## TRIAL OF LLOYD GEORGE POISONING CASE

### INTENDED TO SHOOT POISONED DARTS AT PREMIER--FOUR PERSONS IMPLICATED

#### HOLLAND IS GOING TO TIE UP HER SHIPS

Rather Than Risk Further Losses By Submarine, Dutch Ships Will Not Sail—May be Taken by Allies.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, March 9.—The report is current here that the Dutch government is considering whether it would not be better for all Dutch shipping to be kept in port rather than risk further losses by exposure to the dangers of the German submarine campaign. The Dutch losses of ships and cargoes have been very heavy recently. The Entente will consider this proposed action as unneutral, as it would be playing into the hands of Germany. It is considered probable that all Dutch shipping now in the harbors of Holland may be requisitioned by the Allied governments, should such a course be pursued.

#### HALIBUT ARRIVALS

There were numerous arrivals in the harbor today. The New England Fish Company's "Manhattan" came in with 100,000 lbs. The others are all American boats. Director, with 47,000 pounds; Polaris, 30,000 pounds; Heligoland, 25,000 pounds; Mololo, 16,000 pounds; Volunteer, 16,000 pounds, and President, 3,000 lbs. The Trio arrived yesterday with 17,000 lbs., making a grand total of 244,000 lbs. at present in the port. No sales had been made at the time of writing.

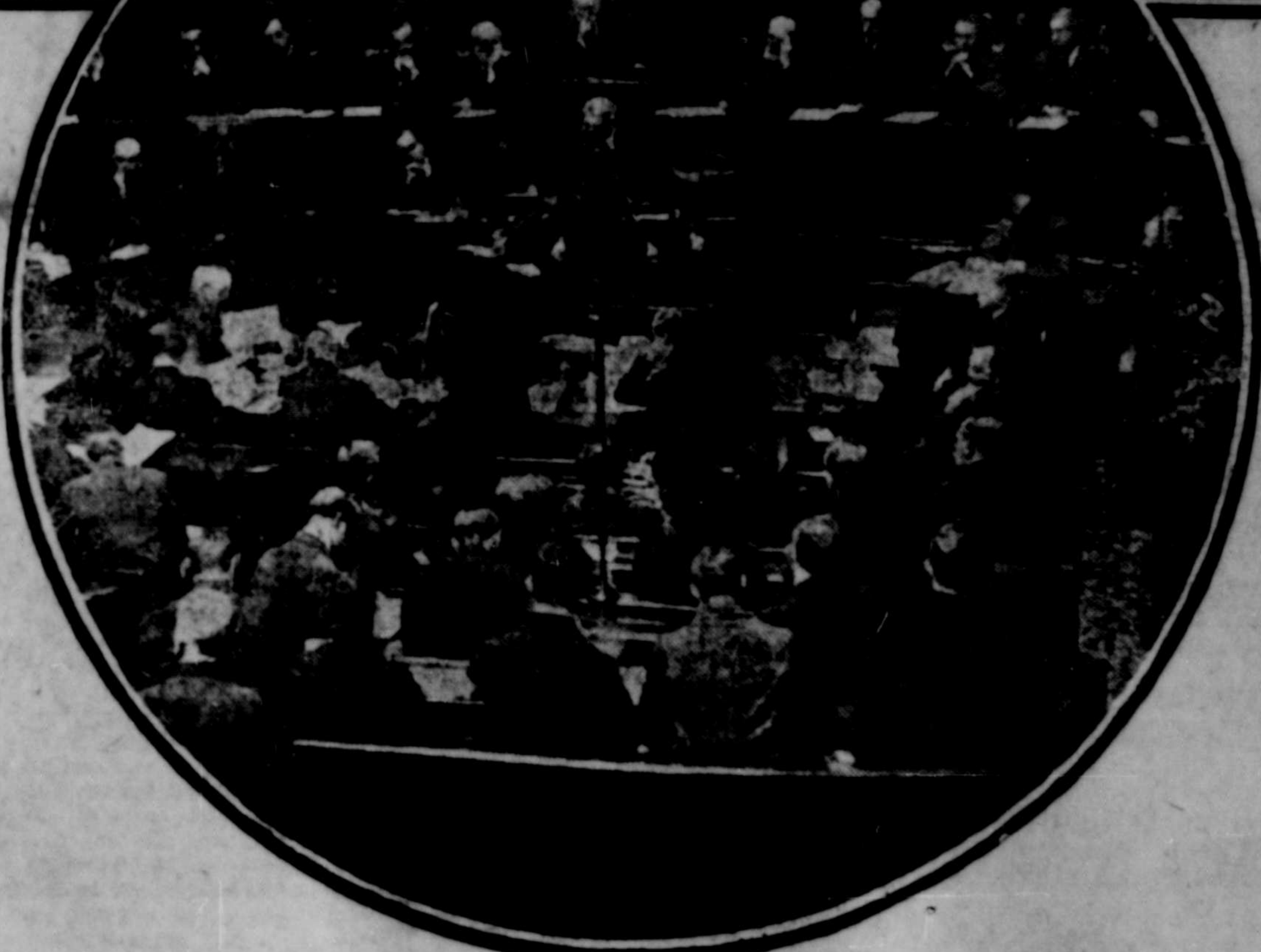

### THE POISON PLOT AGAINST LLOYD GEORGE

Very Remarkable Evidence Given At Trial—Poisoned Darts to Be Shot At Victim—Subtle Poison.

London, March 9.—Remarkable disclosures were made by the attorney-general, Sir Frederick Smith, in opening the case for the prosecution against the four prisoners arrested on a charge of conspiring to kill the Prime Minister and Mr. Arthur Henderson. The four defendants are Mrs. Alice Wheeldon, Harriet Ann Wheeldon, her daughter, Alfred George Mason, and his wife, Winnie Mason, another daughter of Mrs. Alice Wheeldon.

It will be the submission of the Crown, said the attorney-general, that the prisoners are a very desperate and dangerous body of people, who are bitterly hostile to this country, shelterers of refugees from the army, and persons who do their best to injure Great Britain in the crisis in which the country finds itself today. A secret service man, who was working on the case, passed himself off to the defendants as an F. W. W. and as such, was warmly welcomed as an accomplice. One of the defendants, Alfred George Mason, was a chemist and he supplied the poisons, which were hydrochlorate of strychnine and "curare," which is a vegetable poison of the greatest subtlety and durability. It originally came from South America, and its qualities are known to very few people, and to only those with special training. It was well known to the Indians who used it to poison their arrows. The mother and the unmarried daughter used very coarse language whenever they spoke of the government or of any of its members. In talking to their supposed accomplice, one of them said "We had a plan before when we suffragists spent £300 in trying to poison him (Mr. Lloyd George). It was to get the poison into the hotel where he stayed and drive a poisoned nail through his boot." The plan on which they were (Continued on Page four.)

#### CHANGES IN THE RULES OF CONGRESS

(Special to The Daily News.)

Washington, March 9.—The leaders of the Senate are certain that the rules of Congress will be amended, as a result of the unfortunate talking out of the armed neutrality bill by such a very small minority. The change is sought by President Wilson and it is expected that the change will be opposed by a very small proportion of the Senate as to be negligible. The feeling in the country against Senator Stone retaining the position of Chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee is still running very high.

#### PREMIER AT THE FRONT

(Special to The Daily News.)

Ottawa, March 9.—The latest advices received here from Sir Robert Borden carry the information that the members of the Imperial Conference are visiting the front on the western front. The premiers of the self governing dominions will visit all the colonial troops now in France.

#### THE WAR SITUATION HAS NOT ALTERED

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, March 9.—The British troops are now within eight miles of Baghdad. The retreating Turks are on the defensive, where they always are at their best. The steady pressure of the British forces on both sides of the Tigris, assisted by aeroplanes is being relentlessly kept up. The Russians are making forced marches from the northwest in the direction of Baghdad. The fall of Baghdad is imminent.

#### Western Front.

After intense bombardment an attack was made on the Ancre front by the British. The Germans were forced to abandon their trenches over a considerable front and 100 prisoners were captured.

#### French Front.

Paris, March 9.—The French forces took prisoners in three separate actions on the Western front. Artillery activity has been very great between the Oise and the Aisne. Heavy bombardments are also in progress at Givenchy and Serreney.

#### GRAND TRUNK MANAGER SILENTLY LEAVES TOWN

It has been freely rumored in town that the Board of Trade was desirous of meeting Mr. W. P. Hinton, the traffic manager of the G. T. P., on his arrival in Prince Rupert last night, in order to discuss certain matters at present outstanding. The Board of Trade were ready to convene their meeting, but at the last moment it was called off. Mr. Hinton arrived at 5:30 p. m. and left for the south at midnight. Certain influential citizens did interview Mr. Hinton, but to what effect is unknown.

#### GERMAN RAIDER OUT

(Special to The Daily News.)

Sydney, N. S. W., March 9.—A German raider reported to be a 4,000-ton vessel, has been paying attention to the sea lane between Aden and Colombo, Ceylon. She carries torpedo tubes in addition to guns and a sea plane, and is fully equipped for sinking vessels. Her operations have been reported by wireless and Australian navy vessels are out after her.

#### GERMAN PLOT OF WORLD-WIDE DIMENSIONS

The United States Secret Service Unearthed Ramifications of The German Intrigue Over Wide Area.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Washington, March 9.—The German machinations revealed to the State Department by the Secret Service show that the German plotters had scattered their efforts to create trouble throughout India, Japan, the Philippines, Mexico and the Central American States. By the use of Hindu agents instead of men of German nationality, they had hoped to strike at the Panama Canal, which would be a critical blow to the United States in the event of war. The unrest in India, the Philippines and in Central America has all been traced to the operations of the agents of the German government. They had all been financed through the German Embassy in Washington. It has been an open secret for some time, that Mexico could not have shown such a bold front unless she had the backing, now known to have had that of Germany. German agents have been arrested by the Peruvian government, following proof that they were engaged in arranging for the operation of submarines from Peruvian bases. Similar action has already been taken by other of the South American States, where the German population is strong numerically.

**THE U. S. POSITION**

Public opinion in the United States is very much inflamed at the present moment by the action of a small group of senators. These senators, belonging to the opposition, have carried out to the fullest the dictum that the "duty of the opposition is to oppose." But there is a time for everything. Even when in opposition, the duty of opposing is a variable quality. There is opposition—and opposition. That this small group of men are able to hold up their President in his intention of carrying out what may be considered a matter of national necessity is a sorry spectacle. With German intrigue of a very serious character exposed, and the underhand work of the late German ambassador every day becoming plainer, these men would unhesitatingly decline to assist the government in its proposed action only to protect American lives and property. The President asks for a bill to empower him to arm American vessels and convoy them in their passage across the seas and also for "other instrumentalities." These other instrumentalities are not specified, but in self defence any instrumentalities are within the law. Germany has proved again and again that she has no kind of respect for the laws of God or man.

The President thinks he has the power specified in his request, but he wishes an act of Congress to be sure. The great majority in Congress were with him, but this little group were able, according to parliamentary rules, to talk the bill out. It would probably have been better had the President demanded straightly a declaration of war. From recent events it seems as if Germany had intended deliberately to provoke the United States into joint action with the Allies. And it looks very likely that the United States will yet be compelled to declare war on Germany. President Wilson can not be said to have taken any

action so far with Germany that was not deliberate. That he has been so deliberate has caused not a little comment from other nations. The United States have been long suffering from the aggressive acts of the German, but that they should longer withhold action in the face of the recent disclosures of German duplicity is unthinkable. It is patent even to the most Pacific minded people that the act of Germany in trying to get Mexico to attack the United States cannot in any way be considered friendly. And for the United States to be prepared for eventualities with an avowedly unfriendly nation is only reasonable.

**NOTES AND COMMENTS**

Mr. Bowser certainly is not without a sense of humor, and his stock of gall evidently has suffered no recent diminution. He wants to know why the attorney-general has taken no steps to prosecute those who helped John T. Scott to escape. Mr. Bowser was attorney-general when Scott obtained bail and he was attorney-general when that bail was jumped and Scott escaped. Why did he not do something?

There are two parties in different parts of the world whom Mr. Bowser does not want to see back in British Columbia. One is Sir Richard McBride and the other is John T. Scott. The former would get his job and the latter would get his goat.

Press opinion in the United States these days is all but general that the British fleet has been the bulwark which protected the republic against the aggression of the power which aimed at world power. The Chicago Tribune goes even farther than that. It suggests that pledges be asked from Great Britain regarding protection by the Imperial navy after the war is over. Here are the words used by the Tribune: "If we go to the point now, and we have apparently already done so, where we are to use armed vessels to protect our commerce with Great Britain during the war, we must drive a proper bargain and

make sure that Great Britain's armed vessels will protect our commerce after the war."

Four years ago Winston Churchill agreed with the Borden government that Canada could not do anything in the navy line with her own resources. The sequel shows that Canada could have done more to help in countering Germany's most formidable weapon by establishing shipyards, building small cruisers and destroyers and training crews than by borrowing from England the price of five times three dreadnoughts and sending it across the Atlantic again. Those facilities today would be worth their weight in gold. If it were not for Britain's shipbuilding plants, her light cruisers and destroyers, a thousand dreadnoughts could not save her at this time.

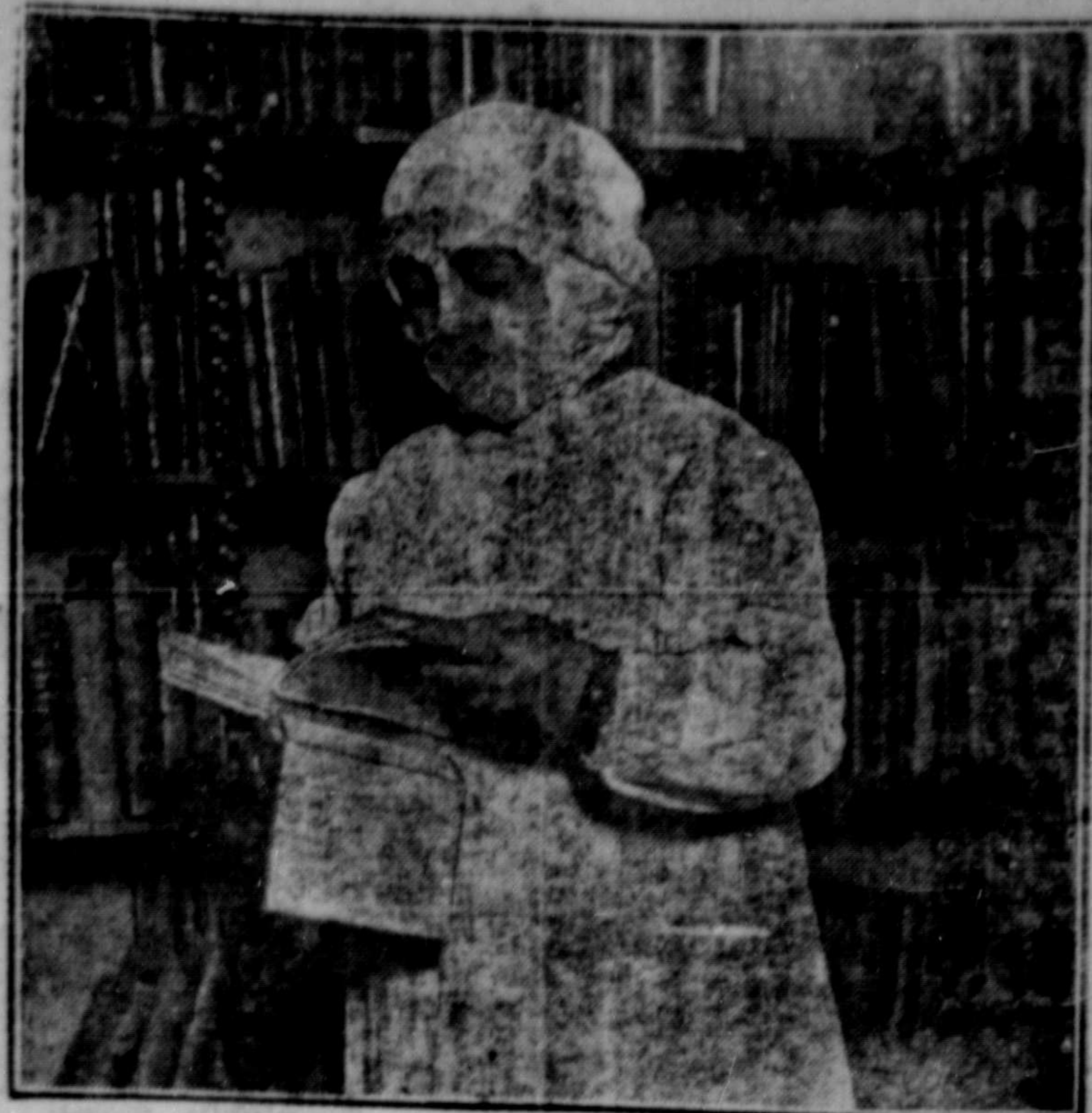

line and Old Bulgarian churches; and he persistently urges the Synod to grant more money so that the church may be outwardly still more imposing. He has a voice of thunder and his gestures suggest fate. When he takes off his gemmed mitre and his cloth-of-gold surplice, he behaves like a hustling politician.

**Has High Place At Court.**

Pitirim's rank as Metropolitan gives him free access to the court and his talents as politician have made him a court adviser. Since the change in the army command he has been a good friend of the Czar; with the Czarina he has supplanted as spiritual counsellor the once all-powerful Father Yanushoff; and his opinion on all questions is taken.

Pitirim's political aims are far-reaching. First of them is to make peace. His motives in making peace are desire for power, general humanitarianism, and an intense dislike of Catholicism. He declares that if peace is made at the present stage Germany will succeed in her aim of detaching Poland from Russia, and without the Catholic Poles, he urges, Russia will gain more than she loses.

Pitirim's ultimate aim is to convert Russia into a theocracy with the church on top. He represents mediaeval ideas, and against him is the modern spirit, so he ought to fail. But Pitirim's opponents, who represent the modern spirit, are mostly men of no political capacity, whereas Pitirim runs his mediaeval ideas with the most approved methods. If peace comes this year and no revolution follows, Pitirim will be Russia's real ruler, and the world witness experiments in government and social organizations of which it never dreamed.—Byron Lomax.

engaged at the time of their arrest was to put poison on darts and shoot them with an air gun at Mr. Lloyd George at Walton Heath. According to the evidence put in, any person dying from "curare" died in great agony. It was harmless if taken in the mouth, but fatal if injected. In summing up the case, the attorney-general said he did not think he exaggerated when he said at the opening of the case that they were dealing here with a gang of desperate persons poisoned by these revolutionary productions, (referring to the Labor and Socialistic literature found in their possession) with a complete and unreasoning contempt for their own country.
