MAJOR-GENERAL FUNSTON DIES SUDDENLY

BRITISH AND FRENCH RAIDS SUCCESSFUL -- GERMAN SPIES ARRESTED IN U. S.

WOMEN TO BE TAKEN INTO THE BRITISH ARMY

Non Combatant Posts to be Filled By Women—Will release Many Men for Firing Line.

London, Feb. 20.—It is believed that the military authorities are developing a scheme to appoint women to the non-combatant posts in Great Britain and France. They would be engaged in cooking, canteen, storekeeping and clerical duties, thus releasing thousands of men for active service.

READING ROOM WILL HAVE PROMPT SUPPLIES

Tenders with regard to the supply of magazines for the public reading room were opened last night at the council meeting. Complaints had been made of the late arrival of certain magazines. It was said that the reading room supplies sometimes did not arrive till after the magazines had been on sale at the news stands for two or three weeks. Alderman Montgomery objected very strongly to the late deliveries. Alderman Nelson wanted to know what particular magazines were so late. He wanted to know, but no one could enlighten him. He wanted to know how many magazines there were altogether, but no one could say. Alderman Montgomery offered to take Alderman Nelson across the way to the reading room to count them, but his offer was not accepted. The tender from Mr. W. W. Wrathall being the only one which guaranteed prompt delivery, and, in fact, the only tender under these conditions, was accepted. The amount was \$156.15.

GET YOUR OWN GOAT

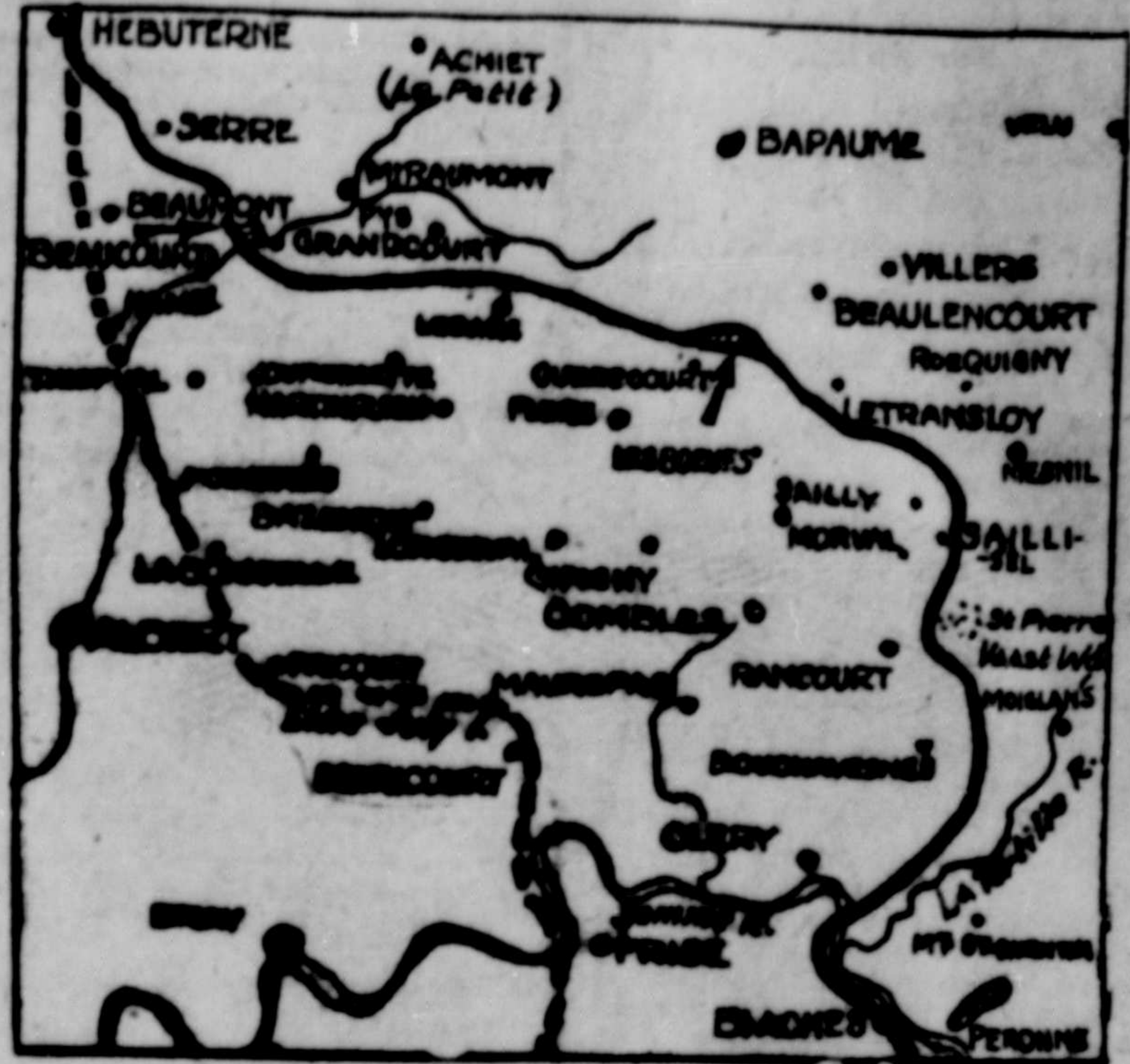

EARLY CLOSING BYLAWS ARE TO BE AMENDED

A new bylaw was introduced to the city council last evening by Ald. McMeekin. It proposed to close all shops not included in the two previously existing bylaws at 6:30 p. m. on week nights and 10 p. m. on Saturdays, thus bringing all places of business in the city into line. The penalty for infringement of this bylaw is to be a fine of \$100 or thirty days in jail.

After the first reading, the bylaw was referred to the city solicitor for his report as to its legality. Ald. Casey thought, from the information before him, that this bylaw might work some injury and injustice on some businesses, which might be regarded as public necessities.

Ald. McEae introduced a deputation from the Trades and Labor Council consisting of Messrs. S. D. Macdonald, Kerr, and Linzey. Mr. Macdonald spoke in favor of the bylaw in so far as it would tend to shorten the hours of labor. While it was not their intention, he said, to interfere with the merchants in the conduct of their business, he thought that 16 or 17 hours worked in one day was too long. While it might not be in the interests of the citizens if the drug stores closed, still it would be beneficial for all concerned that ten o'clock be the closing hour on Saturdays. Buying could be done before ten to the advantage of everyone rather than after ten. Messrs. Kerr and Linzey homologated what Mr. Macdonald had said.

The mayor, while appreciating the point of view of the delegates, felt himself at some slight disadvantage, as he had only had the bylaw put into his possession that night, while the delegates had had time to study its provisions.

Ald. Casey wished to question the delegates, but they had no power to reply to questions. The three gentlemen then withdrew after thanking the council for having received them.

Ald. McMeekin in winding up the discussion said that "the bylaw of last year closed up the fruit stores, but they are all open yet." Which was a somewhat paradoxical statement. He went on to explain that this bylaw will take in those stores not covered by the existing bylaws. "We don't want to close the drug stores," he said, "because we can't," which was such an obvious truth that all smiled. "But," he added, "we can prohibit the selling of goods carried by other stores, who have to close early."

BRITISH AND FRENCH RAIDS ARE SUCCESSFUL

London, Feb. 20.—The British successfully raided the German trenches to the east of Souchez and captured very many prisoners. A mine was also exploded which destroyed several occupied trenches.

French batteries effectively shelled the German organizations to the north of Dambloup. A surprise attack was carried out by the French troops north of Munster. The French inflicted heavy casualties upon the enemy and captured many prisoners.

CITY MARKET REPORT FOR THE LAST MONTH

The city treasurer's report showing the business done at the city market was presented to the council last evening. The report showed a turnover of \$2,450.35 for the month of January. The market clerk's commission of 7 1/2 per cent amounted to \$161.27. A stock of 500 boxes of apples was still on hand out of the thousand received last month. The report showed that the growers netted 86 1/2 cents per box, which were retailed at the market at from 90c to \$1.25.

STEEL FAMINE IN NORWAY

Norway, which exports large quantities of iron ore, possesses no steel works of her own, and is dependent entirely upon imports from abroad. With a view to remedying this state of affairs a syndicate has recently been formed for the purpose of erecting a large steel works in the neighborhood of Christiania, at Drammen, on the Drammensfjord. The promoters of the scheme declare that Norway is threatened not merely with a shortage of steel, but actually with an acute famine, as in the near future Norway will not be able to cover half of her normal consumption—that is to say, the consumption of peace times. The imports from Germany and Austria, both of which countries are using nearly the whole of their production, already show a decline of 75 per cent, and may soon cease altogether. Norway has recently received practically nothing in the way of manufactured steel from England, and none at all from Belgium. Imports from America are extremely expensive and difficult to obtain owing to the shortage of tonnage.

San Antonio, Feb. 20.—Major-General Funston, the commander of the American forces on the Mexican border, collapsed yesterday after supper in his hotel. He had been playing with a little child and expired very quickly. The cause of death is given as acute indigestion.



GERMAN SPIES ARRESTED IN THE UNITED STATES

New York, Feb. 20.—The department of justice has caused the arrest of Albert Sander, aged 35, president of the Central Powers War Film Exchange, and Chas. Wunnenburg, 25 years of age, a naturalized citizen of the United States and business assistant to Sanders, on a charge to employ agents to obtain photos, maps and military information regarding England and Ireland and the United States. Some of the maps and plans of defenses were prepared in invisible ink and were all ready to be despatched to Germany.

THE POPE ANXIOUS TO KEEP U. S. NEUTRAL

Paris, Feb. 20.—A Rome report indicates that the Pope has cabled Cardinal Gibbons to inform the president that the Vatican is ready to exercise all its influence to avoid war between the United States and Germany.

CANADIAN PACIFIC DECLARE DIVIDEND

The Canadian Pacific Railway Company have declared a dividend of ten per cent for the year ending December 31st, last, this being 7 per cent per annum from the revenue and 3 per cent per annum from special income account payable March 31st.

THE HEATHEN CHINESE

The Chinese lottery case was again adjourned this morning in the police court by Magistrate Carss. More will be heard of the "ways that are dark and tricks that are vain" three days hence.

FRIGHTFULNESS IN THE AIR

So little are the people of Great Britain affected by the fear of Zeppelins nowadays is shown by the fact that the government rate of insurance against enemy aircraft bombardment risks has been reduced by 50 per cent.



TO PROSECUTE B. C. FIRM FOR CONSPIRACY

High Cost of Living Commissioner Gets Permission From Attorney-General to Prosecute The Sugar Trust.

Ottawa, Feb. 20.—The attorney-general of Alberta formally granted permission to High Cost of Living Commissioner O'Connor to criminally prosecute the British Columbia Sugar Refineries Company. The charge will be of conspiracy with the western jobbers and wholesalers in designing the regulation of prices of sugar products on a bonus basis.

MINING NOTES

In driving a drift tunnel at the Highland Boy, they have taken out over a carload of ore, which is all sacked and ready to ship. In addition to the ore developed in the drift, a winze was sunk on the first shoot to a depth of 30 feet. It was in ore all the way and there are two feet in the bottom.

During 1916 the Rocher de Boule mine produced 2,097,000 pounds of copper. The tonnage of ore was 16,750.

The Granby Consolidated Mining and Smelting Co. earned \$2,533,079 in the six months ending December 31st last. Ore treated at Anxoy yielded 16,179,521 lbs. of copper, 193,142 ounces of silver and 4,681 ounces of gold.

Shipments of both silver-lead and silver-zinc ores are being made regularly from the Silver Standard Mine. Development is also being carried on as well as some stoping.

At Rocher de Boule mine another shoot of ore has been opened at the 300-foot level. The main tunnel is now in practically 2,300 feet.

EDWARDS NOW CHAMPION

Lew Edwards won the lightweight championship of Australia on Saturday at Sydney, N. S. W., when he knocked out Herb McCoy in the eighteenth round of one of the fastest and cleverest contests seen in Australia for some time.

GERMAN DEMOCRACY

As has been publicly stated on many occasions by those in authority, the chief aim of the Allies in this great war is the destruction of the Prussian militaryism. The quarrel is not primarily against the German people. They have been cribbed, cabined and confined in their mental processes by their Prussian masters. It suited the Prussian idea to have them thing of war and nothing else as their only way to realize their ideals. The Prussian ideal is very largely akin to that of the Roman Empire. Centralization of everything in Rome ultimately failed. The whole world as the old Romans knew it gave tribute to Rome. If, by any chance, the Germans should win this war, the whole world as we know it, will pay tribute to Berlin.

The Prussian idea of the means to that end are the same as those of the Romans too. War, and constant war trained their legions to such a point of efficiency that nothing could withstand their cohorts. But that was before the Year of Our Lord. Since that time men's ideas have changed, slowly, it is true. And ideas of statecraft have improved in all other countries except Prussia. There is a parliament in Germany it is true, but so far as it can make itself felt in the government, it might as well not be. Parties may come and parties may go, but the cabinet with the Chancellor at its head, is unaffected by parliamentary changes. What, therefore, is the use of a parliament of duly elected representatives if their deliberations are of no effect? It is safe to affirm that were the German parliamentary machinery brought up to date and effect given to the wishes of the electorate, there would be another upheaval similar to that of France in the last century.

That the Emperor, William and his immediate advisers are fully alive to the imminence of the demand for reforms, even in the midst of war, is very plainly shown by the utterances of their hiring professors. Writing to the "Ta geszeitung"

in a recent issue, Professor Langemann comes to the conclusion that parliamentary government would be Germany's ruin. It would be instead Germany's opportunity, but it would certainly be the ruin of the Court Party, and the aristocrats, so called. While every Briton, Herr Professor says, whether Liberal or Conservative, has for centuries been impregnated with the idea of statecraft, he does not go beyond the policy of his class and party. Party dogma makes him deaf to the necessities of the State.

The professor finally winds up warning Germans against all attempt at democratizing Germany. Without the class and party restrictions, which the professor implies do not obtain in Germany, for the German people to rule themselves, instead of being ruled by an effete oligarchy, would mean the speedy overthrow of the military caste.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

Ambassador Gerard will have some interesting things to say when he gets home. But will he say them? In the meantime he is wondering whether he will be blown up on his way across the Atlantic by those good friends with whom the United States never before had such cordial relations.

The unwritten rules under which the component parts of the British Empire act together furnish an example of the survival of the fittest, in national existence.

The first flurry of frightfulness seems to be over. The Kaiser's Jolly Roger is not proving the terror Berlin told the world it would be.

Herr Hollweg prays to heaven that frightfulness on the sea may prove more effective than frightfulness in the air. Yet there was a time when the Hun was quite sure the Zeppelins would prove the ruin of Britain, Gott strafe her.

Do not smile too broadly at China's approval of Uncle Sam's attitude on the submarine ques-

tion. China is potentially the most powerful nation on earth. Her population is something like 450,000,000 and recruiting on a ten per cent basis could raise an army of 45,000,000. She has been overrun and conquered. She has had a great many wars, but it will be noticed that she has always swallowed her conquerors.

When Germany restores Alsace-Lorraine to France, she will part with her chief iron deposits and some of her valuable coal mines, her largest cotton industry and some of her largest iron and steel industries. A large part of Germany's industrial gain on France in the last half century is due to the transfer of this valuable territory.

The Netherlands government cannot see their way to go so far as the United States in protest against the submarine campaign. It is true that Holland has lost many ships and many men in this pirate warfare to which the kingdom is not a party. But on the frontier of Holland, Germany has distributed several army corps. They are there to persuade the Dutch to be neutral while Germany makes war on Dutch shipping.

Mexico is becoming humorous. She has sent a circular message to all neutrals inviting co-operation to make peace in Europe. It might be thought that Mexico needs all the peace she can produce for home consumption.

When the long wars with France began in 1793, the only force which Pitt, the great British Premier, had available consisted of but 30,000 men. This "contemptible little army" by strenuous exertions he managed to increase in a year's time to 140,000.

These numbers Pitt described as "unparalleled and such as could hardly be expected." Today again, the government is following in Pitt's footsteps and training an army after the war had begun.
