THE RAILROAD PROBLEM

The solution of the railroad problem recommended to Parliament by the Commission of experts appointed last session goes a part of the way with the proposal of Sir Thomas Tait, issued in pamphlet form recently and referred to some days ago. The difference between the two is mainly one of scope. The Commission would merge the Grand Trunk, the Grand Trunk Pacific, the National Transcontinental, the Canadian Northern and the Intercolonial in one system owned by the nation and operated by a company formed for the purpose, the only beneficiary stockholders being the people of Canada, The Canadian Pacific would be left out of the scheme. Sir Thomas Tait would include that railroad in a national system, acquiring it under perpetual lease.

The Tait plan thus goes much farther than the commission's recommendation, which is at best a compromise and, if adopted, would be a half-way step either to the control of all the railroads of Canada by the Canadian people or their control by the Canadian Pacific. 

CAUTION: Chicks must not be fed until at least 48 hours old, and hen only sparingly.

If you can, start now with eggs or chicks; if not, arrange at once with the local poultry association for pullets in the


