Petrograd, March 17 .- The revolution in Russia has proved shortest and the least bloody of any in the history of the country. Russia has had many revolutions, some of which lasted for a considerable period, and caused much fighting, but they usually ended in the utter defeat of the revolutionists. This time the army was on the side of the people, and assisted the acomplishment of the coup d'etat. 

AN ANCIENT CITY.

The capture of Bagdad marks the climax of one of the most dramatic and picturesque phases of the world war. The city which has fallen to British arms links the present to a past so distant that it is semi-fabulous. The known history of Bagdad reaches back for more than 4,000 years to the shadowy times of King Nebuchadnezzar of Babylon, a quay built by the Scriptural monarch still existing submerged in the Tigris. Within its precincts also there still stand the tombs of the Jewish prophets Joshua, Ezra and Ezekiel and the well of Daniel

Long after the Babylon dynasty had ceased to be more than a memory, Bagdad rose to splendor as the artistic, literary, scientific and religious capital of the world. The heart of the great Islamic empire of the Caliphs for hundreds of years, it was known throughout the world as "The Glorious Ctiy" and was the scene of the fantastic exploits of Haroun al-Rashid, the potentate whose magnificence is immortalized in the Araban Nights.

In 1800 B. C. Bagdad was credited with a population of 2,000,000 souls and was easily the first city in the world in wealth and commerce. With NOTES AND COMMENTS the fall of Caliphs before the Turkish sultans, the decline of Bagsad commenced. It was successively the prey of Turks. Mongols, Tartars and Persians, but it was not until 1638 that the cty became definitely a part! co of the Turkish Empire. Ite ancient importance was largely due to the fact that it stood at the crossing of the lines of communication between India and Persia and the west.

The fall of Bagdad is of even greater significance for the effect it s expected to have on German ams than for its value in restoring British prestige in the eyes of the Mohammedan world and the East generally. While it is recognized that the British misfortunes in Mesopotamia had a serious influence on the prestige of the ruling power in India and Egypt and while it is pointed out that the capture of Bagdad will restore the balance, the chief gratification expressed is that the suc-
