HAIG'S TROOPS MAKE UNEXPECTED ATTACK

IMPORTANT CAPTURES OF GERMAN POSITIONS AGAIN MADE EAST OF ARRAS

HAIG STRIKES ANOTHER BIG SUDDEN BLOW

Enemy's Positions Captured Near Oppy—All Objectives Gained—Lens Practically In Ruins.

(Special to The Daily News.) London, June 30.—To the south and the southwest of Oppy General Haig struck another sudden and tremendous blow at the German lines. The enemy's forward positions were captured over a front of two thousand yards, and all the objectives sought were gained. Our troops continue to gain ground on a wide front south of the Souchez river, and have entered Avion, which is the greatest gain made by the British since the capture of Vimy Ridge. Raids have been made on the German trenches near Croisilles, and Armentieres, and many prisoners have been taken. Lens is practically in ruins from both the German scheme of destruction, and from the shells of the fighting forces. Hindenburg is thought to be staging another strategic retreat after the fall of Lens.

French Front. Paris, June 30.—Heavy blows are being exchanged on the Meuse and the Aisne. The Germans attempted a general counter offensive, which was repulsed. Picked German troops made a strong attack on the Verdun front. The attack was broken up by the sharp reply of the French, and the Germans obtained a footing at only a few points in the French first line. A struggle of a most desperate character is in progress in the vicinity of Cerny.

Mesopotamia. London, June 30.—General Maude is being hampered by the inactivity of the Russian troops, which were to have co-operated with him, but notwithstanding, the Turkish army between Persia and Mesopotamia has been driven across the river onto the north bank of the Banah.

Italian Front. Rome, June 30.—The fighting between Italy and Austria is at present confined to artillery. The activity of the big guns is particularly intense east of Gorizia and in the Monte Fiati areas.

THE DECKHANDS' STRIKE (Special to The Daily News.) Vancouver, June 30.—The longshoremen are loading the boats. There is no indication that their union will go in with the striking deckhands and firemen. The attorney-general will look into the situation. It is said that there is a "silence pact" to keep information away from the public.

HOW OTHER NATIONS REGARD THE HUNS

(Special to The Daily News.) London, June 30.—Norway is chafing at the Hun plots. A German messenger carrying bombs to place in Norwegian ships was apprehended. The Foreign Office at Berlin is charged with instigating the outrages. An investigation is being made into the German spy system, and many suspicious characters have been arrested. A secret wireless station has been discovered on Arendal Island.

Mexico. Mexico, June 30.—The Leading newspaper urges Mexico to break with Germany, as public opinion is no longer neutral.

Greece. Athens, June 30.—The Greek Government, headed by Venizelos, has broken off diplomatic relations with Germany, Austria-Hungary, Bulgaria and Turkey. The Greek diplomats accredited to these countries have been recalled.

Brazil. Rio de Janeiro, June 30.—The Government of Brazil has revoked the decree of neutrality in the war between the Entente Allies and Germany.

Argentine. Buenos Ayres, June 30.—Argentine appeared likely today to announce the revocation of neutrality within a few hours. The sinking of the Argentine steamer Toro recently by a German submarine has apparently brought the government to a crisis. Public sentiment favors Brazil's course in aligning with the United States.

TRADES UNIONISTS FAVOR CONSCRIPTION

Winnipeg, June 29.—At a special meeting called to discuss the Military Service Bill now before Parliament, the Bricklayers' and Masons' Union, the strongest labor body in Western Canada, rejected by a large majority an anti-conscription resolution submitted to the meeting by one of its members.

CANADIANS TO RUSSIA

London, June 28.—The American committee of engineers in London, a body of prominent engineers organized to render advisory and practical assistance to the United States Government and the Allies during the war, has sent to Russia a committee of two military railway experts to offer advice and aid in reorganizing the railroads already built. The London committee's representatives are Lieut.-Col. J. W. Boyle, of the Canadian forces, and Lieut.-Col. J. A. Macdonnell, of a Canadian pioneer and railway battalion.

WEDDING BELLS

A very pretty wedding took place last evening in the Baptist Church, when Miss Clarrasa Tillie Allan and Mr. Hugh Henry Phillips were united in matrimony. Mr. Phillips is well known in Prince Rupert, being on the staff of the Bank of B. N. A., while Miss Allan came from Vancouver, arriving in Prince Rupert on Friday. The church was beautifully decorated for the occasion by the Young People's Society, and the ceremony was conducted by the Rev. W. S. A. Gray, the newly arrived Methodist minister. At the close of the proceedings in the church, the wedding supper was served at the home of Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Ledlie, 224 Seventh Avenue, West, and a most pleasant evening was spent. The newly married couple intend taking up house at Musgrave Place.

THE POLICE COURT

At the police court this morning, before Magistrate Carss, two Indians named Ambrose Wilson and Elijah Jones, were charged with being in possession of liquor and were fined in the sum of \$10 each. Mentaza Khan was fined \$50 on the charge of supplying.

GERMANY'S GOLD RESERVE FAILING

Copenhagen, June 30.—The Imperial Bank of Germany, for the first time since the war began, reports a decrease in the gold reserves. Some gold from Germany reached Holland lately, and the opinion is that this desperate enemy attempt is to save the mark from further and complete demoralization.

GENERAL NEWS ITEMS

(Special to The Daily News.) Paris, June 30.—Two French merchantmen over sixteen hundred tons, and three smaller ones were sunk last week.

Amsterdam.—The Austrian Emperor and the Empress will visit the King of Bavaria in Munich within a few days.

Prince Christopher, brother of ex-King Constantine, is said to be coming to London to marry a rich American woman.

Washington.—General Pershing's men in France have been nicknamed "Sammys." The title bids fair to stick.

The salmon embargo has been modified. The British prohibition on canned fish and lobsters has been raised.

The belief exists in Holland that next week's meeting of the Reichstag may produce startling results. The German press is declared to be completely muzzled. The Queen of Holland warns her people that more sacrifices may be necessary.

FEARS FOR AN OLD TIMER

Letters have been received in town making enquiry as to the estate of Wm. Logan, who enlisted in Prince Rupert and was drowned in Montreal a few days ago. At present there is no record of anyone by the name of Logan other than William McK. Logan, more commonly known as "Long Bill Logan," who is one of the most popular and best known of the old timers of this north country. The many friends of Long Bill Logan will sincerely hope that he is not the Wm. Logan referred to.

SAYS THE GOVERNMENT MEMBERS HAVE NO SONS

(Special to The Daily News.) Ottawa, June 30.—During the debate on the Military Service Bill Mr. A. Verville, the Liberal Labor member for Montreal, said that organized labor might declare a general strike in the event of the Government undertaking to enforce conscription without consulting the people. Mr. M. Martin, mayor of Montreal, predicted that the enforcement of the bill would bring about the end of confederation. "If you pass this bill," he said, "you are entering the realm of civil war. The Government have no sons."

HUNGER RIOTS IN GERMANY

Gothenberg, Sweden, June 28.—According to further details given by the newspaper Tijd by a resident of Gothenburg who witnessed them, the recent hunger riots in Sweden were of a most serious nature. Several persons were killed.

The riots began June 18. The mob was composed largely of women although some men took part in the disorders. The outbreak had its origin in rumors that food stuffs had been exported. The mob plundered shops and broke windows.

The police in the outlying parts of the city strenuously fought to quell the riots. One girl was reported to have been stabbed through the body with a sword. In the central part of the city the soldiers used machine guns and bayonets and several persons are reported to have been killed near the Hansa bridge.

The sound of firing was heard all night. Machine gun detachments were posted at various centres of the city throughout the following day. Work was generally resumed June 20th.

CONFEDERATION

Tomorrow will be a day of celebration throughout the length and breadth of Canada. The date marks the completion of the first fifty years of the life of the Dominion. It is a good thing for any nation to have a period at stated intervals, wherein they can take stock of themselves; wherein progress and achievement can be looked upon with national pride, and also wherein shortcomings may be noted.

In reviewing the growth and development of the nation during the past fifty years, the material progress is a most remarkable tribute to the people who form the nation. In 1867, Canada embraced an area of 540,000 square miles and since that time other territories have been organized into provinces which now give Canada 3,729,665 square miles, and more than double the population.

The increase in trade and commerce has been marvellous and even yet the full value of the resources of the country is unknown. The progress and development during the time since Confederation have only shown to some extent what the actual potentialities of this rich land, which is the heritage of Canadians, really are. And in our celebration of the event which occurred fifty years ago, it is impossible to look back over the past without also taking a glance into the future. If our wealth and material prosperity has increased tenfold or more during the past fifty years, the ratio of increase hence will be much greater. The wisdom of the Fathers of Confederation bequeathed this land of untold possibilities to us, and at this time, it may be well for us to ask ourselves if our wisdom has increased, as the results of their wisdom have. With all our greater wealth, it were well to remember that "righteousness exalteth a nation."

UNEQUAL TAXATION

One of the arguments with which Sir Thomas White, W. S. Middleboro', and others meet the demands for a high levy on war super-profits and the taxing of large incomes is that the Government is able to finance

the war on its present sources of revenue. The question of revenue in itself is not directly an issue in the minds of those who make the proposals referred to. They are more concerned with the readjustment of the burden of taxation, so that those who have the most shall pay the most, instead of those who have the least paying the most, as they do now.

Over sixty per cent. of the present revenue comes from customs taxation; thirty per cent. is drawn from excise and the so-called war taxes such as stamp duties and imposts on articles which in England are not taxed at all. A little over six per cent. is yielded by the tax on war profits and large incomes pay nothing at all.

Everybody knows, of course, that the average consumer pays the customs tax plus a super-tax which the protected interests add to the amount of the tariff rate. And he practically pays all the rest with the exception of the 6 1/2 per cent. of the total received from the war profits taxation. The burden of our taxation thus is inequitably distributed. What it needs is readjustment in accordance with elementary justice. The revenue would remain the same, if desirable, with the difference that those who are making most from the war would pay most towards its cost.

CONSCRIPTION

One element favors conscription of men without conscription of wealth. Another opposes conscription of men because it might involve conscription of wealth. A third wants conscription of wealth without conscription of men, while a fourth objects to the conscription of wealth because it might involve the conscription of men. The first and second represent a division of opinion among certain leaders of finance and industry. The second and third portray the conflict of thought at the other end of the economic pole. All of them are illogical; some of them are that and more.

The common ground upon which these extremes might meet is conscription all round.



which is advocated by a fifth class. It is just as easily accomplished as conscription of either man-power or money-power.

It is the right and duty of the state to require the employment of all its human and material resources for its defence when it is in danger, and it makes no difference whether that danger is in the form of a mob with its threat of chaos, organized lawlessness or an external enemy. The obligation is the same.

DETRAYED SHIPS TO GERMAN SUBMARINES

New York, June 28.—An officer of a liner from a Norwegian port which recently arrived has given out the news of the arrest and imprisonment of two Norwegian skippers of passenger steamers plying between ports of Norway and Great Britain for giving information to German submarine commanders of the sailings of British and neutral boats from Norway. One of the skippers has been twenty-five years in the trade and has been held in high esteem by the Norwegian Government. It was learned through secret service agents who travelled on his ship and that of the other convicted skipper that the pair had been working for a year in the pay of Germany before their duplicity was discovered.

At these meetings all statements of claim to water privileges under Acts passed before the 12th day of March, 1909, on any of these streams, all objections thereto, and the plans prepared for the use of the said Board, will then be open for inspection.

All persons interested are entitled to examine these, and to file objections thereto in writing if they deem fit. Objections will be heard forthwith if the party objected to has received sufficient notice of the objection.

THE DEBATE ON CONSCRIPTION

Ottawa, June 28.—At the outset of the debate on the conscription bill it was intimated that the government, having through the prime minister outlined the needs of the situation and explained the provisions of the measure, would put up few speakers, and would leave it to the opposition to monopolize the discussion in expatiating upon its various points of view. Sir George Foster and Sir Edward Kemp were to be the main speakers, following the prime minister, and after that there were to be few others. It has since apparently been decided that the government will put up a man for every man put up by the opposition. The debate has continued along these lines from the commencement, and it is likely to continue to do so for the better part of the week from all present indications. There will be very few members on either

side who will not have been heard from before the bill comes to a vote on the second reading.

From present indications the division will find about a score of Liberals voting against the Laurier amendment and for the second reading of the bill. It will find a few more voting for the amendment and on its defeat voting for the second reading. And it will find practically all of the French-Canadian members and a number of maritime provinces' men, together with a small group from Ontario and the west, voting for the amendment and against the second reading of the bill.

Referendum Preferable.

Mr. German based his support of the Laurier amendment on the principle that no punitive legislation can be placed on the statute book and enforced without the predominating backing of the people at large.

He believed that if the people were appealed to by a referendum in connection with the present measure they would approve of it. But he believed on the other hand that if it were forced upon the people nothing but distrust, discontent and disaster could follow.

Dr. Pugsley, who represents a constituency largely composed of United Empire Loyalists, took his political life in his hands and opposed the measure bitterly on the ground that the voluntary system had not been given a proper chance. Canada which already had done well, he argued, could give more effective aid to the Allies by preserving national unity than by jeopardizing it. A moribund parliament which did not represent the people and a government which had followed party lines since the beginning of the war, he declared, had no right to pass or enforce such a measure.

No Extension.

As significant of what may follow, Dr. Pugsley was accorded a good deal of applause when he declared that if extension were again brought up in parliament he would not repeat "his mistake" of last season by voting for it. The present government, he declared, had shown itself unworthy of that extension by bringing down an autocratic measure. All the more significant was the fact that Sir Wilfrid from his place said "Hear, hear."
