## GERMAN PLOT DISCLOSED IN U.S. CONGRESS

### MEXICAN TROUBLE MADE IN GERMANY -- SWISS MINISTER TO U. S. GETS IN BAD

#### GERMAN PLOT REVEALED IN U. S. CONGRESS

Documentary Evidence Produced Showing German Attempts to Get Japan and Mexico Against U. S.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Washington, March 2.—Letters and other documents, which have been in the possession of the United States government for some time were produced in Congress yesterday showing that Germany has been very active in attempting to align Japan and Mexico together belligerently against the United States, in case of war. The correspondence between Germany and its Mexican representative proved conclusively that Germany has been at the bottom of all the recent trouble in Mexico. It has been doubted previously that the Germans had anything to do with the various uprisings but the evidence now in possession of the United States government shows such to be the case. It was sought by Germany to keep the hands of President Wilson full with Mexican and Cuban troubles, so that the full strength of the U. S. would not be employed in European matters.

The effects of the disclosure of the German plot against the United States was seen immediately in Congress. Large introductions were made to have the president communicate all the facts to Congress, while Hardwicke insists on a motion to refer same to the foreign committee. Full confirmation of the disclosures regarding the German intrigue was given at the White House, State Department and in the Senate. The plot revealed by the administration today was put forth to sway the daily Congress and to stir the nation to realize the real perils of the German problem. Facing the possibility of further delay in Congress together with the opposition to give the president the powers he asked, it is considered that the administration played a trump card in making the disclosures.

Secretary Lansing states that it is inconceivable that Japan had any official knowledge of the plot or that the Japanese government would consider any proposals made by the enemy.

#### THE GERMAN BLOCKADE

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, March 2.—Out of the thousands of vessels arriving and departing from British ports during the month of February, the total number of ships sunk is 183. Of these 110 were British, 20 belonged to other of the Allies, 2 were American, and 51 were those of neutral countries. This very small percentage sunk shows that the submarine warfare is practically accomplishing very little.

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

#### BERNSTORFF GONE HIS WORK REMAINS

Washington, March 2.—Dr. Paul Ritter, the Swiss minister, took over the charge of the German Embassy when Bernstorff left. The accumulating annoying activities of this minister seems to be going to place him in the same category with the late German ambassador, Dr. Paul Ritter, as Germany's indirect representative, has not only inherited Bernstorff's diplomatic work, but has taken up certain German propaganda work, which may force a show-down between himself and the State Department.

#### NEW YORK ANGRY

(Special to The Daily News.)

New York, March 2.—There is a fresh outburst here today against the dilatory tactics of the government in handling the German situation. The press censures Congress severely for blocking the free action of the president, and tying his hands in the war affairs. It is realized here now that perfidious Germany will not stop at anything and that on four separate occasions Germany has given occasion for a declaration of war. The disclosures made by the government show that Germany intended to use the Japan-Mexico-Cuba troubles as a club over the United States to keep her neutral and to prevent the stand she has already taken against the ruthless submarine edict. That Germany should be in a position to do so unsuspected has hurt the pride of all Americans.

#### GENERAL NEWS

(Special to The Daily News.)

The Admiralty seeks naval officers from Canada. The Bantams have arrived safely in England. Fourteen hundred returned and invalided soldiers have arrived in Halifax from England yesterday. Mr. W. J. Bowser leads the opposition in the provincial parliament in Victoria.

#### FINANCIAL AID COULD BE GIVEN

London, Feb. 28.—There is a growing tendency to believe that the American-German situation may continue indefinitely, although full consideration is given to the chances of an "overt act," or other eventuality creating a state of war. Discussion centred on the question whether if an actual state of war continues to be avoided, the existing situation will not necessarily develop into an attitude of benevolent neutrality on the part of America toward the Entente Powers. It is fully recognized that such a possible development would have to be entirely a matter of American initiative.

How valuable benevolent neutrality would be can be indicated by a single instance of one of its possible workings. Dispatches from New York yesterday stated that J. P. Morgan & Company had just received from Canada \$28,500,000 in gold. Under a system of benevolent neutrality financial arrangements obviating the necessity of such a drain upon the Allied gold resources would be easily reached.

In the opinion of some authorities here the United States could help to bring the war to a more speedy end without herself incurring the responsibility and risks of war. Germany's attitude toward an American policy of benevolent neutrality toward the Allies would present no feature of essential difference from her actual attitude inasmuch as a declaration of war would have to emanate from Germany.

#### TARNOWSKI STILL ON THE OUTSIDE

Washington, Feb. 28.—Count Adam von Tarnowski, Austro-Hungarian Ambassador to the United States, was virtually turned down by the Washington administration late yesterday. Baron Zwiadenik, Charge of the Austrian Embassy since Dr. Dumba was handed his passports, called at the State Department and inquired when it would please Secretary Lansing to have the Count present his credentials and thus bring about his recognition as Austrian envoy. The Baron was told that no time would be set for the presentation of the credentials until the submarine issue between Austria-Hungary and the United States was settled.

This more forcibly indicated President Wilson's firm stand against not only Germany, but her chief ally, than any other incident of the past week, which has been practically barren of diplomatic developments in view of the critical international conditions. It was interpreted by some as a warning to Germany not to attempt to influence Austria further in her dealings with the United States and to emphasize President Wilson's determination not to temporize.

#### POLAND UNDER PRUSSIAN HEEL

Amsterdam.—Only with great difficulty, and on definite and approved business grounds, will the Germans allow travellers from Poland to come westward. The following interview, therefore, which was obtained at Rotterdam on Sunday with a certain Pole, who had arrived from Warsaw, cannot fail to be of interest as giving a general idea, from which detail is necessarily omitted, of conditions in that city and other parts of Poland under the German heel.

I would sooner die than return. By every possible means Germany is Prussianizing Poland, refraining from no methods to attain this end. Vast areas of our forests have been cut down and the wood exported to Germany. Thus, in the opinion of many, they have permanently and irreparably injured our sources of wealth.

With all speed Germany is sending a number of police agents into Poland to dragoon, depress, and mishandle the population. In all our schools now it is compulsory to learn German, all teachers even suspected of opposing or disliking this order are being arrested and imprisoned. Practically all public life and the activities of our economic and intellectual societies are forbidden.

There is also a very strong propaganda in full swing against the Jews, and measures of an outrageously unlawful kind have been put in force against them. When a Jew presents himself for a passport to travel over to his own town he is formally asked his religion. When he replies that he is a Jew the military become abusive and remark, 'Aha, a Jew, also a smuggler and a traitor. We grant no passes to such people.' No Jew is allowed to build a house, and this in spite of the fact that there are 350,000 Jews among Warsaw's round million inhabitants. Nor are Jews allowed any hand in the administration of the country.

#### Vicious Maltreatment.

Within two hours after the German troops entered Warsaw the German secret police, provided with lists, made searches of more than 200 houses, arresting a large number of quite innocent people. All the prisoners of Warsaw and the adjacent Praga are filled with Polish citizens who have spoken only a word or two indiscreetly, while great numbers have been shot. Spies are everywhere.

The city of Warsaw shows scarcely any life. Many zones have been made into prohibited areas, where the general public are not allowed. Moreover, Jews wearing their long caftans may not even enter Warsaw's public park, known as the Jardin de Saxe.

Food is extremely expensive, as elsewhere, and if there is any food surplus in one district it may not be transported to another district under pain of imprisonment. Bread is supplied under an official rationing scheme.

In spite of their great misery, the Polish population endure patiently, never abandoning the hope of deliverance by the Allies' victory. Business is in a serious condition throughout the country. Many big houses, including some important banks, have become bankrupt. Among the banks which have failed is that of Wilhelm Landlaw, also the house of Peretz, also the firm of Goldfeder. These failures, of course, have caused the deepest distress.

The Polish population under Austrian domination have much less reason to complain. The Austrians, I assure you, are not Germans, and it is not without good

#### PRINCE GEORGE VOTERS ASK FOR INVESTIGATION

The enlargement of the scope of the Vancouver Election Royal Commission so that it can take cognizance of the charges made in respect to the election in Fort George was urged upon the premier on Saturday last by J. R. Campbell, Prince George, president of the Liberal Association for the riding, who is in Victoria at present.

It is claimed that there were several irregularities in this election, where the candidates were W. R. Ross, K. C., then a minister in the Bowser cabinet, who had deserted his old riding of Fernie, which he had represented since 1903, and John McInnes, formerly Socialist member for Grand Forks. Mr. Ross' majority over Mr. McInnes is only seven.

Mr. McInnes and his friends believe that they can prove several breaches of the Elections Act committed on behalf of Mr. Ross by his supporters in the constituency, and a great many electors of Fort George consider that no matter what steps Mr. McInnes might or might not take in regard to the election, public policy demands that the allegations of irregularities should be investigated.

#### GERMANY TO PAY

(Special to The Daily News.)

Amsterdam, March 2.—Germany has intimated that she is willing to compensate the owners of the seven Dutch steamers torpedoed in the English Channel last week. As these vessels carried mostly food stuffs it is pointed out that in time of practical famine nothing can ever compensate the Dutch people for the loss of food. Feeling in Holland is very acute over this matter as the sunken vessels carried a safe conduct from Berlin for their voyage from Falmouth to Amsterdam.

#### RETREATING GERMANS BLOW UP POSITIONS

Carefully Prepared Defences of Bapaume Are Now Untenable —German Retreat Not Stopped Yet.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, March 2.—The German retreat still continues. The retreat is slowed down to what it was on the first day, but it is steady, and is extending to the north of Arras. Indications of any recoil movement are unnoticeable. Explosion follows explosion unceasingly in the town of Bapaume. Many months of hard work have been expended on this ridge on which the town stands and it was expected that hard fighting would take place before it would fall into the hands of the British. From the number of explosions, it is the accepted belief that the Germans are deliberately blowing up all their wonderfully constructed defences preparatory to their evacuating the town. Gommecourt has now fallen to the British troops and they are within a mile of Bapaume. The retreating Germans are being continually harassed by the advancing British, whose patrols are in constant touch with the German rear guard.

There is no news from the other parts of the front. Quietness prevails.

#### Mesopotamia.

Cavalry and gunboats are continuing the pursuit of the beaten Turkish troops from Kut-el-Amara. Further large quantities of ammunition and material have fallen into the hands of the British troops. The Turkish forces are almost surrounded and it is thought that the very large numbers will be compelled to surrender.

#### Eastern Front.

Petrograd, March 2.—The enemy assaulted the Russian positions on the Jacobeni-Kimpolung high road in force and succeeded in establishing themselves on part of our line. A counter attack drove the major part of the enemy back to their own positions.

#### TERRACE NEWS

A new lumber mill is to be opened up in the spring near Copper River by Frank Phiscarto and Geo. Little.

Frank Phiscarto has 400 acres of good timber land near Copper River. There will be a small townsite near the new mill with a store for the convenience of the workers. Frank is now in the south purchasing machinery for the mill.

George Little is doing a lot of logging here, picking up a nice lot of clear spruce logs for use in making aeroplanes. There is a big demand for this kind of lumber. Buyers from the east and the States have been here to see what they could get.

A Red Cross entertainment will be held here on Saturday. The ladies have been working hard on a play that has earned a name for itself in the east. They are enthusiastic. A good night is ensured.

## A BLACK EYE FOR CANADA

Unquestionably it is with deep regret that the Canadian public learns that Hon. Robert Rogers is in the Prime Minister's party whose safe arrival in England has recently been announced. Why Sir Robert Borden chose that minister as his colleague in Canada's representation at the Imperial conference passes comprehension. Not more than a month ago a Royal Commissioner in Manitoba found Rogers guilty of the most sordid manipulation of a public contract and branded him as a perjurer. It was a verdict in which political prejudice played no part, for Mr. Justice Galt, the commissioner, is a Conservative, as Rogers professes to be, and according to the minister was appointed on his recommendation. The commissioner's finding was in strict conformity with the evidence and Rogers himself knew what it must be, for he attempted to discredit it in advance by making an attack upon the judge.

The other overseas dominions will be represented at the conference by statesmen of high repute and outstanding ability. Why did Sir Robert Borden include among the Canadian representatives a man who stands for a system and methods against which the conscience of the whole decent world has revolted? South Africa, for instance, will be represented by Lieut.-General Smuts. Imagine that soldier-statesman and Rogers sitting at the same council table! There was nothing to prevent this Dominion going to the conference with clean hands. All that was required was a little firmness on the part of Prime Minister in resisting Mr. Rogers' importunities or demands, whatever they might have been, and a decent conception of what is due this country's dignity and reputation. These could have been safeguarded by the selection of Mr. Doherty, or Dr. Roche, or Sir Thomas White, or, particularly, Sir George E. Foster. It is not hard to picture Mr. Rogers' contribution to the discussion at the conference. He

probably will desire to learn from Lieut.-General Smuts who is going to get the fat concessions of minerals and lands in the newly-captured German colonies in Africa and how much the "campaign fund" of the Union Government will be enriched from that source. He not improbably will inquire how much the German indemnities will yield the various belligerents for election purposes. He may wish to know just where the "boys" will come in on the bill that is to be presented to the Central Powers and how much there will be "going in commissions." Undoubtedly he will be unique in that atmosphere but, withal, a poor advertisement for Canada.—Victoria Times.

## NOTES AND COMMENTS

We are not in the least anxious to have the United States enter the war, but we would not like it to be said that a nation, speaking the same language as ourselves and with some at least of our traditions, kept its ships at home because Germany told her to, and would not let them venture to sea until Britain had shown that the highways of ocean travel were reasonably safe.

Mr. Edward Lyon, of The Toronto Globe, has been appointed to represent the Canadian press at the front. It is satisfactory to know that at least a real newspaperman has been assigned to that work. Mr. Lyon will not have to employ somebody who has never been in France to write his stories for him.

Come to think of it, it is pretty tough on men like Baron Shaughnessy and Sir Frederick Williams Taylor, for instance, to be told by implication that they are not to be trusted as members of the government of a country which tolerates Bob Rogers in one of the principal ministerial posts.

## UNABLE TO GUESS POINTS OF ATTACK


With the British Armies in the Field, Feb. 17.—There is one item of news along the British front of immense importance to the history of the war, though it may not find its way into an official communication. It is this: There must be cold terror in some of the German trenches, now that the British raids are on and the British guns are hammering along the line. In spite of their watch-dogs trained to listen and bark at any movement in No Man's Land, the Germans are caught by surprise. How can they know where the attack is coming when the wire being cut and the trenches battered at many sections of their front, they go to earth in their dugouts while the ground above them heaves under the crash of the British heavy explosives?

### In Dugouts.

In the great raid made by the Canadian troops on Tuesday morning there were not many of the Germans who were up and out of their dugouts to meet the Canadians, and they did not get their machine guns working as they used to at the beginning of the Somme battles. On the left of the Canadian attack, which was on a 400-yard front or thereabouts between Souchez and Givenchy, one or two machine guns got to work and brought down several men. What was surprising was the absence of machine gun fire elsewhere. It seems that the bombardment must have buried the German emplacements. It was not a preliminary bombardment in the old style. It was a long continued and deliberate hammering for many days, and the Canadians who went over saw the awful effect of it. It had blown the strong system of trenches to chaos.

### Wild Turmoil.

Nearly 50 prisoners came back. They were men of the Eleventh Bavarian Regiment, which is a body of picked troops who have seen service at Verdun, in Russia and on the Somme. They can make nice comparisons between one kind of hell and another and they say they never have been put into such frightful trenches—wild turmoil of bombardment.



### EXPLOSION VICTIMS HONORED IN DEATH

ground—as those to which they came last Sunday.

Five hours later Canadian troops made a second raid farther south and did great damage. On Wednesday the Saxons had their turn of tragedy, and many of them were taken on a front of 200 yards near Conclincourt.

So it goes on, and the enemy is having a bad time, losing many men in killed and wounded. He is saving his ammunition with most rigid economy, and is self-denying with his ordnance for days when he hopes it will do more damage. That is the absolute truth, but it is ridiculous to pretend that his artillery is inactive. He has quite enough guns and enough ammunition, even with economy, to make the British front extensively unhealthy at times.

### A PLEA FOR SOCKS

The Imperial Order of the Daughters of the Empire is making a special appeal to the public for socks for the men in the trenches. A change of socks is the best preventative of "trench feet," the most dreaded ill of the present campaign. Canadians at the front number double what they were a year ago, but the supply of socks has not increased in proportion.

The I. O. D. E. wishes to ask the women of Prince Rupert to answer the plea of the soldiers. This is the women's share in the war. On Thursday afternoon, March 8th, Mrs. McMullin will be "at home" to receive the gifts of the Prince Rupert women in the shape of socks for the boys in the trenches.

The Patriotic Fund needs four dollars this year for one last year. Do your part.
