## FIGHTING IS RESUMED ON RUSSIAN FRONT

### GERMAN ATTACKS ON DWINA FRONT ARE REPUESED BY RUSSIAN TROOPS

#### RUSSIANS INTO THE FIGHTING ONCE AGAIN

On the Entire Russian Positions Fighting is Again Resumed—Fierce Conflicts on Western Front.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Petrograd, May 11.—The Germans have been defeated on the Russian front. On the eastern sectors fighting has been resumed over almost the entire Russian positions. In the region of Dwina German attacks have been repulsed with particularly heavy losses.

**French Front.**  
Paris, May 11.—More gains have been made by General Nivelle's troops in the repulsing of an attack in the region of Chevaux. The French wedge into the German lines across the slope of the plateau Vauclere has been widened.

**British Front.**  
London, May 11.—The British troops have regained part of the lost ground around Fresnoy. Desperate fighting is in progress.

#### COALITION GOVERNMENT FOR RUSSIA NOW

Petrograd, May 11.—A long declaration made by the Provisional Government just published forecasts a coalition government in the near future.

#### PROGRESS IN PRINCE RUPERT

With preparatory work for the erection of the new \$300,000 sawmill outfit well under way, and the site for another cold storage plant within the city limits practically settled, the real progress of Prince Rupert will become very much accelerated. If the Munitions Board decide to utilise the facilities afforded by the big plant on Hays Creek in doing work of national necessity, or allow some other firm to do so, the real growth of the city, so long retarded, will recommence.

Whatever prospects there may be of this latter being consummated, apparently no one knows, but in the natural course of events this may be looked for any time. In addition to these, there are good prospects of the establishment of a smelter and refining works here in the near future. When these prospects materialise, the city of Prince Rupert will be in a fair way to come into her own. Even as it is, there need be no fear of the future of the city, in spite of the drydock, and the conditions obtaining as a result of the war.

Prince Rupert is the natural centre of the fishing industry of these northern waters, of the mining industry of the interior, the development of which has practically only started, and of the lumber business in the north, of which the half has never been told.

These are facts which it is well not to forget.

#### NEW COLD STORAGE FOR PRINCE RUPERT

"Personally, I am thoroughly satisfied," said Captain J. J. Logan, of the Vancouver Cold Storage and Ice Company, last night, "and if the board of directors of the company see things as I do, we will go right ahead."

Captain Logan has been in town again for a day or two regarding a site for a new cold storage plant and expressed himself as being very well pleased with the attention and consideration he had received from the Grand Trunk Pacific officials and from Mayor McCaffery.

"If half of what I have been told is true," continued Captain Logan, "then I consider that it will be a good thing for our company to come here. But," he asked laughing, "do you believe all the fish stories you hear up north here? Of course, I know you have the figures to back them up, and these are hard facts.

"I cannot say very much in the meantime," said Captain Logan, "until our directors have decided what they are going to do, but everything looks very good to me. The site we have been offered is a very suitable one, and if our directors decide to come here, they will do so at once."

Captain Logan left for Vancouver on the Prince George last night and the results of his visit here will be awaited with interest.

#### THE NEW SAWMILL AT SEAL COVE

Mr. E. F. Doby, who has been in the city for the past few days in connection with the construction of the new sawmill at Seal Cove, left for the south last night. Mr. Doby expresses himself as being well pleased with the progress of the work now being done on the site. He will be back again shortly, when the actual construction work of the buildings will be begun. Lumber for this purpose will be arriving soon, and it will not be long before the work of erecting the buildings will be in full swing.

During this visit, Mr. Doby has visited several points in the district, and has already let some small contracts for logs. These only amount to a few million feet, and contracts will be let for several more million feet on his return here.

Thirty-five or forty men will be required for the construction work to begin with and more will be added as the work proceeds. These men may, if they care, find regular employment at the sawmill when sawing is started. About forty-five men are at present working on the excavations and levelling, and twenty-five more will be put on at once, so that there will be no delay when the lumber arrives for the construction of the buildings.

#### NEW MANAGER FOR THE BOOTH FISHERIES, LIMITED

The Booth Fisheries of Canada, Ltd., have got a new general manager in the person of the Hon. Hugh Armstrong, of Portage la Prairie. Mr. Armstrong will likely be located in New Westminster or Vancouver, and he will have under his charge all the operations of the Booth fishing interests in Canada. They have a large Cannery on the Fraser river which is quite an important one, and in Eastern Canada they have also extensive interests.

#### METLAKATLA MAN DIES SUDDENLY

The very sudden death of a well known man in Prince Rupert occurred last night about eight o'clock, and the many acquaintances of Mr. Joshua Leighton, of Metlakatla, will be sorry to hear of his demise.

Mr. Leighton was a well known figure around the waterfront and was a frequent visitor to the city. He had gone to see some one on Ninth Avenue regarding a business transaction last evening, and about 8 o'clock he apparently dropped dead, just about the corner of Ninth Avenue and Fulton Street.

It is known that he had visited the doctor yesterday regarding his heart, which was affected and it is supposed that this was the cause of his death. The inquest will be held this afternoon at 2:15, and Mr. J. H. McMullen will be the coroner.

Mr. Leighton has several sons, who are very well known in town, one of whom has been in Mr. Geo. Frizzell's store for years, and they will be sympathized with in the loss of their father.

#### THE COAL DEPOSITS IN NORTHERN B. C.

In a summary of the minerals of British Columbia, a publication of the Mines Branch of the Canada Department of Mines has the following to say regarding the northern part of this province:—

In the northern interior there is another prospective field which attracts great interest at present, owing to its proximity to the line of the Grand Trunk railway, which has been constructed through the district. This is the Telkwa Valley field, in the northern part of British Columbia. Some of these areas are of considerable extent, and several have been proved to contain coal of good quality and in beds of workable thickness. The character of the coal varies from a bituminous to a semi-anthracite.

About 140 miles by trail north from Hazelton near the headwaters of the west fork of the Skeena River, is another coal field of great promise, known as the Groundhog coal field. This coal is anthracite or semi-anthracite in character. From present indications and developments it would seem though this coal field would prove to be one of the most important developments that the province has seen for many years. The field is, as yet, only slightly developed, and, if but a fraction of its present promise is fulfilled, it is bound to have a wonderfully stimulative effect upon the future of the province. This field was first discovered in 1903, though its full extent was not at that time recognized. More recent explorations have shown the field to extend in a northwesterly direction about 75 miles, and to have a width in places of about 30 miles. The rocks in which the coal occurs have been classed as of Cretaceous age.

Coal is also found in the Queen Charlotte Islands, the most important coal-bearing group known in this group of islands being that found in a development of Cretaceous rocks on Graham Island, the most northerly island of the group. In this field coal outcrops have been located in several places between the Skidegate channel and Yakoun lake in the interior of the island.

#### FISH ARRIVALS

The Unimak has arrived with 13,000 pounds of halibut; Reform, 7,000; Baltic, 15,000; Signal, 15,000; Jim, 10,000; Fram, 4,000; Brian, 20,000; Arctic, 32,000; Alameda, 10,000; Tahoma, 30,000; Rose Spit, 18,000; Margalice, 9,000; Deborah, 1,800; Tona, 1,200; Unity, 2,000; and the Chief Zibasa has come in for the Cold Storage Company with 30,000 pounds. Quite a number of the trolling boats have also arrived with salmon and several thousand pounds are in the market. Bidding is still in progress at time of writing.

#### DIED AT METLAKATLA

Mrs. John Campbell, wife of ex-Councillor John Campbell, of Metlakatla, died yesterday afternoon. She was attended by Dr. Cade and the immediate cause of her death was internal hemorrhage. The funeral will be held on Saturday afternoon in Metlakatla. Mrs. Campbell was very highly respected in the village and many friends will mourn her loss.

#### MORE SHIPS SUNK

(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, May 11.—Two more hospital ships have been torpedoed. Seventy persons perished when the big steamer sank. The facts have not yet been given out by the Admiralty.

#### FOUR BRITISH BOATS CHASE ELEVEN GERMANS

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, May 11.—Four British destroyers doing patrol duty came across a flotilla of eleven German destroyers of the same class and prepared to give battle. The challenge was refused by the German destroyers who turned tail and fled for the protection of Zeebrugge. The British vessels gave chase and pursued the fleeing enemy boats right up to within range of the land forts.

#### THE PEACE TERMS MADE IN GERMANY

(Special to The Daily News.)

Amsterdam, May 11.—The Germans are still babbling of peace terms. Hertling, the Bavarian premier's mouthpiece, says Germany desires the end of the war, but she must have concessions. All her colonies and her ships must be returned. Her foreign trade must be permitted to develop and the imports of raw material must not be interfered with from other parts of the world.

#### APPEALS FROM POLICE COURT JUDGMENT

Two men who pleaded guilty and were convicted in the police court recently on a charge of supplying liquor to an Indian, appealed and their case was heard at the county court this morning. Counsel for the prisoners, Mr. L. W. Patmore, argued for new trial. Mr. Fred Peters, K. C., for the prosecution, argued that the prisoners were estopped from appealing, having pleaded guilty. At this stage, Mr. Patmore asked the court to adjourn the case, to cite precedents.

The case will come up again on Monday morning.

**DOGS IN THE MANGER**

In the Provincial Parliament last week the difference between the outlook of the present Government and that of the Opposition was very clearly marked in the discussion on the second reading of the bill to amend the Forest Relief Act. This measure is designed in part to compel holders of timber limits to pay the rentals accruing from now on when they become due and also, in cases where the mill men could not get logs, to force the limit holders to operate upon their holdings, or else get out and let someone else who will, do so.

This latter section raised the ire of the Opposition. It does not matter to Mr. Bowser whether the mills can get logs, or whether the loggers can get work, or whether development work is done at all. No matter what happens, the speculator must still have his chance.

It is apparent—plainer than ever—that Mr. Bowser and his adherents are dead to the spirit of the present. They are still mentally in the last century. The day of the speculator is passing, if not indeed past. It will no longer be tolerated in self respecting communities that the natural resources of the country should be in the possession of people who will not develop what they have been allowed to own. The man who owns land must till it. It is imperative. If he cannot do so, or if he has too much, then morally he has no right to it. The land, particularly, ought to be in the possession of the man who can and will use it for production. This fact is apparently too much for the mental grasp of Mr. Bowser. So long as any man, or body of men are registered as the owners, whether they utilize what they have received, or whether they pay the just and lawful rentals or taxes upon their property or not, Mr. Bowser says vested rights must be protected.

Mr. Bowser seems to forget that the Government is elected by the people as a whole, and not by the "vested rights." The duty of any government is to protect the people as a whole against the encroachments of "vested rights" or of any par-

ticular section, for their own benefit.

The timber limits on Queen Charlotte Islands was instanced in the House as an example of the "dog in the manger" policy of certain corporations. One hundred and twenty-five thousand acres of the finest timber in the province was tied up. The holders of these limits would not, or could not operate. And until they do so, no one else can operate either. Thirty miles of frontage of the finest spruce in the world are thus tied up on Massett Inlet. The people who have these limits will not use them, notwithstanding the great demand for spruce. And this is only one instance. The same thing applies all over the province.

The policy of allowing the speculator to grab the best and the most quickly realized of our natural resources has been weighed in the balance, along with Mr. Bowser, and found wanting. In the old days it was said that "those shall take who have the power, and they shall keep who can." This motto apparently of Mr. Bowser's requires some slight modification nowadays. That which has been taken in the past, in order to be kept now, must be utilized. No longer must the speculator, who produces nothing, be allowed to retard the natural development of the country.

That the present Government are fully alive to this fact is shown in their bringing down this bill by the Minister of Lands. In view of the commencement of the sawmill industry in Prince Rupert, the action is timely, and will also be of service to the other mills nearby.

**NOTES AND COMMENTS**

Germany now is in a position to concentrate all her warlike energies on one front, but Britain and France seem to be more than equal to the task of meeting her. And they have the United States in reserve. The way to Paris and peace "based upon victory" is becoming longer every day.

Austria, Hungary, Bulgaria and Turkey are weary of war, Russia is so much occupied with internal affairs that she cannot give undivided attention to it. But what-

ever the conditions in Germany may be, when Bethmann-Hollweg makes his latest peace announcement two weeks hence he will find that Great Britain, France and the United States will have something to say about terms, and are in a strong position to carry on if they are not satisfactory.

Mr. Bonar Law has announced that the Imperial War Conference has accepted the principle that "each part of the Empire, having regard to the interests of our Allies, shall give specially favorable terms and facilities to the produce and manufactures of other parts of the Empire." This, as a contemporary points out, is merely an expression of opinion, and is not binding on any part of the Empire. It can only be brought into effect as the result of legislation in each of the British par-

It is also suggested that ladies throughout the United States show their patriotism by displaying the "colors" on their gloves, stockings, hats, etc. The gloves are of white kid with the stars and bars embroidered on the backs. The stockings are of white silk, with the flags embroidered in silk.

### POLICE WERE REAL MASTERS IN RUSSIA

Petrograd, May 8.—It has been said that Russia was ruled, not by the Czar, but by the police and the Orthodox Church. There is a good deal of truth in that, but possibly there would be more if the church were left out of the count. The police were the real masters of that patient, suffering nation of 170,000,000 souls, and they ruled it with a hard hand. Only one thing could have put an end to its malevolent power, and that one thing has now come to pass. The sum total extorted annually by this body from the Russian people in bribes and blackmail must have amounted to many millions of dollars. In the extinct Russia nothing could be done without greasing the palm of the police, and with that lubrication it was possible to do anything.

The police held out to the last, fighting desperately with machine guns from their strongholds on the tops of public buildings. The police were loyal to the old regime because they were the old regime. None had so much to hope from the obsolete order, none so much to fear from its overthrow. Most of them were only too well aware that the dawn of a new era would mean for them if not long terms of well-merited imprisonment, at any rate the loss of their livelihood. It was no abstract loyalty to the throne which steeled their resistance, but the thought of their own morrow. Other classes of officials, though lazy, incompetent, and corrupt, might hope to be left in their posts, but there could be no chance for a new Russia till the old police system had been cleared out, lock, stock and barrel.

It must not be supposed that the secret service maintained in Russia by public money were at any time united and co-ordinated under a single control. Not only had nearly every member of the cabinet a private system of espionage at his service, but in some departments subordinate officials had their own chiefs watched by similar means. It was a case of sap and counter-sap down to the very depths. To combat the sub-

terranean attack of treachery, the patriotic elements in the administration were themselves compelled to go underground, and espionage and provocation were met by counter-espionage and counter-provocation.

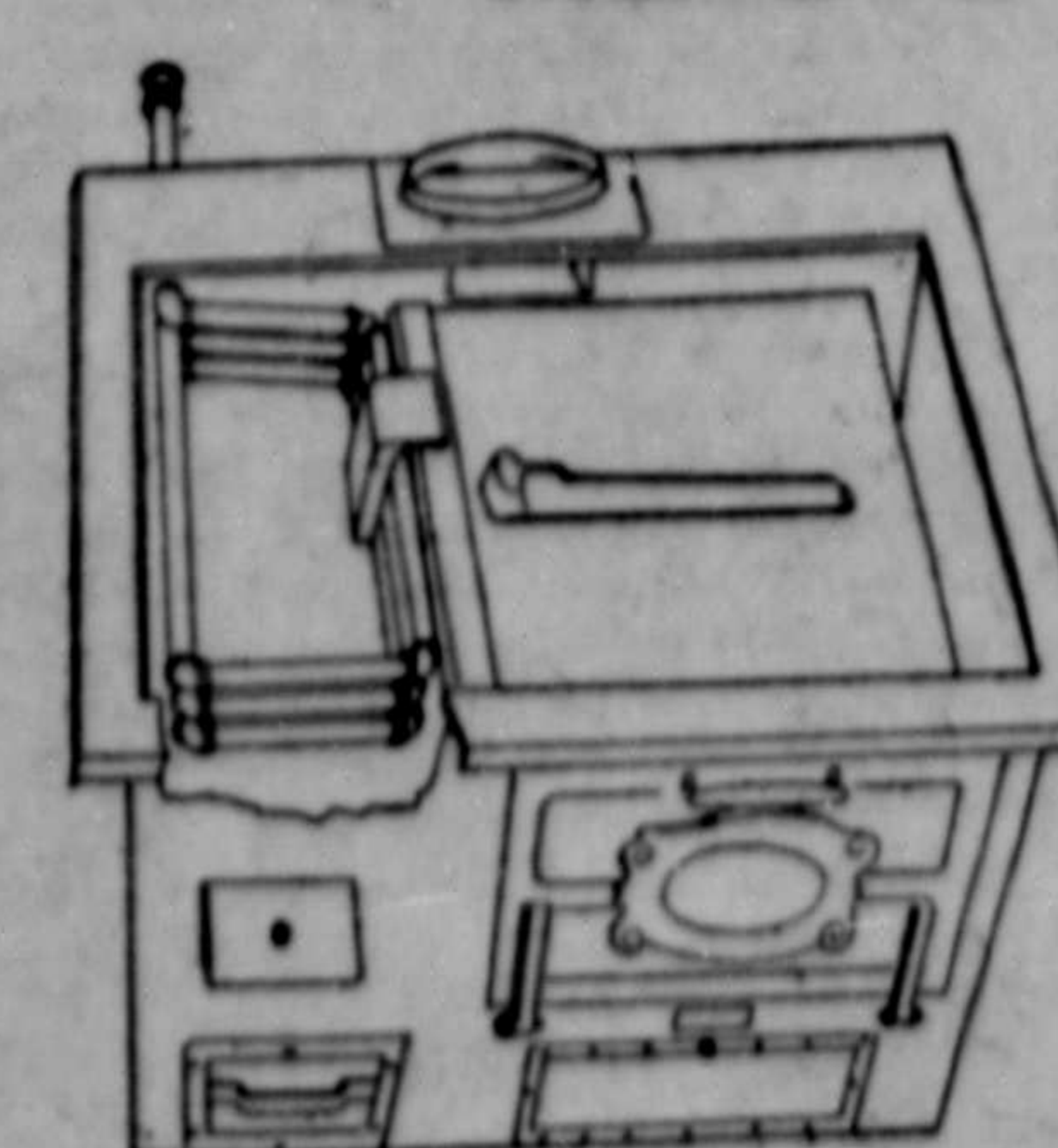
