## GERMANS SINK AN AMERICAN LINE STEAMER

### THIS MAY CAUSE DECLARATION OF WAR -- SUB REFUSES TO ASSIST SURVIVORS

#### AN AMERICAN STEAMER SUNK BY SUBMARINE

Ship Carrying a Million Dollar Cargo Sent to the Bottom—No Warning Given By Submarine.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, March 15.—The American line steamer Algonquin from New York to London with a cargo of foodstuffs worth one million dollars has been torpedoed by a German submarine, without warning. Ten Americans were on board the steamer, and the crew was saved. The U-boat offered absolutely no assistance to the survivors. The ship itself was worth half a million.

After the warning to Germany by the United States, it is thought that this action will be good and sufficient cause for the United States to declare a state of war existing between them and Germany.

#### FRENCH FRONT

Paris, March 15.—South of St. Mihiel the French captured Romanville Farm and penetrated four different points up to the second lines of the enemy between the Meuse and Aprimont. Many prisoners were taken.

#### ITALIAN FRONT

The Austrians have been bombarding Gorizia very heavily. After an extended period in winter quarters considerable activity is going on on both sides. Long range artillery actions are increasing in intensity, in which the superiority of the Italian fire has evidenced itself.

#### GERMAN RAIDER OUT

(Special to The Daily News.)

Tokio, March 15.—The German raider reported a few days ago as being active in the Indian Ocean, has again been heard from. A Japanese vessel en route from Tokyo to India has been sunk somewhere in the southern waters. The Japanese fleet are working in conjunction with the Australian fleet in searching for the raider and are scouring the ocean. All shipping has been warned to keep a look out.

#### FISHING ARRIVALS

The arrivals of halibut were rather light this morning. The Tod with 10,000 pounds, and the Cora, with 3,000 pounds were the only two halibut boats in the harbor. Herring are still coming in very plentifully. Three heavily laden scows, loaded past the Plimsoll mark passed up the harbor early this morning bound for the cold storage.

London, March 15.—The Duchess of Connaught has succumbed to an attack of bronchial pneumonia. The Duchess contracted an attack of measles, and with pneumonia superimposed, was unable to make headway against the progress of her illness. The late Duchess spent over five years in Canada and made very many friends in the Dominion.

#### THE SOLDIERS' VOTE

In the matter of the counting of the ballots taken in the voting by the soldiers in Europe on the prohibition question, a cable has been received from London saying that Sir John Simons announced his decision this morning, which is that "all ballots polled must be counted. The charges of the prohibitionists are matters for adjudication in British Columbia, when brought forward in a proper form."

The counting of the prohibition ballots was stopped awaiting the decision of the judge, and according to this decision all the ballots cast must be taken into consideration.

A further wire received here later, says that Sir John Simon throws out nineteen hundred votes claimed by anti-prohibitionists, leaving not enough to offset the dry majority.

#### IS THIS AN OVERT ACT?

Amsterdam, March 15.—Dutch troops fired at and wounded a German aviator who flew over Dutch territory. The aviator was successful in keeping aloft and got across into Belgium.

#### BOTH AMBASSADORS ARRIVE HOME SAFELY

Washington, March 15.—Ambassador Gerard reached the end of his transatlantic voyage yesterday. On his arrival at the capital he was accorded an enthusiastic reception. Mr. Gerard was besieged by the newspapermen, but declared he could not make any comment of any kind until he had transmitted his full report to the President.

A message from Amsterdam states that Bernstorff has arrived in Berlin, where he was welcomed by Boy-ed and Dernberg.

#### SOLDIERS RETURNING

Tomorrow on the Maquinna are expected to arrive back in the city two of Prince Rupert's old timers from the western front. Pte. C. D. Thorn, No. 77182, of the 30th Battalion, is one, and the other is Pte. T. Holmes, No. 77153, of the 16th Battalion. Both of these men have many friends in Prince Rupert, who will be well pleased to see them back again. The send-off the men got when they departed from Rupert is a thing few who witnessed it will forget. The reception accorded to these returning wounded men should be equally cordial. It is hoped that as many of the citizens as possible will be at the wharf to welcome the boys. Mr. Holmes is only out of hospital on two weeks leave and is still compelled to use crutches.

#### POLICE COURT

#### CHINA AND GERMANY SEVER RELATIONS

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, March 15.—It has been learned here today that diplomatic relations have been severed by China with Germany. All German ships in Shanghai, laid up there until it was safe for them to leave a neutral port, have been seized by the Chinese officials. Profiting by the experience of other neutrals in the disablement of the machinery of the interned vessels, the Chinese mandarins have caused the crews of the various vessels to be put under guard and placed where they can do no wilful damage to the German vessels. Such prompt action on the part of the Chinese government shows that they are fully alive to the situation.

#### LANCASHIRE UP IN ARMS

(Special to The Daily News.)

A deputation representing the Lancashire Cotton Industry has waited on Premier Lloyd George and the subject of the new duties imposed on cotton imports to India has been discussed. The belief has been expressed that the government will have no difficulty in carrying the new Indian budget through the House.

#### PROGRESS AT GRANBY

The Granby Company are making certain changes at the mine which will practically double their output and it is said to be the intention of the company to add considerably to the smelting plant also. This plant when completed is expected to be capable of producing in the vicinity of eighty million to one hundred million pounds of copper annually.

The Granby Company are also reaching out on the Portland Canal district and are developing property in the vicinity of Maple Bay. Development is going ahead rapidly and a modern plant will be installed capable of producing a much larger tonnage.

#### NO MEATLESS DAYS FOR THE BRITISH YET

London, March 13.—There has been a substantial diminution of meat consumption in Great Britain as the result of the recent appeal to the people by the Food Controller asking that they place themselves on rations. In consequence of this, it was said in the House of Commons, there is no intention at present to introduce compulsory meatless days.

The Evening News says that Baron Devonport, the Food Controller, has decided to put into effect measures to regulate the prices of bacon, butter, cheese and lard.

#### WOMEN TO SERVE

London, March 13.—More than 30,000 Englishwomen have volunteered to form an auxiliary army corps for service in France, it has become known. Within 48 hours after the scheme was announced thousands of applications had been received.

The women are to be sent in groups of 200 across the Channel, and it is expected that before many days at least 5,000 will be working near the firing lines. Before any of them are sent three weeks' training is required in England. The aim is to secure women with skilled hands.

They are wanted not merely in France, but in Britain also. The chief demand is for women mechanics, automobile drivers, cooks, stenographers, waitresses, packers and telephone operators, milkers, shepherdesses, haymakers, horse keepers, cow keepers, market gardeners and harvesters. A great appeal is to be made for women agriculturists.

#### PREPAREDNESS

(Special to The Daily News.)

Washington, March 15.—The message of President Wilson to Congress in the extraordinary session called for April 16th is expected to be "sharply militant." The policy advocated will be that of universal military training, and the keynote of the President's message will be "preparedness."

#### BAUPAUME CAN BE TAKEN WHEN WORD IS GIVEN

British Troops on Heights Above Town—May Compel Whole Line of the Enemy to Retreat Further Back.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, March 15.—On a front of three and a half miles, the Germans have abandoned their main defensive positions on the crest of the ridge to the west of Bapaume. The British troops have occupied the high ground overlooking the town of Bapaume and British officers say that they can take the town whenever the word is given. It is expected that the retirement around Bapaume presages the retirement of the whole German line from Bapaume to Arras. The advantage of position is now all in favor of the Allies. The British are in no hurry to enter the town of Bapaume, as it is feared that a carefully and cleverly prepared trap of some sort may be prepared within the town. It won't be necessary for the British to enter the town at once as they can proceed round about, when in possession of the ground of either side. The first intimation has been received today by the British that von Hindenberg is personally conducting operations on the western front.

Raids made by the German troops were repulsed during the night in the neighborhood of Neuville St. Vaas, Souchez and Armentieres.

#### MESOPOTAMIA

The British advanced detachments are now thirty miles beyond Baghdad. The Turkish forces are expected to make a stand near the town of Samarra, but are being followed up too closely to enable them to establish themselves in any position. Many wounded Turks were left behind in the city of Baghdad in the precipitate retreat of the Ottoman army. The Russians have captured the town of Kermanshah in Persia, which will release a great number of their troops to follow up the retreating Turks.

## THE P. O. E.

In a striking indictment of the men responsible for plunging this province into its present position as regards railway obligations, the minister of railways, the Hon. John Oliver, had somewhat to say to the members of the late government. The minister offered a convincing case for a thorough enquiry into the Pacific Great Eastern Railway Company and the relations of the company with the province.

The main facts of the case are well known. They appeared in the official returns and in admissions drawn from the late government last session. But when the investigation gets under way, there is no doubt that it will elicit evidence as yet not made public, which will justify far more than has ever been said or written about the unwisdom of the late government's railway policy. The two succeeding premiers of the late government were accused, and particularly Mr. Bowser, of collusion with the heads of the Pacific Great Eastern in the illegal payment out of the proceeds of the sale of the guaranteed bonds. It is interesting to note that the entire cost of constructing the road has thus far been borne by the province. All the monies raised by the sale of the guaranteed bonds, exceeding twenty millions, have been handed over to the company. And this includes an overpayment of \$5,700,000 in defiance of the statute.

The promoters were permitted to divide the capital stock of \$24,000,000 among themselves without putting up a cent for it, which is another flagrant violation of the law.

The Pacific Great Eastern Railway Company, of which Mr. Pat Welch is the chief shareholder, awarded the contract without tenders to Mr. Pat Welch for the construction of the line, at excessive prices. For tracklaying, said the Hon. Mr. Oliver, where MacKenzie & Mann were satisfied with \$400 a mile, Pat Welch gets \$750. Now these two gentlemen, Bill and Dan can never be accused of asking too little. And it is the same thing all over the list. Pat Welch contracted with a company which he practically owned, at outrageous prices. There was no competition for

the contract and naturally the prices were fixed as high as they would go. To complete the road from North Vancouver to Fort George will take another \$10,000,000. "It is, therefore," said the Hon. Mr. Oliver, "time, and high time, that the people of British Columbia begin to learn something of the truth regarding their own affairs. I believe that if the investigation is held, it will reveal conditions such as will make British Columbia a very unsatisfactory place of residence for the scoundrels who make their livelihood out of and become millionaires at the expense of the common people of the country."

Which statement shows the different opinions arising out of a different point of view. The people referred to by Mr. Oliver as "scoundrels" were regarded as of a totally different complexion by the late government. It is refreshing to hear things called by their proper names once in a while. Were the practice more common we venture to predict that it would have quite a salutary effect upon our public men. Men who have no objection to being called "smart", "clever" or "grafter" would distinctly object to being called a thief or a scoundrel. While the terms are practically synonymous, the one does not sound so rough as the other. But the fact remains, although we disguise it in softer sounding accents. The evidence placed before the committee of enquiry will be awaited with very great interest.

## WINNIPEG CAN NOW GO INTO FOOD BUSINESS

Winnipeg, March 13.—The city of Winnipeg has now the power to go into municipal trading on a wholesale scale. This aspect of relieving the high cost of living was decided by the law amendments committee of the legislature today, and a clause was inserted in the city charter which enables the city to go into merchandizing of food and fuel.

Provision is also made for the city to buy up merchants' stocks. In cases where more than \$100,000 is to be spent on a transaction, consent of the ratepayers must first be obtained.

## REAL CONDITION IN GERMANY

London, March 12.—The Prussian food controller, Dr. Georg Michaelis, made in the Prussian diet what the Koelnische Zeitung calls a serious speech on the food situation, says a Reuter despatch from Amsterdam. Dr. Michaelis declared the distress was such that a more severe state of things especially in the large industrial centres could hardly be imagined.

He indicated the possibility that all surplus stocks of grain would be exhausted and said that very radical measures were needed to enable the people to hold out until next year.

### Fraught With Danger.

"We have, in the third year of the war," the food controller is quoted as saying, "discovered that among all sections of the people the general feeling evinced is not one of that endurance for which we had hoped. This is human nature, but it is highly deplorable and may have most serious results."

"We have not perceived in the towns that stern supervision which is absolutely necessary in the distribution of foodstuffs. There has been widespread abuse of bread tickets, entailing grave consequences as regards our stock. Bread tickets have been used illegally on such a shocking scale that our entire reserves were exhausted. So, when potatoes failed and bread was ordered as a substitute, there was none available. Flour has been similarly reduced, owing to similar irregularities in the mills."

### Grim Starvation.

Dr. Michaelis concluded by urging the utmost severity to remedy the shortcomings while there was yet time. Some of the mills would have to be closed and the municipalities deprived of their autonomous powers. Rationing and requisitioning must be strictly applied with respect to eggs, milk, butter, fruit and vegetables. He added:

"We are confronted with the thought of what might happen if this measure should also fail and what grim starvation there would be, if suddenly, during the closing months of the economic year we should find there was insufficiency and we could not hold out. The ensuing misery would be indescribable."

### Caused Sensation.

The speech caused a sensation, and the Socialist, Hufer, who followed, according to the Rheinisch Westfälische Zeitung, declared that the junkers were to blame if a famine supervened. An attempt was made, he said, to shift the blame on England.

"The selfishness of the Agrarians," he said, "is the cause of the high prices. The war would long since have been ended if everybody had to suffer hunger equally. The present meat ration is insufficient. To withhold such a necessity from the people, in the interest only of Agrarian tariff is damnable. I recall Professor Abbe's retirement from the council of the farm feeding department; the strikes of munition workers in Essen and Berlin, owing to under-feeding, have only too well justified him."

### Admits Success.

The minister of agriculture then spoke and vigorously defended himself against attacks. He alluded to the critical situation created by the partial success of the Entente's plan of starving Germany, and added:

"For the small bread ration one can only make the Almighty responsible, who has not given us the harvest we expected."

### NEW AUSTRIAN TRICK

London, March 13.—Official announcement was made here today that Austria-Hungary has issued a proclamation to the Albanians, stating that it has granted autonomy to Albania under its protection.

Influential Albanians have published from Saloniki, the statement says, a protest, saying the Austrian measure is useless because it is directed toward a country which, already independent, has declared war on the enemies of the Entente. The purpose of the Vienna government in issuing this proclamation, the statement adds, obviously is to justify the levy of men for its armies.

After the occupation of Serbia and Montenegro by troops of the Central Powers all of Albania was taken over, with the exception of the section in the south below Avlona, which still is held by the Italians. Essad Pasha, Provisional President of Albania, served with the Turkish army early in the war, but later left it and declared war on the Central Powers, taking a force of Albanians under his command to Saloniki, where it joined the Entente army.

### GERMAN DIPLOMACY

London, March 13.—The Koelische Volks Zeitung under the heading: "Oh, Our Diplomacy!" bitterly contrasts the behavior of Bernstorff on his departure from the United States with the behavior of Gerard when he left Berlin. Did Gerard send extravagant messages that he was "gratified?" it asks. "Did he dispatch from the German frontier parting messages to his German friends in Berlin? Not a bit of it. The dignified American made his farewells coldly and departed in all reserve. A comparison shows what is wrong with our diplomacy. Let our authorities see to it that our younger diplomatists who are now growing up are educated differently. What the fatherland needs is that after the war we shall send more ambassadors and ministers who are filled with the Hindenburg spirit instead of diplomatists who practice weakly consideration of other people and seek their successes only by being conciliatory in sparing feelings and in anxious submissiveness."
