FIERCE FIGHTING CONTINUES UNCEASINGLY - THE FRENCH CAPTURE CRAONNE

Fierce and Difficult Fighting in Progress Along Whole Line -Huns make Strong Resistance.

(Special to The Daily News.) London, May 5 .- Another day of fierce and difficult fighting is in progress. At many points the The most important gains of the day for the British are at the plage of Cherisy and at Bullecourt. At Fontaine Les Croisilles, the British found it difficult to get forward because of the great strength of the German detences to the south of the village, and the terrific barrage of heavy shell fire. .



OF IMPERIAL INTEREST

Regarding the appropriation of \$10,000,000, which has been placed at the disposal of the Munitions Board in Canada, for the building of ships, there is a very interesting article under the above heading published in the Victoria newspaper. "The Week," in a recent issue. This article is peculiar, inasmuch as it is the first one of the kind that has come to our attention, coming from Southern British Columbia, recently. "The Week" is to be congratulated. It boosts for Prince Rupert.

"The shipbuilding program of the province appears to be enlarging from month to month," says The Week. "Mr. Bukhart, the managing director of the large cement works on Tod Inlet, and Captain Troup, of the Canadian Pacific Railway, have been summoned East by Mr. Flavelle, head of the Munitions Department, in order to consult upon the Imperial question of building ships for commerce. Ten million dollars has been placed at the disposal of the Munitions Board, the greater part of which is to be spent in British Columbia. Nothing can be more significant to the future prosperity and welfare of the province. There is no reason whatever why this great necessity of the West shall not secure a large place in the activities of the province for all time. Hitherto we have been content to be the recipients of small doles flung to us by chance of the winds and waves in the shape of repair work. and often by grace of our American cousins. A few smaller craft have been built and bear the honored name of, one of the ports of the province as its place of registry. Already there are large and stately ships of commerce being built, equipped and sent forth laden with the productions of our






