ATTACK IS PRESSED AT STRATEGIC POINTS

MOST IMPORTANT FIGHT SINCE WAR STARTED NOW ON—HUN FLEET SETS OUT

THE GERMAN FLEET IS IN THE BALTIC

Apparently to Attempt an Attack Behind the Russian Lines—Transports in Convoy of the Fleet.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Petrograd, April 24.—A German battleship and cruiser squadron has left Libau, presumably in an attempt to attack behind the Russian lines. Another German warship squadron is also reported to be en route to the Russian Baltic positions from Kiel.

A great number of transports loaded with troops is accompanying the squadron which sailed from Libau. It is expected that the Germans will attempt to make a landing at some distance behind the present Russian line, where the coast is not so strongly defended, and thus get in behind the Russian defences, which the Germans have been unable to break by their military force.

The Russian fleet is on the alert, and are keeping in touch with the German fleet by aeroplane scouts.

At Zeebrugge.

The greatest activity was apparent about the Belgian base Zeebrugge yesterday, and today. During the night searchlights were being worked vigorously, and rockets were going up at frequent intervals.

The Dover Fight.

Berlin admits that two German destroyers were sunk off Dover. Amsterdam reports state that the squadron of German destroyers which set out from Zeebrugge to attack Dover, including the two vessels that were sunk, were of the latest type. The German squadron of eight vessels left Zeebrugge after dark on Friday night.

THE REGISTER OF VOTERS

It is satisfactory to learn that the ladies of Prince Rupert are coming out in large numbers to get their names put on the voters' roll. THE HAYS COVE BRIDGE

Attention was called to the state of the Hays Cove bridge by Alderman Montgomery at the council meeting last night. It was somewhat shaky, he said, and it sways rather much when vehicles were driven across it rapidly. It was decided that the city engineer should have an examination made as to its stability.

Washington, April 24.—The one vital fact which has emerged above all others from the trappings of diplomatic courtesy is that what the Allies want from the United States more than anything else is food.

It is officially stated that there is no immediate concern regarding the sending of troops to Europe.

The Submarine Menace.

One member of the British war commission said that twenty German submarines and their crews were captured by the British on the tenth day of April, just the day before the ministerial party sailed. He says that the British navy is getting a lot more submarines than the people in America know of.

NEW SIDEWALK ASKED FOR STAL COVE

At the meeting of the city council held last evening, Alderman Casey brought up the matter of communication between the end of Eleventh Avenue and Seal Cove. There are a number of families located at and near the end of Eleventh Avenue, and at present to get to Seal Cove, it is necessary to walk as far as Frederick Street in order to get on to Eighth Ave., and then to walk the same distance back in a parallel direction.

Alderman Casey moved that the city engineer be authorized to report as to the cost and the feasibility of constructing a connecting sidewalk on Immanuel Street from Eleventh to Eighth Avenues and to report to the city council. The construction of this sidewalk would save the long detour necessary at present.

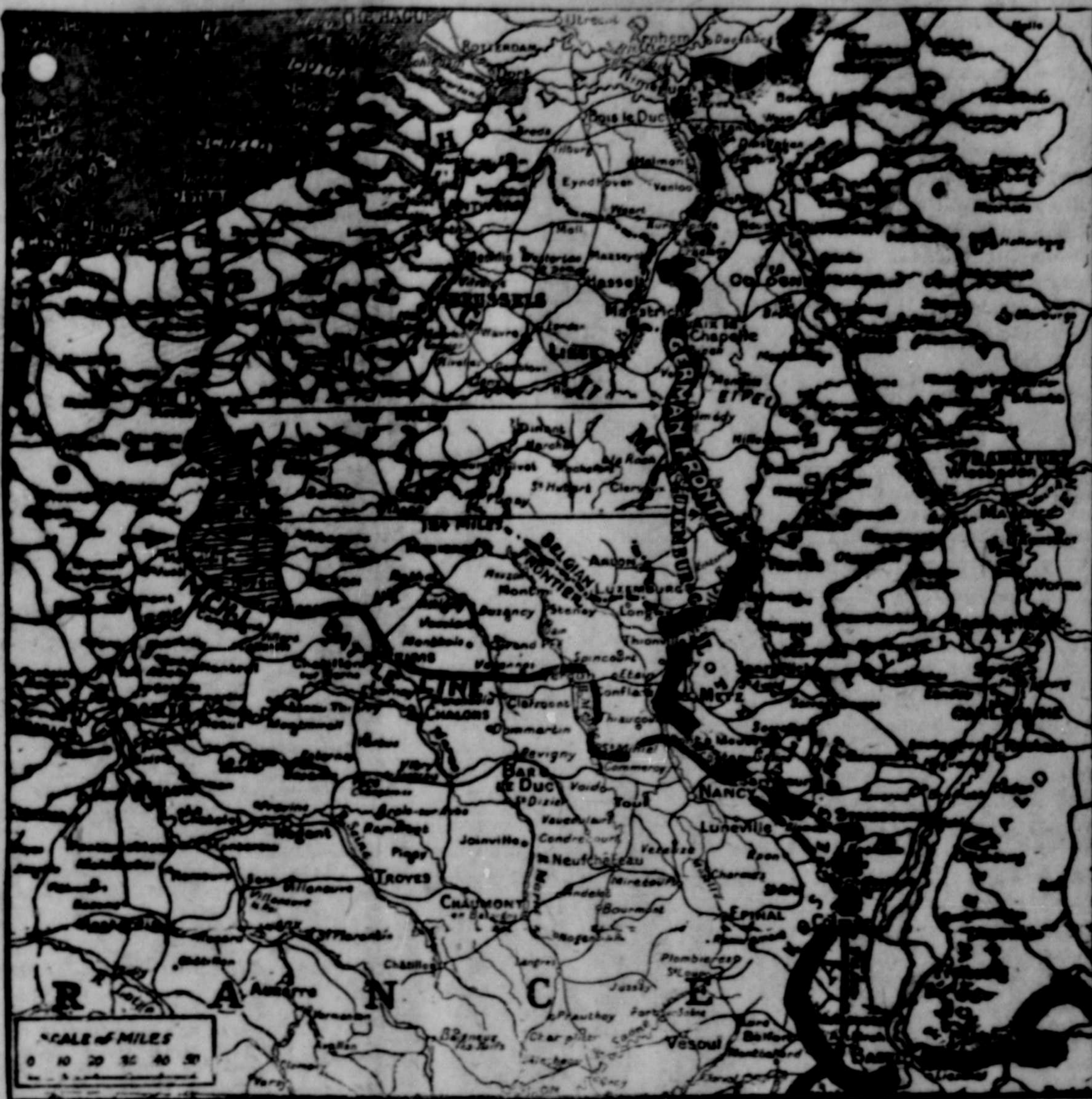
TROUBLE IN SWEDEN

PRESENT BATTLE LINE IN RELATION TO THE GERMAN BOUNDARY.—This map shows the extents of the gains of the last three weeks. The gain at some points is as deep as 25 or 30 miles and affects a frontage of about 120 miles. Elsewhere the battle line is unchanged as yet, though the fruits of the past few days' victory at Arras may be important. From the Canadians' position at Vimy Ridge to the German-Belgian frontier is about 125 miles.

GERMAN SUB SINKS HOSPITAL SHIPS

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, April 24.—The British hospital ships Donegal and La France, with many wounded aboard, were torpedoed without warning on April 17. Many wounded Germans and prisoners went down with the ships. Nineteen British and fifteen Germans are believed to have perished.

When it was realized that the ships were sinking, the craven Prussians made a mad dash for the ship's boats, in advance of the wounded. The British upheld their traditions and the wounded all got away first.

THE CITY AND WATERFRONT

At the meeting of the city council last evening, a letter was read which had been received from the Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands, regarding the application made by the city council for the reserve of provincial waterfront for the subsequent use of the city. Mr. Pattullo's letter said that the matter would be taken into consideration.

Alderman McClymont enquired whether any other concerns had made application for lots 1 and 2 in Block F, and if so, thought that maybe some more vigorous action should be taken by the council if the city really desired this frontage. It was stated that the Georgetown Sawmill Co., and possibly the Swanson Bay Co., had made such application.

TURKISH TROOPS FOR THE WESTERN FRONT

(Special to The Daily News.)

Copenhagen, April 24.—Berlin is thronged with Turkish troops who are being brought through Germany en route to the western front. The officials at Berlin continue to feed stories of great victory being achieved by the German troops to the credulous people. The Socialists are now divided. One branch of the German Socialists continues to seek a separate peace with Russia, while the other branch is strong in its desire for the democratization of Germany.

DECLARE IRELAND SEPARATE NATION

Dublin, April 21.—The Sinn Fein met today at the Mansion House, with Clyde Plunkett in the chair. Two hundred and fifty-seven Irish public bodies had been invited to send delegates, but 200 of them declined to do so.

The attendance was large, including unexpected numerous priests, but no prominent Irish public men took part in the proceedings. The convention proclaimed Ireland a separate nation, and demanded representation at the peace conference. Arthur Griffith moved a resolution claiming the application to Ireland of President Wilson's principle of national freedom.

The Dublin trades council was especially represented at the conference and endorsed its declarations.

FISH ARRIVALS

The Alameda has arrived with 8,000 pounds; the Adeline, 5,000; Lincoln, 7,000; Seymour, 40,000; Viking, 8,000; Lumen, 12,000; Crescent, 10,000; Holdhall, 5,000; Alliance, 8,000; Unity, 3,000; Karl F., 1,000; There is also a quantity of spring salmon arrived. No sales have been made up to time of writing.

ONE OFFICER SHOT OVER FORTY GERMANS

British Headquarters in France, April 21.—The weather is still atrocious.

The sharpest fighting of the last three days has been in the neighborhood of Monchy-le-Preux, the loss of which evidently was not a part of the enemy's plans. They are making desperate and costly efforts to recover it. In one day, what were practically five counter attacks, were delivered. All were beaten off and the enemy's loss is believed to have been about 4,000.

One German advance in two columns, supported by a third on the south side of Monchy, reached within 150 yards of the trenches held by an English regiment, which opened with rifle and machine gun fire. The line wavered and then stopped dead. The remnants fled to the east. The attacking forces actually reached a temporary advanced trench, where they came under an enfilading fire and suffered terribly. One small British party at a point which enfiladed the trench had an extraordinary experience, shooting continuously till the trench was practically heaped with dead. It is reported one officer shot more than 40 Germans himself.

INDIA TO BE ON WAR COUNCIL

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, April 24.—India is to get representation in the councils of the Empire. The great Eastern possession will be given a place at the next Imperial war conference table.

ACCIDENT ON FIFTH AVENUE

There was an accident, which might have had more serious results on Fifth Avenue last evening. The rig belonging to Lynch Bros., got somewhat badly smashed, and the driver got a bad cut, but otherwise there was nothing more serious.

TWO BATTLES NOW RAGING IN FRANCE

Fighting Today Surpasses Any Since the Beginning of war—Germans Sustain Great Losses.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, April 24.—Two battles are raging today. One is along Chemindes Dames, on the plateau dominating Laon. The other is around Moronvillers on the heights which dominate the Champagne plains. The fighting which is in progress today supercedes in importance any actions which have taken place on the western front. Newer and more important situations may be created at any moment.

A Disastrous Week.

Germany has just gone through the most disastrous week in her history, since the war commenced. The fighting which is now in progress is of vital importance. Since Monday a week ago, when the great French offensive began, General Nivelle's forces have captured more than one hundred guns, twenty thousand prisoners and have occupied twenty large villages, not including the hamlets. The territory from which the invaders have been driven extends to about fifty square miles, and the losses in killed, wounded and missing, inflicted upon the Germans is conservatively estimated at one hundred thousand men.

Mesopotamia.

The British forces to the north of Bagdad have achieved another victory over the Turks. Full details are lacking.

SHAWATLANS POWER HOUSE STAFF'S WAGES

At the short meeting of the city council held last evening, the matter of the wages of the men at Shawatlans power house was brought up by Alderman Casey. The men had requested a raise of pay two months ago, which was considered by the council, but the superintendent of utilities had done nothing so far, said Alderman Casey. He moved that the men at Shawatlans power house be given a raise of pay equivalent to the reduction made a year ago. As the superintendent of utilities, presently out of town, was expected back on Wednesday, it was decided to leave the matter in abeyance until his report be received.

TO REMOVE ROCKPILE

A letter was read last evening at the meeting of the city council which had been received from the Sisters of St. Joseph, asking that the obstruction in the shape of a rock pile adjacent to their new house, be removed.

It was moved and seconded that the matter be referred to the general committee and that the city engineer be instructed to prepare an estimate as to the cost of the work.

THE P. G. E. ENQUIRY

"My agreement was to take care of the campaign funds as far as the Conservative party was concerned," said Mr. Tate, before the P. G. E. committee. This "agreement" was part of a bargain, and regarding this agreement, the Victoria Times asks the following pertinent questions:—

What were the other terms of that bargain? Was the company's contribution in return for the over-payment of nearly \$6,000,000, or the action of the late government in closing its eyes to the conditions of the contract since revealed by the inquiry, or the six-million-dollar "loan" passed last session? Was not the campaign fund derived from public moneys improperly diverted to the company? Was an attempt actually made to bribe the people with their own money? What undertaking was given by the late government to the company in the event of its re-election, as part of the agreement? Who negotiated the bargain and who benefited from it, and how?

Rather than answer these questions and others equally pertinent Messrs. Tate and Welch levanted, leaving a subordinate to be the scapegoat. The men who have had millions to which they were not entitled and whose operations already have imposed an annual interest charge of a million a year upon the taxpayers—who will appreciate the character of the burden when they receive their tax notices—disappear with what amounts to a gesture of supreme contempt for the public and all its works. It is their intention to remain away until after the end of the session, when the committee of inquiry must cease its investigation? Do they expect that some counter-blast will put the government in difficulties, involving a dissolution and another election, which would give them another chance to continue their merry course, under the old friendly auspices, from where they left off? Is the charge against the Attorney-General following at once upon their sensational departure, a counter-blast to that end?

All this will be disclosed in time. As to Mr. Thomas, the

scapegoat, it is hardly necessary to say that anybody with an ordinary conception of ethical standards must be convinced that Mr. Bowser's commendation of his course was an affront to the Legislature and to the country scarcely less reprehensible than that delivered by the two absent witnesses. The confidence that Mr. Thomas shared was a confidence of guilt or the men who gave it would not have run away. Mr. Bowser knows or ought to know that the law recognizes no such confidence. Would any law-abiding citizen consider himself bound to keep silent on the witness stand on the ground that the person or persons accused of serious crimes had told him all about their criminality "in confidence?" Mr. Bowser says Mr. Thomas was to be "commended" for his faithfulness to his employers. Would he be equally deserving of commendation if his employers, for instance, had robbed a bank? Is the honor of the Legislature or the country nothing as compared with a confidence which covers wrongdoings? Is the public interest negligible alongside the expediency—directly affecting that public interest—which prompted Messrs. Tate and Welch to leave the country? What is Mr. Bowser's ethical code, anyway?

NOTES AND COMMENTS

Further light is shed upon the whole world aims of the German emperor and his clique by the outbreak of revolt in Brazil following that state's break with Germany. Three states of Brazil populated thickly by Germans are in open revolt and fighting is in progress with the Government troops. The rebels are well armed, even with artillery, and their preparations must have been already made long before the European war commenced. Revolt at home, of course, will prevent Brazil lending her full help to the Allies, and that the Germans were prepared for these contingencies all over the world shows to what extent they had expected to eventually dominate the world.

Two German officers were publicly horsewhipped by the Turkish women right in front of the Min-

istry of War in Constantinople lately. The occasion was the return of a detachment of wounded soldiers from Mesopotamia. The indignation of even the Turks at the domineering Germans can be understood, but the surprising thing is that the Turkish women should do the horsewhipping. Women there have heretofore been regarded chiefly as household effects, but now the world movement for their emancipation has evidently spread to the harem. On this occasion they have asserted themselves and made themselves felt.

China has commenced assisting the Allies against the German enemy. Her first contribution is a whole railroad thirty-six miles long and complete in every detail, rails, rolling stock, and equipment. It is to be shipped to the Allies' western front and to be used in the great drive. The line had been constructed by a German concession to the seaboard, and the Allies will have much pleasure in using the German material against its former owners.

SHIPBUILDING IN BRITISH COLUMBIA

Ottawa, April 24.—The following official statement was given out tonight:

"The Imperial Munitions Board has felt great regret at not being able to place a larger proportion of the work of making munitions in British Columbia and Western Canada generally, on account of the prohibitive cost of paying freight on steel both ways. The British Government has now intimated that in view of the fact that all steel available for shipbuilding is absorbed by existing contracts, it is prepared to give orders for wooden ships in British Columbia, which on account of its great lumber production, has facilities for the construction of these, and the board, which has for the last month been making investigation into the matter, has now obtained leave to let contracts.

"The Dominion Government has facilitated the matter of offering to advance to the board ten million dollars for the purpose of assisting in the development of this new and important industry, and the provincial government of British Columbia has expressed its willingness to give all facilities in its power. Plans and specifications are being prepared and will be ready very shortly. It is hoped that construction will commence shortly and will proceed rapidly, as at the present moment tonnage is as important a requirement of the Allies as shells, and by supplying it British Columbia will be doing its share in the munitioning of the Allied forces as it has already done in its contribution to their fighting strength."

THE GOVERNMENT AND THE P. G. E.

This resolution was presented to the committee of enquiry now looking into the affairs of the P. G. E. in Victoria. It was brought in by Mr. George Hanes, of North Vancouver, but is held over temporarily, as the committee have yet some evidence to extract.

That, whereas the Pacific Great Eastern Railway Co. and Foley, Welch & Stewart have failed to carry out their agreement to build the P. G. E. between Vancouver and Fort George, and whereas D'Arcy Tate on behalf of the company of Foley, Welch & Stewart have stated under oath that they can not complete the line, and that the firm would not do so with their own money, and whereas D'Arcy Tate, vice-president of the railway company, and P. Welch, of Foley, Welch & Stewart, and Donald McLeod have left the province, therefore be it resolved that the following be adopted and presented to the house:

1. That the \$24,960,000 worth of capital stock issued illegally to the Pacific Great Eastern Railway company be cancelled.

2. That the contract let to P. Welch for the construction of the railway be cancelled.

3. That the P. G. E. Railway Company and Foley, Welch and Stewart be sued for the return of all statutory overpayments.

4. That action be entered against the directors of the P. G. E. Railway Company for the return of all money made as profits directly or indirectly out of the contracts or sub-contracts in which they were interested in connection with the construction of the railway.

5. That action be entered against the contractor, P. Welch, for the return of all overpayments made to him by the railway company on account of increased or wrongful classification, or payments made in accordance with the specifications.

6. That the legislature at this session prepare and enact legislation for taking over complete control and ownership of the P. G. E. Railway as a government line, and that tenders be called for the completion of the same.

CHINESE GOT GERMAN VESSELS IN TIME

Prompt action taken by the Chinese naval authorities in seizing the German vessels Deike Rickmers, Sikiang, Albenga, Maillee, Meigah and Fortuna, following the severance of relations with Germany, was fully justified by the discovery of four bombs of high power in the cylinders of the Deike Rickmers, three in the engine-room of the Sikiang and two under the midship boilers of the Albenga, according to advices brought by the Kamakura Maru.

The machinery of the vessels was dismantled and parts were missing. But for the smart and efficient action of the naval officers the six vessels would doubtless have been completely destroyed.

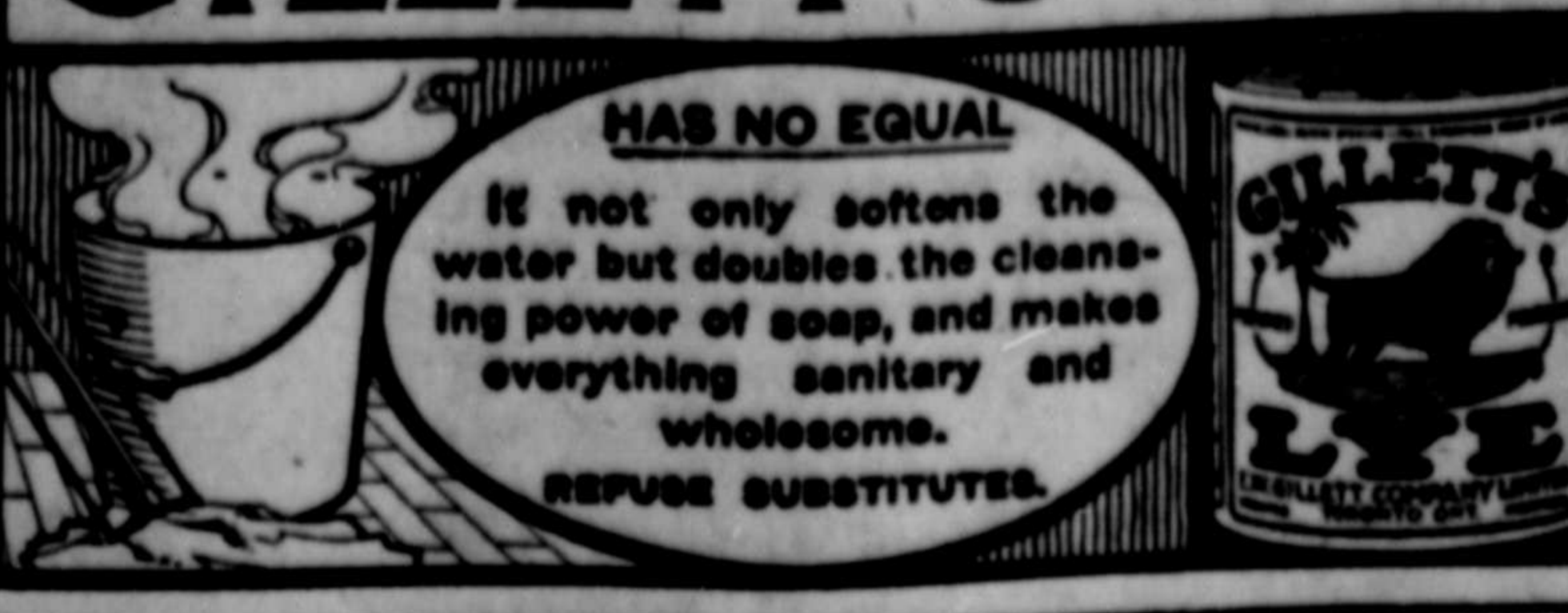

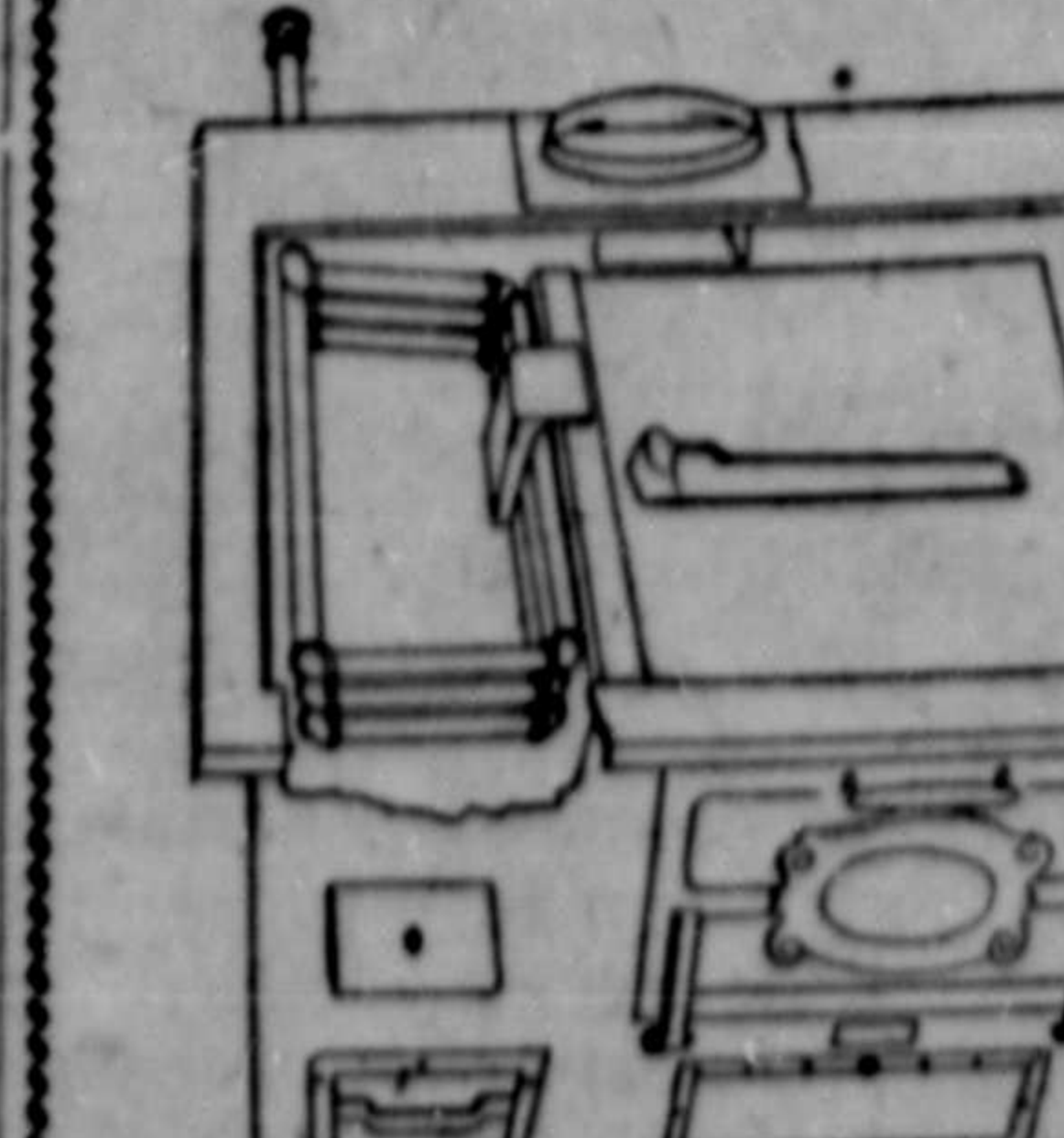
