### THREE IMPORTANT POINTS IN BELGIUM ARE BOMBED BY BRITISH AEROPLANES

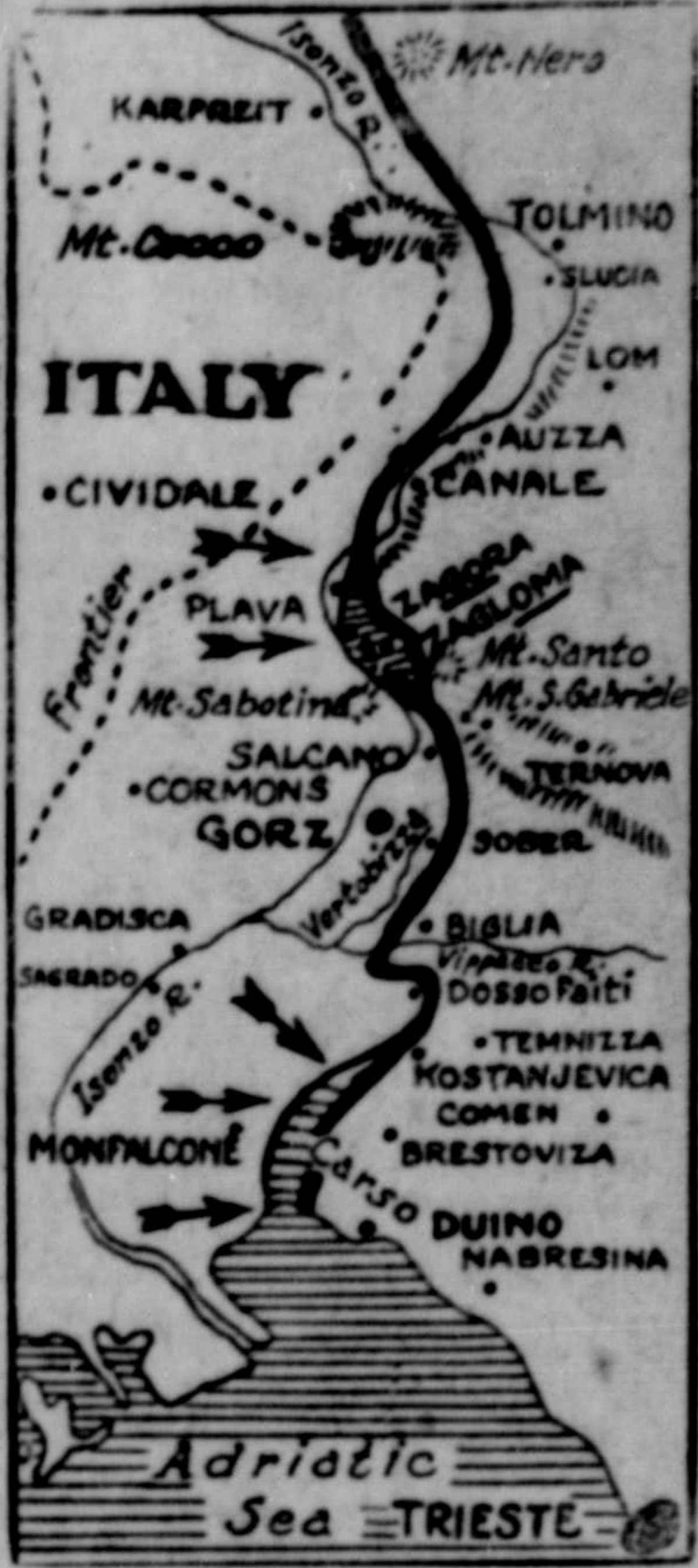
#### VIOLENT COUNTER ATTACKS REPULSED BY THE FRENCH

**STRONG INFANTRY ATTACKS SUCCESSFULLY BROKEN—ALL-NIGHT ARTILLERY BOMBARDMENT KEPT UP BY GERMANS—AUSTRIANS SUFFER HEAVY LOSSES**

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Paris, June 2.—Violent German counter attacks were made on two sectors of the French front. The enemy artillery drumfire was particularly concentrated and their infantry advanced in close waves. On both sectors the attacks were repulsed with great losses to the enemy troops. The French artillery did enormous execution among the ranks of the Germans and few of them reached our first line.  
In the regions of Moulin, Le Fallaux, California Plateau and Chevreux, the enemy artillery kept up a severe bombardment all through the night, evidently expecting a resumption of the Allied advance.

#### CARDINAL MERCIER POINTS OUT DUTY

London, May 29.—A dispatch to the Daily Telegraph from Rotterdam says a new movement by the leading Rhineland Catholics ostensibly designed to renew relations between the German and Belgian Catholics, has brought the following declaration from Cardinal Mercier, Primate of Belgium:  
Catholics over the frontier, who have not found a single word of disapproval for those who slaughtered people in Belgium and shot down priests—these Catholics who, for three years, have looked on with folded arms at the martyrdom of a people—now are singing hymns of brotherliness, peace and forgetfulness. But it is our duty to press for the restitution of violated rights, punishment for the guilty and for means to make repetition impossible. The hour for the exercise of mercy can only strike when wrong has been righted and when contrition is shown and penance is accepted."

#### Italian Front.

Rome, June 2.—The Italians are now consolidating and reinforcing their lines with fresh troops. The captured positions are being refortified. Frightful losses continue to be inflicted upon the enemy. They are making countless counter attacks to regain their lost positions, apparently fully realizing their importance. These counter attacks have been made repeatedly with a total disregard for the lives of the attacking troops. Each counter attack has been repulsed with exceedingly heavy losses to the Austrians.

#### British Front.

London, June 2.—Many tons of bombs were dropped by British aircraft on the Belgian towns of Ostend, Zeebrugge and Bruges, which are important military points. Great damage was done, apparently to ammunition depots as great explosions were observed.

#### Prisoners Taken.

Between April 15 and May 24, the number of German prisoners falling into the hands of the French reached a total of 31,829, of whom 28,045 were unwounded.

#### Expect Sea Fight.

Copenhagen, June 2.—The German press looks for another sea fight soon, and it is expected here that another naval battle is imminent, when the German High Seas Fleet puts out to sea. The German stories of the British losses are discounted here.

#### Abandon Hope.

The Hague, June 2.—Germany has apparently abandoned all hope of a separate peace with Russia. The Frankfurter Gazette warns the people of the dangers of the unofficial truce on the eastern front, and says that Germany will deal with the Russian situation forthwith.

There is a growing movement in Germany for the drafting of criminals into the army, says a correspondent to The London Chronicle. It is called a movement for "the rehabilitation of those under penal regulations." A powerful association has been formed, with a Pastor Seyfarth at its head, for the purpose of inducing the authorities to consent to drafting prisoners into the army, the joining of the army to be equivalent to a formal amnesty by the Emperor.

Madrid, June 2.—Severe rioting has broken out at Barcelona among the soldiers of the garrison there. Numerous officers have been imprisoned.

Reports from Vienna say that simultaneously with the opening of the Austrian parliament, thousands of the workmen will cease work, and a great procession has been organized as a demonstration for peace.

#### THE MUNITIONS BOARD AND SHIPBUILDING

A telegram was recently despatched to the Hon. Thos. White, Minister of Finance at Ottawa, by Messrs. G. W. Nickerson and J. W. Scott, of this city, asking if there is any possibility of the Government using the plant here to build ships. A reply was received this morning as follows:—"Your wire received. Chairman of Munitions Board states that he wrote a committee from Prince Rupert which waited on him in matter referred to stating that the Board would be pleased to have any proposals which they could make for the building of ships at Prince Rupert, and that up to date, no proposals have been received."

#### PRESIDENT WILSON ISSUES A WARNING PROCLAMATION

**ELIGIBLE CITIZENS ATTEMPTING TO LEAVE THE COUNTRY ARE LIABLE TO PROSECUTION AND ARE SUBJECT TO EVENTUAL MILITARY SERVICE**

#### THE BOARD OF TRADE AND SHIPBUILDING

A very full meeting of the Board of Trade was held last night, when among other things, the lack of shipbuilding orders for the plant in this city was discussed. Superintendent Pillsbury of the drydock stated that the standardized vessels that the Munitions Board were issuing specifications for were about 250 feet long and would absorb two million feet of lumber. These vessels, he said, could be built more economically here than in the cities to the south, by about 20 per cent. No orders, however, had been given for the Prince Rupert plant, where everything was in readiness for a start.

#### Invade Meeting.

New York, June 2.—The Sixty-ninth Regiment invaded a meeting held in Madison Square last night, where thirteen thousand foreigners assembled. They arrested eight men who were industriously distributing anti-registration literature.

#### Utter Treason.

New York, June 2.—Three men have been arrested in Columbus, and were charged with treasonable utterances against the selective draft proposals.

#### Too Outspoken.

Twelve outspoken objectors to the selective draft law in Kansas City, awakened this morning behind prison bars. They were charged with conspiracy against the Government. Two women were included in the number.

#### Startles New York.

New York, June 2.—The shipping world of New York was startled today when on a state order, the harbor was closed for the greater part of the forenoon.

#### Vessels Sunk.

London, June 2.—The American vessels Dirigo, Barbara, and Frances M. have been destroyed by German gunfire. The submarine in each case turned the crews out in open boats on the high seas.

#### DENIED ENTRANCE TO LORD ABERDEEN

Ottawa, June 1.—An incident occurred here during the evening which caused some amusement. Lord Aberdeen, former governor-general of Canada, arrived at the Parliament Buildings to call upon Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and was held up at the door by the Dominion policeman whose duty it is to keep out any one not armed with the necessary ticket of admittance. His lordship was compelled to wait at the door until he had sent in his card and it received the O.K. of the secretary of the Leader of the Opposition. He submitted to the procedure without protest. Lord Aberdeen is on a brief visit to the capital.

A FALLACY

There has been detected in some quarters a tendency to attribute to Germany almost superhuman powers because the Central Empires have been able to wage war for three years against enemies who exceeded them greatly in population and material resources. This is the impression Germany herself has sought to convey, and certain people thoughtlessly permit themselves to appraise her at her own valuation. A few moments' reflection should destroy that ridiculous fallacy for all time. If any side is entitled to distinction as a miracle-worker it is the Entente combination, not the Teutonic alliance.

When the war began Germany held all the trump cards. Geographically she and her ally were impregnable. She improved upon this by establishing during her forty years' preparation a system of strategic railway lines from one frontier to the other which could not be attacked. She had no overseas military communications to guard. Her armies were intended to fight practically at their bases of supply. She and Austria were able to begin with two to one superiority in men and a seven to one superiority in artillery and munitions and to maintain an enormous lead in these respects for more than two years. She chose her own time, place and circumstance; she had the initiative. Up to the last summer there never has been a time on either of the main fronts when the Teutons did not have a great preponderance in every arm over their foes. And that concrete superiority was indirectly doubled by the advantages of operating on interior lines and the fact that as the resources of the Central Empires were all together it was possible to have unity of plan and action. The manpower of Germany and Austria was under lock and key. The Allies had to draw their human material from all over the world.

The Allies, on the other hand, at first were without a solitary advantage until Germany perpetrated her first act of unexampled stupidity in invading Belgium and aligned the British Empire with the

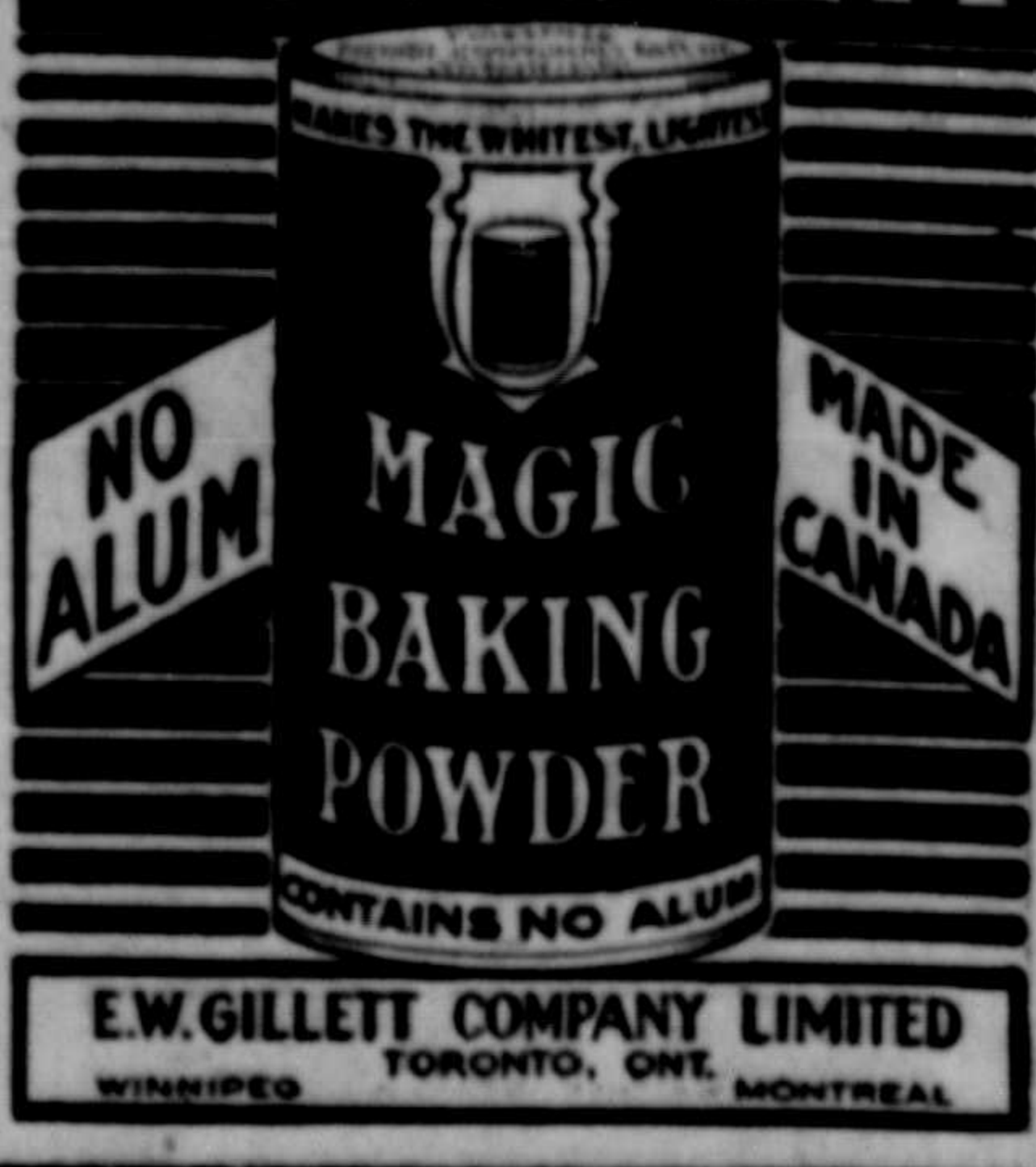
British fleet against her. The French army of less than a million men, with the heroic little British expeditionary force, was confronted with more than 2,000,000 German troops equipped to the last button. Russia, with practically no first-class railroads, was hopeless as a mobilizable offensive force. She could not put half as many equipped men on her front as her enemy could. Germany could throw a whole army from the west to the east front, a distance of 650 miles, before Russia could move half that number a third the distance from one point to another on the same front. And this was the state of affairs up to last summer. It was altered then by the appearance of the great British army and the tremendous increase in munitionment by the western allies. It had not been affected by Italy's intervention, because not only was Italy unprepared for heavy operations but the mountainous frontier was easily defended by Austria.

But apart from the overwhelming advantage which long preparation and the development of the military spirit had given the Central Empires, the vast superiority of their communications should have been decisive.

Reinforced by thorough preparation for many years, by an enormous superiority in artillery, munitions, air-craft, in fact in everything; their flanks protected by Nature in the form of impassable swamps, mountains and the neutrality of small neighboring countries serving as bastions, their failure at every decisive point can be explained only by grossly inefficient leadership.

Napoleon Bonaparte, with a population of one-fourth of Germany's present population behind him, fought practically the whole world to a standstill for nearly twenty years. For a considerable part of that time he had all of continental Europe prostrate at his feet and dictated terms of peace, not in the capitals of tiny states like Belgium or Montenegro, but in Vienna and Berlin. He did not have anything like the advantages over his foes which Germany and Austria had over their enemies when they struck. Yet nearly twenty years inter-

vened between Lodi and Waterloo. There is nothing dazzling about Germany's performance. The most impressive feature about it was the preparation for it. So far the nearest approach to a miracle-worker produced by the war is Father Joffre, "the man who stopped them at the Marne."

CANAAN FOR HEBREWS

Ottawa, June 1.—In view of the likelihood of Palestine passing permanently under allied control, Clarence I. Desolo, on behalf of the Federation of Zionist Societies, appealed to Foreign Minister Balfour of Great Britain for the co-operation of that country and the other allied governments in a project to repopulate the Holy Land from the Jewish population of the world. Sympathetic consideration was promised.

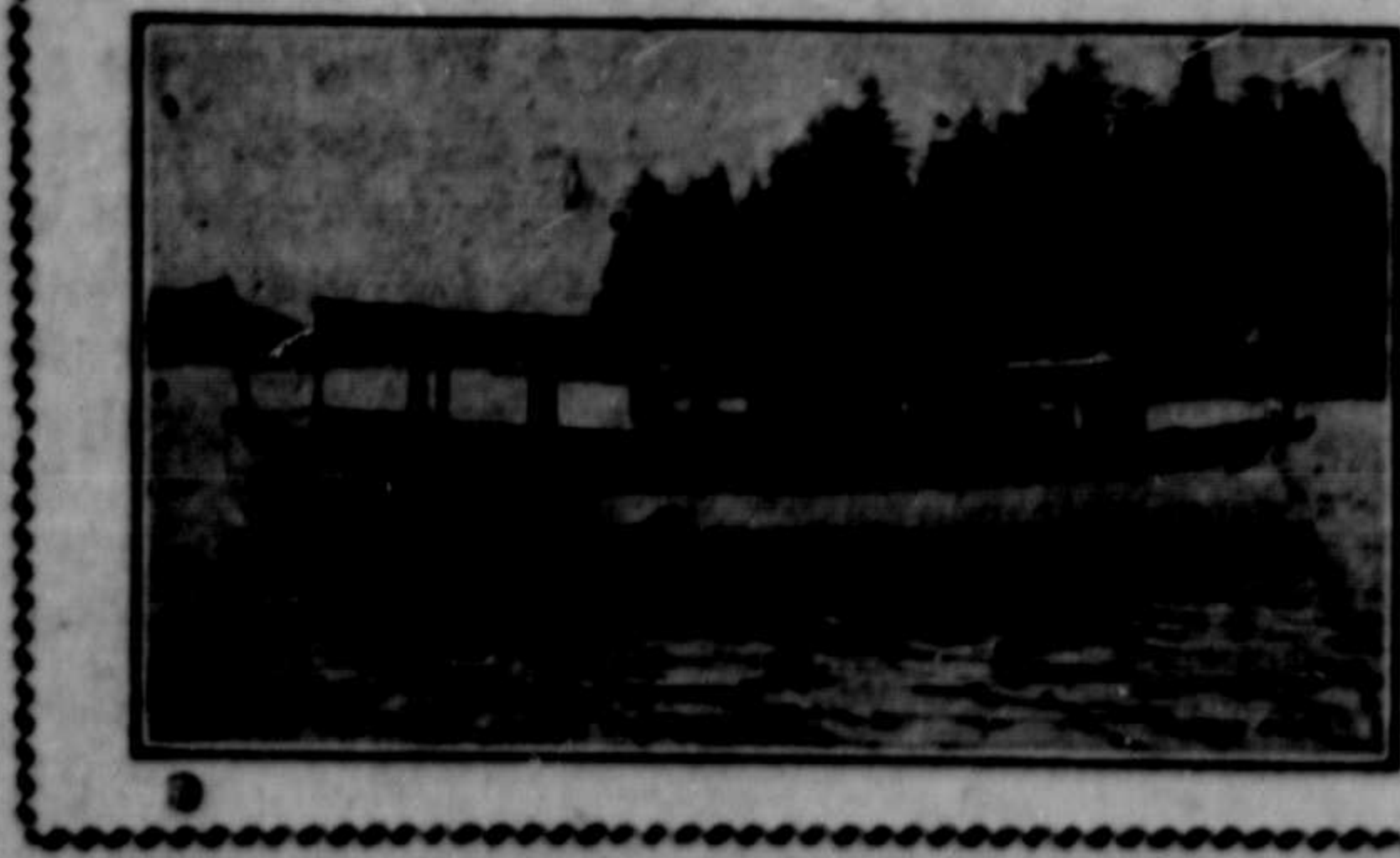

## HUN STRENGTH IS ALL THAT MATTERS

On a recent visit to the French forces under General Petain a war correspondent says that he was made feel that war writers had better cease writing about German sins, and dwell more intently upon the one thing that really matters—German strength. A certain General said:—

"Germany has no morals anyway, and now that practically the whole earth is agreed on that point, we can get on with the serious business of beating her and teaching her a code of morals for the future. When Germany chucked her old standards overboard, she certainly considered the cost, with interest, that she must pay if she lost. But she counted on victory only, with her strength. The abandonment of her moral code was only for the purpose of adding to her political strength. It was necessary to talk about her sins only until the United States entered the conflict. That was the final verdict. Judgment was pronounced. Germany must pay but we must beat her first."

It is on this very serious business that Petain's army is now engaged. It is a tough job. It will be accomplished. Very definite information was given by the escorting officer concerning this German strength. He said that today the entire effective German army consists of 233 divisions and today a German division consists, on the average, of 13,000 men or a total of slightly under 3,000,000 able-bodied, sufficiently fed soldiers. This does not, of course, include Austrians, Turks or Bulgarians. Asked what of them, his answer was typical: "We Frenchmen only speak of the German army."

It was learned at Washington last week that Ambassador Jesserand has forwarded to the French and Belgian Governments a unique offer on the part of United States students to aid in rebuilding as rapidly as the Germans are driven back.

The plan is to send city-beautiful units of architects and engineers to Europe to reconstruct the ruined municipalities along model lines, in order that the war zone in France and Belgium may emerge as one of the most beautiful regions on earth.

Dr. Edmund James James, President of the University of Illinois, brought the offer to Ambassador Jesserand. The University at Urbana-Champaign, on July 1, will open a special city-planning school, in order to train professional men for service in these units.

Each unit, Dr. James explained, will consist of an architect, a landscape architect, an electrical engineer, a highway civil engineer, a municipal and sanitary engineer, a chemical engineer, and an economist. The training school which will combine special courses of the university's school of architecture and its various engineering schools, will teach the co-operation necessary to make the building units effective. The course will last six months, at the end of which time it is hoped to send the first units abroad.

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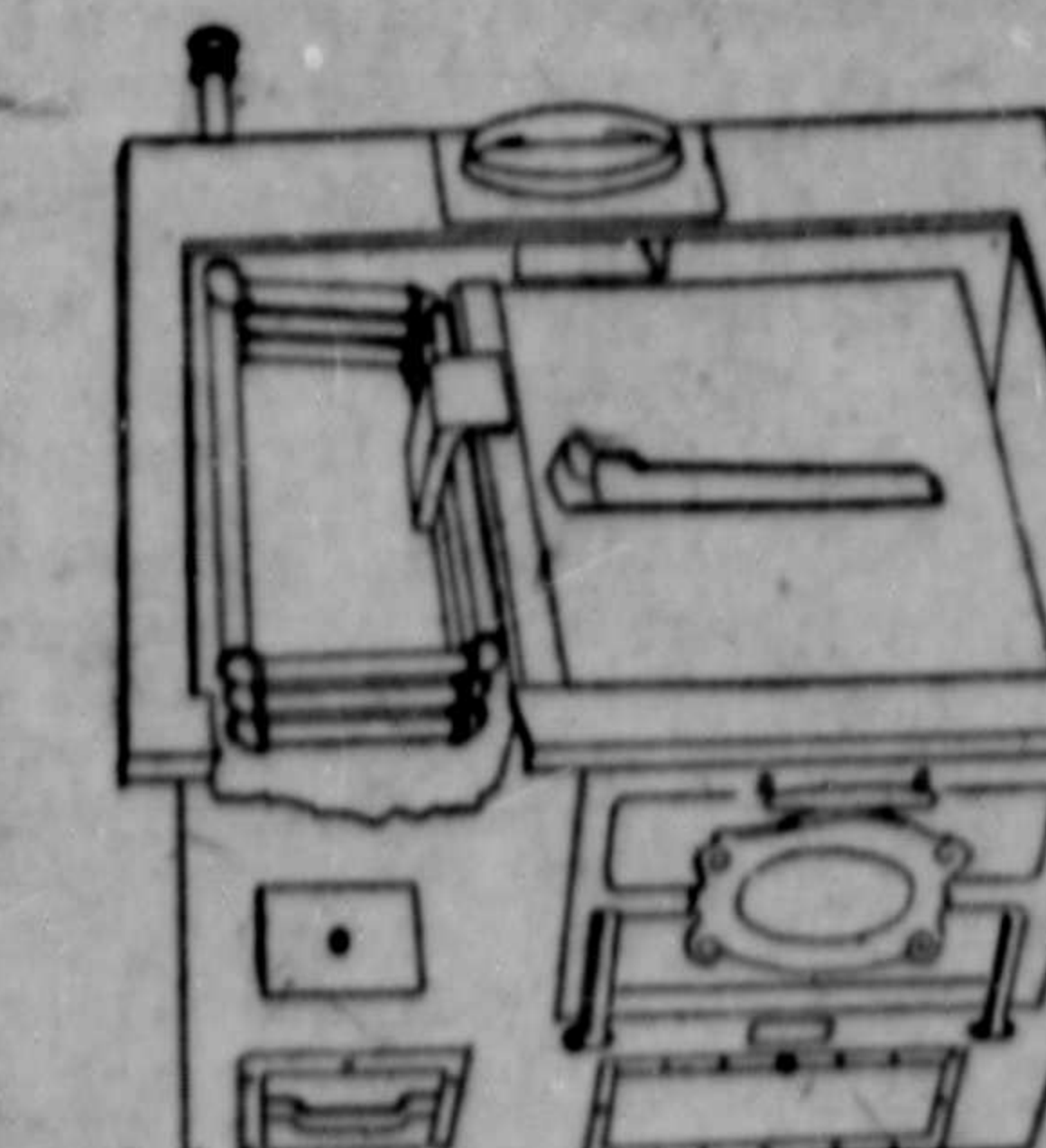
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
