MR. CLEMENTS GIVES PLANS FOR COMOX-ATLIN

COPIES OF THE DAILY NEWS PROVE CLUE TO HIS IDENTITY

DEAD BODY OF MAN KILLED ON WASHINGTON RAILROAD IS SUPPOSED TO BE P. J. CARRIGAN, THE PROSPECTOR, HAD MUSHED HERE FROM EDMONTON LAST AUGUST.

P. J. Carrigan, the lone prospector who a few weeks ago munched it all alone from Edmonton to Prince Rupert, is dead, having met a tragic death on the railroad track near Kelso, Washington. Of that there is little doubt after reading a letter which arrived at The News office from Dr. Floyd A. Bird, coroner of Comox county, Washington.

The dead man, who was struck by a train, was identified through having in his pocket a copy of the Prince Rupert Daily News and a clipping, both relating to the exploits of Carrigan as published in The News of Monday, September 25th. He is described by the coroner as a man of about 150 pounds, 5 feet 7 inches tall, with dark hair and clean shaven face. At the time of his death he was wearing a greenish blue suit and a gray mackinaw coat. The description leaves little doubt that the unfortunate victim of the railroad is Mr. Carrigan.

MAYOR MAKES NO COMMENT

On Subject of City's Defeat He is Silent—Says McMordie Case Will Take Its Course—A Wildcat Resignation Rumor Denied.

Mayor Manson had nothing to say this morning in regard to the city's defeat in the Supreme Court yesterday. Asked what he thought of the Judge's opinion of the strike period particularly, he declined to venture any comment. Regarding the S. P. McMordie case, the Mayor said that this would come up before Council in course. He was not immediately concerned with it. City Solicitor Peters mentioned that the McMordie case was not nearly in shape to come before the Supreme Court yet, and would certainly not be heard at this sitting.

POMP AND POWER AT OLD DELHI

On Golden Thrones King and Queen Are Viewed by a Procession of Natives—Took an Hour and a Half to Pass Along.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) Delhi, Dec. 14.—The King and Queen were given a great ovation at the garden party last night, at which seven thousand guests were present. Late in the afternoon their Majesties, seated on golden thrones, watched for an hour and a half a long train of religious and other native processions pass in review, depicting the customs of the ancient Mogul empire.

TO REPLACE THE KESTREL

Proposal That the Dominion Government Purchase Hon. James Dunsuir's Yacht Delaura for Fishing Cruiser.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) Victoria, Dec. 14.—It is reported here that the Dominion Government may purchase the steam yacht Delaura, the property of Hon. James Dunsuir, for the fisheries protection service on the coast. The craft is being held at a price of \$125,000.

A PRINCE RUPERT CASE

Dispute Over Lot Heard Before Supreme Court at Victoria.

(Special to Daily News.) Victoria, Dec. 14.—Prince Rupert figured largely in the Supreme Court today when Chief Justice Hunter heard an application by John Irving of this city for reversion on a piece of property in the northern town. Defendants in the case are Arthur Pearson and William Moser of Vancouver. The case is not yet concluded.

BANK ROBBERS RAID

Three Masked Men Enter Bank of Commerce at Everett.

(Special to Daily News.) Everett, Dec. 14.—Three masked men entered the Bank of Commerce just before the closing hour last night and at the point of the gun demanded all the money in sight from a lone clerk. They secured \$1,500. There is no clue to the robbers.

NO USE FOR RUSSIA

Persecution of the Jews is Resented by the United States

\$2,000,000 DEFENSE FUND IS PRACTICALLY ALL SPENT

STATEMENT IS MADE CONCERNING McNAMARA CASE BY SECRETARY FRANK MORRISON OF THE A. F. OF L. DARROW'S FEE WAS \$50,000 OR OVER.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) New York, Dec. 14.—Not less than \$50,000 was the fee received by Clarence Darrow for his services in defending the McNamara brothers in the Los Angeles dynamiting case, according to a declaration made here by Frank B. Morrison, secretary of the American Federation of Labor and custodian of the McNamara defense fund.

Mr. Morrison also said that for days after the McNamara brothers' plea of guilty money for their defense was pouring in. The subscriptions were made before the pleas were entered.

MADE ELOQUENT AND SYMPATHETIC APPEAL ON THE INDIANS' BEHALF

Rev. W. E. Collison in a Masterly Address Told of the History, Religion, Character and Deeds of the Indians—Has Been Brought Up Among Them and Has Faith in Their Future

Intensely interesting was the address delivered in the Presbyterian Church hall last night by Rev. W. E. Collison on "The Indians of the North Pacific Coast." Far too small an audience heard it. Born, himself, on the coast with Indian boys only as his playmates for his early years, Mr. Collison has the Indian tongues at marvelous command, and his illustrations of the power of expression in the many languages of the coast Indians well conveyed the fact that the coast races have sprung from no mean crowd of savages, but seem rather to have degenerated from a highly developed race.

Old Indian Legends. Touching on the far-reaching "crest system" of the Indians, on their laws of succession, of marriage and of revenge in the early days, Rev. Collison held his audience in rapt attention for over two hours. He told the story of the totem pole with one or two of the familiar legends which the Indians hand down, one in particular being strikingly reminiscent of the Bible account of Jonah and the whale.

The Indians' Appeal. To repeat last night's lecture would take a whole paper. It was to the last degree full, varied and interesting. In his conclusion the Rev. Mr. Collison struck a fine note of appeal for the Indian races, anxious now after all their long history to become like the white men, whom they so aptly mimic. He spoke of the reserves, denying that they contain so much better land than that about them and pointing out that there is little chance of the Indians ever improving land to which they have neither individually nor in community any real title.

ENGLISH SPIES' HEAVY SENTENCE

Schultz, a Ship Broker Found Guilty of Espionage, Receives Seven Years and His Companion Twelve Years.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) Leipzig, Germany, Dec. 14.—Heavy punishments were meted out to the English spies arrested at Hamburg in March last. Schultz, the English ship broker, received a sentence of seven years and another man named Hipsch twelve years. Wulff received two years and two others three years each.

SUPREME COURT SESSION ENDS

Case of Beaton vs. Christiansen & Brandt Decided for Plaintiff Today with \$4,000 Commission and Costs.

Mr. Justice Clements after hearing the evidence in the case of Angus Beaton vs. Messrs. Christiansen & Brandt today found for the plaintiff, Beaton, for the amount of \$4,000 and costs, being half the profits on a Lakelse valley land deal which Beaton had furthered for the firm named. Messrs. Williams & Manson appeared for plaintiff and L. W. Patmore for defendants.

This case ends the sitting of the Supreme Court in Prince Rupert for this time. Judge Clements having adjourned the court sine die when he rose at 12:30 today.

DAINTY WORK DONE IN GAOL

Prisoner Valentine Stella Has Modelled in Chewed Bread a Whole Street Grading Outfit With Drills and Wheelbarrow.

Work of marvelous neatness considering the uncouth material used has been executed in chewed bread and a few chips of wood by Prisoner Valentine Stella, held on an assault charge in the city gaol. Repeated adjournments have caused this case to drag on for many days, and during the delay Stella has secretly contrived to pass the time by modeling with his dinner bread a full miner's equipment or street grading outfit for a wheelbarrow gang. All kinds of drills, crowbars and hammers, a pick, a mattack, a double bitted axe, a pointed shovel and a wonderfully neat wheelbarrow have been made by the prisoner. The work was not quite finished when discovered and confiscated by the police. Stella has repeatedly asked to be set to work, but this cannot be allowed under the circumstances of his case, which is still pending.

NO HOPE FOR MINERS

Tragedy of the Tennessee Coal Mining Disaster Deepens.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) Bryceville, Dec. 14.—With the passing of another day without the discovery of any more live men in the Cross Mountain mine hope for the rescue of the fifty men still unaccounted for has reached the lowest ebb. Forty-five bodies have been recovered thus far.

Seattle, Dec. 14.—A heavy gold hunting case watch, suitably engraved, has been presented to Captain J. C. Hunter of the steamship Northwestern at Seattle by a committee of the passengers of the steamship on the southbound trip just ended, during which the vessel was storm beaten for eight days. During all that time the captain never had an opportunity to remove his clothing and for one period of 50 hours he was on the bridge and in the pilot house continuously.

“NOT A LEG TO STAND ON.”

After a long and costly trial the city authorities have learned from the lips of a learned judge of the Supreme Court that which any humble citizen could have told them for nothing; namely, that “in point of substantial justice and common honesty they had not a leg to stand on” in refusing to pay the contractors’ bills. Indeed, these were almost the very words used by Alderman Morrissey when he entered protest against the actions that City Solicitor Peters was urging the city to take part in.

“It will only cost the city three hundred dollars, and it’s worth that to us to find out the law,” declared an alderman. The city has learned the law; it would be interesting to know at what cost.

Mr. Justice Clement has had previous knowledge of the ways of Prince Rupert local authorities. He it was who tried the Prudhomme case, and his scathing words in issuing the mandamus to renew the license will be remembered. The same attempt to play petty politics with the public offices was apparent in both cases. The pity of it is that the ratepayers in both cases will be called upon to pay the bills.

It would be easy to write columns in scorn of the conduct of the Council, but columns of scorn cannot undo the past, and the Council is too near its end to be worth many words. All that is not worth bothering about is to see that for next year a new Council, composed of non-political business men, is elected to carry out the affairs of the city on a non-political basis.

The ideal form of civic government—the only form that offers scope for specialised administration under democratic control—is government by commission. That, even in a modified form, has been denied the citizens by the Provincial Government, who seemingly view with disfavor the possibility of a non-political city government. Until such time as a party of progress can revise the Municipal Clauses Act, there is nothing for the citizens to do but elect—if they can—a Council of non-party business men and run the city as far as our human deficiencies and failings permit on strictly business principles.

To keep itself above suspicion, The News has purposely refrained from mentioning the names of anyone or either mayor or council. In exhorting others to refrain from political distinctions in civic affairs, it is prepared to show the way.

The utter defeat, the shaming that the civic authorities have subjected the citizens to in their efforts to play petty politics with the contractors will not be made the occasion for bitterness or diatribes, but rather to urge the citizens to rally to the standard of a non-party civic administration.

With the exception of the grafters, there is no man in Prince Rupert, whether he be Liberal, Conservative, Labor, Socialist or Anarchist, but stands to gain by a progressive business administration, and to suffer by a continuance of machine rule.
