SHARP BRITISH ATTACK ON WESTERN FRONT

DASHING ATTACK BY THE BRITISH TROOPS CAPTURES THE VILLAGE OF IRLES

HURRICANE BOMBARDMENT ON WEST FRONT

Sharp Fighting—Casualties Important Position Taken After Heavy for Germans—British Dash.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, March 13.—The British forces have stormed the village of Irles. This important village was taken after a gallant dash and some very sharp fighting on the part of the British. The British advance came right on the heels of a tremendous bombardment by big guns of all calibres. The village of Irles was battered to pieces and very many of the enemy were killed before the infantry attack reached them. Large numbers of prisoners were taken. The village was very strongly defended and was a perfect nest of machine guns, and at this point the retreating Germans thought to hold up the British advance. The British troops followed very close to the advancing curtain of fire and in hand to hand fights, the Germans were overpowered. Considering the fierceness of the fighting the British losses were comparatively small.

French Front.

Paris, March 13.—Further gains were made by our troops in the region of Maisons Champs during the night. Numbers of the Germans were captured and taken prisoner.

THE SOLDIERS' VOTE

A press wire received here today states that Mr. W. D. Bayley, the Prohibitionist representative in London, has wired that three fourths of the liquor voters are non-existent and that the names of seventy-five per cent of the soldiers who voted "wet" were found to be bogus. Many men were hoaxed into voting for the second time, on being told that there was a re-vote, and second voting was quite regular. Liquor men hold polls, obtain credentials and organize the taking of the soldiers' votes.

GERARD BACK AGAIN

Havana, March 13.—The Spanish liner carrying Ambassador Gerard on the last portion of his journey from Berlin to Washington has arrived here safely. The members of the party are quite well pleased to be again in American waters, after their trip fraught with so many dangers.

THE ENFORCING OF ARMED NEUTRALITY

Washington, March 13.—The State Department today notified all foreign diplomats presently in the city that an armed guard for the protection of the vessels and the lives of the persons aboard has been placed on all American ships intending to sail through the zone barred by Germany.

LUXEMBURG NOW IS WHOLLY ISOLATED

Amsterdam, Netherlands, (Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—Little news reaches the outside world concerning the state of affairs in the Grand Duchy of Luxemburg, the little state wedged in between Germany, France and Belgium that was the first country to resort to the tramp of the German legions on their way to France. Luxemburg is entirely isolated by the Germans, and its inhabitants are, like the Belgians, practically prisoners within their own borders, where they are sharing all the economic hardships of the Central Powers.

According to information furnished to the Amsterdam "Telegraaf" by a Luxemburger who has just succeeded in getting through to Holland, there is practically no unemployment in the Grand Duchy, where numerous iron

DELEGATION EXPENSES

At the meeting of the city council last night a motion was made by Alderman Casey to the effect that in the matter of all delegations travelling at the expense of the city, such delegations be appointed by the city council and that the expenses of the delegation be fixed not to exceed \$6.00 per day and transportation. Alderman Montgomery seconded the motion. It was pointed out that even if this motion was adopted, it would not be binding on the council, whereupon Alderman McRae asked whether the city solicitor could not draft a bylaw to cover this particular line of action. Alderman McRae agreed with Alderman Casey in this motion except as to the amount of the daily expense. He did not think that it should be fixed at \$6.00. The city clerk pointed out also that under the act, the city has the power to pay the expenses of any delegation, whether appointed by the city or otherwise.

Alderman McRae said one thing he would like to add to the motion of Alderman Casey was that a report of the expenses should be submitted to the council at the first opportunity by any delegation sent abroad. Some of the council knew what the expenses of the recent delegation to Ottawa were, and others only by hearsay. The public are entitled to know what is going on and how the money of the municipality is expended.

Alderman Montgomery considered that the expenses of the recent delegation were very reasonable. Still he didn't believe in the policy of giving a blank cheque to any delegation, leaving them to come back and tell what had been spent. It was not a good policy.

Alderman McClymont proposed to vote for the motion because the mayor last year stated that he could travel very comfortably on \$6.00 per day and if the mayor could, so could anyone else. When travelling at the city's expense, no one should put it on any louder than when travelling at their own.

On the question being put, the motion was lost.

THE ILLNESS OF THE DUCHESS OF CONNAUGHT

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, March 13.—The Duchess of Connaught is very seriously ill. Her condition is causing grave anxiety. She is suffering from measles together with broncho-pneumonia. While the best skill is being employed, the condition of the patient is such as to cause grave fears.

ANOTHER COLD STORAGE

At the city council meeting last night, Alderman McRae referred to the fact of the herring coming in too fast for the Cold Storage Company to handle them, and of the consequent dumping of large quantities of herring outside the harbor. He commented on the lack of waterfront possessed by the city and contended that the city was as much entitled to the waterfront as they were to their streets.

He said that the Cold Storage people needed all their capacity for their own business and were unable to accommodate business from outsiders. This was a serious matter for the city. There should be some place where herring could be stored frozen, so that there would be no shortage of bait at a later date. If the fishermen cannot buy bait in Prince Rupert, they will go to Ketchikan, and likewise buy all their other supplies there.

Alderman McRae being ruled out of order, the rules were suspended to enable the question to be aired. Alderman McRae was in favor of the city obtaining from the provincial government a deed to certain waterfront lots, or else a lease at a nominal sum. As the revenue from the northern part of the province far exceeds the amount the government spent here, he thought that there was something coming to the city. There was quite a lot of discussion regarding the subject and the fact of the government possibly intending to lease their waterfront to other parties. Finally it was decided to wire to the Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands, to the effect that the government suspend action regarding the leasing of any waterfront within the city until a deputation from the city be heard on the matter.

PROMPT ACTION BY MINISTER OF LANDS

Victoria, March 12.—The government has served notice on the holders of the timber lands in the Renfrew district that on April 3 they must appear before Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands, to show cause why the lands should not be cancelled.

Liberals Investigated.

The Renfrew land deal was the subject of an investigation by the Liberals in the house last session and, though there was not time in the enquiry before the public accounts committee to get very far with it, sufficient information was obtained to show that the deal had the earmarks of a gigantic fraud that had been perpetrated upon the province. It was shown conclusively that the land had been taken up as second class agricultural land and was in reality some of the most valuable timber land in the province. Thus the company which obtained this land got it for some \$2.50 per acre and saved thereby many thousands of dollars in timber royalties, which the province thus lost.

Proof of Value Seen.

No further proof of the great timber value of these lands is needed than the splendid pictures taken by the Puget Sound Lumber Company and given to the B. C. department of lands as a gift. Those fine, great tree pictures so liberally shown about the province as examples of the fine timber growing here, are said to be off this Renfrew district.

Many Similar Deals.

This deal, however, was said last session to be but one of other similar deals whereby the government lost much money in royalties. On account of the prompt manner in which the minister of lands has set out in this particular it may be expected that there will be other investigations of the same nature in other districts.

PREMIER AT THE FRONT

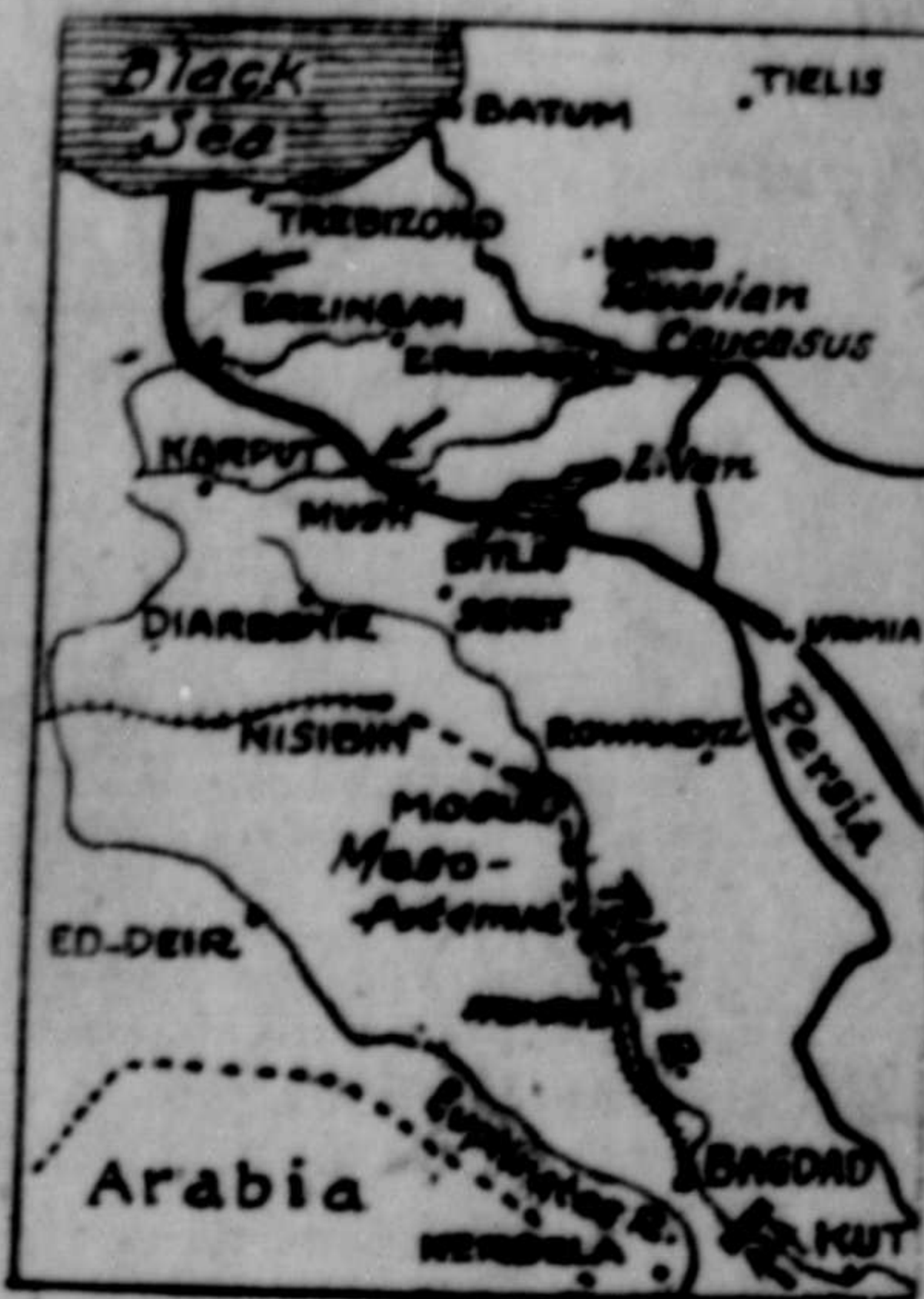

FISHERY EXPLORATION

The Marine and Fisheries Department steamer Fiska, under command of Captain J. F. Crichton, is paying a visit to this harbor. The captain is one of the expert fish culturists of the department of the naval service, and in the last report of that department, published September 20th, is to be found the result of the captain's three years of exploration of the many streams emptying into the Pacific along this coast from Vancouver Island to the Naas. It is an extremely interesting and valuable report and should be in the hands of everyone interested in the fishing industry. The business value of the work is shown in photographs of streams naturally dammed near the mouth, thus preventing the salmon and other fish from reaching their natural spawning grounds in the interior. These obstructions are to be removed by the department and when this is done the production of fish each season will be multiplied manifold.

5,000 ARE WANTED FOR FORESTRY WORK

The Dominion has dispatched 5,000 men overseas for forestry work. Great Britain wants 5,000 more. The shortage of transports has necessitated greater efforts within the borders of the United Kingdom and the embargo on timber imports has compelled the Imperial authorities to supply their needs at home.

A variety of new duties has been created. Men who desire to join the forestry drafts should have some experience in mill or forest work, but the medical examinations are not so strict and the age limit is increased to 48. Men with minor defects, such as flat feet, who are free from organic defects, can aspire to the forestry drafts.

The men will be raised by drafts and no officers are required. This month the men from the lumber camps will be coming out, and brisk recruiting is expected. The Imperial authorities contend that every man enlisted for the forestry battalions releases a man for infantry purposes at the front.

DREAM OF THE EMPEROR WM. IS DISPELLED

Progress of the Allies in Asiatic Turkey Puts End to Hopes of Berlin to Baghdad Railroad.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, March 13.—The full details of the occupation of Baghdad by the British forces under General Maude are still lacking today. The full narrative is expectedly awaited, showing the details of the captures of prisoners and war material from the Turks in taking the city. The British are advancing up the Tigris toward Mosul, the only city of any importance between Baghdad and Aleppo, whence there is direct rail communication to Constantinople. The Turks in Asia are being menaced from four different quarters and being on the run, the pursuit will be kept up. General Maude is advancing up the Tigris, another British force is already nearing Jerusalem in Palestine. The Russians are advancing from the northeast of Persia and the fourth army is operating on the flank of the retreating Turks from Transcaucasia. It is expected very soon that the Turkish forces will be confined to Anatolia in Asia Minor, with the possibility of large portions of their armies being cut off, if the activity of the Russians from Trebizond continues.

The German Emperor's plan of a Berlin to Baghdad railway is thus dashed. With an overland route guaranteeing quick transport of troops he hoped to be able to menace the British possession of India. The capture of the city of Baghdad is the first blow inflicted on his ambitious plan. The present end of steel is about 300 miles west of Mosul and has been constructed at enormous expense by Germany through very difficult country for the most part and enormous quantities of material are lying at the present terminus for the further construction of the line to Baghdad.

IN THE MIDDLE EAST

The success of the British arms in encompassing the fall of Baghdad will have a most profound effect upon the continuance of the Turk with the Central Powers. He finds his Empire crumbling to ruin. Like the previous empires built upon the same territory, the Ottoman Empire is passing.

The loss of Baghdad in itself is a serious blow, but the loss of prestige among the peoples living for hundreds of miles around will prove to be of much greater moment. No longer will recruits flock to the victorious crescent. The Turk has been finally discredited in these regions. Thousands of years ago, this district of which Baghdad is now the centre was the birthplace of our civilization. Nations rose and fell. The great and marvellous ruins of ancient Babylon, and Nineveh are yet a silent witness to the progress and decline of their respective empires. At one time, the land supported an immense population, but with the devastating rule of the Turk, production is down to its minimum. The ancient canals, built thousands of years ago, are still to be traced in the desert sand, their channels all broken and choked. Where once were fruitful vineyards and cornfields and date palms and olive trees is now barren desert. Potentially this country is the most productive in this world. Under stable government, it may yet return to its ancient fertility and "blossom as the rose." The miracle that British rule has wrought in Egypt has in Mesopotamia another subject for similar treatment. Where once Egypt was a narrow strip of green on both sides of the Nile, and nought else but interminable sand, now stretch broad acres bearing several crops each year. With the advance beyond Baghdad and the recent success of the British troops in Palestine, where they are reported to be only twenty miles from Jerusalem, an enormous population will be cut off from communication with Constantinople. The Russians are particularly active from the north and very soon all the vast territory hitherto tributary to the Turkish power, will be given to nations "bringing forth the fruits thereof." That Turkey will

ever regain the territory thus taken from them is unthinkable. They proved themselves to be the "lords of misrule." They did little to develop the resources of the lands they had conquered and any nation which does not develop its resources, has, as a result of the inexorable laws of human progress to give way to another people who will.

The whole history of the Ottoman power has been one of bloodshed, fire and sword. From the invasion of the Saracens down to the present day, they have changed not, and it looks very like as if they will be expelled from Europe finally and very little of their territory left to them to misgovern anywhere else. And it is safe to say that not one of the many subject races making up the Ottoman Empire will be sorry.

The result of the fight for Jerusalem will be awaited with interest. This ancient city has been taken by assault many times in past years. Babylon, Nineveh, Persia, Egypt and Rome have possessed it by turns before it passed under the rule of the Turk. That such a place of historic and religious interest should be battered with high explosives would not prove acceptable to the Christian peoples, but many things have to be done in the exigencies of war. And north of Jerusalem lies the plain of Armageddon.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

The Huns are willing to give Belgium freedom—with certain forts permanently occupied by Bosches and all ports permanently in the hands of Germany. Only a Prussian would imagine that this proposition would have any likelihood of receiving consideration as a basis of peace negotiations.

Germany naturally can see nothing wrong in attempting to foment external and internal war against the United States. But Gott strafe the persons who revealed to the people of the United States the intrigues of most efficient Potsdam!

Discussing the New Brunswick election, the Ottawa Citizen says: "And the Liberals will continue to win elections as long as the Conservative party is officially identified with such characters as the



"Hon." Bob Rogers, minister of public works."

If ever the United States does get into the war we are willing to wager that, whatever the president's views, the American people will never be satisfied with a peace without victory.

GERMANS ROBBING BELGIANS FURTHER

Havre, March 12.—General von Bissing, German governor-general of Belgium, has issued a decree ordering the seizure throughout Belgium of certain articles for removal to Germany when the quantity held by any owner exceeds certain specified numbers or weights.

There are sixty articles on the list, including table cloths, napkins, manufactured or raw silk, waterproof stuffs and garments, oilcloths, woolen yarns, fibres of every sort, animal hair, bristles, felt, old or new blankets, tarpaulins, leggings, knee bandages and other sanitary articles.

The country, according to advices received here, is being emptied under this decree of everything useful to Germany.

FORESTRY SERVICE PUT ON PROPER BASIS

Recently committees representing the various lumber associations met with the Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands, and amongst other things discussed was the protection of the timber resources of the province from fire. The minister of lands has now established an entirely new method of handling this important matter. This method is of particular interest, not only as regards the forest problem with which it deals, but also as establishing a non-political public service under very difficult conditions. While civil service systems have been applied to clerical staffs, as at Ottawa, it will be the very first time in Canada that an outside service has been taken out of politics and placed on a basis of business efficiency. The whole basis of fire protection hinges on the efficiency of the men employed. In order to secure the best men available, it has been decided to give all possible publicity to the fact that some 65 assistant rangers will be needed to replace the 163 forest guards employed last season. Each assistant will be offered six months employment at \$100 per month plus travelling expenses, with re-engagement for six months each year, while services are satisfactory, and also with the prospect of advancement, on merit, to the regular forest service as occasion offers. Applicants for these positions are required to obtain application forms and send them in to the chief forester, or to the nearest district forester. Examinations will be held at Prince Rupert Terrace, Hazelton, Smithers and at various other places at the end of March or in April. While application forms should be sent in at the earliest possible moment, no person who has not done so will be prevented from taking the examination. The chief object aimed at is the selection of capable practical men. Returned Soldiers with the necessary qualifications will be given preference.

As it is intended to make the Forestry Service one of the best in Canada, it is hoped that good men will send in their applications. The examinations are merely simple practical tests designed to select good men, just as in the case of the tests that scalars have to pass in order to qualify for their licenses.

This is the start of the cutting out of patronage as promised by the new government. With the knowledge that the best men get the work, and not the man with the political "pull," good men need have no hesitancy in offering themselves.

LUXEMBURG NOW IS WHOLLY ISOLATED

(Continued From Page One)

foundries, steel manufactories and engineering works are busily engaged on German orders. But while this results in high wages, and a lot of money being put into circulation, there is little to be had for money. The food position in particular is described as serious. The government has tried to get food from Holland and Denmark, but the Germans refuse to let it pass, frankly declaring that they will not have the competition of Luxemburg buyers on the markets in those countries. The Luxemburg government bought and paid for 250,000 francs' worth of butter in Denmark, but it has not reached its destination.

The country would itself be able to meet its own prime needs were it not for the fact that it still has to regularly cede a large part of its products to Germany. As a result of the complaints of the government, however, Germany has restricted its requisitions. The Duchy has to feed one German battalion, and on the other hand German soldiers are forbidden to requisition or buy eatables there. Notwithstanding the latter regulation, however, troops going to or coming from the front are well provided with paper money, and are glad for instance to pay as much as 15 francs for a pound of ham. It is true the Luxemburg soldiers who are serving as customs officers have recently obtained the right to search German soldiers leaving the country, but this right does not extend to officers, and the latter smuggle quite as much or more than their men. The Chamber is constantly urging the government to take fresh measures to combat the smuggling, but the latter dare not go too far for fear lest Germany should cut off all foodstuff supplies. The Germans recently offered to supply the entire industrial region with food, on condition that all factories without exception should work for them, but the majority of the Chamber is of opinion that this offer cannot be accepted.
