AUSTRIA BACKS UP GERMAN SUBMARINE CAMPAIGN -- EXPECTED U. S. ACTION

BOXES FOR LADIES

London, March 4.—The British forces are giving the fleeing Turks beyond Kut-el-Amara no chance to reform their broken columns. The pursuit is continuing and the retreating enemy forces are being engaged on three sides. Many of the stores and baggage which the Turks did manage to take with them on their flight across the desert they have been compelled to abandon. Several of their field guns and howitzers they have thrown into the River Tigris. One of the British gunboats captured in the previous campaign has been recaptured now.

THE PENSION SCALE

Of the numerous particulars in which the pension scale is unjust and inadequate there is none more readily apparent than the provision for women dependents of soldiers. It would be interesting to learn upon what the Pensions Committee of parliament based its recommendations in this respect, not to speak of the scale as a whole. It could not have been upon the cost of living in Canada in normal times. As far as we have been able to discover in the Hansard record of the discussion of the report—a discussion which was deferred until the very last day of the session of 1916—the Hon. Frank Oliver was the only member who appreciated the inadequacy of the provision for soldiers' wives and mothers in the pension scale.

Under the scale thus adopted a soldier's widow receives \$32 per month and a widowed mother \$28.80 per month. A widow with three children receives \$50 per month, \$6 per month being allowed for each child up to the age of sixteen, if a boy, and up to seventeen, if a girl. We submit that these allowances are entirely inadequate and we shall prove our contention by reference to an authority which was more accessible to the committee than it is to us.

According to the January number of "The Labor Gazette" issued by the department of labor, Ottawa, the cost per week of an average family budget of staple foods, fuel and lighting, based upon an investigation of the prices in sixty Canadian cities, was \$16.32 last December. This, however, is war time and economic conditions are abnormal, so we shall be content with the budget estimate before the struggle. In 1914 the weekly budget per family was \$14.30, in 1913 it was \$14.02, in 1912 it was \$13.78. This budget, it will be observed, dealt with food, fuel and lighting. It does not include clothing, an item which must substantially raise the

weekly cost. Thus it is clear that according to the pension scale, families of soldiers killed in their country's service cannot avoid a serious monthly deficit.

There should be no deficit nor the slightest danger of one for these dependents if this country desires to escape everlasting reproach and shame. For the moment we are not considering the other glaring defects in the scale—the inequalities between ranks, the unique discovery that the child of a captain in this democratic country is worth a dollar a month more than the child of the various grades below him; these are all bad enough. What is most pressing at this juncture is the need of such a readjustment of that outrageous schedule as will absolutely safeguard families who die in their country's service against poverty.

It is estimated that the cost to the country of pensions on the present scale will be \$28,000,000 per annum. That should be regarded as a minor aspect only. As we have pointed out before, the men who volunteered for overseas service did not count the cost; indeed, they were expected not to do so. Now it is the duty of the country to show an equal disregard of this factor in providing for the dependents of those who, though not counting the cost, have paid it to the last full measure, as well as those who have been maimed and otherwise incapacitated in the war. This should have priority of consideration over every other demand upon the country's financial resources. If it called for \$56,000,000 instead of \$28,000,000, which, of course it will not do, it should be cheerfully paid. In any case this pension scale should be thoroughly overhauled. In its readjustment the schedules and regulations of other countries should be forgotten and our men should be rewarded and they and their dependents provided for solely in conformity with the conditions prevalent here, not those of Australia, New Zealand or the United Kingdom.—Victoria Times.

GERMANY'S EYE ON FRENCH ORE LANDS

London, Feb. 27.—In the course of a debate in the Prussian Diet on the trades budget, according to a Reuter despatch from Amsterdam, the National Liberal deputy, Fuhrmann, said that President Wilson was anxious to place the world's peace on a solid basis, but events had shown how solid that basis was. As for a league for a world peace, he said:

"We do not intend to found our future upon the United States of America, but upon our own strength."

Herr Fuhrmann further said: "Field Marshal von Hindenburg has pointed out the great importance of the ore lands of Briey and Longwy (France), and we shall not allow this region to be taken from us. Even the Socialists agree that certain frontiers must be removed."

"If a statesman returned from the war without Briey, Longwy, Belgium, Courland and Lithuania, history would call him the gravedigger of German power and greatness. Our nation must not be allowed to emerge from the war without enhanced power."

A Centrist deputy said: "After the brutal rejections of our magnanimous peace offer, the peace programme must not contain a clause to the effect that every country must bear its own war expenses." He demanded a substantial guarantee that the Entente Powers keep their hands off Belgium, and insisted that Germany do everything to recover her colonies.

**BRITISH PURSES
NOT YET EMPTY**

London—The Times in an edi-
torial entitled "Colossal Subscrip-
tions," says:

"Mr. Bonar Law announced in
the House of Commons that the
loan had brought at least £700,-
000,000 new money. The figure
is necessarily provisional, for the
applications are not yet fully
counted. Indeed, numbers which
arrived late in the provinces had
not reached the Bank of England.
For full details we must wait un-
til next week. This amazing sub-
scription has been obtained, it
must be remembered, at a time
when we are raising the revenue
by over £500,000,000. Not a penny
moreover is included by way of
direct applications by the banks
themselves, which in 1915 provid-
ed £200,000,000 out of the £600,-
000,000 resulting from the issue
of 4½ per cents. In 1915, too, a
considerable proportion of the
money subscribed by the public
was for the purpose of fulfilling
conditions imposed on the con-
version of consols and the 3½
per cent loan. Nothing of that
sort operated this time as an ex-
traordinary inducement to investors.
This nation may well be proud of
the result of the loan. The mes-
sage will speak to the world in no
uncertain accents.

"There are some things worth
pointing out about the broad re-
sult. One is its amazing success.
But it is not the limit of what
might have been attained. If any-
body is disposed to imagine that
the pockets of the public men are
drained he must be very blind to
the actual conditions throughout
the country, also as to what is
already going on in the city. It
is very useful to be able to feel
that if necessary any such loan
as the present one can be brought
out again at the proper time.
