## PRESIDENT SAYS A STATE OF WAR EXISTS

### WAR AGAINST THE IMPERIAL GERMAN GOVERNMENT RESOLUTION IN CONGRESS

#### PRACTICALLY DECLARES WAR ON GERMANY

United States Congress is Discussing War Resolution—Declares War Exists—Stormy Scenes.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Washington, April 4.—President Wilson has picked up the gage of battle thrown down by Germany. The President's speech in Congress is hailed with acclaim by the press the world over. The American press characterize the utterance of the President as the greatest of this generation. That the President has the whole nation behind him and has enunciated the unanimous feeling, is shown by the acclamation with which his words have been received. Congress has been stirred with the pronouncement of the nation's executive that "a state of war exists" and that the nation must bend every energy to prepare the army and navy, and to render every assistance to the Allies. A canvass of Congress shows approval of the statement of the President and that both chambers stand united behind him. The United States will go into war united and determined to win. The President urged the immediate organization of an army of 500,000.

**Congress Re-convenes.**  
Immediately after the President left the capitol, both the Senate and the House of Representatives re-convened and an identical joint resolution was introduced into both houses declaring the existence of a state of war and directing the President to employ all the resources of the country to carry on war against the Imperial German government and to bring the conflict to a successful conclusion.

**Stormy Scenes.**  
In the Senate the pacifists adopted obstructionist tactics. La Follette forced over the further consideration of the war measure until the following day. Stormy scenes were witnessed and Senator Martin forced the adjournment to cut off La Follette. Consideration of the war resolution was, therefore, delayed until the next day.

#### PRESIDENT'S SUGGESTIONS

(Special to The Daily News.)

Washington, April 4.—in his speech to Congress, the President suggested that extending credit to the Allies be heeded. Bonds will be provided for the present expenses but hereafter the country itself must pay largely the burden of the war. It was intimated that a heavy tax on excess profits and large incomes will be the means of raising the bulk of the war revenue. The foremost leaders today say that the President can have what he wants. "We will pass credit for the Allies and will see that there is sufficient money to make the war a success."

#### BRITISH COMMONS CHEERS PRESIDENT

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, April 4.—A great outburst of cheering, which lasted for a considerable period, broke the stillness of the British House of Commons, when the announcement was made by the Chancellor of the Exchequer, Mr. Bonar Law, that the President of the United States had recommended to Congress the entrance of America into the war with Germany. There was a perceptible stillness for a second, while the full import of this statement was grasped by the House, and then uproarious cheers broke forth. The London press is eulogistic of the President's action and the British point of view is that the United States has declared war upon Hohenzollernism.

#### GENERAL NEWS ITEMS

(Special to The Daily News.)

Washington, April 4.—Senator Chamberlain has introduced a bill to Congress for universal military training.

A break between the United States and Austria seems probable.

London, April 4.—Mr. Page, the American ambassador, held a long conference with Mr. Arthur Balfour, the Foreign Minister today.

Amsterdam, April 4.—German and Austrian heads meet today in Berlin. Newspapers hint that Germany is ready to talk peace.

Ottawa, April 4.—Canadian officers with overseas experience may be loaned to the United States government by Ottawa.

#### TO BE CALLED FOR PRESIDENT CHAMBERLIN

The Geographical Board of Canada announces that it has decided to name a splendid peak in the Canadian Rockies "Mount Chamberlin" in honor of President E. J. Chamberlin, of the G. T. P. The great mountain territory in the neighborhood of the Yellowhead Pass was first thrown open to travellers by the building of the Grand Trunk Pacific's transcontinental line, which was completed under President Chamberlin's supervision. The peak is at the southerly end of a massive mountain range in the Grand Fork amphitheatre and is surpassed only by its near neighbor, Mount Robson.

#### G. T. P. PURCHASE AMERICAN SHIP

It has been learned that the Grand Trunk Pacific has just purchased an American bottom for service between Prince Rupert and Ketchikan, particularly in connection with the fish business. Certain alterations have to be made to make the vessel suitable for this service, after which her schedule will be announced.

#### THE "PRINCE RUPERT"

It was learned yesterday morning that there had been a fire on the steamer now on the rocks at Genn Island. The pilot house and the cabins immediately behind it were burnt more or less badly due to a defect in the electrical wiring. The patent extinguishers on the ship proved sufficient to control the blaze, which was quickly put out. It was exciting while it lasted though. Preparations are well in hand for an attempt to float the vessel about the 8th inst., when the tides are higher. Failing success at this date, the tides will not serve again till the 22nd of April.

#### RED CROSS SALE ON SATURDAY MOTHER AND SON SLEEP OUT IN THE BUSH

The sale of home cooking this week will be under the charge of Miss McClenaghan and Miss B. McLeod, in the society's new premises and will be held on Saturday, Friday being a public holiday. The public are asked to especially remember the wounded men who are spending another Easter on the battlefields of France, where so many are giving up their lives.

The provincial constable brought down from Terrace on the train Sunday night Mrs. Sarah Alfson for a medical and mental examination. Mrs. Alfson had recently arrived in B. C. and has a brother residing in Terrace. While the officer was telephoning to the doctor after coming off the train on Sunday night, the woman and her son slipped out and disappeared. A careful search was made all over the city but without avail. It was thought yesterday that possibly she was making her way back home to Terrace and Constable Doolittle left on the early morning train and arrived back again with his charge last night. Mrs. Alfson had evidently got out of the city at once and the surmise of the police was correct. She was found near Zanardi bridge and had evidently not kept to the railroad track, but had made her way through the bush, as she was in a pitiable condition, with bruises and scratches. The first night the mother and son had slept out in the snow which was then lying in places and on Monday night had taken possession of a deserted shack near the bridge. The way across Kaien Island to Zanardi through the bush is not to be considered in any way easy going, and with little food and the rough going, the mother and the little fellow must have been very tired.

Mrs. Alfson will be examined by Dr. Cade to determine the malady.

#### ORATORIO FOR GOOD FRIDAY

#### PROGRESSING STILL NEARER ST. QUENTIN

British Forward Movement Makes Further Capture of German Positions—French Get Machine Guns.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, April 4.—Bitter and desperate fighting marks the further progress of the British troops in their piercing of the Hindenburg line. The British positions are now less than two miles from St. Quentin, and they are relentlessly pushing the Germans back from their so-called impregnable positions.

The town of Maissemy is the latest among the British captures and their enveloping grip of the captured positions never relaxes. Northward in the Arras sector, the British have advanced from Boyelles, captured a few days ago, and have now taken the town of Henin, which was a very strongly fortified post.

**Fire the Town.**  
The Germans are apparently aware that they cannot hope to hold St. Quentin as they are deliberately firing the city and blowing it up with dynamite. The British have captured their trenches along a ten-mile front and have taken six more villages.

**French Front.**  
Official.—Artillery fighting continues north and south of Ailette. We took six machine guns yesterday, north of Vaux Aillon. In the Champagne district, violent artillery actions are also in progress.

**Russian Front.**  
Petrograd, April 4.—A violent German attack was made on the Russian positions to the south of Illukst. The Germans attacked in close formation in a series of waves, but each wave was repelled by our gunfire and the attack was thrown back.

WHEN THE PREMIER RETURNS

One of the biggest of the war problems with which Canada has to contend, says the Toronto Globe, is the present Dominion government. Other problems yield to careful treatment. It is possible by a concentrated effort to run the boodlers and grafters to earth, and to make men like "Hon." Colonel Allison feel that, like Othello, their occupation is gone. But what can be done with a government which, in the third year of the war, has failed to consolidate the country, and which leaves Canadians groping in the dark, sans policy, sans leadership, sans ideals. In the work of organization, in all that makes for national efficiency in a country at war, the government has hopelessly fallen down.

The chief obstacle to efficiency in war time is the Premier. With Hon. Robert Rogers in his train, the Dominion of Canada cannot be expected to take her proper place in the councils of the Empire now meeting in London. But under any circumstances, Sir Robert is not the man to fill the role that Canada's Premier ought to fill in these grave times. He is sadly lacking in the primary qualities of leadership. All the defects and blunders and crimes of the government at Ottawa may be traced to this fundamental defect—the want of leadership. Canada for over two years has been calling for a leader, and calling in vain. The continuance of Hon. Robert Rogers in office, after a judge had left the stigma of his scathing condemnation upon his conduct as a minister of the crown, is enough to blast the reputation of Sir Robert Borden.

But the Prime Minister's chief sins are sins of omission. Canada may recover, morally and financially, from the debauch of her boodlers and the excessive war profits made by friends of the government, but Canada never can vindicate her honor and reputation if she fails to live up to her pledges in this war. No one passing through the streets of our large towns and cities would imagine that Canada is at war. The government has had a free hand in the conduct of the war. It has had the support of the

Opposition in all its reasonable demands upon the public exchequer. It has had exceptional powers conferred upon it for war purposes. How has it exercised these powers? It is no exaggeration to say that the influence of the Borden Government has had a debilitating effect upon the country in the prosecution of this war. The absence of leadership has retarded recruiting agents, Sir Robert Borden has failed to unite his own party or the country. When the country asked for an intelligible war policy that would enable Canada to redeem the pledges of her statesmen, Sir Robert gave it speeches instead of leadership. "Words, words, words." This is the epitaph that should be placed over the grave of Bordenism.

What has Sir Robert Borden discovered in London that will aid Canada in solving her biggest war problem? When the Premier comes home he will have to render an account of his stewardship. Canada is at war, but the government is not fully alive to the fact.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

Nicholas Romanoff is said to have been the owner of six million acres of land, more or less, but probably more, in Russia. These great possessions may be confiscated for the benefit of the state, like the many thousands of acres held in British Columbia by speculators "who were given their chance." Political and other revolutions very often carry benefits for the common people in their trail.

The Russian revolution has furnished a fresh stimulus to Germany's military aims on the eastern front. The political object of that campaign in Prussian eyes now must outweigh the military purpose. Hitherto campaigns against Russia were promoted with the object of gaining a separate peace in order that fresh forces might be diverted against France and England. Now, the Hohenzollerns will try to crush the new democracy because the longer it lasts the stronger will be its influence upon democratic sentiment in Germany. Prussian hatred and fear of Russia have been greatly intensified during the last month. Germany, if she dared, would back up to the Rhine

in the west to facilitate her designs against the new Russia.

The enthusiasm with which a large majority of the British Commons approved of the enfranchisement of women shows the extent to which the war and its lessons have revolutionized sentiment in the United Kingdom. In the light of the new revelation ancient prejudices and what seemed to be eternally irremovable traditions have vanished like the mist before the sun. When statesmen so inflexibly opposed to the extension of the franchise to women as Mr. Asquith, Mr. Walter Long and Mr. Bonar Law once proclaimed themselves to be, arise in their places and declare their approval of this aspect of election reform, it becomes evident that the war is developing remarkable changes in the mental attitude of the country's leaders of thought as well as the country itself.

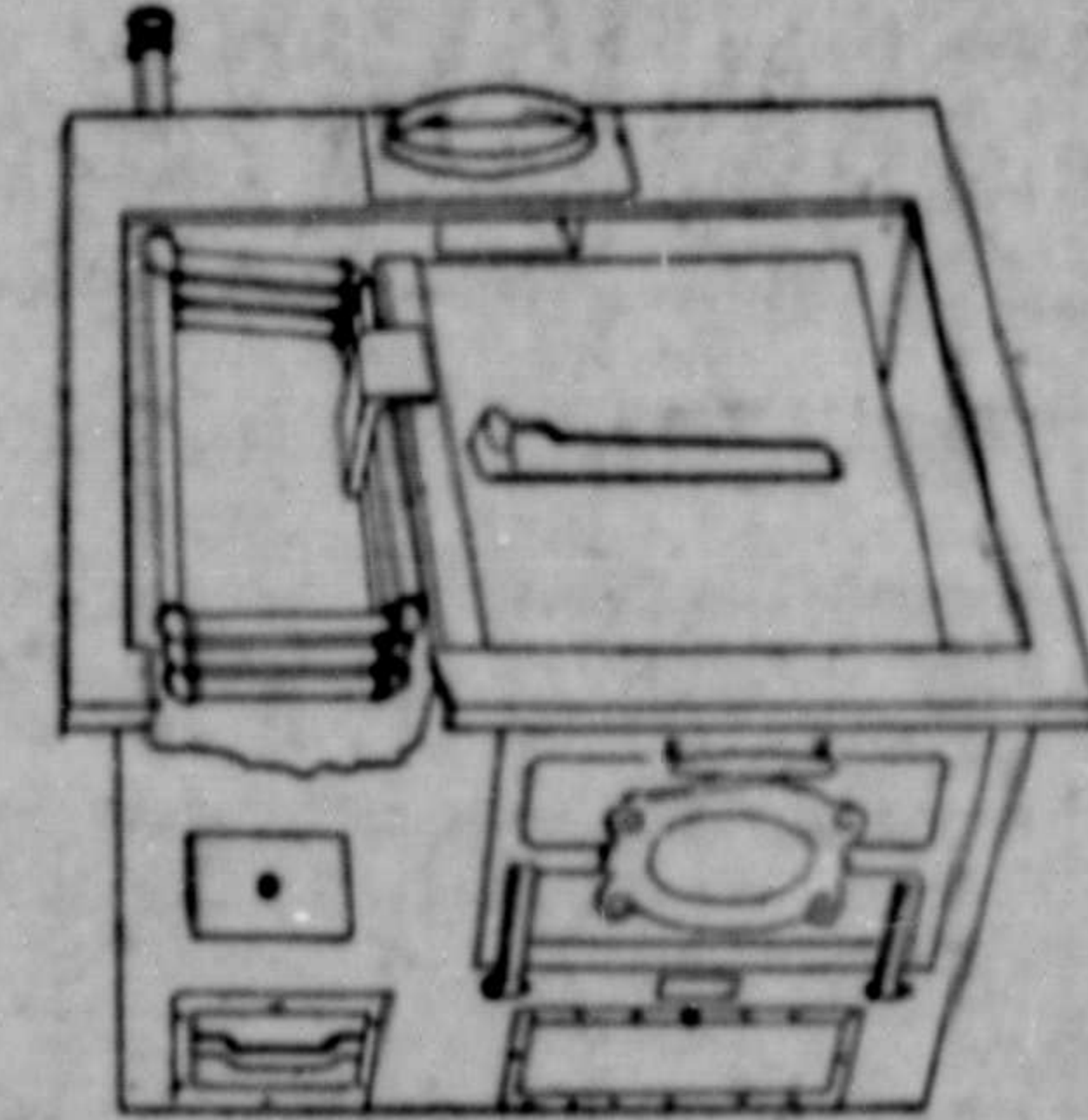

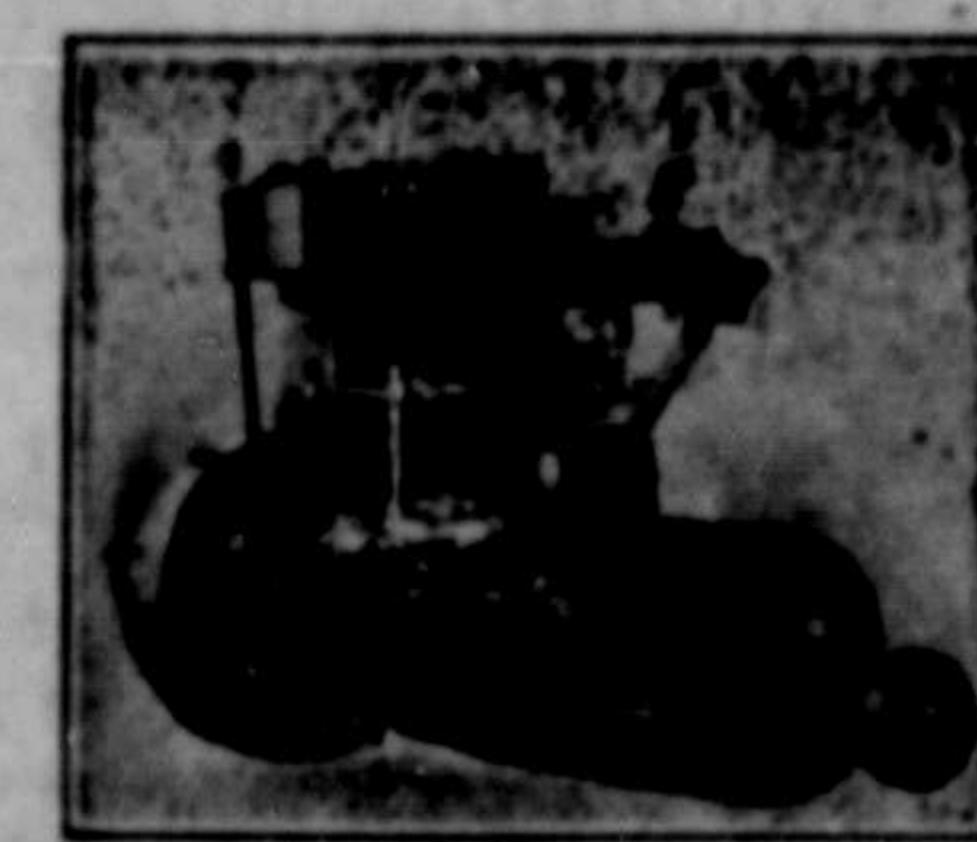
