CANADIAN ARMY SMASHES GERMAN LINE

STRONGEST GERMAN POSITION AND MANY PRISONERS TAKEN BY CANADIANS

THE SPRING DRIVE HAS NOW STARTED ON WESTERN FRONT

OFFENSIVE IS TAKEN ON FRONT FROM LENS TO CAMBRAI—ALL MILITARY ARMS EMPLOYED—AEROPLANES AND TANKS ACTIVE—CANADIANS TAKE MANY PRISONERS

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, April 10.—The British began a terrific drive this morning in a high wind and a driving sleet storm. The movement started along a wide front, extending from Lens to Cambrai. General Haig is striking today the most formidable blow at the Hindenburg line that the Allies have so far launched in this sector. The offensive extends over a front of twenty-five miles and a great thrust is being made at the two key positions of the German defence line, extending from Cambrai to St. Quentin. The reports received from General Haig declare that the German line is everywhere penetrated and that satisfactory progress is being made.

Paris, April 10.—The British successfully launched a powerful offensive from the north of Arras to the south of Lens. This sector is north immediately from the one from which the Germans have been retiring. Their troops everywhere penetrated the enemy's lines and are making further satisfactory progress. No estimate of the number of prisoners taken by the British has been made as yet, but the reports indicate that a considerable number have been captured. In the direction of Cambrai, the British have taken the villages of Hermies and Boursiers and in the direction of St. Quentin have taken Fresnoy Le Petit.

French official. Many patrol encounters took place during the night between the Aisne and the Somme.

EMPIRE DEVELOPMENT WILL PROCEED RAPIDLY

Mr. Henry S. Wellcome, of the great drug firm of Burroughs, Wellcome & Co., of London, Eng., is making a short visit to Prince Rupert. Mr. Wellcome's firm is one with a world wide reputation and its name is known worthily in practically every country in the world.

Mr. Wellcome has been debarred from business on account of his health, and having been ordered by his physician to get as far away from the cares of a city life and its concomitant anxieties in these times of stress, has come to the Pacific coast. Mr. Wellcome has been in British Columbia before, but this is his first visit to the metropolis of the north. Mr. Wellcome has been up to Alaska and arrived in the city on the steamer last night from Skagway.

In speaking of the state of affairs in the old country, when he left there several months ago, Mr. Wellcome mentioned the appreciation in which Canada is held over there on account of the splendid manner in which she, in common with the other self-governing dominions, came to the help of the mother country in the fight for right against might. In the reconstruction of the Empire, as a result of the war, said Mr. Wellcome, free trade in the old sense is dead. The Imperialist idea of an inter-Empire preference has taken its place and there will also be an entente preference as well.

Considering that practically every family has lost some relative in the war, the whole nation is bearing its burden of loss stoically. The oppression of the weight of mourning is not being made visible by any outward emblem. The spirit of sacrifice is nation wide, and Mr. Wellcome pays a high tribute to the women folk who have willingly given their dearest in their country's cause.

Discussing ante bellum conditions, Mr. Wellcome is convinced that the development of the Empire resources will be the most striking feature. Under the aegis of the government, it seems to Mr. Wellcome that the hitherto latent possibilities of every part of the Empire will be taken into consideration and development of their natural riches will proceed very rapidly.

Mr. Wellcome will pay a visit to Port Simpson, the oldest town in the north, before he leaves for the southern cities in a day or two.

MEATLESS DAYS IN GREAT BRITAIN NOW

London, April 9.—Baron Devonport, British food controller, has ordered that beginning April 15th in hotels, restaurants, clubs and boarding-houses there shall be one meatless day each week.

The controller has also ordered that no potato or food containing potatoes shall be allowed except on meatless days and on Friday.

The order imposes restrictions on the quantities of meat, sugar and bread at meals served in hotels, restaurants, boarding-houses and clubs. The scale for meat is for breakfast, two ounces; luncheon, five ounces, and dinner, five ounces. The bread restrictions call for two ounces at all these meals.

Baron Devonport, in examining the order, said he expected it to result in a saving of 65 per cent. of the meat now consumed, 53 per cent. of bread and 63 per cent. of sugar. He said he had originally intended to order two meatless days, but that he feared that this would lead to an increase in bread consumption.

THE MEXICAN TROUBLE

PROMISES REFORMS

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, April 10.—The Emperor Karl of Austria will follow the Kaiser's announcement with one of liberal internal reform promises. Among those promises will be one for semi-autonomy being granted to the principal provinces of Austria-Hungary. The German autoerats see their empire crumbling. The action of the Kaiser in proposing the extension of the franchise appears to be highly significant, but this reform would be delayed until after the war. The German people are disinclined to brook any untoward delays. The temper of the people is for action and pledges are not enough. The German press think that the Kaiser's message is not sufficient and express dislike for the secret vote.

AUSTRIA BREAKS OFF RELATIONS

(Special to The Daily News.)

Washington, April 10.—Austria formally broke off relations with the United States Government yesterday, when the Austrian Charge d'Affaires Zwiedinek called at the State Department and requested his passports. He informed the Department that the order calling for his action was issued by his government the day previous. A short time earlier Minister Stovall at Berne cabled the Department from Switzerland that the break has been ordered. Ambassador Penfield knows nothing of the break in diplomatic relations. He left Vienna on the 7th inst. No change is made in the status of the relations of the United States Government with Turkey or Bulgaria.

The charge of the Austrian interests in the United States will be assumed by the Swedish Embassy. It is stated that whether war will be declared upon Austria-Hungary will depend largely upon her official attitude. Passports will be made out immediately for Zwiekenek and Ambassador Tarnowski. Tarnowski, while the formally accredited ambassador, has never been officially recognized by the Government.

CANADIANS TAKE MANY PRISONERS

Two Thousand German Prisoners are Captured by Dominion Troops—Enemy is Kept Retreating.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Canadian Headquarters, France via London, April 10.—The war on the western front which has been moving more rapidly during the past five weeks, broke into full swing today along the whole line. The attack which has been directed against the retreating Germans in the sector of the Somme has been extended to the sectors immediately to the north. In a series of assaults upon a broad front with the town of Arras as a pivot, the British struck a heavy blow at the German line and the enemy has been driven from scores of important positions. The British penetrated far into the German lines and inflicted heavy casualties.

Vimy Ridge.
In the territory captured today from the Germans, was the famous Vimy ridge, which has been fought over time and again since the war was ten months old. This ridge of Vimy was reported to be the strongest defensive position on the whole western front. This important position fell to the lot of the Canadian troops, and in the fighting which took place for its possession over two thousand Germans were taken prisoners by the Canadians. The drive still continues and the fighting is of a most sanguinary nature. The total number of prisoners taken within the last twelve hours exceeds five thousand.

Bad Weather.
The weather has been extremely disagreeable, gales and storms of sleet accompanied the British advance, but the concentrated force and the co-ordinated activity of the Allies' movements overwhelmed the Germans. This movement overshadowed the great Somme drive of last year.

Like Seagulls.
In the air, vast droves of British airmen hover like seagulls, bombing the German trenches. Below, the tanks in action wallowed ahead of the advancing infantry, struggling over the broken ground. The success of the Canadian troops is a most notable achievement.

AEROPLANES ATTACK GERMAN DESTROYERS

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, April 10.—British aeroplanes have attacked German destroyers off the Belgian coast. One German destroyer was sunk and another was severely damaged. The action took place last night.

THE HOME DEFENCE FORCE

In discussing the entry of the United States into the war, among the other contingencies which our neighbors are expected to have to guard against is the entry into Canada of armed bands of German sympathizers, prepared to take "desperate chances." In some quarters, it is said that this is a contingency which Canada ought to be prepared against. In this connection the "Sun" says:

The plan of the Borden government to enlist 50,000 volunteers for a home defense army has been the subject of much criticism, as a weak move to satisfy public opinion which demanded of the government a stronger recruiting policy. A large section of the people favor a call for men under the militia act, confined to unmarried men from 18 to 25, as a means of raising a home guard and are of the opinion that in this way the principle of compulsory service could well be introduced to the country.

The critics of the home guard scheme have said that the force would provide a refuge for slackers who have no desire for anything but peace soldiering, that it would afford promotion for officers who have not shown a desire to go to the front, and that it would spoil recruiting for overseas. The only thing that appears to be in its favor is that it will release for active service the 50,000 men now in training in the Dominion. There appears to be no doubt that the scheme was designed to shirk the enforcement of the militia act.

However, as far as British Columbia is concerned the home guard scheme appears to be hanging fire, while at the present time there is arising a need for a home defense force perhaps unforeseen when the scheme was hatched. The president of the United States has taken steps which will inevitably lead to war with Germany. There are millions of German citizens in the United States as well as hundreds of thousands of German subjects and undoubtedly grave disturbances created by these will follow the declaration of war. That Canada may be invaded by filibustering expeditions from the other side of the

boundary is more than a possibility. A situation will arise which will call for a patrol of the border by large bodies of armed men, and while the United States, as an ally country, will certainly employ large military and naval forces in guarding the frontier, Canada must be prepared to co-operate actively with the American forces.

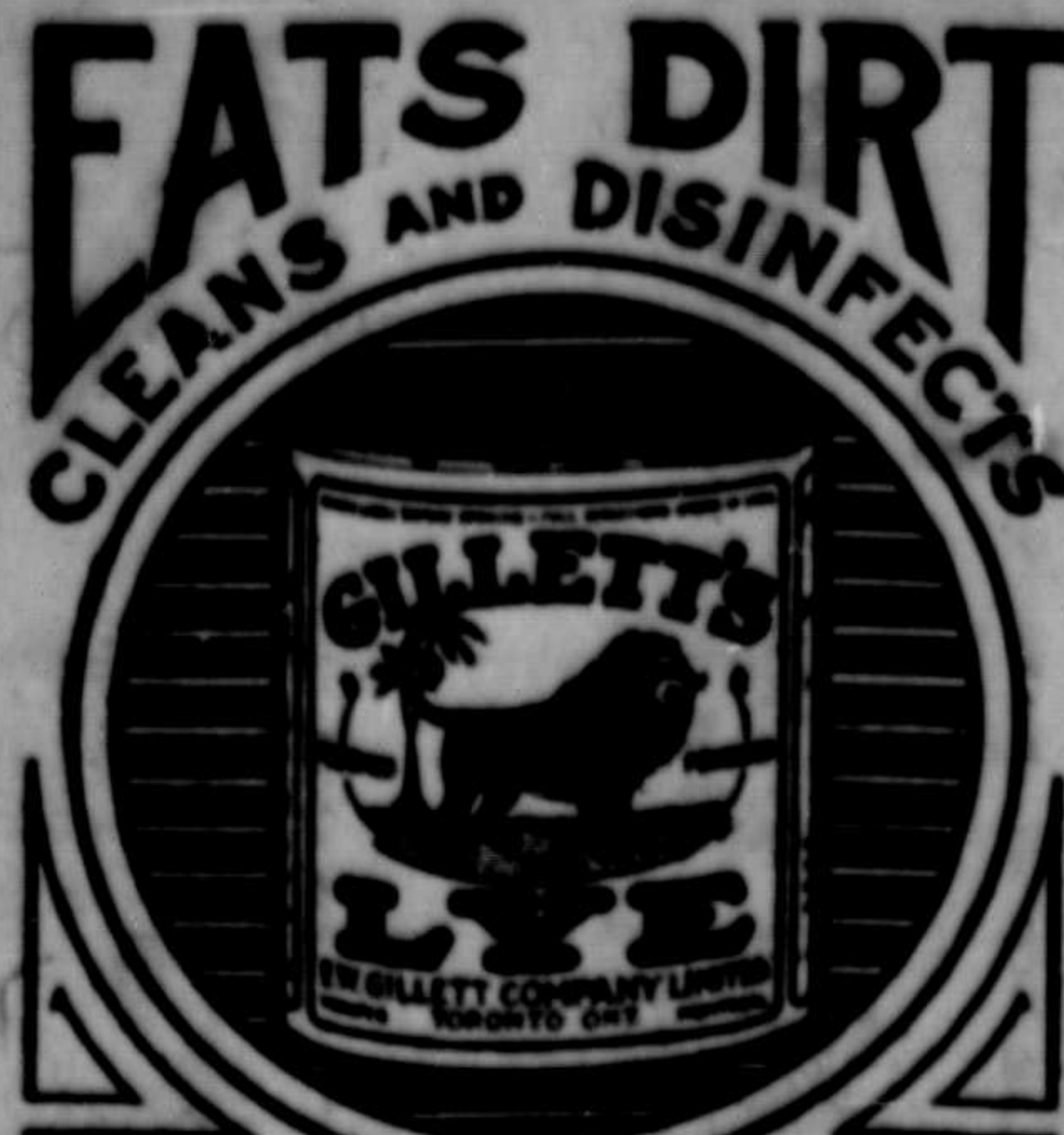
The border must be patrolled and the military authorities must be prepared to deal with filibustering bands that may cross the boundary, ready to take desperate chances. Events in the United States are rushing toward a situation when a raid on Canadian territory by German banditti will be not only possible but probable.

The enlistment of the home defense force is proceeding in Eastern Canada, but apparently no steps have been taken in that direction here. Enlistment should be rapid in this force, which in each locality will consist of the old militia regiments, recruited up to strength. The men are needed now for real home defense service. They should be recruited with the greatest possible rapidity.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

Ottawa Citizen: Last week the King received in audience "Hon." Robert Rogers as a representative Canadian minister of the Crown. By thus allowing the King to be imposed upon Sir Robert Borden took another step towards becoming the Premier Sturmer of Canada. It only remains for Mr. Robertoff Rogersovitch to be made overseas minister of elections, to organize the soldiers' vote in a Dominion general election; and surely the limit of the regime of the "dark forces" in this country will have been reached.

Prussianism is primitive savagery which always overdoes what it sets its hand to do. Thus in Northern France the Hun, in order to be "thorough" and "efficient" in destroying things, cut down all the trees in the districts he was about to abandon and left them lying there. When the Allies arrived they found the timber most useful in the construction of roads and extension of railways. Thus the Huns saved them a lot of work and facilitated their

pursuit to such a degree that another long retirement is now due.

The history of this war will have a no more glorious chapter than the record of the achievements of Britain's women. Without them this struggle could not be won for humanity and freedom. Let there be no mistake about that. They have disclosed a reservoir of resources hitherto unsuspected perhaps even by themselves. They have done everything but fight in the trenches, and they would tackle that task without hesitation if they were given an opportunity. It must be a hopeless reactionary, indeed, who is unable to agree that they have demonstrated their right to a share in the institutions which they have done so much to uphold in the face of armed attack.

A PRINCE RUPERT CHORAL AND ORCHESTRAL SOCIETY

The great success of the musical productions given before the public by the different associations in the city this winter is a source of gratification to those who took any part in them. From various quarters lately has arisen the same suggestion for the formation of a choral and orchestral society, which would combine the musical enthusiasts of the different organizations into one society. This winter has proved conclusively that in the city of Prince Rupert there is a sufficient number of good voices to make a choral society possible. And possibly also enough instrumentalists.

In larger and older established communities the success of such a society depends largely upon leadership, and Prince Rupert is not deficient in this respect. The problem of a shifting population is not so acute there either. Nevertheless, despite the difficulties to be contended with in a comparatively new city, the successful operation of a choral and orchestral society is merely a matter of combination. The voices are here. The leaders are here. The organizers are here. With them all combined, the success of such a society is assured.

The advantages of one strong musical association are many. The chief one is that more ambitious works may be undertaken than hitherto, which will make to work more attractive for the members. From a social point of view, its possibilities are immense. From a health standpoint and as a lung exercise, nothing is more beneficial than singing. While for absolute pleasure for most people, what can compare with taking part in or listening to, well-rendered music?

Were the musicians of this city to get together on this matter, success would be assured for the musical part. A small membership fee would defray the preliminary expenses of the practices, and for the final productions, without doubt, there are sufficient public-spirited citizens to act as guarantors for the expenses, should such be necessary, which is a remote contingency.

This is a matter well worthy of consideration. It would be none too soon for preparations to be made right now for the next season. The society could be formed and officers elected. Prospective members could be enrolled. The season's programme could be outlined and everything got in shape for a start at the earliest possible date. The formation and success of such an association would constitute an asset to the city of Prince Rupert.
