

# RETREATING GERMANS BLOW UP POSITIONS

Carefully Prepared Defences of Bapaume Are Now Untenable -German Retreat Not Stopped Yet.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, March 2.-The German retirement still continues. The retreat is slowed down to what it was on the first day, but it is steady, and is extending to the north of Arras. Indications of any recoil movement are unnoticeable. Explosion follows explosion unceasingly in the town of Bapaume. Many months of hard work have been expended on this ridge on which the town stands and it was expected that hard fighting would take place before it would fall into the hands of the British. From the number of explosions, it is the accepted belief that the Germans are deliberately blowing up all their wonderfully constructed defences preparatory to their evacuating the town. 
