

ALLIES MAKE ANOTHER ADVANCE IN WEST

FROM ARRAS TO RHEIMS, BRITISH AND FRENCH REGISTER IMPORTANT GAINS

BRITISH AND FRENCH TROOPS
NOW RESUME THE OFFENSIVEADDITIONAL SECTIONS OF THE FAMOUS HINDENBURG LINE
ARE CAPTURED BY GENERAL HAIG'S ARMIES—A
BRILLIANT SUCCESS IS ACHIEVED BY
GENERAL NIVELLE

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, May 22.—The British and French forces have struck another blow in the joint offensive today. Additional sections of the Hindenburg line have been taken by General Haig's troops. General Nivelle's troops have achieved a brilliant success and have captured several lines of trenches on the northern slopes of Mont Cornillet.

A British advance is registered in the sector embracing Bullecourt and Fontaine Les Croisilles, immediately to the north. This sector forms the foundation for the Oppy-Queant part of the Hindenburg line. The advance was successfully made, despite the massing of formidable fresh German divisions drawn from the Russian front.

Lock Gates Opened.

The continuous French advance was suddenly checked when the Germans opened the Iser lock gates. Eleven miles of the valley were rendered impassable, and the floods meantime form a barrier to the further immediate advance of the French in this direction. The capture of Oise and St. Gobain has proved fatal to Hindenburg's plan.

British Official.

London, May 22.—Last night we took the support trenches behind the lines of trenches we took yesterday in the Bullecourt sector.

French Official.

Paris, May 22.—We took several lines of trenches near Monseigneur in Champagne last night.

Drive on Russia.

Paris, May 22.—Hindenburg is shunting his battered and exhausted divisions from the west front to the northern and the eastern battle lines, where they are being reformed preparatory to a drive on Petrograd. Meanwhile fresh divisions from the Russian front are being sent to France. Germans, who have been taken prisoner, have revealed the purpose which is behind this plan, which is two fold. It is expected that Hindenburg will try to take Petrograd, or additional Russian territory. His purpose would be first to scare Russia into a separate peace, and second, to use his gains as a lever against the Allies.

Italian Front.

Rome, May 22.—The Italians are forcing the mountain passes successfully and the fighting to the north of Gorizia has now reached the climax of its intensity. Men are fighting from behind rocks, in caves and in hastily constructed dug-outs in the granitic passes. Numerous fresh Austrian divisions have been transferred from the Russian front and thrown into action.

DESTROYER SKIRMISH

London, May 22.—An outpost engagement between German and French torpedo boats on Sunday morning is reported. One French ship was slightly damaged. The German vessels did not wait for an engagement, but withdrew at full speed, and succeeded in making their escape.

NEW PORTRAITS OF ORGANIZERS OF VICTORY

TO GET SHIPBUILDING
ORDERS FOR RUPERT

At the meeting of the city council held last night a report by the mayor was read. On the 9th inst. a telegram was received from Mr. J. E. Merryfield advising that Mr. Buchart, who had been appointed director of munitions in B. C., had left Ottawa for Victoria, carrying with him full power to allot contracts for the building of wooden ships. It was advised that representations be made to him on behalf of Prince Rupert.

Mayor McCaffery immediately wired the G. T. P. officials at Montreal and Winnipeg asking them to send a representative with the power to make arrangements. On the 17th, Mr. Hinton arrived in the city and together with Mr. Pillsbury, left for Victoria to interview Mr. Buchart. Mr. Hinton had full authority to arrange for the building of ships here and promised to telegraph Mayor McCaffery tomorrow as to the result of his interview with Mr. Buchart. "If Mr. Hinton is unsuccessful," concluded the mayor's report, "I believe the people of the city should take some action. If I do not receive a favorable reply from the G. T. P., I will consider it my duty to again call you together to decide what action we shall take."

Ald. Casey moved, seconded by Ald. McMeekin, that the report be concurred in.

CANADIAN PACIFIC
AS A LOOKER-ON

Ottawa, May 21.—Railway interests are very much to the fore in Ottawa at present. The visitors here include Baron Shaughnessy and E. W. Beatty, of the Canadian Pacific, and Sir William Mackenzie and a retinue of the Canadian Northern, while Chairman Smithers, of the Grand Trunk, has arrived on this side of the Atlantic. The Canadian Pacific is looking on as an interested outsider.

While a decision is expected shortly, the Government's railway policy, it is understood, has not been determined. There has been no opportunity to discuss the Commission's report since Sir Robert Borden returned home.

RAISING THE HOPES OF
THE GERMAN PEOPLE

Dr. Hefferich, Secretary of State for the Interior in Germany, speaking in the Reichstag on the occasion of the second reading of the estimates of the Department of the Interior, summed up the present situation in his department for the benefit of public opinion in Germany. He was reported in the press as saying, among other things, that:

The adaptation of our economic life to war was accelerated and strengthened by the auxiliary civilian law. Every man and woman has had to fulfill to the utmost the duty which the fateful hour demanded from us without any sentimental consideration either for our enemies or for ourselves. Victory must be gained at home as well as on the field of battle. With our eyes open we must make the unavoidable sacrifices. The collapse of a number of minor industries owing to the war has lost us valuable economic assets. With a view to the sound reconstruction of our economic fabric, measures have been taken for the transition period after the war regarding the production and distribution of raw materials. Fortunately, our fears regarding the possible effects of the restricted supply of foodstuffs and of the severe burden placed on labor were unfounded. Moreover, reports of the Imperial Health Board show that the general state of health has been surprisingly good; the death rate among children has further decreased, while infant mortality is lower than in peace time. The people deserve admiration for their patriotism in enduring he last hard weeks in the way they have done. (Applause). The words "hold on" became a reality. I am firmly convinced that we shall hold on till further.

As regards the rebuilding of our mercantile fleet, negotiations are proceeding with the ship-owners on the subject. In spite of the Paris Conference, we shall renew economic relations with foreign countries after the war. The war cry for the troops is "Beat the enemy," and for us, "Hold on." This shall be the token of victory.

CITY HALL DEPTS.
TO REPORT MONTHLY

At the meeting of the city council held last evening a resolution was moved by Ald. Casey, seconded by Ald. McMeekin, to the effect that the head of each department in the city hall shall hand down to the council each month a report as to how each department stands. Also that no labor be imported into the city to take any civic positions by the head of any department without the authority of the council.

Ald. Casey said he considered that such was necessary for the guidance of the council. Ald. McMeekin understood the idea of the motion was to get some information as to the affairs of the city, but he thought it did not go far enough. He preferred that a committee of the council should have charge of each department—a separate committee for each, instead of a committee of the whole as at present.

In reply to a query by Ald. McMeekin, Ald. Casey intimated that the sentence in the resolution regarding the importation of labor for city work arose from a recent instance, in which the superintendent of utilities had brought two engineers from the south to work at Shawatians. "The men of the city are indignant," said Ald. Casey, "that they were not allowed an opportunity of applying for this work. As a working man myself, I resent the position taken up by the Superintendent of utilities and it ought to be stopped."

"I know men myself who are certified engineers, either electricity or steam, who would have been glad of such an opportunity."

In the discussion which followed it was pointed out that under the policy of allowing the departmental heads full control, without a sub-committee of the council to advise, the supt. of utilities in this case, was not exceeding his instructions. He had had a little difficulty in securing suitable engineers here, and as they were required, he had got them from the south.

GERMAN SUBMARINES
STILL EXACT TOLL

(Special to The Daily News.)

New York, May 22.—The steamers Calchas and Colbert were torpedoed on Saturday. The former had a cargo of munitions.

Paris, May 22.—The French Admiralty announces that the French steamer Colbert, with military passengers to Salonika was sunk by a submarine in the Mediterranean Sea on the 30th of April. Fifty-one lives were lost.

Sweden Sore.

Stockholm, May 22.—The Swedish steamers Vesterland, Aspen, and Viken, laden with grain from Great Britain, have been torpedoed by German submarines in the North Sea, outside of the restricted area. Supplies of cereals were urgently required, and all Sweden has given vent to a great outburst of anger against the Huns.

LUMBER PURCHASES
FOR CITY PURPOSES

At the meeting of the city council held last evening, the question of lumber for the city came up again. At last week's meeting, as only one tender had been put in, it was not opened, as others were expected. However, there was only the same solitary tender on the table last night and it was decided to open it. It was from Albert and McCaffery and quoted the prices of \$23.50 for No. 1 fir, delivery in thirty days; delivery in three months, \$19.35. This was for a quantity of 60,000 feet.

In view of the constantly rising price of lumber and the possibility of the city requiring more before the end of the year, it was moved that Ald. McMeekin, McClymont, and Montgomery be appointed a committee to investigate the lumber question, with power to act.

U. S. WILL SEND A
FORESTRY REGIMENT

Washington, May 21.—A forestry regiment, composed of foresters, woodsmen and others experienced in lumbering operations, will go to France as a unit in the expedition of army engineers now being recruited. It will be organized as a volunteer military force, and will assist the engineers in preparing timber for construction work.

The forest service, at the request of the War Department, will prepare plans for organization and equipment of the regiment, and will aid in securing suitable men.

As rapidly as enlistments are secured the men will be assembled at six central points, which have not been announced.

THE CHANCELLOR'S SPEECH

It will be observed that the note of defiance in the German Chancellor's speech this time is directed at Germans instead of at Germany's enemies. He declares he will not state the German war aims no matter what pressure may be exercised upon him, even though Herr Scheidemann and others threaten revolution. He says he will disappear into private life first. He belongs to no party, neither the party of the right nor the party of the left. He is the Emperor's man, and that being the case the people have no right to demand that he tell them what they are fighting for.

But while the Chancellor dodged the issue between the Junkers and the Social Democrats he was on congenial ground when he dealt with the Russian situation. He proclaimed Germany's repudiation of a programme of conquest. On this subject he waxed enthusiastic. Who wants conquests, indeed? Only England, which harnessed Russia to her war chariot. Why, Germany would treat with Russia on that basis at once and arrange an alliance for the future, if Russia would only say the word. Moreover, he says with his tongue in his cheek, Germany is the friend of small nationalities. See how generously she has treated Norway, Sweden, Spain, Switzerland and Holland!

Bethmann-Hollweg's trouble is that he cannot make anybody outside of Germany believe him because he cannot wave aside the facts and now the majority of the Germans disbelieve him because the facts are becoming patent to them also. It is of no use to talk about Germany's magnanimous intentions while German soldiers stand upon the soil of Courland, Volhynia, Lithuania, Poland, Roumania, Serbia, Belgium and Northern France. The Chancellor's description of Germany as she is sinking neutral shipping and murdering neutral sailors will make interesting reading for the people of Norway, for instance, while the spectacle of republican Russia forming an alliance with autocratic Prussia is worthy of the

Chancellor's best farce-comedy efforts.

But even the labored attempt to detach Russia from the Entente will not sugar the speech sufficiently to make it satisfactory to the divergent elements to whom it is mainly directed. It will not mitigate the hatred of the Junkers or lessen the distrust of the Social Democrats. The former demand a clear-cut enunciation of a policy of conquest and a further restriction of internal liberty. The latter insist upon a definite assurance that Germany does not aim at annexations of conquered territory and for parliamentary reforms. Hollweg inclines in favor of the democratic element, which indicates the growing strength of that side. But, generally, he is trying to balance himself between the two, and to this performance there is a limit. It is not hard to perceive between the lines of his evasions and subterfuges a cleavage of sentiment in Germany which some day will become very serious, nor to see that the Social Democrats are gaining and the Junkers gradually losing.

PETAIN IN COMMAND

The appointment of General Petain to be commander-in-chief of the French armies on the western front is somewhat of a surprise in view of his recent selection as Chief of Staff of the war ministry. It has been reported, however, that the French authorities have not been satisfied with the nature of the operations conducted by their armies in the present offensive on the ground that they have not been on a sufficient scale to achieve the most satisfactory results. Some critics have claimed that the operations between Arras and Rheims should have been accompanied by determined offensives at other important points, the Allies thereby taking the fullest advantage of their superiority in human and material resources and still further embarrassing the German command.

Petaim was in supreme command of the immortal legions which held Verdun for France in the great German offensive last year. When the enemy's attack began Joffre sent de Castelnau to the scene with in-

structions to examine the situation and act at his own discretion. De Castelnau decided that Verdun should be defended and sent for Petain, who already had distinguished himself in Artois and the Champagne. A writer in the Paris *Matin* graphically describes the brief colloquy between the two great soldiers as they surveyed the scene of the Crown Prince's desperate enterprise. "They must not pass," de Castelnau said. "They shall not pass," was Petain's response. And they did not pass. With extraordinary energy Petain organized a marvellous motor transport from Bar-le-Duc to take the place of the chief railroad communication already dominated by German artillery.

LOCAL LABOR AND THE ADMIRALTY

Dear Sir:—In connection with the docking of the big ship here several weeks ago, certain differences arose between the local men employed and the naval officials regarding the rates of pay. It looks as though the local men have been discriminated against, and the facts of the case may be of interest to the public.

Before the ship arrived, the Trades and Labor Council were approached regarding the local labor available, and assurance was given that union rates of pay would be allowed. Six men, carpenters to trade, were already employed at the dock, not doing carpenter work, nor in receipt of carpenters' pay, being kept on pending their own work turning up. These men were put on shipwright work, and naturally understood, according to the agreement, shipwrights' rates would be paid them, which rates are 62½ cents per hour, same as carpenters' rates. Instead of which, when the work was finished, and pay day came, they found that, although classified as carpenters, and had done shipwright work, they only received \$4.50 per day, contrary to the verbal agreement.

At the same time, other shipwrights brought from Esquimaux were paid the 62½ cents per hour together with a bonus of 50c. per day and an allowance of \$2.50 per day for board, making \$3 over and above the union rates.

would get the district rate of 45c. per hour, but instead only received 37½c.

Representations were at once made to the superintendent here and to the naval lieutenant in charge, who admitted the justness of the men's claims. The men were advised to take the matter up with Esquimaux, as the books and records here had then been closed, and a letter as follows was despatched to the Admiral Superintendent at Esquimaux:—

Sir:—On behalf of the following list of workmen lately employed at the Prince Rupert drydock, I have been requested to bring to your notice the difference in wages paid to local men, and the men from Esquimaux.

Men working at shipwright work were given to understand they would receive the same rate of wages, for the same class of work as the men from Esquimaux, and on these conditions, prepared the dock before the Esquimaux men arrived in Rupert, and not until the work was completed did they discover that they had been classed as carpenters at a lower rate of wages. This they consider a discrimination against local men, as the work performed was shipwright work, and a protest was lodged to Lieut. Woods, and the superintendent of the drydock, and were advised to bring this matter before you, and also the fact that the rate of wages for this district is 62½ cents per hour for carpenters.

Men working as laborers were also given to understand they would receive the rate of wages of the district, being 45 cents per hour, but instead they were paid 37½ cents per hour.

Owing to the fact that the Dominion and Provincial Governments have always paid the union rate of wages of this district, we would ask you to give this matter your careful consideration, and in (continued on Page Four.)

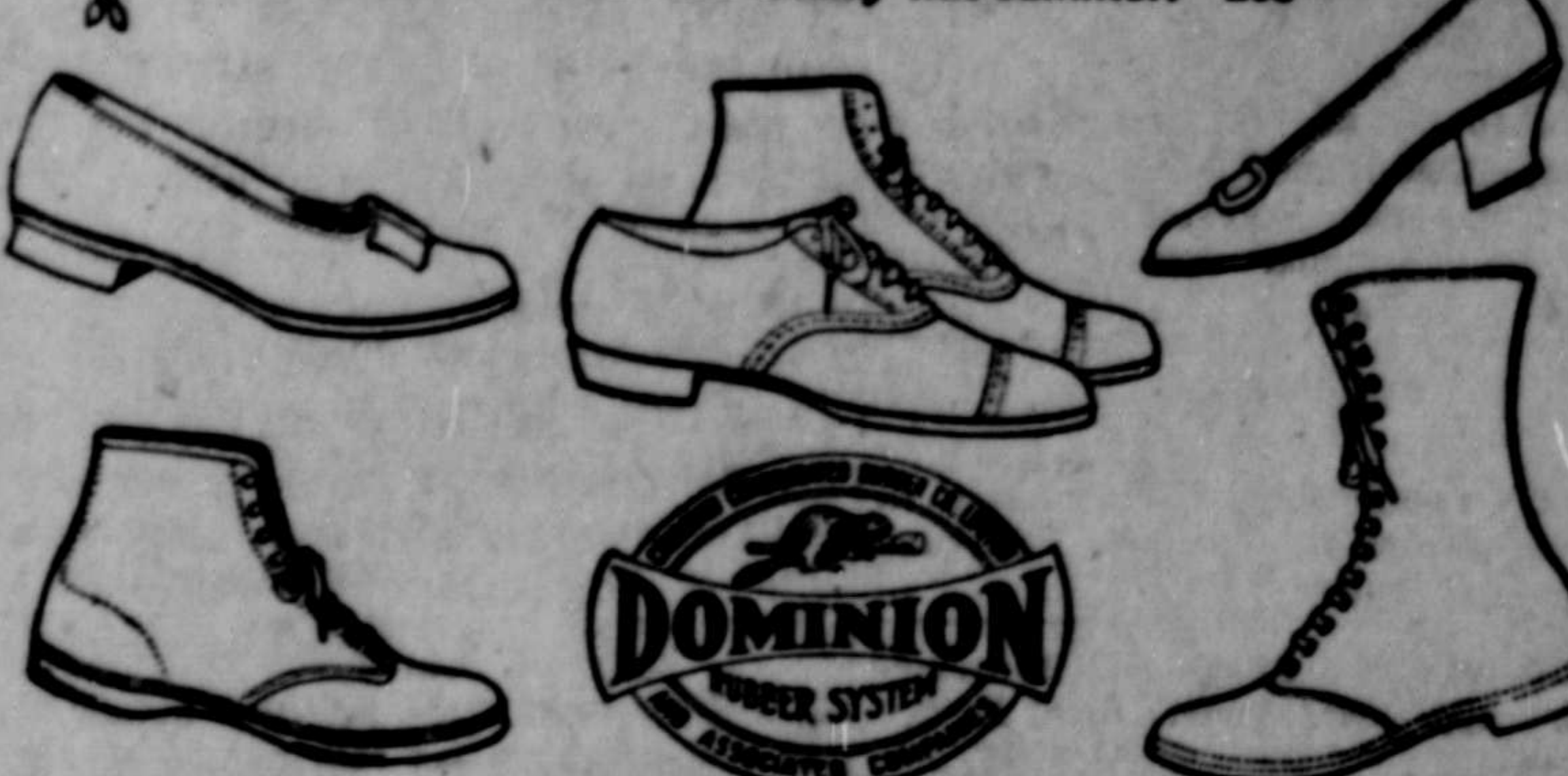

A Real Lever Stimulation GOLD WATCH FREE.**BAKERS REQUEST A FOOD CONTROLLER**

Toronto, May 19.—"In view of the very critical situation, the Bread and Cake Manufacturers' Association, in convention assembled, believe that the time has come for prompt action by the Government in the appointment of a food controller, with Cabinet rank, who should regulate the manufacture, delivery, prices and uses of all foodstuffs throughout the Dominion."

Among the men who voted for the above resolution at the meeting of the Bread and Cake Manufacturers' Association were some of Canada's biggest business men. The session was held behind closed doors.

Unanimously they demanded that the Government at once appoint a food controller, as every other belligerent country in the world has done. To make sure that Canada's food controller will be something more than a rubber stamp, they also demand that he be appointed with Cabinet rank. The bakers cannot control the upward tendency of flour prices, declares their resolution, and if the Government will only take some initiative along the lines suggested, the Bread and Cake Manufacturers' Association promises co-operation. They made it clear that today's assembly was absolutely non-partisan. Delegates from as far east as Montreal and as far west as Winnipeg attended the meeting.

justice to the men concerned, readjust the classifications so the men working as shipwrights will receive shipwrights pay, and men working as laborers will receive the union rate of wages for the district.

In reply the Admiral Superintendent sent the following: W. E. Thompson, Secretary, Prince Rupert Trades and Labor Council,

Sir:—In reply to your letter of the 10 inst., I beg to inform you that the undermentioned men Were on the G. T. P.'s payroll as carpenters, in receipt of 45c per hour for a nine-hour day. They were taken on by us as carpenters, and employed on carpenters' work (not as shipwrights) and paid \$4.50 for an eight-hour day. I fail to see that these men have any cause for complaint.

With regard to the laborers—these men were paid \$3.00 for an eight-hour day, against the \$2.80 they received previously.

If the men at Prince Rupert are not satisfied with the rate of pay we offer, we can, in future, bring up all the necessary labor from Esquimalt.

It will be noticed that the letter from the Admiral Superintendent does not meet the argument put forward by the men, and the people of Prince Rupert may now understand what to expect when union rates are requested for labor.

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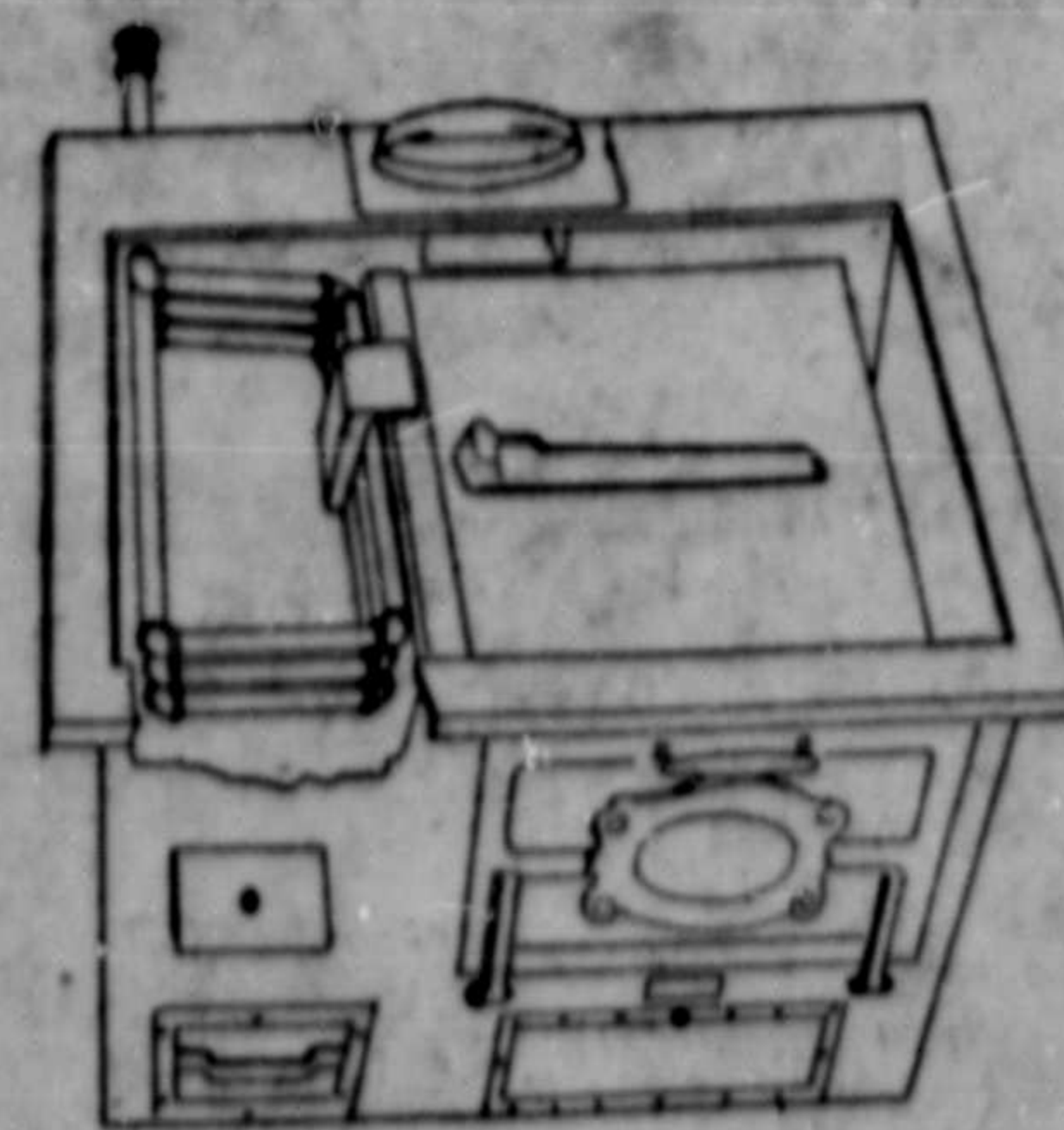
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
