AN OVERWHELMING MAJORITY VOTES FOR MEASURE TO GIVE WOMEN A VOTE

NEW GREEK KING WILL FOLLOW THE POLICY OF CONSTANTINE

KING ALEXANDER ISSUES ROYAL PROCLAMATION WHICH HAS SURPRISED THE ALLIES—BRITISH PRESS WONDERING IF GERMAN DIPLOMACY HAS AGAIN TRIUMPHED IN THE BALKANS

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, June 21.—The new King of Greece has issued a Royal proclamation and in it promises to carry out the brilliant policy of his father. This message has come as a shock to the Allies. The press in Great Britain is asking if on this occasion as previously, German diplomacy has once more triumphed in the Balkans. They are unanimous in demanding the ejection of King Alexander from his father's throne. It is expected that Venizelos may succeed him quickly. The ex-King Constantine is now in Switzerland.

Welcomed by Swiss.
Lugano, Switzerland, June 21.—Ex-King Constantine of Greece arrived here today. Delegates of the Swiss government welcomed him in the name of Switzerland.

Ferdinand Worried.
London, June 21.—Czar Ferdinand of Bulgaria is worried at the abduction of ex-King Constantine and is deeply impressed at his fate. The likelihood of Venizelos taking hold of the government and entering the war against Bulgaria is causing him no little uneasiness. From information received it is learned that he will proceed immediately to the German headquarters to demand assistance in protecting his kingdom.

U. S. WILL HELP RUSSIA IN HER TRANSPORTATION

(Special to The Daily News.)
Petrograd, June 21.—The American Railway Commission after a partial inspection of Russia's railroad resources is confident that the existing efficiency of the rolling stock can be increased three fold. Big piers at Vladivostok are ordered and the work has begun. The commission is now hunting for the best location for the needed repair shops.

OLD MINE OPENED AGAIN AT MAPLE BAY

Mr. Drumbheller, who has been in Prince Rupert for several days past, sailed last night for Maple Bay, where he intends going ahead with the further development of the old Outsider Mine there. This mine was a producer ten years ago, and recently there has been a change of ownership.

The preliminary work of getting the camp buildings, and surface erections in shape is progressing, quite a few men being employed and before long when actual mining operations are under way, it is expected that this mine will employ in the neighborhood of sixty men. There are already about two thousand feet of underground workings, so that there should not be so much preliminary development work as there would be in the case of a new mine. Large quantities of supplies are being shipped in, in expectation of a good summer's work.

ORGANIZED LABOR ON WAR PROBLEMS

Representatives from eighty international trades unions met with the Executive Council of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada in the city of Ottawa, in conference from June 1 to June 4. Among the reasons for calling this conference was the "settled policy of the chairman of the Imperial Munitions Board in refusing to recognize and co-operate with organized labor" and the acute state of affairs arising therefrom; the efforts of certain industrial employers of labor re industrial conscription, and of the Government re military service, and the framing of a policy to meet conditions obtaining and that may arise in connection with these matters.

The Munitions Board.

The hostile attitude of the Imperial Munitions Board to organized labor in Canada was clearly defined, and evidence was submitted by the delegates among other things, violation of the sanitary requirements and gross negligence in regard to the protection of health of the workers, particularly with regard to the construction of Camp Borden, where in one instance 200 men were housed in one room built as a baggage room for the G. T. R. without any consideration whatever, whereby numbers of them had to quit, broken in health. The toleration of excessive hours of labor for women at the Munition Board plant at Verdun, Montreal, where they were engaged for seventy-two hours and upwards per week, was also condemned.

The lowering of the wage standards already established in different sections of the Dominion, and the change from an eight-hour day to a ten to sixteen-hour day and a seven-day week, in all cases without any recognition of the standard overtime rates, was another item. Female labor had also been introduced before proper steps had been taken to utilize the available skilled mechanics, and lower rates had been paid to such female labor for the same class of work as had been previously done by men.

The Munitions Board also refused to have a fair wage clause inserted in the contracts for work done for or by them and had declared a policy of refusing to recognize trade union representations regarding hours and wages. Mr. J. W. Flavell, chairman of the Board demonstrated his lack of desire to consider trade unionism by his letter, wherein he stated that "our good friends of labor, . . . should exercise patience in letting the work go through by any short cut that may be possible, for the purpose of having it consummated."

THE ALLIES RECAPTURE GROUND LOST

Trench Raids and Small Local Attacks Continue—Heavy Artillery Fighting on French Line.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, June 21.—No word has been received from the British Front today. The last dispatches received state that all the advanced posts at Monchy-le-Preux which were overwhelmed during the great German attack two days ago, have been recaptured and the gains consolidated.

The enemy made several counter attacks, which were successfully repulsed. Near Lens, the Canadians made an attack and gained some ground, but details are still lacking.

French Front.

Paris, June 21.—Heavy artillery fighting is in progress on the Aisne and Champagne fronts. A German infantry attack on the Souchez river sector was repulsed.

Italian Front.

Rome, June 21.—The Italians resumed the offensive yesterday and captured the Austrian positions on Monte Ortigara. The prisoners taken numbered 936.

No German Reserves.

Paris, June 21.—The enormous losses of the war are eating up the German reserve forces very rapidly, and the man power of the German Empire is crumbling, says General de la Croux, the French war expert. Germany has now only half a million men to reinforce her lines until November, which is totally insufficient to cover the casualties sustained. A shift in the tactics of the German High Command will be forced by this lack of reserves, and their lines must be shortened to meet the debit balance. The 1919 class will not be available till the autumn.

AUSTRIAN CRISIS

(Special to The Daily News.)

Vienna, June 21.—The Austrian Cabinet resigned last evening in a body. The retirement of the Government was forced by the refusal of the Poles to deal with them in any way.

TWO SHIPS SUNK

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, June 21.—Two vessels named respectively British Earl and Bay State have been sunk by submarines. Both were bound from Boston to Liverpool.

THE COST TO LIVE

The May report of the Department of Labor has been issued and in it, it is shown that the cost of the average weekly family budget increased during that month from \$17.34 to \$18.37. This budget cost only covers thirty staple foods, fuel and rent for an average family. It does not allow for clothing, or the thousand and one little extras, and nowadays necessities too, which would at once occur to the practical housewife. This budget just covers the bare necessities for continued life.

This advance of \$1.03 per week is the sharpest advance noticeable for a long time, and so far as the month of June has gone, there is nothing to show that the increasing increase will not be maintained. And yet with it all, Sir George Foster, speaking in the House of Commons, pronounced that the problem of the rising cost of living was one beyond administrative control. And his statement on the question received the hearty applause of the members on the Government benches. It matters not to Sir George Foster and his colleagues that the pension of \$50 per month to a soldier's widow and family does not attain to that minimum which the Department of Labor says a family requires for bare subsistence. The soldier's widow and his family have got to wait, while prices rise still higher. It matters not that the wage earners and the poor folks with stationary salaries have to pay these enhanced prices, nothing matters so long as the speculators and the manipulators, the big firms and trusts and combines, are allowed to rake in their surplus profits.

These are the friends of the Government. These are the people the Government represent. They certainly do not represent the people of Canada as a whole. These food barons have been permitted to so arrange prices that commodities which have to be transported to Great Britain, are there sold cheaper than in Canada, even with all the cost of three or four thousand miles transit added. Such a state of affairs could only be arrived at with the connivance of a government friendly to the inter-

ests. A government which was out to protect the interests of the people would protect the people at large from this section, which is getting rich at the expense of the community, which includes the widows, wives and families of the men who have risked their lives in the trenches.

With conscription of the food supplies of the country, the man who was conscripted at the same time would know that no unfair advantage would be taken of his dependents by soulless corporations. But this can hardly be looked for until the representatives of these food barons, and cold storage speculators are removed from where they can make arrangements to suit themselves. With a government which represented the people it is safe to say that conscription would have been in force long ago. Not necessarily that partial conscription relating to military service only, but conscription in the full sense of the word of all the resources of the country, whether it be the production of the soil, or the production of men's hands, or brains, either in the shape of foods, manufactures or money.

HOW SEVIGNY DOES IT

Paul Renaud was the editor of Le Francais Parleur, a Quebec paper which had been publishing articles against recruiting. Suddenly the articles stopped and the reason thereof was revealed in Parliament. Mr. Renaud had been given a Government job. He had been appointed accountant in the Inland Revenue Department by the Hon. A. Sevigny, the head of that service.

Mr. Sevigny denies that Mr. Renaud is against the Allies in the war. The attacks upon recruiting, he says, were due to a personal feud between the editor and Sir William Price, who was trying to raise a regiment in Quebec. Still, the Minister says, he thought the paper should be stopped, so he put its editor on the Government payroll.

Ingenious and subtle Mr. Sevigny! He is a born strategist, and his methods are so simple that we wonder somebody did not think of them before. Confound the Nationalist propaganda by laying a trap

for the propagandists. Snare them into the Government service. Do not arrest them for sedition; do not suppress their newspapers. Give them highly remunerative Government jobs and the papers will stop automatically. But it was a great pity that this loyal plot of the Minister should have been disclosed in Parliament. It should have been kept a state secret, for no doubt Mr. Sevigny was trying to entice Henri Bourassa and Armand Lavergne to the payroll, too.

Mr. Sevigny's methods, however, are not altogether original with him. He owes his own position in the cabinet to a similar order of tactics. He, Dr. Blondin and Mr. Patenaude, who has just resigned, were quite as violent against the idea of recruiting for a Canadian navy a few years ago as Citizens Lavergne and Bourassa are today against recruiting for the war. That is why they were chosen as cabinet ministers, but the motive underlying the choice appears to have been different, if we may believe Mr. Sevigny. They were entering into their reward. Renaud, according to the Minister, was appointed to be muzzled. But it is going to cost the taxpayers a fortune if Mr. Sevigny's methods con-

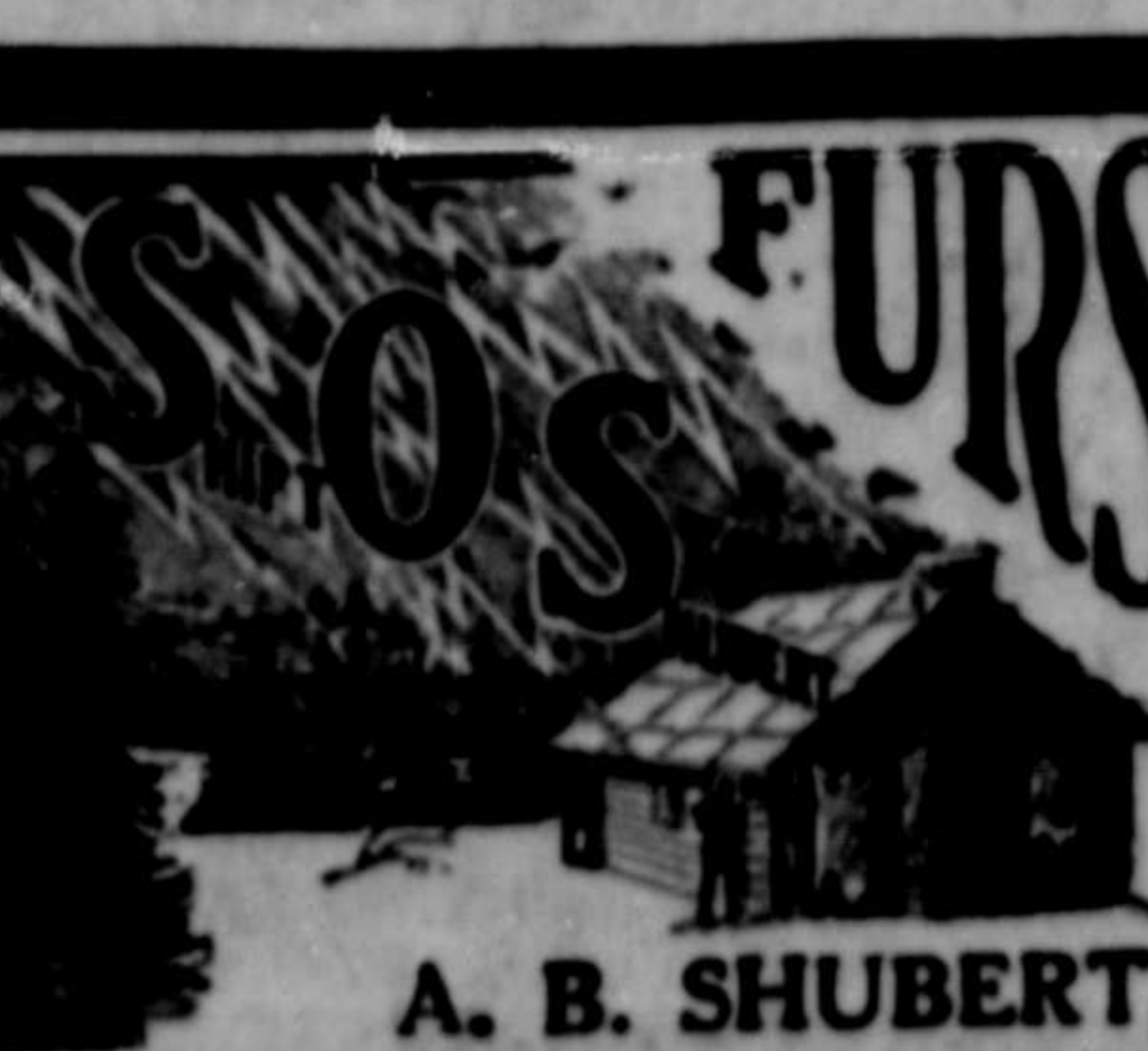

THE FINANCIAL POWER OF BRITAIN

The vast financial resources of Great Britain have been demonstrated by the sums which have been raised by both loans and taxes for the war. Upon national wealth estimated at \$85,000,000,000 the United Kingdom has increased its debt to \$19,270,000,000, yet it was able to make the last bond issue of over \$5,000,000,000 at a lower rate of interest than the one preceding. Out of its borrowings it has lent \$2,970,000,000 to its colonies and allies for war expenses, leaving \$16,300,000,000 as a charge upon its own resources, or 19.17 per cent.

Notwithstanding the steadily mounting annual charge upon its revenue for interest, sinking fund and pensions, the nation has paid 26.3 per cent of its war expenses out of current revenue, a larger proportion than has been paid by any other belligerent, and the Chancellor's estimate raises this percentage for the current year to 26.5 per cent.

The British Empire's ability to accomplish this feat of finance is mainly due to its sea power. Notwithstanding the growing ravages of submarines on its merchant marine and the great diversion of its industrial forces to the army, navy and production of war material, sea power enabled the country to increase the value of its exports 31.6 per cent in 1916 over 1915 and to import not only 55 per cent of its food but many other manufactures and material for munitions and for manufacture.

By way of contrast, Germany has pyramided its loans by encouraging its people to borrow money on one issue with which to buy another issue, also to mortgage their property for the same purpose. Not until 1916 did it begin to pay a part of its war expenses out of current revenue, the entire burden being transferred to the next generation. A German newspaper estimated that burden at \$2,250,000,000 a year before the last loan, and it grows as more money is borrowed.

As Germany's commerce has been destroyed, except with its allies, which are in the same plight, and with the small contiguous countries, the source from which new revenue could be drawn has been almost dried up.

In view of this contrast, there is good ground for Mr. Bonar Law's statement that "want of money will not prevent us from winning the victory, for we know we can hold out longer than our enemies." That is more than ever true, when the practically untouched financial resources of the United States are added to those of the Allies. It needs but a strenuous effort to subdue the submarine before it has impaired the food and munition supply of the Allies; to swamp it with a swarm of new ships and thus to carry the Allies over to next spring. Want of money cannot defeat the Allies; that can only come through inability to bring to bear the power of money in holding control of the sea while the Allies wear down the German armies and while the United States prepares a great army for the final campaign.

ORGANIZED LABOR ON WAR PROBLEMS

labor officials, when asked for the Board's intercession, stated that the workers should, if not satisfied, proceed by their ordinary methods to obtain redress, which, when negotiations are refused, means strike.

The conference condemned these actions on the part of the Munitions Board.

Conscription.

The following resolutions were arrived at:—

"Believing that the workers of Canada are looking for a lead on the attitude that should be assumed by them toward the proposed scheme of conscription, we recommend that the following conclusions be sent broadcast throughout Canada:

"On December 27th, 1916, Premier Borden informed the Executive of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada, that 'if conscription should prove the only effective method to preserve the existence of the State and of the institutions and liberties which we enjoy, I should not hesitate to act accordingly.'

"We are positively of the opinion that this situation has not arrived.

"The necessities for the effective conduct of the war are: food, munitions, shipping, and military man power, and Canada is geographically well situated to supply the first named three essentials, and can do much to assist in winning the war by developing her production in these essentials to her fullest extent.

"We are strongly of the opinion that this is the best service that Canada, with her small population, can render.

"We declare ourselves as most emphatically opposed to the proposed Conscription measure, and we urge the workers of Canada to oppose by every means in their power the enactment of such legislation."

The High Cost of Living. As the most effective means of meeting this situation, the conference was in favor of public ownership of all cold storage plants, abattoirs and canneries.

Elimination of gambling in foodstuffs by speculators and others. That a food and fuel controller be appointed with power to fix prices based upon the cost of production.

That any municipality have the right to sell wood and coal. That the railways and coal fields of Canada be nationalized and that the principle of nationalization be extended in every direction to bring the food resources of this country into the hands of the people and out of the hands of monopolists and speculators.

It was also decided that organized labor utilize all the power at their command to improve conditions and increase wages in order to reduce the serious depression of their standard of living occasioned by the increase in prices of the necessities of life.

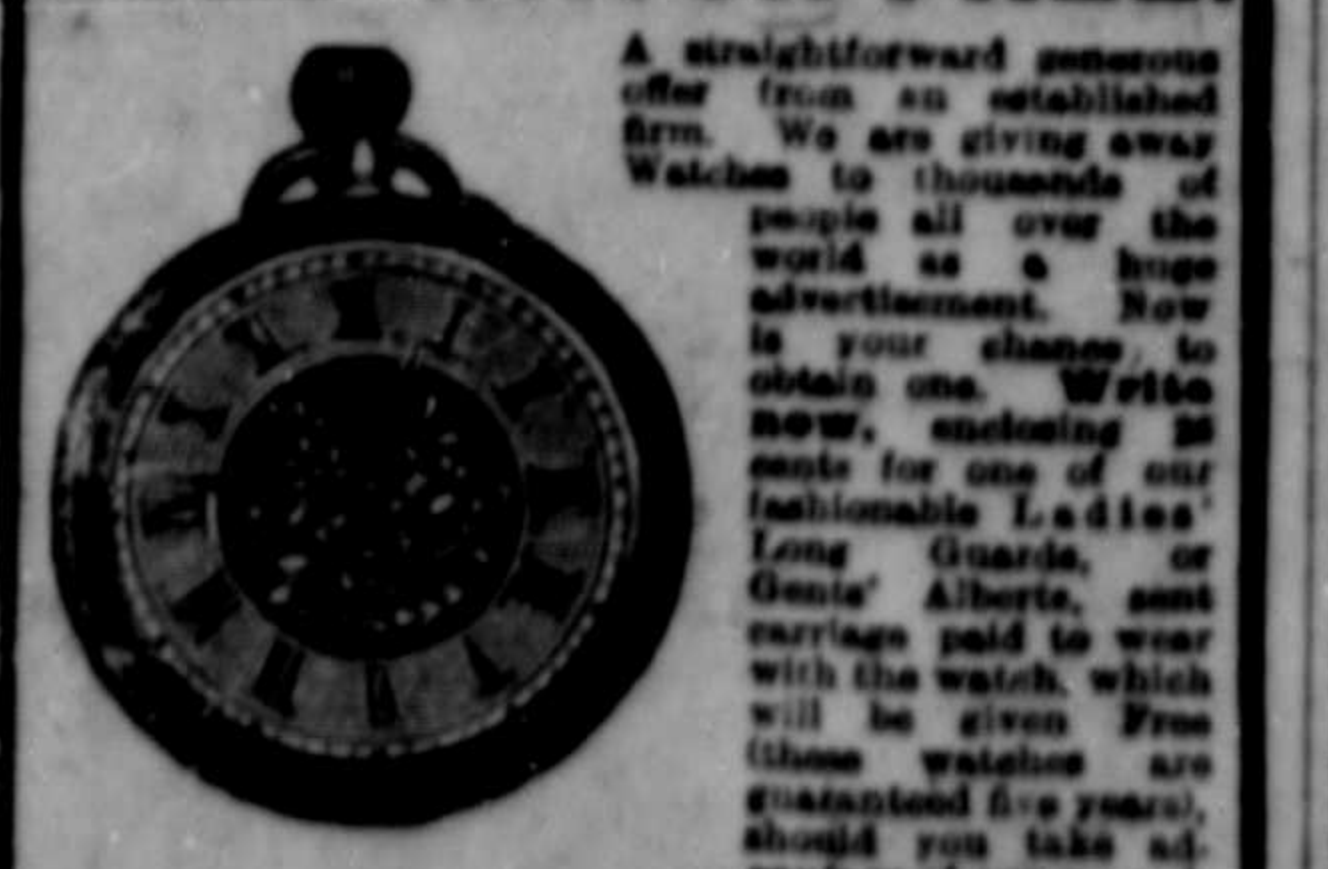
