LORD FISHER TAKES ADMIRALTY POSITION

FIRST PRESIDENT BOARD OF INVENTIONS IN THE ANTI-SUBMARINE DEPARTMENT

LORD FISHER AGAIN BACK AT ADMIRALTY

Is The New President of Board of Inventions in Anti-Submarine Department—Hurts Northcliffe.

London, Feb. 22.—Lord Fisher, former first sea lord, has returned to the Admiralty staff as president of the board of inventions. This board is part of the anti-submarine department which has been established "with the best and most experienced personnel." This appointment is received with great satisfaction throughout the country, as Lord Fisher's adaptability is well known. He is regarded as being the very best man for this responsible post.

CONGRESS ON FOOD PRICES

Washington, Feb. 22.—President Wilson is determined that Congress shall pass immediately an appropriation of \$400,000 which the Federal Trade Commission requested for the nationwide food price probe.

Senator Borah demanded that Congress shall remain in session until adequate steps are taken to bring prices of food stuffs back to their normal. He says that the people are the victims of speculators and combinations which are milking millions out of the people's food.

BRE STEAMERS SUNK

London, Feb. 22.—The British steamer Centurion, 1838 tons, has been sent to the bottom. The crew have been landed. The following ships have been sunk by submarines around the British coast: Minas, Skogland, Guiseppe, Guido, and Rosario, between the 18th and the 21st. No details are yet to hand regarding the safety of their crews. This is only an exceedingly small proportion of the vessels moving in the adjacent waters during this period.

GERMANY IS BLOCKADED

London, Feb. 22.—An order-in-council announced today provides that all vessels carrying goods to and from enemy ports are liable to capture and condemnation unless they call at an allied port en route for examination of their cargoes. The blockade of Germany is thus apparently complete.

PROHIBITION FOR STATES

Washington, Feb. 22.—Following a two hours uproarious debate, the Senate approved by a four to one majority of a measure to raise an iron-clad barrier against the importation of liquor into prohibition states.

Mrs. Tyre and Mrs. H. P. Wilson will have charge of the sale of home cooking on Friday. In view of the terrible year ahead of the Allies, the British Red Cross is asking for renewed effort on the part of the public, so that supplies may be on hand when needed.

MORE RAIDS BY BRITISH AND FRENCH TROOPS

German Trenches Captured and Held—Enemy Attack Fails—More Vessels Sunk By Submarines.

London, Feb. 22.—On three different parts of the British front yesterday local advances were made and the positions consolidated. To the north of Genedecourt, to the south of Armentieres and to the southeast of Ypres, the German positions were penetrated and their trenches seized. Several important enemy positions were also destroyed, as well as their mine shafts and dug-outs. Many machine guns and prisoners were captured and severe casualties inflicted.

French Front.

Paris, Feb. 22.—An enemy surprise attack on Chambrettes Farm failed completely. Several companies of German troops were annihilated.

There is great artillery activity on the right bank of the Meuse. On the outskirts of Grand Chenay, the concentrated fire of French guns caused a great conflagration followed by an explosion in a strong German position.

THANKS FROM BLUE CROSS

A communication has been received from the secretary of the Blue Cross Association stating that the committee of the Blue Cross wishes to extend their most grateful thanks to the residents of Prince Rupert for their generous help. The sum of \$77.25 has been received from Mrs. Percy Godenrath on behalf of her dog "Sandy," this amount having been subscribed recently in this city. The committee gratefully acknowledges this further testimony of the generosity which has always been shown by the people of Prince Rupert in every time of need.

EXPECTED BREAK WITH U. S.

Rome, Feb. 22.—The general belief obtaining here is that the Austro-American situation must result in the severance of the relations between the two countries. Austria will be compelled to confirm their adherence to the submarine warfare, thus hastening the break with the United States, or else disavow their solidarity with Germany.

BRITAIN IS BLOCKADED

London, Feb. 22.—During the period from February 1st to 18th, 6,076 vessels have arrived in British ports and 5,873 had departed, notwithstanding the submarine blockade. Germany's hope of starving out Britain by submarine "ruthlessness" will never be realized at the present rate.

BELGIANS BEING DEPORTED

London, Feb. 22.—"Vorwartz," a Dutch paper, says: "Germans are planning a monster deportation of the Belgians from the cities to the country to improve the food situation." Just in what way was the food situation to be improved by the shifting of the population from one point to another, is not stated.

AMERICANS ESCAPING FROM GERMANY

Zurich, Feb. 22.—Scores of U. S. Consuls and government agents with their families arrived here last night from Germany.

SUFFERINGS OF THE ARMENIANS

New York, Feb. 22.—According to a cable received here, John Masfield, in addressing the American Committee of Relief in Armenia and Syria, said that one third of the Armenian race had been massacred or had died from starvation and disease, since the commencement of the European conflict. One half of the remainder is homeless and dying in exile.

BERNSTORFF HAS GREAT LOVE FOR MUSIC

Halifax, Feb. 22.—The late Ambassador Bernstorff and his party aboard the Frederick V. seem to have a singular love for Gramophone music. They took with them a very representative stock of records ranging from Grand Opera to ragtime. They will not be allowed to take the records to Germany because of the fact that the records may be utilized for rubber. The records will also be played off to ascertain whether they contain any messages. It will be seen that the British authorities are not taking chances with the wily count and his suite.

FRINGES OF THE FLEET

New York, Feb. 22.—Edward Noyes, the well known English poet informed the Associated Press last night that four thousand private yachts, whalers and fishing craft manned by sixty thousand men comprise Britain's anti-submarine fleet. Already two hundred German submarines have been destroyed since the beginning of the "ruthlessness."

PREMIER IN BRITAIN

Ottawa, Feb. 22.—Premier Borden, the Hon. Robert Rogers and the Hon. Mr. Hazen have arrived in England safely, notwithstanding the submarine menace.

FIGHTING IN EGYPT

London, Feb. 22.—The Turkish troops are in full flight from the Allies. The entire garrison of Sinai Peninsula has been captured by the British.

CHANGES NECESSARY BEFORE PEACE SIGNED

The speaker of the British House of Commons, the Rt. Hon. James William Lowther, speaking in London the other night declared it was impossible for British statesmen to make any agreement with the German government as now constituted. It would be necessary before signing any peace or agreement, he said, to insist that it must be with a government different in constitution to the present one.

PREPARING FOR THE GREAT SPRING DRIVE

British Headquarters in France, Feb. 17.—The cold which has held the western front frostbound for nearly a month, is gradually moderating and it is easy to sense all along the battle line an unmistakable quickening, which tells of the approach of spring and foreshadows the coming to grips of the greatest armies yet assembled in the world war. Already these armies are reaching out towards each other, testing various parts of the lines and attempting to discover the most likely point of contact for the beginning of the titanic struggle in which the Allied armies will defeat the German forces.

New groups of divisions have been identified recently along the German lines, bearing out reports of great troop movements now going on in Germany. British officers, however, say that this concentration is not so formidable as it appears at sight. They say that many of the so-called German divisions are merely a rearrangement of old divisions. These statements are based on information carefully collected during the continuous trench raids.

Corps D'elite.

Another manoeuvre carried out by the Germans has been a combining out of regiments and divisions by which groups of 25 of the youngest men were taken from each company in the line and sent back to Germany to form new units of corps d'elite. British officers believe that it is on these corps d'elite that Von Hindenburg is placing his greatest reliance.

Some Misgivings.

The British staff is keenly interested in a report that prior to the declaration of unrestricted submarine warfare by Germany, Von Hindenburg stated to Chancellor Bethmann-Hollweg "everywhere our front is invulnerable. The supply of reserves is ample and the troops are in good spirits and absolutely reliable." The British point of view is that the last three words of this statement constituted an admission that doubts were entertained in German circles as to the reliability of their troops. There is no disposition, however, to underestimate the stubborn resistance that the Germans have the power of making.

Artillery is looked upon as the deciding factor in the coming battle and upon artillery the British have been concentrating their energy.

London, Feb. 22.—Captain Banning of the Princess Patricia's has been dismissed from the service by court martial.

HUNGRY WOMEN DEMAND BREAD FOR CHILDREN

Hundreds of Women Make Great Demonstration in Wall Street Push Carts and Peddlers Raided.

New York, Feb. 22.—The food, or rather the lack of food demonstrations continue today. The women have been arming all day. In the afternoon at a very busy hour, a great parade through Wall Street took place. Scenes of the French revolution were enacted over again.

New York, Feb. 22.—Demonstrations of housewives in New York and Brooklyn were made here yesterday. They appealed to the municipal authorities for bread and for some arrangement to be made to reduce the extremely high cost of all food stuffs. Systematic attacks made upon peddlers and push carts are reported to have been planned by representatives of the Central Powers. They are engaging persons to incite the women of the tenements to organize riots for the purpose of forcing Washington to place an embargo on the exportation of food stuffs, and thus depriving the Allies of their supplies. A Federal investigation is ordered.

IMPERIAL PREFERENCE IS RECOMMENDED

London, Feb. 22.—The committee which has been considering the commercial and industrial policy of Britain issued its report yesterday. Recommendation was made for Imperial preference on customs duties hereafter be immediately imposed on imports. The committee would give imperial preference on all colonial imports to the British Isles, and would establish a wider range of customs duties. This they say might restrain trade, but would meet the wishes of the Colonies.

PRODUCTION

Of course the first duty is to win the war. Our efforts must be primarily concentrated upon but there is another duty, not indeed of equal importance, but one that will in the long run call for greater effort, greater economy, greater wisdom. We will emerge from the war with a heavy debt upon our shoulders and with the very serious charges of a pension fund. These obligations must be met. We dare not repudiate either of them; we will stand ashamed before the nations if we do not discharge them promptly and honorably. To accomplish this means hard work and strict economy. The wealth that has been destroyed must be replaced. But some may say that there has been no destruction of wealth in Canada, that the factories in eastern Canada especially have been running overtime making munitions, which have been sold at a good price, a price indeed which has yielded many people large fortunes. But when the war is over there will be nothing to show for these products of industry. There may be a crop of millionaires and near millionaires, but to offset their possessions, we will have a greatly augmented public debt and a heavy liability for pensions. The new fortunes will represent a part of the debt upon which we will have to pay interest. It would be idle to pretend that they represent any addition to the wealth of the country.

Wealth does not consist of coin or bank notes or bank balances. If it did the government could make us all rich by setting its printing presses to work printing currency. Wealth consists of the product of labor applied to natural resources and if Canada is to recover the position in which she stood before the war, this process must be followed to a degree unprecedented in our history. We will all have to get to work producing something of value. The National Service Commission fully appreciates this, but it would be a mistake to leave this matter too much in the hands of any

branch of the government. Individual effort will have to do most of the work.

In the words of the immortal Carlyle, "Produce! Produce! Were it but the pitifulest infinitesimal fraction of a product, produce it in God's name. 'Tis the utmost thou hast in thee: out with it, then."

NOTES AND COMMENTS

The last British war loan is termed by the London Times as a "colossal subscription." The prompt response of the people of Great Britain to the requirements of war finance speaks to the world in no uncertain tones, as to their willingness to see the war through to a successful finish. A second loan of even greater proportions could be immediately raised if necessary.

The Russian government is taking time by the forelock. They are even now devoting a hundred million roubles towards establishing a mercantile fleet. When the war is over and they are in possession of a warm water port, the Russians propose to take a hand in the carrying trade of the world.

Sir Thomas Holland is presently in India mobilising the resources of that great dependency with regard to the making of munitions. The native princes in proof of their loyalty are giving large subscriptions and all the other assistance in their power to the government.

Lord Robert Cecil in discussing the operations of the German submarines said that less than one ship in every hundred has been lost. The "barred zone" does not seem to be very well barred.

The last word from Havana is to the effect that the revolt is about over. It is suspected on very good grounds that German agents had a great deal to do with the uprising.

A state of terrorism exists in Warsaw in even greater measure than when General Trepoff sent his famous message to the Czar saying "Warsaw is pacified," many years ago. The Hun police agents swarm over the country



and the jails are filled to overflowing with citizens. Poland is being Prussianised and anything of any value is being sent back to Germany with that systematic despatch natural to the German. Even the forests are being cut down as timber is beginning to get scarce in Prussia.

People have peculiar ideas about the liability of a municipal corporation if they slip on the sidewalk and sustain an injury. In Vancouver an action for damages was brought by a woman who slipped on the icy sidewalk. The judge dismissed the case and advised the plaintiff to sue the Lord.

One thing Kaiser Bill is responsible for, every time he talks about peace he enables the Allies to buy cheaper wheat and cheaper steel. Keep it up Bill.

James J. Hill once said: "If you want to know if you are destined to be a success or not, you can easily find out. The test is simple and infallible—are you able to save money? If not, drop out. You will lose. You may think not, but you will lose, sure as fate, for the seed of success is not in you."

The Australian parliament and senate has now a labor majority. The cost of living problem there is nearly as acute as here, notwithstanding.

PEACE TREATIES ARE IMPOSING DOCUMENTS

When the war comes to an end a treaty of peace will be signed, sealed, and delivered, as between the various belligerents.

This will be a most imposing document, written by hand throughout, sealed with many seals, and bound about with green silk ribbon. Following the usual custom, each copy will begin with the words, "In the Name of the Most Holy and Undivided Trinity," should, however, Turkey be one of the signatory powers, as seems probable, this formula will be altered to "In the Name of Allah the Almighty God," in the copy allotted to her.

At least as many original copies as there are signatory powers will be signed and sealed, while several certified copies will be signed, but not sealed, for the sake of convenience. The original copies will be securely locked up in the State archives of the different countries; the certified copies will be used for printing from for reference.

Peace treaties are not written straight across the page, or pages, like ordinary documents. They are written in parallel columns, one in English, the next in French, the next in Italian, German, Russian, and so on, according to the number of languages spoken by the peoples of the signatory powers. The text of each of these columns is an exact translation of the text of all the other columns, and the utmost pains is taken in the selection of words that will convey identical shades of meaning.

The monarchs of the signatory powers do not affix their signatures or seals to the peace treaties entered into by them. This important formality is carried out by specially accredited peace commissioners.—Exchange.
