## LONDON ATTACKED BY HUN AEROPLANES

### A BOMB FALLING ON SCHOOL KILLS TEN CHILDREN, INJURING FIFTY OTHERS

#### GERMAN AEROPLANES MAKE DAYLIGHT RAID ON LONDON

FIFTEEN ENEMY MACHINES DROP BOMBS IN THE CITY—THE BRITISH AIRMEN ROSE TO ATTACK AND FOUGHT A GREAT AIR BATTLE—ENEMY AEROPLANES WERE DRIVEN OFF

London, June 14.—Fifteen German aeroplanes made a raid by daylight over the city of London. Bombs fell in various parts of the city, but it is in the East End of the city that the greatest number of casualties are recorded. One bomb dropped upon a school building. Ten of the children were killed outright, and other fifty were injured when the missile struck the building. The casualty list has grown to 97 killed and 434 injured.

#### Battle in the Air.

British aviators immediately rose, while the anti-aircraft guns fired at the enemy machines. A spectacular battle in the air took place, when the British machines got up, and the enemy squadron were driven off, with the British machines in hot pursuit. One German machine was brought down. The result of the British pursuit has not yet been made known.

#### THE CONSCRIPTION BILL IS NOW IN PARLIAMENT

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Ottawa, June 14.—According to the Government's figures, there are 760,453 single men and 823,996 married men in Canada between the ages of twenty-five and forty. Sir Wilfrid Laurier has asked the Premier to defer the second reading of the bill. It is likely to come up in the House of Commons on Monday next. Several members of the opposition were not present today.  
It is said here that Mr. G. P. Cramham will recommend the conscription of accumulated wealth, and that Mr. Choquette in the Senate will move for a referendum on the whole subject.

#### SUBMARINE LOSSES

(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, June 14.—The losses suffered by the merchant marine were bigger during the past week. The submarines sunk twenty-two vessels over sixteen hundred tons, and the losses would have been greater had not many other vessels been able to fight off the U-boats.

#### French Liner Sunk.

The French liner Sequanna, of 5,557 tons, was sunk in the south Atlantic with five hundred and fifty passengers aboard. One hundred and ninety passengers are missing. Among the other passengers on board was a detachment of the Senegalese Rifles.

#### Leyland Liner Sunk.

The Leyland liner Anglia has also been sunk by a submarine. American Liner Escapes.  
New York, June 14.—The American liner Kronland, which was attacked by a German submarine, managed to save herself by agile manoeuvring.

#### THE GERMAN NATION'S SANCTION OF THE WAR

In several new books published recently, in connection with the war and the German people, one of the noticeable points, which seems to be emphasized in the minds of the writers, is the absolute solidarity of the German people with the Government and the Kaiser in the conduct of the war. It is said that perhaps one of the least understood features of the German nation is its absolute unity in its sanction of the war, the war's purposes, and the methods by which the war is carried on. Mr. Curtin's latest book, "Land of Deepening Shadows," leaves no doubt of the fact, and some of its chapters are devoted to an exposition of how that unity has been brought about. It has been created by the Government with definite intention to achieve this very purpose. The schools, the pulpits, the newspapers, the professors' chairs are all so many wheels in a machinery whose motive power is in Berlin, whose purpose is to create blind, unquestioning, fanatic approval, and which never slips a cog. In the schools, the children are trained in a creed of state worship, hate of enemies, and adoration of militarism, which poisons their minds from the start. Mr. Curtin quotes the German words, and the prose translation of one of the songs sung daily in German schools as follows:  
Over there in the cowardly trenches lies the enemy. We attack him, and only a dog will say that pardon should be given to-day. Strike dead everything which prays for mercy. Shoot everything down like dogs. "More enemies, more enemies," be your prayer in this hour of retribution.  
Mr. de Beaufort in his book, "Behind the German Veil," bears the same witness to the solidarity of the German nation. He says that the people are absolutely at one with the Government and that their confidence in the Kaiser and their admiration for him are unbounded and unshakable. He found the conviction universal that the enemies of Germany had forced the war upon her and that Germany is fighting only because she had to and he came to the conclusion that if Germany were beaten in the war, the people would only rally more firmly than ever around the Government. He quotes one of Hindenburg's staff officers as saying to him that they would not have supposed they could meet successfully so many enemies, adding, "If we are able to accomplish all this unprepared, then by Heaven, give us a draw now and see what we can do ten years hence."

#### SAYS BRITAIN IS THE WEAKEST OF THE ALLIES

Copenhagen, June 14.—Herr von Heydebrand, speaking in the Reichstag, says that he regards Great Britain as being the weakest of all the Allies, and also the most vulnerable. Two months now will finish her. The movement for reform dies in Germany. Nothing towards the modernization of the Diets is being done.  
The continued failure of the Russian aggression has made the Government very cocky again. Even Scheidmann, the Socialist member, who is bitterly opposed to the Government, is not heard in his usual vein. He abandons the committee while busy to detach Russia.

#### The Real Autocrat.

Amsterdam, June 14.—The German newspapers publish violent denunciatory editorials regarding the entry of the United States into active participation in the war. President Wilson is said to be a real autocrat.

#### ADMINISTERING THE LAW

#### STREET CAR STRIKE ON IN VANCOUVER

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Vancouver, June 14.—Vancouver street car men have gone on strike and today not a car is moving in the streets.  
The company's offer of a war bonus has been refused by the men, who declare that 35c. an hour is the minimum on which they can live at present. The jitney question is prominently involved. The position taken by the B. C. Electric Company is that they cannot afford to give the increase demanded by the men, while the competition of the automobiles continues. The company did not attempt to take out the cars at Vancouver, North Vancouver nor New Westminster.

Although jitneys are running, many thousands had to walk. A meeting of the men will be held in Vancouver tonight. The subject is said to be one for the city to discuss.

#### WOMEN TO VOTE IN DOMINION ELECTION

Ottawa, June 13.—The Ottawa Evening Journal says that the Government is preparing a bill to give the women the franchise from east to coast and that it will be introduced in the Commons shortly.

#### COMPULSION IN JAMAICA

Kingston, Jamaica, June 13.—The Legislature has passed a bill providing for compulsory military service. Four members who opposed it said that they were not opposed to the principle, but thought that the volunteer system was working well enough. Registration, under the law, will soon begin. No man between the ages of 18 and 41 who is fit for military service will be allowed to leave the island except as a soldier.

#### LETTERS FROM THE BOYS AT THE FRONT

Word has been received in town from George Hie, who used to be ranching in the Lakelse Valley and later took up a pre-emption up the line about ten miles from Prince Rupert. He left here with the 102nd, and is still in the firing line. He is now in the 4th company of the 8th Battalion, C.R.T. Where he is at present, they are having lots of excitement, chiefly with the Germans trying to knock out his battalion's observation posts near the front line. He says the farmers here are going on with their work right behind the firing line, quite unconcernedly and the little children play happily, although within range of the German big guns.  
A former constable of Prince Rupert, Mr. S. V. Duff, who was also on the provincial police staff later, also writes saying that he is well. He receives the Daily News regularly and passes his copy along to several of the boys. They are always most anxious to know what is going on in their home town, and what the folks left at home are doing. He says that they have many discussions as to what they will all do when they come back here again, and they all feel grateful for what is being done for the boys who have got back already. The legislation for the returned soldiers is followed closely as can be, and he says that about 70 per cent of the boys over there will desire some other occupation than their old one, on their return.  
In talking about the last scrap, he mentions how cheerful the wounded were, which were very few in his company, considering all things. The British artillery fire is so concentrated during an attack that it is like walking behind a moving wall of shells. His many friends here will be pleased to know that he has come through scathless so far, in spite of the enemy and the terrible weather they had experienced. He has got many souvenirs of the various battles and hopes to get many more. He is now with the 32nd Battery C. F. A.

#### PILING FOR RUPERT

Mr. W. T. Muse, of the Prince Rupert Pile Driving Company, arrived in town yesterday morning with thousands of feet of piling from the Lagoon on Smith Island. This will be utilized in the building of the extension of the Albert & McCaffery wharf, between the Government wharf and Cow Bay. After this job is finished, Mr. Muse expects to go right ahead with the building of the marine ways across the harbor. By this means boats will be able to be handled and fixed up at any state of the tide.

#### FIGHTING IN THE OPEN ON YPRES FRONT

Another Drive by the Allies is Expected Soon—On French Front Artillery is Very Active.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, June 14.—Another drive by the Allies seems to be at hand. The lull following on the Messines blast is not likely to last long. Fighting is going on in the open on the Ypres sector.

British Official.  
We repulsed a strong counter attack on our new positions captured yesterday on the left bank of the Souchez river.

French Front.  
Paris, June 14.—There was great artillery fighting last night in the region of Moulin Laffaux, and at several other points on the front. Elsewhere comparative quiet prevails. A German surprise attack was repulsed near Haute Chevanche.

Russian Front.  
Petrograd, June 14.—Our batteries shelled the village of Meeriski three miles north of Tverotch and caused a big fire. The usual fusillades are being exchanged on the Rumanian front. On the Caucasian front east of Kasrishirn, the Kurds attacked our transport and were beaten off.

Pershing Greeted.  
Paris, June 14.—All Paris went frantic with enthusiasm on the arrival of General Pershing and his staff. The streets were massed with throngs waving the American and French flags to greet the American officers, General Pershing will operate under General Petain, the French Generalissimo, and not under the British commander.

Austrian Recruits.  
Zurich, Switzerland, June 14.—Information has been received here that Austria has called to the colors all boys of seventeen years of age.

Prisoners of War.  
Washington, June 14.—Germany has notified the United States that she regards the 74 sailors brought in by the Moewe as prisoners of war. To ensure adequate care being taken of them, the American Government has arranged to supply additional food and other necessities through Switzerland.

Norway to Fight.  
London, June 14.—It is believed that Norway is on the brink of war with Germany. The heads of families are petitioning the Government that they be allowed to fight the German menace openly. The entry of Scandinavia may be but a matter of weeks.

**A UNITED PARTY**

An Ottawa dispatch says that for several years has the conservative party been so enthusiastic, and strong pressure has been brought to bear upon Sir Robert Borden to combine any reorganization of the government to party lines. "By way of contrast it describes the Liberals as a divided party. As a sample of the cohesion existing in the Conservative party, this unity and enthusiasm, the like of which has not been seen for years, the retreat of Mr. Patenaude, the Secretary of State, from the Cabinet, and Captain Burgham, of Peterboro, kicking over the traces, these two members constitute the visible and the outward emblem of this beatific condition. But these inspired dispatches still continue to come out from Ottawa telling of the supposed divisions and dissensions among the Liberals. The origin and object of such are unmistakable. The Government's campaign bureau is trying to make political capital out of the present situation, which, according to the Victoria Times, is an exceedingly provocative proceeding.

If the score or so of Nationalists in the House, continues the Times, are enthusiastically supporting Sir Robert Borden at this stage your readers may be assured that they are doing so at their price. What that price is will soon be apparent. Not improbably a part of it will be the provision that compulsory military service will not be enforced until the proposal has been approved by the country by way of an election or a referendum. This is what Armand Lavergne and Henri Bourassa demand. It is easy to believe, therefore, that the Nationalists will stand pat. But we question if even this concession will square the whole account. We venture the prediction that in the event of an election the soldiers overseas will not be given an opportunity of recording their wishes and that the excuse for this will be the difficulty of taking the vote and the necessity of quick action. The Nationalists know how the soldiers would vote.

If Sir Robert Borden forced an election on straight party

lines he would be fought on party lines. The record of the last three years would not be obscured by a proposal for compulsory service with a string to it which would compromise its prospects. Nor would the waying of the old flag help matters. That game is played out. The Ross rifle tragedy, the failure to deal with the food problem; the Government's tender attitude to the price-hoisting combines and speculators—as expressed by its Ministers of Labor and Agriculture—the refusal to make war millionaires contribute more than a negligible fraction to the revenue, the increased tariff taxation in the interests of special privilege at the expense of the poor, the shell contracts and the exploits of Hon. Colonel J. Wesley Allison, the neglect of returned soldiers and the niggardly treatment of their dependents and the political partizanship, which has run rampant through the military establishment would all receive due attention.

It is in the hope that it will bring about an early solution of the recruitment problem hand in hand with the adoption of vitally essential reforms in administration without the discord and bitterness of a party election, that we favor a National Government, composed of the best men in the country, whether inside or outside of Parliament. Such a Government would have to place this Dominion on a war basis all round in order to have a successful war administration. It would have to deal with war profits just as they are dealt with in England, to make the burden of taxation fall upon those best able to bear it, to control the food situation and to eliminate political partizanship from the army. Such a Government would give this country the strong leadership it needs and would quickly get rid of Sir Robert Borden if he did not show any more resolution and decision in his new environment than he has shown during the last three years.

**NOTES AND COMMENTS**

The contagion has spread to Greece. The inconstant Constantine has abdicated. The sister of the Kaiser is no longer Queen of the Hellenes. "It is a far, far better thing that I do," said Constantine. He has been able to read the signs of the times, and evidently knew when to get out from under. The question is not now who is the next, but how soon.

Having lost confidence in his own Government, Sir Robert Borden has been making overtures to bolster up his tottering position by the inclusion of some of the prominent Liberal members. Sir Robert is slow in losing faith in his condutors. The people of Canada lost confidence in his Government three years ago.

The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church adopted a resolution last week advocating "selective conscription as applied to the battlefield, and also as applied to the wealth and talent of the country for the service of Canada at this time, when so much is at stake." The Assembly calls for the whole of Canada being put upon a war footing, in all respects. The necessity of such a demand is incontrovertible. It was necessary in Great Britain and in France, and done there, and is in process now in the United States. But the Government of Canada still allows its friends to pull down fat profits, and lets them go untaxed.

The prediction is made by a contemporary that the Hon. Robert Rogers never will come back, whatever be the verdict of the tribunal that is going to sit upon the verdict of Mr. Justice Galt. The Honorable Robert, in the light of Mr. Justice Galt's report would be an expensive luxury for any Government to indulge in. All the

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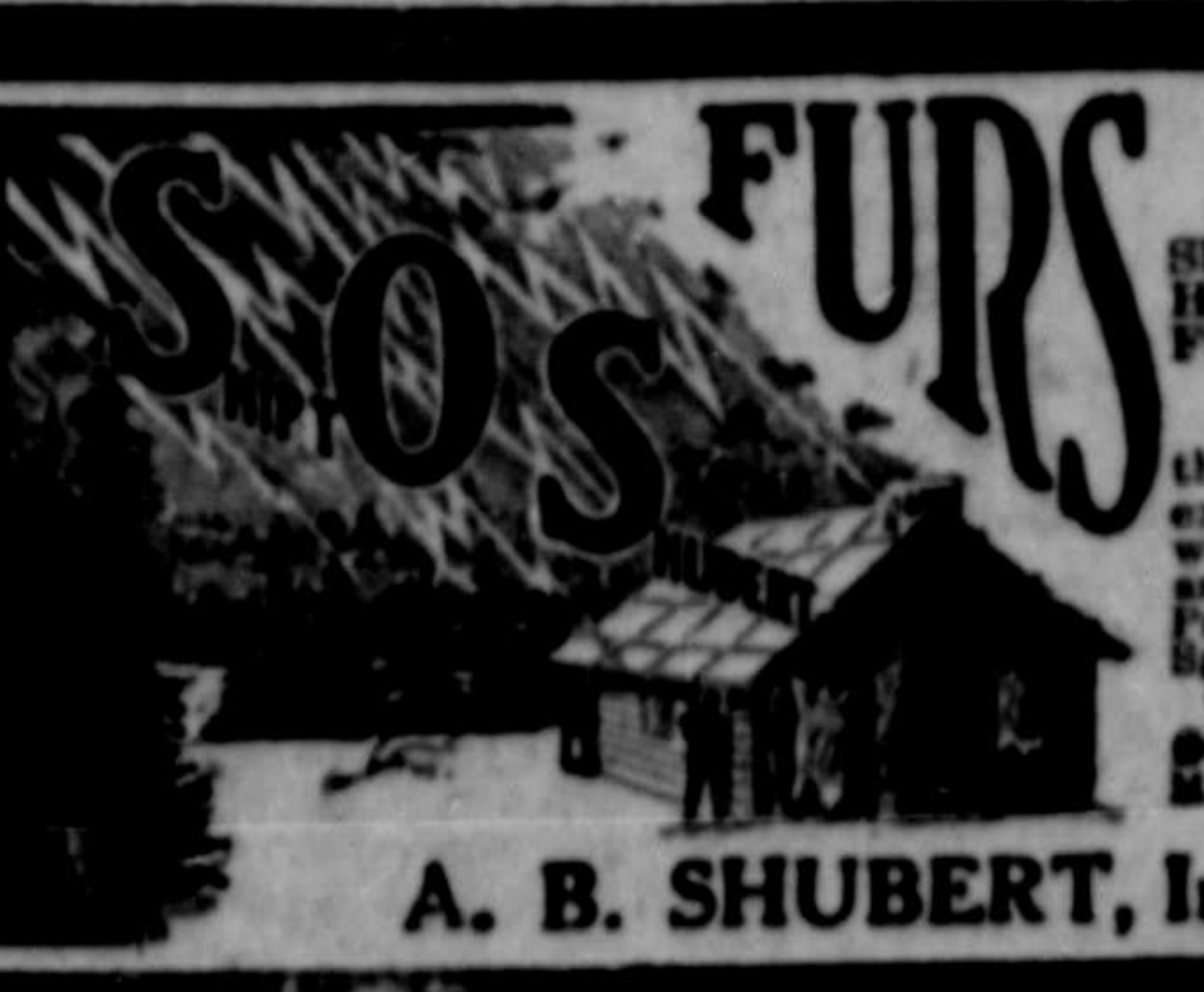

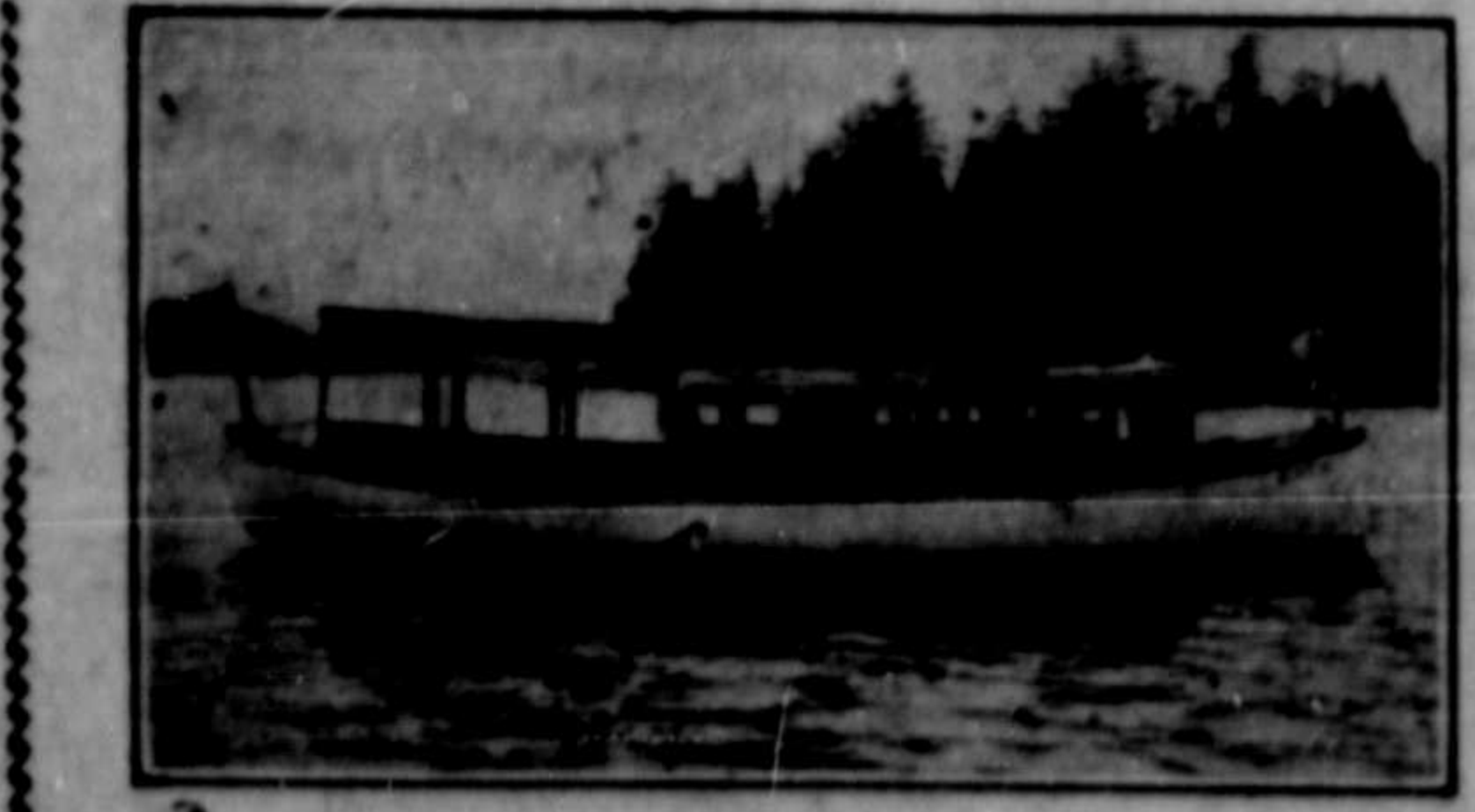

### BARLEY A MEDIUM HARVEST IN GERMANY

Copenhagen, June 12.—The rapid dwindling of Germany's grain stocks under the drain imposed by the supplementary bread allowances granted to compensate for missing potatoes was the cause of the recent hastily summoned conference of representatives of the Central Powers in Berlin. Officials of the German food department, supported by energetic representations from the military and diplomatic authorities, won the grant of an additional proportion for Germany of the grain stocks captured in Roumania.

The German authorities are conducting a vigorous publicity campaign to convince the people that all is well with the coming harvest, and that the present food difficulties will disappear as soon as the new crop is available.

A hint of somewhat different possibilities is given in a paragraph which slipped into a glowing account of crop prospects in the weekly *Woche*. This paragraph says: "If all conditions continue favorable Germany can hope for barely a medium harvest owing to the lack of fertilizers, particularly nitrates." The fruit harvest, according to experts, also will be only medium.

### RED CROSS NOTES

The young ladies who had charge of the sale of home-cooking in aid of the Red Cross in the tent on Third Avenue last week realized the sum of \$34 for the Society and \$25.95 for the prisoners of war by the handkerchief sale.

The sale of home-cooking on Friday will be held in the Red Cross tent as usual and will be under the direction of Mrs. E. Parker and Mrs. Stanley Parker. Very many more articles of home cooking can be disposed of each Friday at these sales. The demand is always greater than the supply, and greater contributions will be gratefully received by the society. With the increasing number of men at the front, the number of wounded is consequently also greater, and still greater are the demands made upon the Red Cross Society. The necessity for increased assistance is still here.

The Red Cross Society acknowledges receipt of the sum of \$16 from the Queen Mary Chapter Knitting Club, for wool sold them by the Society.
