In other and fewer words, it simply means that the Hon. Mr. Graham means, in common with the majority of the people of Canada, that the whole country should be placed upon a war footing. Even after thr years of war, the most terrible that this world, has ever seen. the alleged Government of Canada could not see its way to do this itself. So far from organizing the country to win the war, it has allowed the food barons and munition makers to organize to win profits.

Just the other day, Sir William Robertson said that the REACTIONARIES army counted for only twentyfive per cent of the powers of a nation at war. The organization of the resources at home amount to seventy-five per cent. "That organization takes in the manufacture of munitions, the control of transportation, shipbuilding, the production of food and raw materials, finance and the maintenance of trade as the basis of credit. It also includes th morale of the people. All these should be co-ordinated for the prosecution of the war. The whole nation must get behind the punch of its army."

Instead of that, just look at

In Great Britain, the whole country is one huge national arsenal for the manufacture of war material. Thousands of national munition factories are operating and millions of men and women are enlisted in them as state workers. If such could be done in Great Britain, where vested rights and the rights of private property are protected to a greater extent than elsewhere in the Empire, such a course would have been much easier in Canada. But no. In Canada the cry was munition contracts for the profiteers.

Canada, like most other countries, even democratic countries, too, has her reactionaries. Just the other day. Colonel Cantley, president of the Canadian Steel Manufacturers Association, and a steel magnate himself, declared himself to be of the class that got thrown out of Russia lately.
