



### A CITY WITHOUT FIRES.

Following is an editorial which, though never written for Prince Rupert readers, speaks for itself to every citizen of this city. Comment upon it may be very safely left to the citizens themselves, and the new City Council.

"Calgary is a city without fires," says the Morning Albertan. "During last year the total damage to property by fire amounted to less than \$25,000. There was not a single fire that got away with the brigade. No single fire caused a loss of \$10,000.

"This is very satisfactory. That is a very safe and desirable state of affairs. The report itself is very excellent publicity literature, because the manufacturers, whom we are so anxious to interest in Calgary, after looking into the cost of production, almost immediately look into the fire protection.

"Chief Smart is largely responsible for this very excellent condition of affairs. He organized the force and was the main factor in insisting upon the very best equipment. In ancient days, when the city was smaller, Chief Smart laid the foundation for the present state of the brigade. He approached the city in a somewhat unique way, but his visits had results. He never went to the Council with any "Please, Mr. Alderman, will you get this apparatus for the city fire brigade?" He took the other course, and went down to Council and said that the brigade had to have such and such, and not only couldn't get along without it, but simply wouldn't get along without it. He always got what he wanted before he left the council chamber. Some of the aldermen later on might say that "Cappy" Smart was a bit domineering, but that was the way to act with a council.

"The result is that Calgary has the best euipped and best organized force of any city of its size in any part of Canada or the United States. That such a perfect and well managed organization should be built up in so short a time in a new city is very creditable to

the men interested in building it up. "But the fact that our losses last year amounted to practically nothing is merely one result. We have the brigade, the equipment and the water pressure. The real result is that we have the best insurance rates of any city in Canada. That means many thousands

and thousands of dollars. "This is a very satisfactory condition of affairs and means much money and great security for the city. Our fire brigade is a branch of the city which is well managed and shows the very best results."

We have not got a "Chief Smart" at the head of our Prince Rupert fire brigade, but if we have a smart chief it comes to the same thing.


