GREAT LOSSES INFLICTED ON THE GERMANS

FRENCH TROOPS GAIN IMPORTANT POINTS--BRITISH MAKE SUCCESSFUL RAIDS

BRITISH NOW CONSOLIDATE GROUND WON

Successful Raids Made on German Lines—Hun Ammunition Dump Is Blown Up—Repulse Counter Attacks.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, May 23.—Since Sunday the Germans have lost more than fifteen thousand men, killed, wounded and missing, in the fighting on the western front. Their battered and exhausted divisions have been withdrawn and their places taken by fresh troops from the eastern front. The French today gained full possession of all the important points on Moronvillers crest. Between Mounts Cornillet and Teton, General Nivelle's troops now command the enemy positions and are within half a mile of Moronvillers itself. Three separate counter attacks were repulsed with great losses to the enemy on the ground captured yesterday.

British Front.
We made a successful raid to the northeast of Epehy, and blew up a great German ammunition depot to the northeast of Queant. Vermillers has been bombarded and several German aeroplanes have been brought down. The British are consolidating the positions on the newly won positions on the Hindenburg line, and many successful raids at different points were carried out during the night. To the east of Bullecourt, the enemy artillery has been particularly active.

Italian Front.
Italy is now prepared to strike an important blow for the Allies. Good use of the time secured by the big British and French offensives has been made and a powerful offensive is now under way. Decisive operations are now beginning. Both in Gorizia and in the Trentino, strong enemy counter attacks have been made, but in each case they were repulsed and came to naught.

BRAZIL PREPARES

PRINCE RUPERT BOYS KILLED IN ACTION

Word has been received in town that Charles Dennis, brother of "Scotty," has been killed at the front. He was formerly secretary of the St. Andrew's Society in Prince Rupert and was one of the Society's most active members. He left here shortly after the outbreak of the war for Edinburgh, his home town, where he enlisted in the Royal Scots, the oldest regiment in Great Britain. He was very well known in town, where he had many friends.
Word has also come that John Florence, who left here with the 18th Battalion (Pioneers) has been killed in action. He belonged to Dundee, Scotland. Private W. A. Paterson, formerly of the Bank of Commerce staff here, has been wounded in the arm with shrapnel. He also left here with the 18th Battalion.

THE PEACE CONFERENCE

GERMANY HAS 8,000 LOCOMOTIVES IDLE

In a case before the Prize Court in London recently, in which the Crown was making application for the condemnation of considerable quantities of lubricating oils shipped in New York on neutral ships, but alleged by the Crown to be ultimately destined for Germany, an interesting affidavit was read from Mr. William Fuller Smith, employed in the War Trade Intelligence Department on work connected with economic research. In the course of his affidavit Mr. Smith stated that there was great shortage of fats and oils in Germany throughout 1915-16, particularly of lubricating oils. The shortage was causing particularly serious embarrassment at the present time, the lubricating of locomotives and railway carriages being one of the gravest problems which the Germans had to face. In March there were 8,000 locomotives at Essen awaiting repairs, the wear and tear having been principally due to the shortage and bad quality of the lubricating oils.

RECRUITING

Ottawa, May 23.—For the first fortnight in May, recruiting on the volunteer basis has reached its lowest ebb. Less than three thousand recruits were secured during this period, although since then, with the talk of conscription, a notable increase of voluntary enlistments has taken place.

IN THE STROKEHOLE OF H.M.S. "BROKE"

London—Chief Petty Officer Tom Davies, of Neath, who was one of the heroic survivors of the gallant Fortune which went down fighting in the Jutland battle in June last, gives a graphic account of the recent British naval victory in the Straits of Dover.
"I was on the Broke," he said, "and can say that the engagement was finally fought by Commander Evans with decisive results.
"I believe I am perfectly correct in saying that two German destroyers were sunk and possibly a third. My watch in the stokehold precluded me from actually witnessing the fight, but I gathered many interesting details first hand after the victory was won.
"It was just after midnight on the 20th, and we were quietly steaming at 14 knots, when we were signalled 'full speed.' Presently we leapt forward at 27 knots. Then we heard shells dropping overhead, and knew we were in action.
"A naval battle gives one in the stokehold an uncanny feeling, for he knows so little of what is going on, yet feels so much. The minutes seem as hours.
"A little later we felt a big bump, and then we knew we had rammed the enemy. I sent a couple of hands up to see what was going on, and they returned with the welcome news that we were fighting the Germans, and were winning.
"It was, nevertheless, a very trying time for us in the stokehold, for there was ever present the possibility of a shell crashing into us, but there was no creaking, no wavering. We worked on ceaselessly.
"Suddenly a cheer went up. The intense tension was relieved. We had won. Afterwards on the top we heard how the fight had gone, how Commander Evans had outmanoeuvred the Germans, and how he had destroyed their ships.
"Our casualties were light, the greater number having been caused by a shell crashing into the aft stokehold.
"There was, as I gathered, an act of treachery. A German destroyer came along apparently in distress, and seemingly to surrender. Suddenly she fired into the Broke's stokehold, but she paid a dear price. She was immediately torpedoed, and sank. I believe, with all hands.
"I am sorry to add, however, that the man who released the torpedo was almost simultaneously killed, a shell fragment shattering his head, but he had performed a gallant service."

DICTATORSHIP

That Russia seems to be headed straight for what will amount to a dictatorship, no matter by what name it may be called, unless the war collapses in the meantime, is the view of the Victoria Times.

This appears to be one of the only two alternatives which history shows have confronted states suddenly wrenched from the moorings of dynastic absolutism to which they had been tied for centuries. The other alternative is anarchy civil war and disintegration—in short, national suicide. Russia is not going to commit suicide. Even the most radical of the revolutionary leaders now realize that without the early evolution of order out of the chaos into which the administration of the country has fallen there would be numerous revolutions within revolutions, the upshot of which would be the establishment of the domination of the Hohenzollerns in the place of the Romanoffs. This realization is reflected in the changed tone of the manifesto issued by the Soldiers' and Workingmen's Council, by the shift in their attitude towards a coalition Government and their passionate denunciation of the idea of a separate peace. Having marched blithely to the precipice they glanced over the edge and recoiled in horror, for what they saw below was the menace of ruthless Prussian militarism which had ground Poland under its heel, which had crushed Serbia and Belgium and for the expulsion of which from their country they had hurled the Romanoffs from the throne.

The crisis has been hurried by the resignations of the Russian Minister for War and the commander of the Petrograd garrison as well as the announced intention of Brusiloff and Gourko to throw up their commands. Ruszky resigned some weeks ago. This has brought the recalcitrants face to face with realities. It has forced upon them a realization of the utter futility of fine phrases to avert catastrophe.

They are commencing to understand that their new-gained liberty depends upon the maintenance of their ties with their allies, that in their alliance with Great Britain, France and the United States lies the only anchor of Free Russia. Important as that alliance is to the western democracies, it is infinitely more important—it is absolutely vital—to Russian freedom. Thus the inevitable reaction has begun to swing in the other direction: We read that Kerensky, until recently Minister of Justice, the ultra-Socialist and one-time visionary, is holding up the prospect of a dictatorship as the only escape from national annihilation.

Kerensky's course will be worth watching. He is one of the younger leaders of Russian Socialism who thought he had discovered in his cult a panacea for all the ills of the world. He entered the Provisional Government as one of its most extreme members. His post, however, has given him a complete change of view. He is in a position to realize Russia's danger and to survey the ruinous effects of the propaganda which German agents are now carrying on night and day with the object of not only detaching Russia from her allies but of controlling her future. He belongs to the type of men who stop at nothing to maintain the integrity and freedom of their country. He is now Minister of War and Marine, the resignation of M. Miliukoff, one of the original revolutionary leaders, having involved another cabinet shuffle. It will be of intense interest to see how far Kerensky will go to secure that absolute control over the army which, if the world conflict should continue until 1918, will be necessary not only to Russia's effective participation in the war, but to save her from Prussian domination for all time. If Russia develops a dictatorship the dictator will spring from the revolutionary element. Oliver Cromwell became dictator of England. It was Citizen Robespierre first and Citizen Bonaparte next who became dictators of France. The difference between efficiency and undeviating loyalty and incompetence, weakness and treachery.

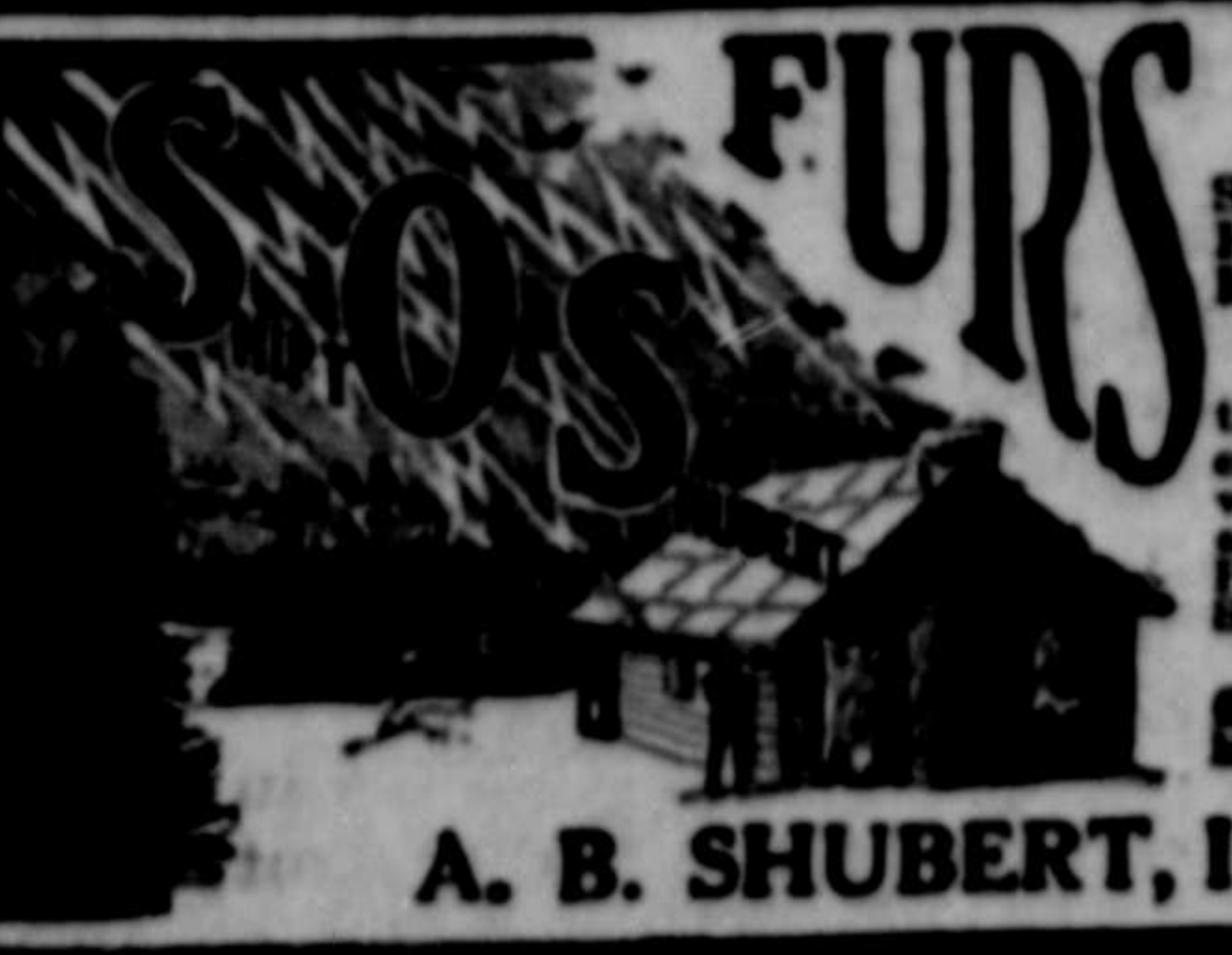

STRATEGIC POSITIONS TAKEN BY FRENCH ARMY

Paris, May 22.—During the past 24 hours sharp engagements on the western fringe of the St. Gobain Forest, as well as in the vicinity of Rheims and northwest of Auberive, have resulted in appreciable gains of ground for the French, who have also made more progress on the Chemin des Dames, the famous crest where the Crown Prince failed to keep his best divisions from being cut to pieces in its defence.

Indeed, the enemy still continues to counter attack the new French positions on the plateau crossed by the Chemin des Dames, which on account of its situation marking the separation between the basins of the Aisne and the Ailette and dominating the whole valley of the latter river besides the high wooded block of St. Gobain, is of inestimable military value to the army holding it.

The French have, moreover, driven another wedge into the German lines on the Moronvillers Hills, to which the enemy is for a very good reason clinging with desperation.

The inexorable pressure of the French between Craonne and St. Gobain subsists at all points, and the operations are being conducted methodically as against a powerful bastion constituting the key to an entire region.

It is evident that when the enemy is forced to abandon St. Gobain and the fortified tract resting on Craonne he will have to make a hasty general retreat towards the northeast.

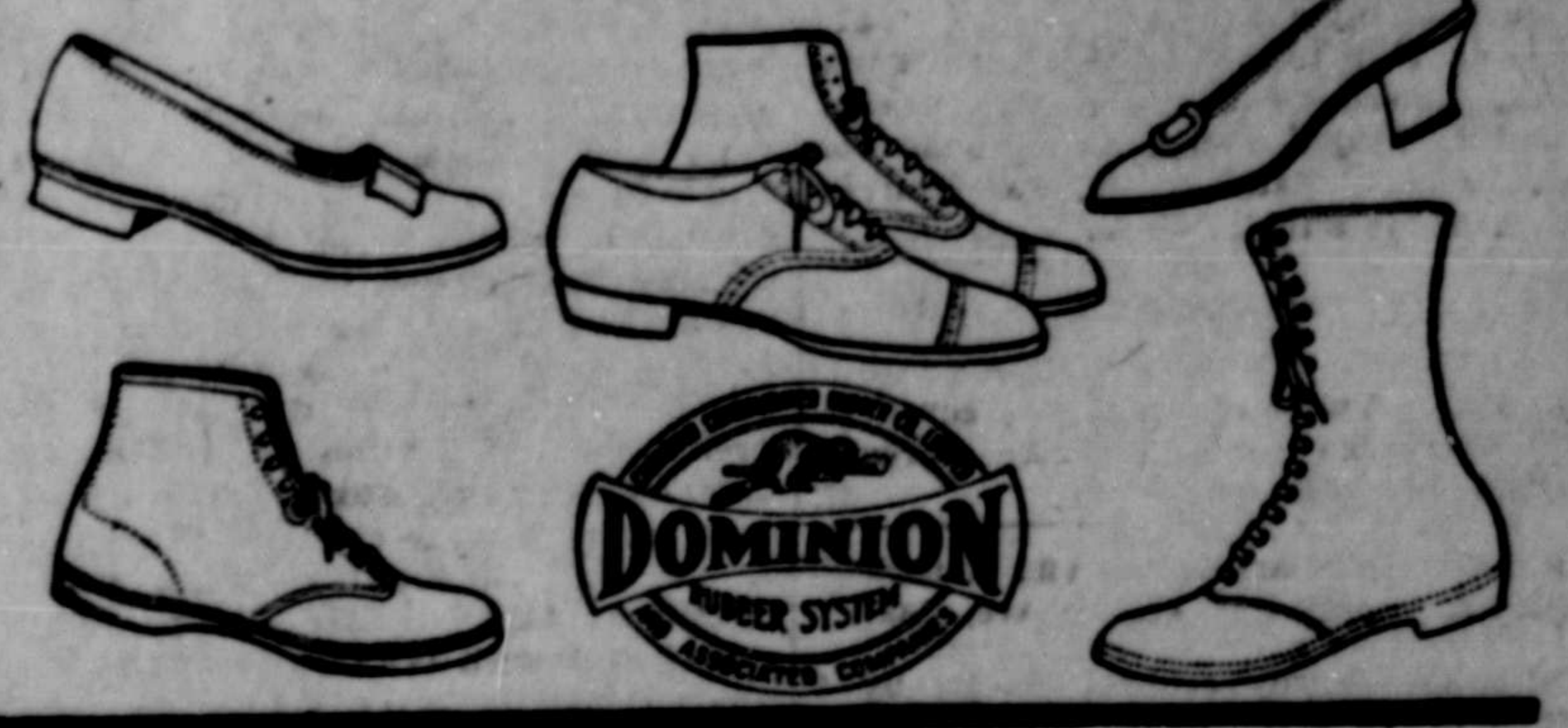
