## TWENTY-ONE THOUSAND PRISONERS TAKEN

### ENORMOUS CAPTURES OF MEN AND MATERIALS BY ALLIES WEAKENS ENEMY

#### A HUNDRED MILES OF BATTLE LINE ON WESTERN FRONT

FROM DIXMUDE TO RHEIMS THE GERMAN LINE IS BEING BATTERED BY THE ALLIES—ENEMY DEFENCES PULVERIZED—MAKE GREAT CAPTURES OF PRISONERS

(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, April 19.—General Haig has reported an important thrust in the direction of Cambrai where the village of Villers-Gaslain on the river Escaul has been captured. This village lies about nine miles to the south of Cambrai. Around Lagnicourt, about nine miles to the west of Cambrai the British positions have also been improved. Cambrai, one of the pivotal points of the Hindenburg line, is being menaced on two sides.

**Greatest Bombardment.**  
All Germany's hold on France today is in jeopardy by the most titanic struggle ever witnessed in the world's history. It is a struggle between von Hindenburg and the master strategist of the British and French staffs on a battle scale undreamed of previously. The part of France in this, the greatest of all drives was preceded by the greatest bombardment in history. Millions of shells have been hurled on to the German defences today. The French marksmanship has been so deadly that the first of the German prisoners captured declared that of their companies which averaged about 250 men each, only about eighty men survived.

**Near Laon.**  
General Nivelle's troops are within two miles of Laon and the French artillery have pulverized the German defences. The sudden Franco-British drive has shattered the German hope of avoiding the spring offensive by a further retreat. The French onslaught is now gathering its greatest momentum, which with the combined advances by the British makes a continuous battle line from Dixmude to Rheims, a battle front of a hundred miles.

**Too Gigantic.**  
The French advance between Rheims and Soissons menaces the entire German line, coupled with the British attack on St. Quentin and the advance of General Haig's troops towards Lens and Cambrai. The Allied onslaught is on too gigantic a scale to permit anyone to visualize the titanic struggle in its entirety.

#### THE CENTRAL POWERS ARE WANTING PEACE

(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, April 19.—Reports are persistent here today that Austria Bulgaria and Turkey are all angling for separate peace agreements with the Entente through secret emissaries. The move is said to have Switzerland as its centre, but no confirmation is available here.  
It is known that Austria wants Russia to quit. If she did, Austria would quit also and leave Germany to fight it out single-handed. Conjectures are rife as to whether the Kaiser and the Emperor Karl have had a quarrel. That the hidden moves behind the peace talk will have no effect on Russia is considered certain.

#### FIRE ON COMOX AVENUE

About noon today the fire department had a call from Comox Avenue, where fire had broken out in one of the houses. The department were promptly on the scene and succeeded in confining the blaze to two houses. One was entirely gutted and considerable damage was done to the other.



#### PARCELS FOR PRISONERS

A special cable from London says:  
The Canadian Red Cross is doing everything possible to get parcels to prisoners, and lately have adopted a new plan of sending three smaller parcels fortnightly by post instead of the former two large ones by express. Six pounds of bread a week are being sent from Switzerland to every man. They expect to get fuller details of conditions in German camps presently, as word has been received from two Canadians in Holland, just escaped, asking the Red Cross to discontinue their parcels.  
Sir Starr Jameson, head of the British Red Cross, which controls the dispatch of parcels to Canadians, too, welcomes the parliamentary inquiry which will be held into the system inaugurated some time ago, which stopped private parcels to men in the ranks. The London Daily Mail suggests that if it is found the German railroads are responsible for delay in delivery of parcels, we must follow the French plan and cut down the supplies to German prisoners until we receive word from our men that they are getting parcels.

#### PRESIDENT WILSON WANTS CONSCRIPTION

Washington, April 19.—President Wilson has stated that he will not listen to any general volunteer plan offered for the raising of the necessary numbers of effectives for the army. The President wants conscription.  
The Senate has passed the seven billion bond bill, and the measure will probably be signed today and become law. Yesterday afternoon, Secretary McAdoo called the big banking interests for suggestions regarding the floating of the seven billion bond issue.

#### COAL MINERS ON STRIKE

Calgary, April 19.—Three thousand miners are on strike at the Crows Nest Mines, which are almost all closed down. Efforts towards a settlement of the dispute are in progress and it is expected that work will be resumed again at an early date.

#### THE RACE COURSE

A great crowd turned out last night to witness the roller race at the skating rink. Mr. Bennie McDaniels and Mr. Fred Wermig were the contestants, in what proved to be a very close race. Bennie McDaniels was adjudged the winner last night, but the finish was such that Fred Wermig immediately challenged the victor to race again. The time taken for the mile was 4 minutes and 17 seconds. The judges were Messrs. Drew, Ross and Angell. Timekeeper, Mr. B. Blyth, and the lap keepers, Messrs. Hooper and Dewhurst.

#### CYMRADORION SOCIETY FOR PRINCE RUPERT

As a result of a meeting held last night, it has been decided by the Welsh boys of this city to start a society as named above. The Welsh people have ever been famous since the earliest days for their bards and poets, and in kindred matters to this day, they take the lead among the English speaking peoples.  
As a national pastime, music, and particularly vocal music, has been that of Wales for many generations, and in a few months from now, the people of Prince Rupert should have some real good singing and entertainments.

#### VON BISSING, GOVERNOR OF BELGIUM, IS DEAD

London, April 19.—Advices received here yesterday state that von Bissing, the German governor of Belgium, died yesterday. Details are lacking. He was the German official who was responsible for the death of Edith Cavell, the heroic British nurse who stayed behind in the conquered territory to nurse the wounded.

#### THE GERMAN PEOPLE GO ON STRIKE

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Copenhagen, April 19.—Strikes have broken out in different and separate parts of Germany, particularly in the munition areas, on account of the high costs and small quantities of food allowed to each person. Berlin itself is seething with discontent. Great hungry hordes throng the public places of the German capital crying for relief.  
The reduction of the food allowance is causing widespread misery and discontent, which together with the defeats on the western front, are causing the authorities much misgiving.  
Any further continued curtailment of the food supply, already insufficient, means revolt, and the Socialists have the people behind them when they state that the limit has been reached. Thousands of workmen are on strike.

#### THE RETAILERS' HALF-HOLIDAY

A deputation representing merchants from the cities of Vancouver, Nanaimo, Ladysmith, New Westminster and Victoria waited upon the government recently in connection with the Half-Holiday Act. The following resolutions had been endorsed unanimously by the merchants:  
(1) "We recommend the principle of a maximum of fifty-three hours for stores and store clerks, to apply to all store employees, excepting watchmen and janitors, the act to cover their regular work only."  
(2) "We endorse the principle of the Wednesday half-holiday, but we recommend that municipalities where sixty-five per cent of the retail merchants are opposed to this half-holiday shall be exempt from the act."  
Mr. Ing, the secretary of the Victoria Retailers Association, read these resolutions, and was supported by the next two speakers, but from this point, one merchant after another rose and repudiated the section of resolution No. 1, which favored the maximum of fifty-three hours a week for stores.  
As the dissent grew more apparent, the Premier informed the delegation that it would be better to have a definite policy formulated among themselves, after which it could be submitted to the Government.  
The deputation then withdrew and most of its members must have been painfully conscious that, so far as having accomplished any definite results, it had demonstrated for the entertainment of the government, the apparent inability of retail merchants to think and act collectively.

#### YUKON PATRIOTISM

The latest copies of "Canada," the illustrated weekly journal published in London, England, has a most interesting article on war and war work in the Yukon. It carries half a dozen illustrations, including that of Captain George Black, Commissioner of Yukon Territory, now in England, and his staff of well known Yukoners; a portrait of Mrs. George Black, now in England for the first time, and the Girl Guides of the Yukon. Mrs. Black says in the article: "In proportion to population, the Yukon has given more to the patriotic funds than any other part of Canada. Men, women and children have averaged \$20 per head." Over six hundred men have gone to the war from the Yukon, many walking long distances to enlist.

#### GREAT CAPTURES OF PRISONERS BY ALLIES

(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, April 19.—The total captures of prisoners by the British army since April 9th, amount to fourteen thousand men and 227 guns. On a closer count of the numbers taken by the French this week in their drive between Soissons and Rheims, the un-wounded Germans now behind the French lines are found to number at least seventeen thousand. Immense quantities of munitions have also been taken by the French. Their advance was so swift and thorough that all the German supply depots on the wide radius were taken, fully stocked.

#### ANTI-GERMAN ACTION BY THE ARGENTINOS

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Buenos Ayres, April 19.—The government here today formally took over into their custody all the German interned vessels. The official explanation of this action is that it is to prevent the German crews from damaging their vessels.  
Mobs have attacked 250 German houses in Porto Alegre and great rioting was witnessed on Saturday. A formal statement issued today points out that all the casualties on Saturday's rioting were foreigners, except the policeman killed.  
The government has not yet announced its course of action regarding the sinking of the Monte Protegido by a German submarine.

#### FORTUNES ARE WON BY BUYING SHIPS

Subscriptions from Cardiff to the new British War Loan amounted to more than £30,000,000, an average of £150 for every man, woman and child in the city. This remarkable contribution is an indication of the golden age which the war has brought to Cardiff. In no British city has such vast wealth been earned so easily and so quickly.  
At the outbreak of the war, Cardiff had the largest export trade in the country. Freights began to increase. Ships doubled, trebled, quadrupled in value. Young business men, enterprising and daring, bought whole fleets on a speculative basis, which would almost make a New York curb broker hesitate. They reaped the reward of their daring.  
In one case a tramp steamer so old that it was carried on a company's books at a nominal valuation of £1, was sold for £80,000, and resold the next day for an even £100,000. In another case, a steamer bought in the midst of a voyage for £100,000, realized £40,000 for its owners by the time it reached his dock, and was then promptly resold for another profit of £40,000.

#### HALIBUT ARRIVALS

AID TO THE ALLIES

The United States, having decided to go into the war, is showing no hesitation in doing promptly all she can do at once, while preparing to grant later assistance of a more material sort. Troops, marines, war vessels, and munitions all take time to be put in military and naval readiness, but financial credit may be loaned almost instantaneously. This is the form of first aid to be extended to the Allied powers, and never was such aid more earnestly desired or more generously granted. Congress will in the shortest practicable time take steps to procure a war loan of five billion dollars from the people of the United States, and of this amount three billions will be put to the credit of the Allies.

For this loan no collateral security is asked; it is frankly accepted as a fact as good as accomplished, that the Allies are going to win in this conflict, and that they will come out of it in a perfectly solvent financial condition. It will take years to extinguish this liability, but the mere fact of its prolonged existence will be a guarantee of the continuation of the bond of alliance of which it is in some sense the present seal.

Hardly less interest naturally attaches to the use of which the other amount of two billions is to be devoted; it will be spent in meeting the cost of carrying out the work of preparing the fleet and the army for actual naval and military duty. It has been authoritatively, if not officially, announced that very heavy war taxes must be imposed to reduce as low as practicable the amount of unliquidated war liability passed on to future generations to discharge. Whether the two billions will be enough remains to be seen, but American statesmen appear to be little troubled with anxiety in the premises. They are going into the vast enterprise not with the cheerfulness of shallow optimism, but with sober assurance of victory and justifiable confidence in their country's resources.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

The eyes of the world are on St. Quentin and Lens today. The British guns are thundering at the gates of both these French towns and unless the Germans are able to effect a miracle they cannot be saved. By the capture of Fayet and Griecourt, which lie to the northwest of St. Quentin, the pressure upon that town has reached a point which must speedily prove unendurable to the enemy. The most stubborn resistance is being offered but while it delays it seems utterly unable to stop the advance of the victorious army of Britain.

The capture of St. Quentin will be more than a mere episode in the war. It is one of the strong points on the Hindenburg line and is a railway centre of considerable importance. Its occupation will be a definite step forward in forcing the Germans back on the Meuse. As the German line is shortened the resistance may prove more stout, but the hammer blows the Allies will be able to deliver should be determining factors in achieving decisive results.

The capture of Lens will transfer to the Allies the controlling position in the iron and coal region of France. Occupation of this industrial centre has been of great value to Germany, while its loss has crippled the French munition industry. From the beginning Germany intended to hold and annex this portion of the conquered country. Alsace and Lorraine brought to Germany great natural and industrial resources. The mineral region about Douai, Lens and Loos, with the villages, cities and farming regions between the Hindenburg line and the frontier, would have been a great acquisition.

Now Germany must leave it, and France will come to her own again. If the Germans destroy the mines for early productiveness by blowing them up or setting them on fire, the world will know that they have abandoned hope of recovering the district. This is what they seem to be doing. They are trying to make useless the coal and iron fields, the smelter works and factories. It is not exactly a war measure any more than the destruction of all the apple trees in the farming region

**THE MAN WHO ACTS WITHOUT THINKING**

The German newspapers are advertising that all men over military age, but liable still for national service, between the ages of 47 and 60 must register themselves forthwith. The official articles declare that there is now no time to be lost because "the war must be finished as rapidly as possible," and the public are urged to smooth the task of the authorities.

In addition to this the Cologne Gazette under the heading, "The man who acts without thinking," shows "how Englishmen today judge their Lloyd George" and comments as follows:

"There can now be few people in Europe who are not clear about the fact that the greatest obstacle to peace for the exhausted world consists in the person of the leading English statesman, Lloyd George. The peoples, which yearn for peace, would probably have had peace long ago, if the uneasy Welshman had not stimulated passion ever afresh by the excess of his self-deception, by his great temperament and by his remaining influence. This miniature edition of a democratic Napoleon maintains himself by the new methods which he has applied to the government of England, by the press dictatorship under Lord Northcliffe and by the paralysis of parliament, through a cabinet of politically impotent experts, who are devoted to him.

"The fact, however, that the recognition of the extent to which this man growing into a disaster for Europe is increasing more and more, not only among England's friends and allies, but also among his own fellow countrymen, is a remarkable sign of the times and one which we should keep in view. For until Lloyd George is either set aside or made harmless as a minister, no real disposition for peace will arise in England."

Comment of this nature from the Cologne Gazette regarding Premier Lloyd George may be regarded as a compliment.

### FOOD CONTROLLER GETS ATTER THE DEER

During this time of food scarcity in Great Britain, the food controller has got the owners of the numerous deer forests together to make arrangements for the hunting of deer for food. A venison supply committee was formed last year and this incoming season they will have their operations extended in practically every deer forest in Scotland.

Locheil, the Mackintosh of Mackintosh, and many another bearer of a famous name are getting everything arranged for the prompt transportation of the carcasses to the market. As the deer can only be killed for food during a limited period, the number to be required for the twelve months must be secured then.

It is proposed to erect a cold storage plant, salting and sausage factories in Inverness, and all details have been gone into regarding ghillies, ponies and motors to get the venison from the depths of the forests to railhead. It is proposed that officers on leave, officers on sick leave after convalescence, and those who have been rendering good service to their country in other capacities, shall be employed in stalking.
