#### THE HOME DEFENCE FORCE

In discussing the entry of the United States into the war, among the other contingencies which our neighbors are expected to have to guard against is the entry into Canada of armed bands of German sympathizers, prepared to take "desperate chances." In some quarters, it is said that this is a contingency which Canada ought to be prepared against. In this connection the "Sun" says:

The plan of the Borden government to enlist 50,000 volunteers for a home defense army has been the subject of much criticism, as a weak move to satisfy public opinion which demanded of the government a stronger recruiting policy. A large section of the people favor a call for men under the militia act, confined to unmarried men from 18 to 25, as a means of raising a home guard and are of the opinion that in this way the principle of compulsory service could well be introduced to the country.

The critics of the home! guards scheme have safd that the force would provide a refuge for slackers who have no desire for anything but peace soldiering, that it would afford promotion for officers who have not shown a desire to go to the




