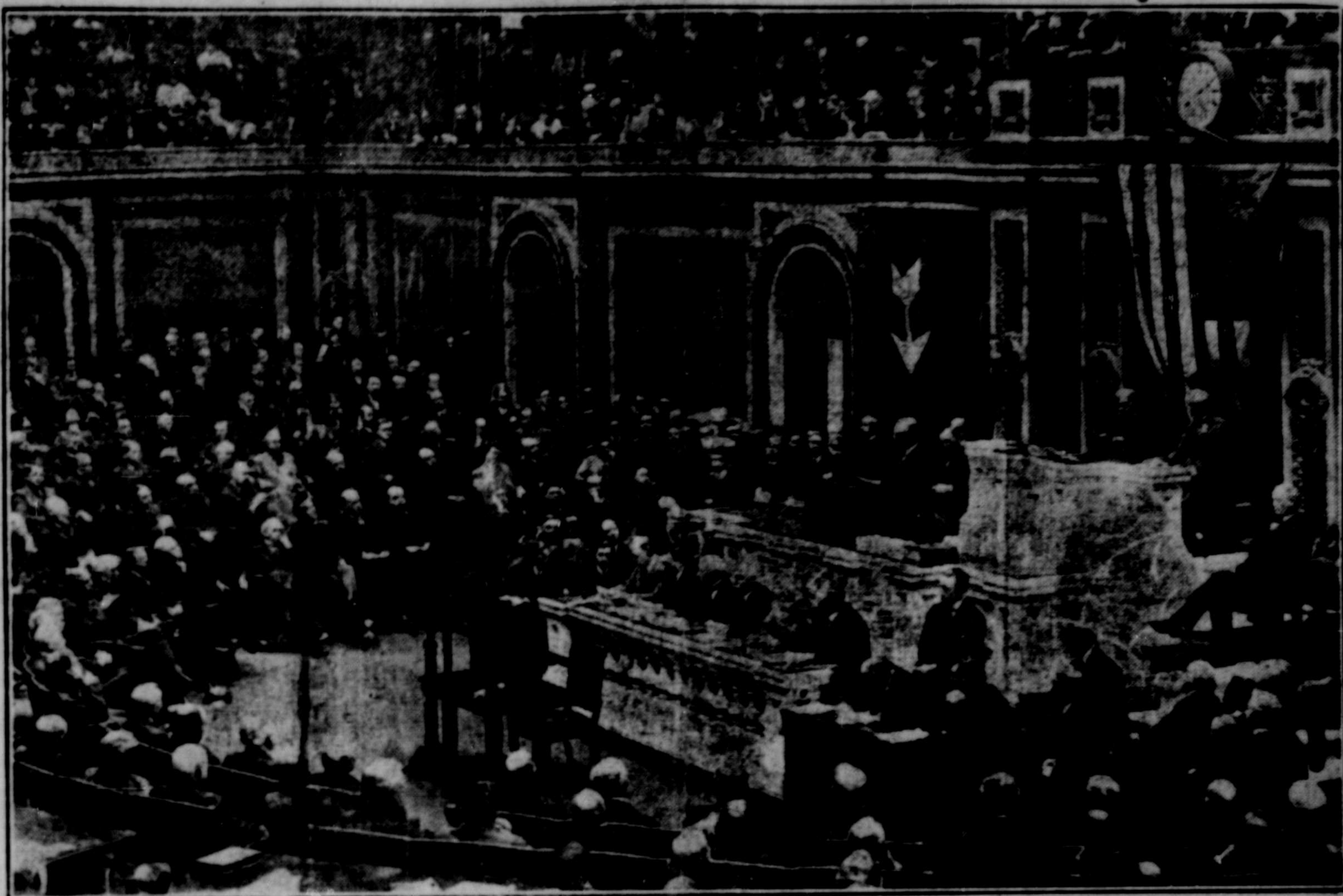
Aerial activity is going on unceasingly. One German aeroplane was brought down within our lines and was captured intact, while other two were shot down damaged very badly, showing the efficiency of British marksmanship. One British machine is missing.

QUEBEC ELECTION A PYRRHIC VICTORY

Ottawa, Feb. 15.—Never were victors more doleful than those who have just emerged from the Dorchester fight. As Hannibal, or some person equally famous, remarked, "One more victory like that and my goose is cooked." The Conservative party in the House of Commons looks on young Mr. Seigney's victory just that way.

Before the election they were going around saying "God help the Liberal party if Cannon wins," and now that Mr. Seigney's victory shows the Borden government just where it stands in Quebec, and the Borden government does not like the prospect any too well.

Considered as a bye-election it wasn't much of a feat for the Borden government to go into a constituency that has been Conservative as far back as man can remember and, with all the resources of money, whiskey, and other substantial cajolements, not to speak of the pressure and active endeavors of the Hon. Mr. Patenaude, who is known as the Bob Rogers of Quebec—it was not much of a feat to concentrate its resources on a backwoods constituency and win it for a cabinet minister who has only four or five months to sit anyway.

A shift might have been made to do without one cabinet minister until the next general election—it is conceivable that the department of inland revenue could have jogged along quite comfortably for a while without any political head—but the government wanted to test out feeling in Quebec, so it sent Mr. Seigney down to test it out. The result of the test is Mr. Seigney's victory, and Mr. Seigney's victory fills the Conservative party with alarm. For alas it reveals too much.

One thing it reveals is that the old nationalism of 1910 and 1911 is as dead as Queen Anne and consequently that the Conservative party will have to make other alliances if it wants to defeat Laurier in Quebec. The old, unholy pact has been its finish. At no stage of the game did Mr. Seigney seek to be elected on the

principles the Nationalist party laid down in 1911.

On the contrary he appealed to the electors on a platform of Empire defence, and his strongest argument was that in this matter he took exactly the same ground as Sir Wilfrid Laurier. In short, Mr. Seigney couldn't be loyal enough. Never once, at all events, never once in public, did he mention the name of his leader, Mr. Henri Bourassa. The shrewd Mr. Seigney sensed that that name no longer had any charm in Dorchester so he forbore to breathe it.

But the grimmest feature of Mr. Seigney's victory has yet to be related. And this is the real sore spot—it broke up the big game which was scheduled for the general election. To put it in a few plain words, the game was to point to a united and highly disloyal Quebec altogether in favor of Laurier, who was to be plattered by implication with the nationalism which Mr. Seigney was so quick to renounce. To create this impression in the English speaking provinces the Borden government was prepared to see Mr. Seigney defeated for taking sides with England in this war. Indeed, there is reason to suppose that Mr. Seigney was to be the sacrifice. The government is surprised to see him coming back—surprised and, so to say, pained.

For what does this victory mean? It means that he was elected on those very principles of loyalty to the British Empire by which the government expected he would be defeated, thus enabling them to point at Quebec and say, "See what they did to Mr. Seigney when he spoke of helping the Mother Country." Mr. Seigney's election naturally prevents this ghastly trick from being pulled off with any chance of success.

Yes, the game was all framed up for a racial campaign of great bitterness, in which Quebec was to be played against the rest of Canada. That Mr. Seigney should have won rather takes the edge off these mischievous intentions. For the last year the whole policy of the government has looked toward a general election that would put a solid Quebec for Laurier against the rest of Can-

ada. The idea was to stir up the English provinces by sweeping claims that Quebec was disloyal. To this end tended the agitation in certain Ontario newspapers with their foolish parrot cry that "a vote for Laurier is a vote for Bourassa." To this tended the bilingual controversy which fizzled out in spite of the best efforts of the Tory agitators to keep it alive. And to this tended—last and most particularly—the national registration cards which were issued for two reasons. First to give the government a line on the labor resources of Canada with a view to helping the profiteers, and second to point to Quebec as a province in which the cards were not well signed.

Ever since the war began the Borden government has been preparing Quebec soil for this baneful seed. The simple habitants have been told that their duty was to stay at home and raise crops. Three Nationalists have been kept in the Borden cabinet as living guarantees of the fact that the Borden government loves those who would shoot holes in the Union Jack. Moreover, in the middle of Mr. Seigney's campaign Mr. Blondin told the electors of Dorchester that it didn't make any difference to Canada because it was British money Allison took. He also told them that if anybody was afraid of conscription all he had to do was walk across the line into the United States, and reports state that this advice was accepted by two of his organizers who took eleven thousand dollars of campaign funds with them.

By every means, open and covert, by precept and example, by bold statement and stealthy insinuation, Quebec has been taught by the Borden government and its Nationalist allies to take recruiting lightly. And yet, in spite of all these discouragements, Quebec has kept on providing recruits who have gone to the front and proved themselves as keen in the great struggle for liberty as any other Canadians. And on top of it all, Mr. Seigney was elected on a platform of empire defence. It was an awful blow to the Borden government. The last man they wanted to see back on those terms was the Hon. Albert Seigney.

EARL DERBY WANTS MORE AND YET MORE MEN

London, Feb. 19.—Earl Derby, speaking in Bolton, Lancashire, said that the critical period of the war is yet to come and will in all probability occur within the next few months. He warned the nation against excessive optimism in believing the end of the war near as the enemy still possesses great reserve forces of money and munitions. He said that money, munitions and men are vital necessities. Money and munitions we have in plenty, but men, and more men we want—and must have.

BRITISH ECONOMIC POLICY OF FUTURE

London.—The Times says it understands that the committee appointed by Premier Asquith last summer to consider Great Britain's commercial and industrial policy after the war has made a preliminary report to the government unanimously recommending imperial preference as the foundation for the British economic world policy of the future.

SIR WILFRID'S IMPERIALISM

Is Laurier loyal? That is, by the order of a great political party, the selected issue on which the impending elections in Canada are to be fought out. Of course, some issue there had to be. And if the record of Rogers and Sir Sam would not do—why, then they must take Sir Wilfrid. If it is hopeless to whiten the one, then they must blacken the other. In default of a policy or a party record, one can always bespatter the opposing leader.

So the gauntlet is on the ground. Let us pick it up. Every Tory lodge evidently has received its commands. And this is to be the red herring across the trail. Well, every such question deserves an answer. No evasion. Is Sir Wilfrid an Imperialist or a rebel? Has the open book of his life been only a long hypocrisy? He who has sworn allegiance to three sovereigns. He has received their confidence. He has bent the knee and kissed hands in the palace. He is of the privy council. He has vaulted in eloquent periods and in many lands, his unbounded admiration for the British institutions of his birth over all others. And now, after seventy years, we are told that he has not deserved that confidence, and we are asked to believe that he would betray it. That he blows hot and cold. That in thirty recruiting patriotic orations delivered recently to his race, he had only expressed the thoughts that were undermost and the thoughts in the back of his head.

Now when a government itself or an individual is on trial, slander may sometimes be a substitute for defense. But, in that case, you must make sure that your jury is densely ignorant, and hopelessly prejudiced. If they should also be illiterate, blind and deaf, it might also help some. But on no other assumption can you safely insult the intelligence of such a public, and submit such reasons in support of such an indictment.

Carlyle begins one of the most seathing and spiritual

and useful of his lessons to his countrymen by saying: "The population of England is about thirty millions; mostly fools."

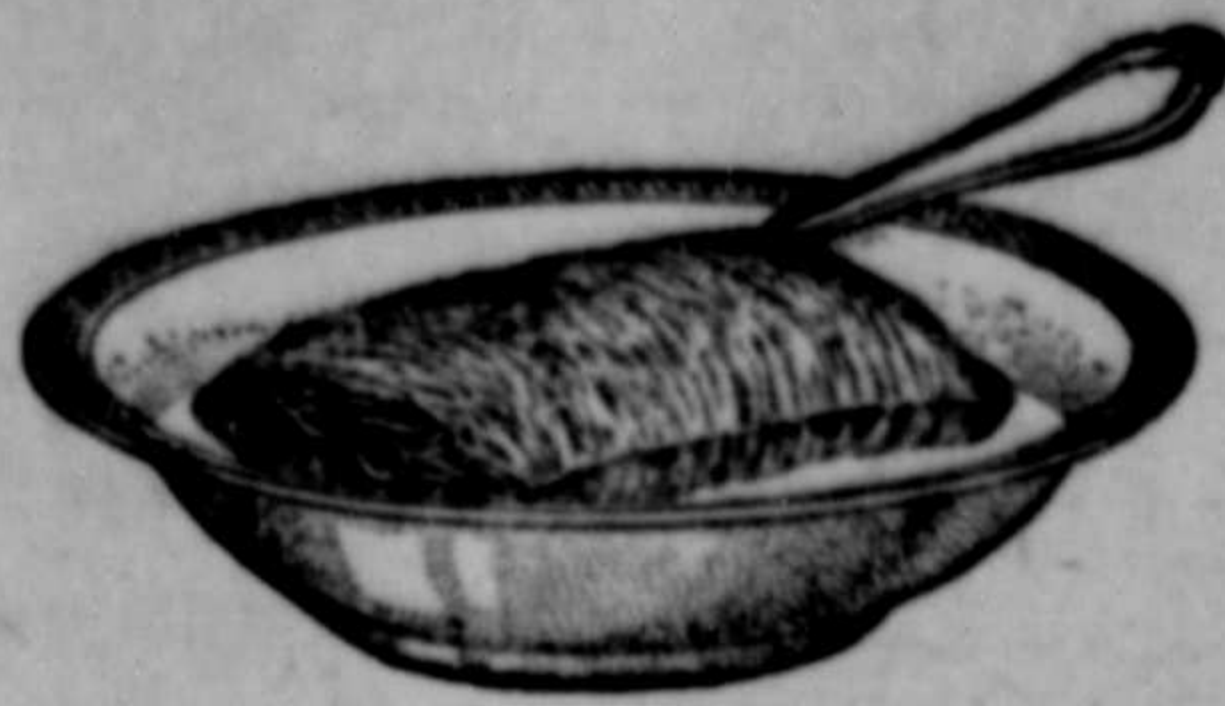
With a slight verbal variation, the Conservative managers at Ottawa must have adapted the text of the Sage of Chelsea. Let us take them seriously, however. Because we see about us, on every hand at this moment, all those signs which generally precede that peaceful, periodical revolution called a parliamentary election.

And the test of sincerity is this: Has the accused statesman held consistently the same language at various times and in diverse provinces, and even foreign lands? Or has he varied with time and place and audience, and every wind that blows? Has he been an educational power with his countrymen for good or for evil? Has he timidly held one tone in friendly and another tone in unfriendly communities? Let us see. Let us go back to the ante-bellum events; of yesterday, and even of the day before.

In 1902, shortly after the Fashoda incident, when every British journalist in Europe was doing what little he could to cultivate the tender, budding plant of the present entente, France was divided into hostile camps. Half the Paris press was pronouncedly anti-British. Pro-German editors even were not wanting. German spies and even German gold were not absent from the game. It would never do to let "perfidious Albion" become the head of a continental coalition.

And, at this time, Sir Wilfrid was being honored and feasted in London. He, and Botha, were giving the world personal proofs of the wisdom of the British way of dealing with conquered races. And they were both champions of the superiority of British institutions over all others. The result was that the jingo press of Paris, when Sir Wilfrid arrived there, the guest of the President and Premier, assailed him with invective. He was a "renegade Frenchman." An apostate. "A convert to British ideas. More British than the

King himself." "And he should be treated in France as a malevolent stranger whose heart was British, though his blood was French." And more of this kind.

He is assailed here for being too French, as it was in Paris, where he was accused of being too British.

In one of the Premier's speeches, of the Jubilee year in London, Sir Wilfrid said: "I am British at heart, though French by blood. And there is not today in Canada a single Canadian of French descent who is not convinced that under the British flag he has enjoyed a larger measure of liberty than he would have enjoyed under the flag of France."

Sir Wilfrid, who has always held the same language on both sides of the channel; who has told French audiences clearly and kindly the curious secret of French-Canadian loyalty to British institutions; and who has recalled courageously and sincerely before English audiences in that touching confidence and simplicity they admire there, how all the French legend, the French feeling, the French ancestry, was not incompatible with his oath of allegiance, is expected by a few violent critics, to forswear that allegiance, or to qualify it, in favor of this excellent country which failed to defend his great grandfather.

"The very head and front of his offending, hath this extent; none other."

The French Canadian is well; and like the philosopher, where he is well, there is his country.

ly intelligent way, of avenging the defeat of his ancestors.

The followers of Wolfe captured only Quebec, Sir Wilfrid has captured the whole country.

The gallant Montcalm with all his last regrets did not yet suspect that he had lost the key to half a continent.

But his fellow-countrymen, after four generations, in the name and in the wake of Sir Wilfrid have simply marched into legitimate political peaceful possession of it again.

The Norman rules the Saxon once more, with our consent, for the second time in 800 years.

For with a charm of manner which is altogether French, and a purity of eloquence which seems to have come down to these Gallo-Roman—French-Canadians untarnished from the days of Cicero; more fervid, more feeling and more latin than the oratory of Waldeck-Rousseau himself—Sir Wilfrid Laurier has carried the French name and French influence and French genius into the highest pinnacle of place and power in the New World. And he has carried it back again into the councils of the old.

He has made that influence and that moderation respected, both there and here, in spite of both extremes of opinion; in spite of mistaken Anglo-Saxon arrogance of universal superiority; in spite of Roman Catholic ultra-montanism, and in spite of Protestant prejudice; and in spite of some powerful enemies, and in spite of false friends.

And thus he has given to this country of his birth and to that country of his forefathers, what I can best describe in one of the poetic phrases of the last Prime Minister of France, as "l'aumône d'un peu de gloire." (He has given to his country the alms of a little glory).—Donald Downie.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

The British naval authorities, the owners, masters and crews of British merchantmen and the British public generally do not seem to be very much concerned over the submarine campaign. While the Admiralty is, as usual, silent as to what is being done, enough has been said to warrant the belief that the menace is well in hand.

American shipowners are about to arm their vessels and resume business. It is interesting to note in this connection that the United States government flatly refuses to discuss the submarine question with Germany until the latter withdraws its declaration of ruthlessness.

The ousting of the American relief committee from Belgium is a pretty piece of business. It looks as if the Germans meant to steal the supplies the committee had on hand.

The British expedition up the Tigris is progressing very favorably and the indications in the latest dispatches are that the Turkish force is hemmed in at Kut-el-Amara. If that place falls into our hands, the effect upon the Mesopotamian campaign will be very great.

How history repeats itself is exemplified in the latest Canadian raid on the German trenches. Over three hundred years ago, when the Prince of Orange was struggling to free Flanders from the Spanish yoke, a "camisada" was a favorite form of night attack. The enemy, with their sleeping costumes over their armour, would suddenly descend upon the slumbering camp and would sweep over it like a great wave of destruction, slaying everyone in their way. Just about a week ago, 100 husky Canucks donned white ladies' "nighties" for their customary visit to Fritz by moonlight and came back with some prisoners. If the Germans report more Angels, we can account for it this time.

A free Poland, which is now promised by the Czar Nicholas as one of the ultimates of the war, recalls the vigorous glorification of the struggles of the Poles under Kosciuszko against the combined Prussians and Russians in 1794, which survives in Campbell's poem "Pleasures of Hope."

A little anecdote illustrating the spirit of France is told by a war correspondent. Two French poilus were talking in a front trench. "The seat of my trousers is torn," remarked a poilu; "I am quite unrepresentable." "Oh," said another, "that makes no difference among friends, and your enemies will never see it."
