FIERCE FIGHTING WITH ALLIES' PROGRESS

DESPERATE CONFLICT OVER FIFTY-MILE FRONT -- ALLIES ARE STILL ADVANCING

ADVANCE BY THE ALLIES CONTINUES

Pursuit of the Germans Marked by Violent Fighting on Fifty Mile Front—Counter Attacks Made.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, March 28.—Violent fighting both of an open and a massed kind has characterized the Allied pursuit of the German forces. At half a dozen points along a fifty-mile front, very large forces are engaged and the permanent Hindenberg line is rapidly being neared. The French are within a mile of the positions chosen by Hindenberg for the German stand and are progressing steadily. The enemy are showing increasingly strong resistance and the French troops have to contend with great inundations, but notwithstanding the great difficulties are making good progress. The nearest approach of the British to Hindenberg's line is eleven miles west of Cambrai in the village of Lagnicourt. Extremely bitter fighting was experienced in this neighborhood yesterday. Massed German forces repeatedly tried to retake the village, but the British held firm and a series of massed attacks were beaten off.

French Official, South of the Oise we took the village of Gouchy and all the north part of the forest of Gouchy driving the enemy back to the Barrisch line to the northwest of Soissons. A severe struggle was made for the possession of a farm to the northwest of Horgoval, and eventually the German forces were ejected leaving very many casualties. The village of Gouchy le Chateau has also been captured and further progress made in the forest of Coucy.

London, March 28.—The British have captured Equicourt ten miles to the southeast of Bapaume and Longavesnes which lies three miles to the northwest of Roisel after very heavy fighting. Severe losses were inflicted upon the enemy.

Reports from Berlin, Berlin, March 28.—On account of the rainy weather very little fighting has taken place over the whole front. In the forest between the Oise and Coucy le Chateau, stronger French forces encountered our protecting troops, which inflicted severe losses on the enemy and gave way before the threatening outflanking movement.

HELP FOR TURKEY

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, March 28.—Field Marshal Mackenzie has arrived in Constantinople and will proceed at once with the reorganizing of the disrupted Turkish army. Germany has reorganized the Turkish army previously and at one time kept a great number of German officers there. Their conduct was such that the Turks asked for their recall, but evidently the Turks are in such shape that they have to appeal for outside assistance.

THE SITUATION OF NEW RUSSIA

(Special to The Daily News.)

Petrograd, March 28.—It has been discovered that ex-Minister Protopopoff had a secret wireless station set up in the ex-Czar's Tsarkoe Selo palace. Direct communication was thus established with Berlin, whereby the pro-German element in the late government were able to keep the German authorities advised of whatever went on in the Russian capital. Further proof of the treachery of the reactionaries has been found by the new government and it is expected that it will go hard with them on trial. The proofs are overwhelming, that they were betraying their country to the enemy. Since the new government took hold of the reins of the State, a steady improvement in the general conditions has been noticeable. The ministry is working indefatigably, and many spies have been arrested. A new Russia is budding forth, just becoming conscious of her power and strength.

BARGE "BANGOR" ASHORE

Word was received in the city last night that the barge "Bangor" had gone ashore on Nary Island. A telegram was received here from Ketchikan bearing this information and asking that scows be despatched to the stranded vessel to lighten her cargo of lumber. The "Bangor" at one time was a regular visitor at Granby and is a well known vessel on the coast.

BETTER TIMES FOR JEWS IN RUSSIA

Washington, March 27.—The first steps by the new Russian Government toward the emancipation of the Jews in Russia were reported today by Ambassador Francis, who said all educational restrictions as to both schools and colleges had been removed.

Officials here look on this step as a forecast of freedom for the Jews in Russia. Incidentally also it forecasts removal of the old passport restrictions because of which the United States abrogated the commercial treaty with Russia and leads to confidence that the treaty soon may be renewed. Combined with steps toward home rule in Finland and promises of autonomy for Poland, it convinces officials that the new leaders intend to carry out their liberal programme at once as establishing a firmer foundation on which the war can be prosecuted more successfully.

TO RECRUIT SERBIANS

St. John, N. B., March 27.—Something new in Canadian military circles will be witnessed at Camp Sussex, the central training camp for New Brunswick, this summer, if plans now announced work out successfully. The military authorities have decided to open a recruiting campaign throughout the Dominion for Serbians, and it is anticipated that from 1000 to 1500 men of this race will be enlisted during the spring and summer of 1917. As the recruits are signed on they will be sent direct to Sussex to receive their military training.

Although they will be recruited by the Canadian authorities, the Serbians will not become members of the Canadian expeditionary force. This is but another service which the Empire is rendering to its Allies, and, on leaving Canada, they will be sent direct to the Balkans to take their place in the firing line with their fellow-countrymen.

GERMAN DESERTERS

(Special to The Daily News.)

The Hague, March 28.—The situation of the German army may be imagined when it is stated that four thousand German soldiers have crossed the line into Holland seeking food. The Dutch authorities have interned the German deserters at Zwolle. The state of the ordinary people may be imagined. In Germany everything has been sacrificed for the army and when the troops have to go hungry, it is very certain that there will be very little for the civil population.

THE BASKETBALL GAME

One of the fastest basketball games ever seen in this city was played last night in the Railwaymen's Hall, between the Tigers and the Boys Own Club. From the very start the game was fast and furious and at half-time the score stood 14-13 in favor of the Tigers. The second half of the game was equally fast and at the end, the score stood 28-28—a tie. In order to decide the game the teams agreed to play two five-minute halves, in which the Tigers scored 12 points and the Boys 3. The game thus finished with a lead of nine in favor of the Tigers. The referees were George Allen during the first half and Mr. Carmichael during the second. Ben McDaniels kept score to the satisfaction of all parties. The lineup of the teams was as follows: Tigers—Murphy, centre; Blythe, right; Poole, left; defence, Craggs and Smart. The Boys Own—Currie, centre; Smith, right; Mitchell, left; defence, Ramsome and Morrow.

PREMIER IN ENGLAND

London, March 28.—Premier Borden visited the wounded Canadian soldiers in the Oxford hospitals yesterday. He found that the wounded soldiers were receiving every care. The Premier will attend the Imperial War Conference today.

DESTROYERS SUNK

London, March 28.—Two British destroyers have been sunk. One of the vessels struck a mine in the English Channel, while the other went down as the result of a collision. One of the crew was drowned and the others were rescued.

VINDICTIVE RAGE OF DEFEATED FOE

With the French Armies at Ham, March 21.—(By G. H. Perrie.) I reached Ham hotfoot upon the tracks of the first French troops after an old fashioned campaign day, in the course of which we repeatedly bogged or lost ourselves on the desolate moorland, and were turned back several times by broken bridges along the canals of the reconquered region.

It is no exaggeration to say that this abandoned region has been devastated. There has been no wholesale massacre, but, except in that respect, the spirit of barbarous cruelty is as rife today in the German army as it was during the terror in Belgium at the beginning of the war. Most of the villages through which I passed this week have been burned wholly or in part, and the able bodied inhabitants carried off into what is virtually slavery. The Germans took away the last batch of girls between 15 and 25 years of age immediately before their retreat.

Orchards and farm implements were destroyed and the townfolk were robbed of their bedding and house linen, and often of their furniture. The money of the whole region was confiscated by an ingenious system of forced contribution and the exchange of cash for worthless paper. Standing before the mountain of rubble that today represents what was a week ago the ancient citadel of Ham, I cannot but feel that my attempts to distinguish scrupulously between different degrees and kinds of crime are wasted before the resolute unscrupulousness and cold-blooded, unwinning vandalism of the men who damn themselves by these abominations.

Ham was legitimately proud of its historic monument, that was of no military value, like the great belfry that was blown up at the same time, but which gave the town public dignity and associated the people with the annals of their country. The bastions and towers which held Louis Napoleon prisoner, and from which he escaped in disguise, were unarmed and could be of no use in modern warfare. Like the Tenth Century donjon of Coucy, they have been sacrificed to slake the rage of a foe at length driven to recognize his impotence to achieve real victory. The villagers say, almost in a tone of excuse: "They are like wild beasts driven into a corner."

HOSPITAL SHIP SUNK

London, March 28.—The hospital ship Asturias, of 12,000 tons has been torpedoed by a German submarine. Thirty-one lives were lost by this act of German savagery, and twelve are still missing.

U. S. CONGRESS TO VINDICATE HONOR & RIGHT

Resolution to be Introduced in Congress Declaring That a State of War Exists With Germany.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Washington, March 28.—It is expected here that a resolution will be introduced in Congress on April 3rd, immediately after the President concludes his address to the joint session. The resolution it is said will declare that the time has come when the United States will vindicate decisively its honor and rights. It will declare that by the acts of Germany a state of war exists and Congress will place at the disposition of the President the means of vigorously prosecuting the war, and thereby hastening the restoration of peace.

MACEDONIA

(Special to The Daily News.)

In Macedonia, the French under General Sarrail have made considerable progress, gaining a thousand metres. The British forces have also displayed considerable activity and have captured many prisoners.

RUSSIAN FRONT

(Special to The Daily News.)

On the west bank of the Chara river in the region of Darevobuzzy a gas attack was made by the Germans and the Russian forces were compelled to fall back in an easterly direction.

GENERAL NEWS ITEMS

Prince Frederick Karl of Prussia, cousin to the Kaiser, has been killed in action.

Persistent rumors are in circulation in Ottawa that Sir William Hearst, the premier of Ontario, contemplates the dissolution of the legislature and a general election at an early date.

A wire from Vancouver regarding the soldiers' prohibition vote states that over a thousand votes were polled at Epsom and only 200 B. C. men were there. Prohibition ballots were missing in the returns.

RIOTS IN BERLIN

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, March 28.—It is reported here that riots are of frequent occurrence in Berlin. Advice received from Switzerland also state that rumors of a revolutionary movement in Germany are current there.

WAR AND THE U. S.

At a public meeting held in New York last week it was stated that Germany and the United States were then at war. This statement was made by a former president of the United States, a former secretary of state, a former ambassador to Great Britain, and a retired judge of the United States Supreme Court. They were Messrs. Roosevelt, Choate, Root and Hughes. These men are not firebrands, but responsible citizens, who have held high office in their country and who have some considerable knowledge of the laws of nations. Germany has committed warlike acts against their erstwhile friends and there can hardly be any doubt that Germany is at war with the United States, but, as yet, the United States is not at war with Germany. It is a very one-sided arrangement. But that it will be changed in the very immediate future is evident from the arrangements being made before the meeting of Congress next week. The National Guardsmen have been taken under the control of the federal authorities in sixteen states already and mobilization has been ordered for others. This will make quite an addition to the armed forces of the republic and is only the beginning. Congress has been called to meet two weeks before the date given in the first announcement of the extra session and all things point to a speedy entrance of the United States into a state of hostilities with Germany. The state of affairs which has continued so long whereby Germany acted towards the United States on a warlike basis cannot continue forever, even with a peace-loving nation. And action when it does come, is likely to be swift. The entrance of the United States into the war will be of incalculable benefit to the Allies, even if her forces are never called upon to fire a shot. Her navy will be of very great assistance alone, and it cannot be imagined that her manhood will be content to be at war with another state and allow other nations to do the fighting for them. There are thousands of Americans already enlisted under the Allies and who are fighting today on the western front. Besides the

material assistance which the United States will be capable of affording to the Allies, the moral support given by their actual entrance to the war will be very great.

It seems as if Germany has deliberately asked for this state of affairs. There are no outstanding questions between the two governments, apart from the treatment given to American property and citizens at sea, and which has arisen out of the war with the other European states. What Germany thinks she will gain by having another enemy on her hands is a matter of conjecture. Reparation will have to be made and possibly Germany thinks that the greater number of opponents the easier will be the terms of peace. So far as the history of the United States shows, she never yet has been too easy on a defeated enemy in her previous wars. In this case, Germany can hardly hope to find an easy creditor at the conclusion of hostilities. Germany has practically compelled the Americans to enter the war by her unprovoked inroads upon her neutral rights, and once in, it is only to be expected that the United States will see the matter through to a final and victorious conclusion.

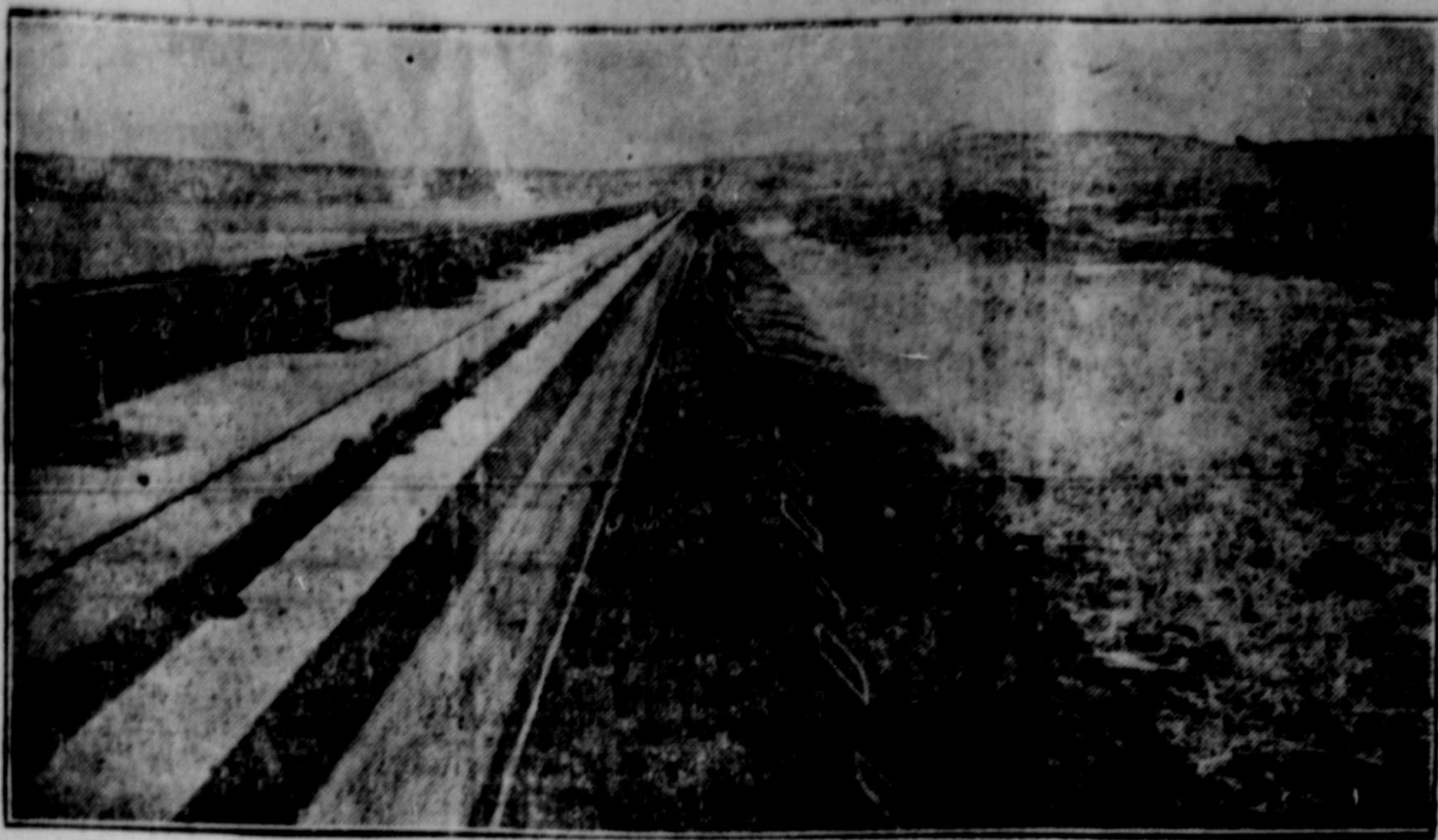

In the Letter Box

Editor, Daily News.

Dear Sir:—On various occasions I have noticed in the daily papers some reference to a merchants' boycott of the G. T. P., our only railroad. As a citizen and a taxpayer, I would sound a note of warning against the citizens' support of such a suicidal policy. No one can deny that the G. T. P. is our main and only hope for putting Prince Rupert on the map. It pays considerable taxes and furnishes a large part of the payroll that keeps our merchants in business, while the company that benefits by this boycott is engaged in centralizing the trade of northern British Columbia at its own terminus, Vancouver, pays no taxes in this city and merely keeps an office with two or three poorly paid clerks to get Prince Rupert money.

If the merchants have a grievance they should find some way out besides trying to injure the railroad with whom our fate as a city is indissolubly linked.

In all controversies we must not forget that the G. T. P. before the war spent money lavishly in this town, while the company that benefits by a boycott never spent a cent and that British capital which built the G. T. P. is now fighting our battles in Europe instead of developing business.

If in doubt about the effect of this boycott, ask the head of any bank, insurance or trust company having interests here.

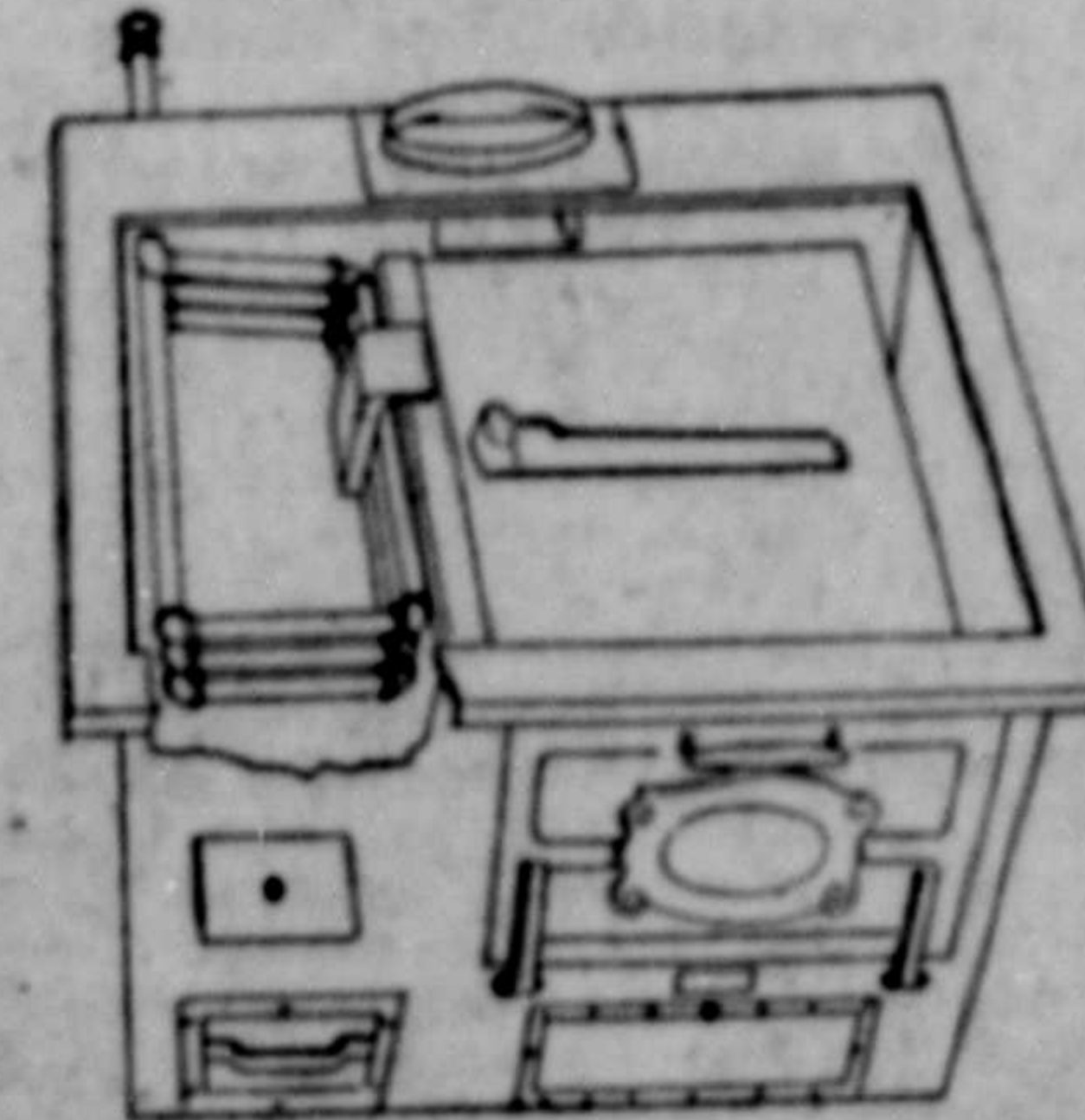
