TERMS OF PEACE ARRANGED AT LAST IN MEXICO

LLOYD-GEORGE TELLS HOW THE MONEY GOES

Liberals Have Paid Off \$130,000,000 from the National Debt in Three Years---Have Inaugurated Old Age Pensions, Increased the Navy, the Civil Service, and Will Pay the Members of the British House---Million and a Half for Coronation

London, May 17.—An interesting statement was made in the House of Commons last night by Mr. Lloyd-George showing how the increased expenditure of \$38,500,000 in the Budget is made up.

Where the Money Goes

Additions to the navy, the civil service, and the old age pensions scheme accounted for the greater portion of the increased expenditure, while the proposed payment

of members will absorb \$1,250,000. The Coronation festivities will cost another \$1,500,000.

Claims a Triumph

Mr. Lloyd-George declared that the fiscal system had passed through a period of great stress and exceptional strain with lustre. He claimed a triumph for the system. In addition to what they had done for the people to relieve the pressure of want, they had

during the three years his tenure of office paid off \$130,000,000 from the National Debt. But since the Liberals came into office they had reduced it by \$350,000,000.

Outlook is Good

He declared the outlook is good. Prospects were hopeful, and the trade of the country excellent. He estimated the revenue for the current year at \$980,580,000.

LOST HALF A MILLION

After Fifteen Months, the Spokane Inland Herald Quits

Spokane, May 17.—After a stormy career of fifteen months, during which \$500,000 was spent on it, the Inland Herald of Spokane has suspended publication. The Inland Herald was started as an evening publication. Talent was engaged at fat salaries and the people of Spokane and Washington as well as newspapermen of the coast expected wonderful results. But the paper failed to make good with the people. It was elaborately equipped in every department—mechanical and editorial. Its foreign home and special telegraphic service was the best. Its high salaried staff turned out high-salaried work, but the "work" did not reach the soul of the people. Its editorial utterances fell on unresponsive ears.

LAND ORDER IS MODIFIED

Won't Apply Where a Deposit Has Been Made

WILL AFFECT MANY

Order in Council Raising the Price of Crown Lands Will Not be Enforced Where Purchaser Has Made Deposit.

(Canadian Press Despatch)
Victoria, May 17.—By an order-in-council approved by the lieutenant-governor today the enunciated policy of the Provincial Government with respect to the recent doubling of the prices of first and second class crown lands throughout British Columbia has been modified to the extent that it will not be held applicable to lands applied for on an upon which the required deposits of fifty cents per acre had been paid prior to the decision arrived at in respect to the increase of price.

The order-in-council reads as follows:
"That the order-in-council approved on April 3, 1911, increasing the minimum prices of first and second class lands from \$5 and \$2.50 per acre respectively to \$10 and \$5 per acre respectively, shall be held not to apply to applications to purchase such various crown lands which were received by the assistant commissioner of land on or before April 3, 1911, and with respect to which the required deposit of fifty cents per acre had been received by the said commissioners on or before April 3, 1911."

U. S. CRUISER HELPLESS IN HARBOR AT CORDOVA

U.S.S. "Buffalo" Has Not Coal Enough to Reach the Nearest Coaling Station---Railroad Company Refuses to Give Cruiser Any Coal---An Amusing Situation Arises in the Alaskan Port Over the Coal Lands Mix-up.

(Canadian Press Despatch)

Cordova, Alaska, May 17.—The United States cruiser, Buffalo, is in the harbor of Cordova today, unable to proceed any further for lack of coal for her bunkers. She has applied for coal to the agent of the Copper River railroad, but the application has been refused, the agent stating that the 2,000 tons which arrived on the steamer Edith from Canada for his company

is a rush order, on account of troubles which are impending at the mines at Nanaimo, B. C. This is the only coal in the port.

is at Sitka, 1,000 miles away.

As a recognition of his services, and to save the doctor from loss the city council voted him a gift of \$500.

THREE TRAWLERS COMING

Mr. Geo. Doughty is Sending Three Boats from Grimsby

The northern fishing fleet will be augmented by three big beam trawlers which Sir Geo. Doughty the wealthy English fisherman, is having outfitted at Grimsby for service in these waters.

It is said to be the intention of Mr. George to enter the whaling business. He will investigate the coastal herring industry shortly, with the idea in mind of also entering into that business. He is largely interested in fisheries in England and the North Sea, and operates many ships out of Grimsby.

Sir George Doughty was a member of the party, headed by President Hays and other Grand Trunk officials which visited Prince Rupert and Stewart last September.

REGULAR RAIL SERVICE UP RIVER NOW TO BEGIN

All Difficulty Will Soon be Overcome—Ballasting Going on Rapidly—First Regular Train Will be Run to Kitselas Next Week

Early next week the first of a regular service of trains will leave for Kitselas with goods chiefly for Messrs. Foley, Welch & Stewart. This is the beginning of the real rivalry between the rail and river services which will of course result in a win for the railway. General Superintendent Mehan is able to state today that all difficulty with the snow has been finally conquered and the train service promised by him for this spring can now be inaugurated.

Immense Advantage

At the opening of what certainly promises to be the busiest season yet for the up-river points, the starting up of the rail service to carry goods and later, passengers regularly, is of immense advantage, and will be appreciated to the full by hundreds who have been hoping for it since the first promise of spring.

Ballasting Rapidly

Since the difficulty which prevailed a month or two ago on account of the exceptional accumulation of snow, has been effectively overcome, Mr. Mehan is able now to press on with the work of ballasting. Two steam shovels are being started at the

big ballast pits, and as many gangs of men as can be efficiently worked in the mileage to be ballasted are hard at work making the track ready for the regular train service.

RAPID BRIDGE BUILDER HAS ARRIVED FOR G.T.P.

Latest Improved Track Pile Driver for Trestle Construction Landed This Afternoon—New Locomotive and Rolling Stock Arrive Today

This morning the barge George arrived from Vancouver with an interesting consignment of new rolling stock for the Grand Trunk Pacific railway. An important part of the consignment is one of the newest improved track pile drivers, the very latest modern contrivance for rapid railway construction.

Swift Bridge Builder

The new machine is a steam pile driver mounted on a specially constructed car adapted for running out trestles, and similar structures in the building of a railway. It is a fast bridge builder and is in fact one of the latest

appliances used by engineers for the construction of bridges in a hurry. Its arrival for use at this end of the G. T. P. means a great deal to Prince Rupert.

More Rolling Stock

Eleven box cars, and one locomotive also arrived by the barge today. The cars will be used in the rail service up river to be inaugurated next week, and the locomotive is the first of half a dozen which are coming. The rest of the engines are to be brought up by the barge on her next trip. The rolling stock was unloaded this afternoon, and the Georgian returns at once to Vancouver for the other rolling stock.

WHY NOT A TOWN BAND?

On the 24th of May we are all to be entertained by a brass band contest between the bands of the Indian tribes. Nine of them have entered the contest, and the contest will be a good one. The Indians of Northern British Columbia are musically inclined. One of the bands indeed, once carried away the championship of the Province against allcomers. They will surprise those who have not heard them before.

"Music hath charms to soothe the savage breast," was probably the thought in the mind of Rev. John Duncan, the pioneer missionary to the Indians, when he introduced the first set of instruments among them. But from an aid to civilization, the Indian brass band has become a potent source of entertainment to many, including the white population.

This raises the suggestion that the institution of a town band in Prince Rupert would be a very good move. Many towns of only a third the size of Prince Rupert are maintaining town bands. We have musical talent enough in town, and lots of need of a band all the year round.

As a form of publicly endowed free entertainment, nothing more acceptable than summer evening band concerts in Prince Rupert can easily be thought of. Music is both entertainment and education, an element of refinement and a source of general delight.

An appropriation from the city council to start a fund for the purchase of instruments and music would meet with popular approval. Why not a town band?

A HARDSHIP TO THE TRADESMEN

There is a hardship inflicted on some of the tradesmen on Second avenue, arising out of the grading work, that should be attended to. If it is not, then not merely the tradesmen referred to will suffer, but the incident will form a bad precedent for other tradesmen whose premises may later on be affected by the grading work.

Before the grading work began on Second avenue, the tradesmen on both sides of the street had a plank sidewalk in front of their stores for the convenience of their patrons. The plank sidewalks still exist, but on the north side of the street, the approach at one end is practically cut off. This has resulted in the traffic being diverted almost wholly to the one side of the street leaving the other stores difficult of approach.

This is a serious matter to the tradesmen affected. They see the crowds pass on the other side of the street, unable without great inconvenience to get near to their stores. It is not in human nature to make detours to go to special stores, without special reasons. Consequently, the storekeepers are suffering a loss of trade. The grading which was to help them by making the business section easier of access, has had the opposite effect. It has made it more difficult for the public to reach them.

The tradesmen in question are taxpayers, and will have to pay for the grading improvements. Something should certainly be done to see that they get a fair chance to catch the trade that passes along the street.

MUSINGS

BY MACK

It is at night that you notice it most. Climb up to some of the vantage points of our city. Stand still and let your eyes sweep around the whole extent of the townsite stretched out below you in the darkness. Look at the twinkling lights scattered here, there, and everywhere in valley and on rising ground far and near. Every light tells of a home. Every home tells of hearts high with hope, throbbing with a hundred warm living human interests. The whole site of the city is instinct with a spirit of progress, growth, the spirit of a community striving towards prosperity, the spirit of Prince Rupert.

Down towards the wharves clusters of lights are gleaming, and the streets where the work of this never-resting city of ours is mostly done, either by day or by night, are brightly illuminated. Listen to the sound of distant hurrying feet on the echoing plankways. Every footfall is a step nearer to success. Look over the wide, faintly luminous surface of the harbor. There whit her red and green side-lights, her steady white mast-head light, and perhaps the broad beam of a searchlight flung forward to guide her, approaches a steamer. Hark at the hoarse boom of her siren that challenges the sleeping echoes of our encircling mountains. Each blast is like a note of triumph, the triumph of man over these forest-clad crags that have been cleared, carved into shape, conquered by the thriving, striving community who have had the courage from the first to say "Here we will have our city."

You may talk to the old-timers here and think perhaps that they do not appreciate the significance of this strange intense spirit of Prince Rupert which seems most awake when the city is aglimmer with her lamps, and the shadows of night hover over her hills and hollows. Make no mistake about it. The old-timers here may not seem to appreciate the spirit of the city they have founded but it is because to them that spirit is not an outside presence as it must ever be to the new arrival or mere visitor. That spirit is a part of the being of every old-timer here. In their hardships and struggles, before there was anything here but a tree-covered townsite, that indomitable spirit had birth. For them every curve and corner of the waterfront has a story, every hummock and hollow of the gradually levelling town-site has associations.

Those of us who came later and are learning to love the city because of our own conflicts and conquerings within its limits can never quite realize what the wide and ever wider scattering of the lights of Prince Rupert means to the old-timer. But we can pause for a moment in the stillness, and watching the lights twinkle over the town-site, we may gain something new for ourselves from the spirit of the city they have shared with us.

Weather by Wireless

TELEPHONE BEAT LIGHT

Phone Statement Shows Profit. Light is in the Hole

MR. LOVE'S REPORT

Prince Rupert's Wire Conducted Conversations Have Cleared \$794 for the City, but the Light Has Cost \$100 too Much

E. Love manager of the Telephone and Light departments of the city submitted his report to the council on Monday showing the cost of working and revenue derived from the 'Phone and Light departments for the past month.

There were 342 'phone subscribers at 30th April and 412 'phones in use. The revenue was \$1469.00 and the expenses \$674.31 leaving a surplus of \$794.69 to the good.

The Light department earned \$1137.50 and cost \$1036.56 which gives a deficit of \$99.18. Alderman Hilditch suggested that the profits from the 'phone department might be devoted to extending the system. Alderman Clayton preferred the idea of using the profit for the purpose of reducing the rates for the 'phones to users. This has been Alderman Clayton's view all along in regard to profitable municipal enterprise. It should act so as to reduce the cost of common advantages to the community.

Douglas's Maiden Speech

Alderman Douglas made this matter the occasion of his maiden speech. He said that if there were any profit from the 'phones the people should get the advantage, and the 'phone users among the people would benefit most, and most fairly, by the use of the 'phone profits to improve and extend the system. (Cheers from Alderman Clayton.)

On the motion of Alderman Douglas seconded by Alderman Smith, the reports were filed, and the question of how to use the 'phone profits is left with the finance committee meantime.

At the meeting Police Chief Chamberlain stated that as many as twenty men were herded together in a cell at times. He referred to one night this week when men taken into custody for being drunk attempted to pass away time by indulging in pugilism. A constable had to be detailed to keep order.

Dr. Underhill, medical officer of health, stated that the conditions were abominable and a disgrace to present day civilization.

Representatives of the press were denied admission to view the prison which has at times been condemned as totally unfit for human habitation.
