SMALL ACTIONS FOUGHT ON WEST FRONT

LULL BEFORE THE STORM IS NOTICEABLE --- GENERAL ADVANCE NOW EXPECTED

ADVANCE ON THE WESTERN FRONT HALTS

No Major Actions, But Scores of Local Advances and Counter Attacks — Fighting in Macedonia Now.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, May 12.—The Franco-British advance has halted temporarily today. The official reports indicate no major fighting operations, but scores of local advances, counter attacks, repulses and general skirmishing have taken place. This may be the preliminary to the resumption of a general concerted movement. The British were successful in a raid to the east of Ypres. The Germans still maintain their hold upon Fresnoy and Bullecourt. The former place is almost completely encircled. Both places will soon be in the hands of the British.

French Official.
Paris, May 12.—We took German positions in the region of Chevreux and repulsed heavy counter attacks. The French have identified four fresh German divisions on the front since the first of May. The German losses have exceeded all estimates.

Bombed Zebrugge.
London, May 12.—A British aeroplane bombed Zebrugge yesterday morning.

German Official.
Berlin, May 12.—Artillery fighting of the greatest violence yesterday on the entire Arras front. Eighteen British and French aeroplanes were brought down.

Macedonian Front.
London, May 12.—Fighting has been resumed on a serious scale on the Macedonian front. Very heavy losses have been inflicted upon the enemy. The long waited push of General Sarrail is now in progress.

Italian Front.
Rome, May 12.—All the indications point toward the great offensive of Italy now being started with Trieste as its objective.

CAN'T STARVE BRITAIN

London, May 12.—Premier Lloyd George says that the food problem will soon be solved. Britain cannot be starved. A special session of Parliament was held in Camera. Mr. Asquith suggested that the Premier's speech should be given to the country.

GOOD WORK FOR ITALY

Washington, May 12.—The Italian navy has sunk thirteen Austrian submarines in the Mediterranean during the past three weeks.

PRESIDENT GRANTED POWER TO RAISE ARMY

Washington, May 12.—President Wilson has been granted power to raise the army. The House and Senate have agreed upon the terms of selective service. Volunteering will be tried first, and if the regular army and National Guard enlistments fall off, conscription will follow.

U. S. HAS NO AGREEMENT ANENT SEPARATE PEACE

Washington, May 12.—Secretary Lansing denies that the United States has an agreement with the Entente nations that the United States will not sign a separate peace.

NO EARLY PEACE

London, May 12.—A well known military expert says that there are no certain grounds for expecting an early peace. The road to victory will be a long one. Britain must call all her able-bodied citizens. France needs her full support. The United States are urged to supply men enough to keep the ranks up to full strength.

LOTS OF SHIPS

London, May 12.—The ship tonnage of the world will be colossal after the war. Britain will then have more ships than the rest of the world combined. It is expected that the British yards will turn out three million gross tons every year.

A SEPARATE REPUBLIC

Petrograd, May 12.—The workmen of Schisselburg are reported to be revolting and have announced their determination to work for a separate republic. The leader has been arrested. The Duma and the people are apparently not yet united for the common weal.

FOR FUTURE DECISION

Paris, May 12.—The Belgian flag is to fly over Constantinople and that Belgium will control the Dardanelles is one of the plans put up to the Allies for its war aims respecting Turkey.

SIR ROBERT IS PROUD

London, May 12.—Speaking here yesterday, Sir Robert Borden said that he was proud to know that Canada had made such a splendid contribution to the Empire. He said that the Germans are retreating because they were unable to face the Allies' advance.

CAN AWAIT HARVEST

Amsterdam, May 12.—Germany has notified the Dutch government that Dutch vessels may proceed to Holland safely. The German food dictator says that the Central Empires are able to await the new harvest.

RUSSIA CANNOT MAKE A SEPARATE PEACE

(Special to The Daily News.)
Petrograd, May 12.—Great applause greeted the statement of President Rodzianki at a special session of the Duma yesterday on the anniversary of the opening of the first Duma, that Russia cannot make a separate peace. The President pleaded with the people to stand firm and thus ensure the defeat of Germany. "Russia cannot betray her Allies," he repeated.

BRITAIN MAY BUY THE LIQUOR TRADE

London, May 11.—The whole question of purchase of the liquor trade by the state is now under consideration by the government. Chancellor Bonar Law gave this information to the House of Commons today.

UNCLE SAM'S INCOME TAX

Washington, May 11.—Incomes of all Americans earning above \$1,000 and above \$2,000 for married men are to do their bit toward raising \$1,800,000,000 of taxes included in a revenue bill to be reported tonight or tomorrow by the House ways and means committee. Incomes of \$500,000 or more are to pay a new tax of 33 per cent., it is understood, a total tax including normal and surtaxes of from 45 to 50 per cent.

NO MEATLESS DAYS IN BRITAIN NOW

London, May 11.—Great Britain's "meatless days" is to be abolished, because it augments the demand on breadstuffs and other substitutes which are less plentiful than meat. This was announced today by Baron Devonport, the food controller, in the House of Lords. Baron Devonport declared that a diminution in the consumption of breadstuffs was of vital moment and a main factor in the situation, but he added: Provided that the call for a reduction is responded to, and the efforts of the submarines are not successful beyond reasonable likelihood, we shall get through with a fairly sufficient balance at the time the new harvest becomes available.

NORSE SHIPS SUNK

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, May 12.—The Norwegian steamers Tiget and Leikanger were escorted out of Spanish territorial waters by German submarines and then sunk.

CHINA WILL NOT GO TO WAR

Pekin, May 12.—The Chinese House of Representatives, after an all night riotous secret session refused to pass a declaration of war upon Germany.

PRINCE RUPERT WILL RESUME ALASKA RUN

Victoria, May 11.—Good progress is being made with the repairs to the Grand Trunk Pacific steamer Prince Rupert at the Yarrow yards at Victoria, and according to reports received at the local offices of the company, she will be ready to resume her Alaska run by the latter part of next month. This will enable her to follow the original summer tourist schedule.

THE PRINCESS MAY IS BACK

The Princess May is back again on the Prince Rupert run and arrived last night between eight and nine o'clock from the south. One of this week's casualty lists carries the name of J. Bathurst, box 838, Prince Rupert, as previously reported wounded, now not wounded.

EXPERT RAILWAY MEN FOR SERVICE IN FRANCE

Washington, May 9.—Arrangements were made today to recruit between 11,000 and 12,000 expert railway men for nine new volunteer regiments of army engineers to be sent to France, "at the earliest possible moment," to repair and build railroad lines needed urgently in the big push against the German line.

Volunteers will be received by the regular army and National Guard recruiting agencies in New York, Chicago, St. Louis, Boston, Pittsburg, Detroit, Atlanta, San Francisco and Philadelphia. Labor unions and railway officials are expected to help in gathering the desired force and care will be taken not to take so many men from any single line as to disrupt its working organization.

ENGINEERS OFFER SERVICES

New York, May 10.—Three thousand engineers who enlisted with Col. Roosevelt's division today offered their services to the government as part of the first unit of Americans to go to the front in France.

T. C. Desmond, who organized the engineers for Col. Roosevelt, offered the services of the men to Secretary Baker after a conference with the Colonel, during which the latter urged him to take the shortest way to get his men to France, even though it takes men from the volunteer division. "Our men can go into camp on a moment's notice," Desmond said. "A recruiting office for one regiment of engineers will be opened tomorrow in New York. Lieut.-Col. C. H. McKinley will command the first reserve regiment which will be recruited. It will consist of 1061 enlisted men and 37 officers."

QUARTER-DOLLARS FOR NEWFOUNDLAND

St. John, Nfld., May 11.—War spirit and banking needs have combined to overcome political fears as to the possible outcome of the introduction into this colony of coinage similar to that of Canada, and for the first time in fifty years twenty-five-cent pieces have been placed in circulation. Half a century ago Newfoundland declined an invitation to join the Canadian Confederation, and since then the colony has held aloof from inducements to become a province of Canada. Because of the sentiment against annexation public men have been extremely careful lest any legislation which they might introduce should be construed as tending toward union with Canada. The colony, therefore, did not follow Canada's lead in putting quarter dollars in circulation, but established a twenty-cent piece.

The war has drawn the colony and the Dominion closer together in sympathy. Hence the present government has finally acceded to the plea of banking interests which long have desired the change, and the first consignment of coins of the new denomination has just arrived from the British mint.

THE LAND SETTLEMENT BILL

The new Land Settlement Bill, which was lucidly and comprehensively explained by the Minister of Agriculture in the Provincial House recently, is the Government's response to the greatest demand of these extraordinary times. In the light of the Minister's explanation, the measure reflects the intention of the provincial authorities to play an active role in land settlement and agriculture in the province, not only to lay a foundation for the future, but to meet the urgent conditions with which the exigencies of the war have confronted the country. Upon all governments, national, provincial and state, devolves the imperative duty of not only encouraging, but promoting and directing the increased production of food.

This cannot be done effectively only by private initiative. It must be the result of organized effort backed by the resources of the country. The Government which does not respond to that duty is laying upon itself a heavy responsibility. The governments of Great Britain and France, not to speak of those of the enemy states, are actively managing the agricultural production of those countries as state services. President Wilson is seeking extraordinary powers from Congress in a similar direction, while the authorities of many of the American States have virtually gone into the agricultural industry. This measure is in accord with the demand of the times, recognized everywhere else as too pressing to be disregarded.

It is proposed to form a board to be known as the Land Settlement Board of B. C. "It will be for the Board to bring about economic settlement," said Mr. Oliver, in explaining the bill: "community settlement, where men and women will be able to have the advantage of neighbors, schools, and all the comforts and conveniences of life in a settled community, but which are impossible in scattered settlements. It is impossible for settlers to exist in anything like reasonable circumstances in some of the places where they are to be found today. You can find women and children practically

buried alive, under conditions that it is not fitting that any of our race should be subjected to; where it is utterly impossible under financial conditions and impracticable in any event to give them the facilities they must have to make life worth living. I can point out to the House by name localities where settlers are trying to exist under conditions which are not fit for a human being.

"I speak of conditions as they exist," continued Mr. Oliver, "without reference to how they were created. The Government is continually besought for money to carry on road work and to make improvements in districts where the only means the settlers have of subsistence, in addition to the few vegetables they can grow in their gardens and the game they can hunt in the woods, is the few dollars they can get from road work. The commission will have power to take over their holdings, and substitute holdings in a settled community, where they can exist as white people should."

This is only one of the proposed duties of the new board, but it is one that will have far-reaching consequences. By a system of community settlement, the value of the pioneer work done by a community together is infinitely greater than when that work is scattered over a great area. Besides which, the pleasure of the settlers is immensely increased. And by making settling attractive, many more people will be prepared to go on the land than otherwise would.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

Now that the fraternising of the Russian troops with the Germans has ceased and fighting has again been resumed, great things may be looked for from Russia. Apparently they have cleaned things up in Petrograd to the immediate satisfaction of all parties of the people. Now that a working basis of Government has been reached, it is to be hoped that the Russians will "get on with the war." The Russian soldier will realize as never before that he is fighting for his own country, and not for the Czar's, and the bureaucrat's.

Four British destroyers put to flight eleven enemy vessels of the

same class in the North Sea the other day. The German destroyers did not wait to fight, although almost three to one. The memory of the deeds of the "Swift" and the "Broke" in the Channel a few weeks previously, when the two British destroyers accounted for six of the enemy destroyers must have stayed with the Germans on this occasion.

Dispatches received the other day state that the Germans are still "babbling about peace terms." The Bavarian Premier's inspired statement is that Germany desires peace but must have concessions. Before the war is finished he may have to switch his verbs.

All colonies and ships must be returned, is one of the other conditions of the peace which is to be imposed upon the Allies by Germany. In fact, Germany wants to be put back into the same position after the war as she was in before she started it. Doubtless the Allies will appreciate her point of view.

IN THE LETTER BOX

Prince Rupert, May 11, 1917.
Dear Mr. Editor:

Two days have passed since I respectfully requested those merchants who are reported as having urged the desirability of providing fallen women as a first aid-to-business reception committee for American fishermen when they come to town, to defend their remarkable proposition, but, as none has come forward, it is possible they have had a change of heart and concluded the idea is indefensible. That is unfortunate because the public is entitled to know the names of the merchants who are so filled with solicitude for the entertainment of fishermen that they propose to have it done by the denizens of Comox Avenue. I cannot believe that all the retail merchants are of one mind in this matter and it is unfair to those merchants who conduct their business in a legitimate way to be compelled to suffer the loss of trade which is bound to follow as a result of the questionable attitude of a few.

Fishermen are liberal spenders, but they are not fools; and now that they know how they are esteemed by the merchants of Prince Rupert it could not well be expected that they should be riotously anxious to spend their money here. Probably they will be more determined than ever to get out of town as quickly as possible when their catch is sold.

And there are other troubles that beset the fishermen and which result in driving trade away from Prince Rupert. American captains tell me we have an acting official on the water front who is offensively officious; that he compels them to report their arrival any hour of the day or night; that he arrogates and exercises powers for which he has no authority; that he affects a bulldozing manner and is often hot-tempered and uncivil; that he imposes unnecessary restrictions

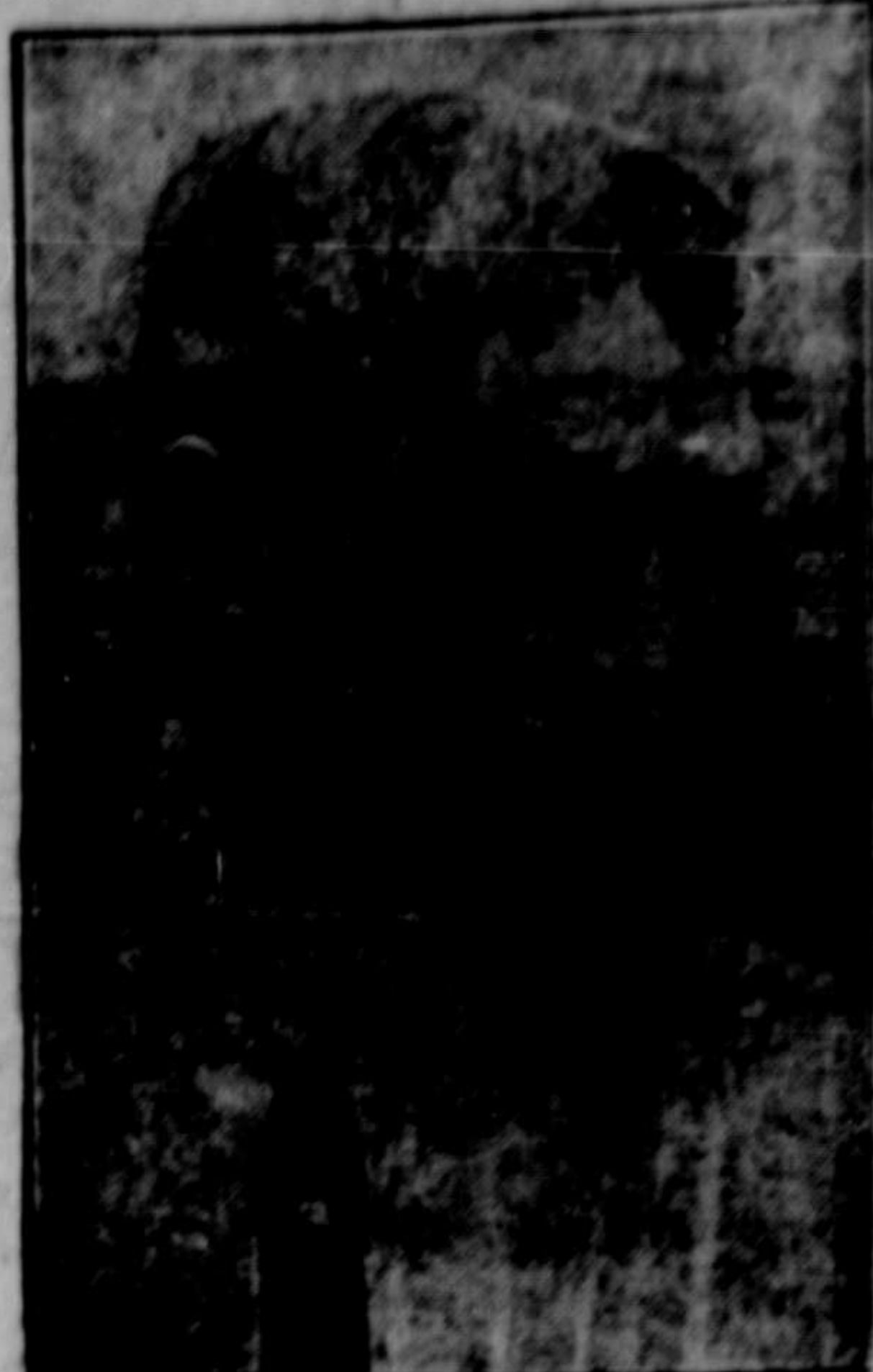

and has been doing other things not warranted by law. (I may have more to say about this some other time.) So the fishermen's lot here is not particularly happy. Yet they do not ask for favors; all they desire is fair and equitable treatment. But what with being harassed by an over-zealous official who is not intelligent enough to read the law understandingly; and classed by certain merchants as immoral easy-marks, fit for fleecing by the women of ill-fame who are allowed all-night whiskey privileges in the segregated district, in order that business might thrive, will anyone be surprised if much of the \$100,000 which they would ordinarily spend here this season should find its way elsewhere?

In conclusion, permit me to add, Mr. Editor, that upon the question of the advisability of abolishing the segregated district, or the questions of drink and immorality generally, I have nothing to say. These are matters for the determination of the people who live here permanently and are none of my affair. But I am paid by the American Government to look after American interests, and when certain merchants are reported in the public press as declaring that American fishermen are attracted here by fallen women; and it is proposed to continue the vice of the segregated district as a means of extracting the earnings from the pockets of these fishermen so that local merchants may profit, I do not think I would be doing my duty to my country and the interests I represent should I remain silent.
