## CRISIS IS ON BETWEEN CHINA AND JAPAN

### ENEMY TAKES TRENCHES ON HILL 60, BUT ARE REPULSED--ATTACK DARDANELLES

#### JAPAN AND CHINA WILL FIGHT REPORT JAP TROOPS SAILED

EMPEROR PRESIDED YESTERDAY OVER COUNCIL OF ELDER STATESMEN, WHO INSIST ON THE DEMANDS MADE ON CHINA.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Tokyo, May 6.—Emperor Yoshihito presided at a meeting of the Elder Statesmen of Japan today. The council fully endorsed Foreign Minister Kato's demands on China. The War Office has admitted that troops have embarked on transports for a secret destination. Martial law has been declared in Kwang Lung Peninsula.

War is now regarded as certain between Japan and China. Japs Leave Mukden. Mukden, May 6.—Under consular order, there is a Japanese exodus from Mukden. The Japanese troops occupy a strategic position. Chinese soldiers are moving south of the city. At Hankow, the Japanese barracks have been prepared to withstand a siege.

#### NEW OFFENSIVE STARTS AGAINST DARDANELLES

London, May 6.—New violent attacks on the Dardanelles forts and the Smyrna positions are reported. Fifteen hundred Turks were killed near Magahuran, led by German officers. They were repulsed by British bayonets. The Allies at Gallipoli have commenced a general advance into the interior. French artillery is being landed.

The Queen Mary Chapter Independent Order of Daughters of the Empire has sent eighty-two pairs of hand-knitted socks to Captain Clayton at The Willows for the Prince Rupert men under his charge. Last Saturday they forwarded a bale of khaki handkerchiefs to the men on active service.

#### TRACT IN SEWARD SOLD.

Seward, May 6.—E. E. Rudolph has sold the north half of his homestead to Herbert Tozier and Derrick Lane, well known Alaskans, for \$30,000 cash. This is the last of four tracts on Resurrection Bay to which patent has been issued by the government. All the other land on the bay has been reserved by the government.

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#### BRITISH BORROW SHIPS INTERNED BY GERMANS

San Francisco, May 6.—First of the German tramp steamers "borrowed" by the British is the C-12, formerly the German freighter Wotan, which has arrived from Newcastle by way of Honolulu, where a full cargo of coal was discharged. The C-12 is to load here with a full cargo of fodder for Australia and went to Port Costa for that purpose this afternoon.

The steamer was interned for nine months at Newcastle, and was then taken over by the Australian government as a transport. According to one of the officers on board, the government "borrows" these German vessels and at the close of the war they will be turned back to Germany and a price paid for their use in the meantime.

#### JAPAN'S FIRST BREACH OF PROMISE ACTION

Tokyo, April 3.—(Correspondence)—Miss Hede Nozawa has won \$10,000 by the award of the highest court of Japan from Sozohira Vanaka for breach of promise, which is not only the first breach of promise case to be adjudicated in Japan but a long step forward in the recognition of the rights of women, who, under the old regime were considered more or less as chattels, as they still are in most of the Orient.

Under the existing law, a marriage is not valid unless registered, and registration is not compulsory or even usual. Miss Nozawa had consented to share Vanaka's house on the condition that their union be entered on the records. Vanaka put the matter off for months, and then left the house after quarreling with the girl.

Instead of yielding to circumstances, Nozawa brought suit. One court turned down the case. She took it to another. Again she lost. But undiscouraged, she went to the highest court.

#### FIVE MORE SHIPS TORPEDOED-- GERMANS USED GAS BUT FAILED

GERMANS MADE DESPERATE ATTEMPT TO CAPTURE HILL 60 AND WON SOME OF THE TRENCHES BUT WERE DISLODGED.

(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, May 6.—The trawler Stratton of Grimsby, the schooner Earl of Lathom and the steamer Cherberry have been torpedoed. The crews were rescued. The steamer Cathay, from Copenhagen to China, was also either mined or torpedoed in the North Sea. Her crew and passengers were saved.

The Swedish steamer Vanadis was sunk in the Baltic by the German cruiser Silvana for disobeying the signal to stop.

#### Lost Trenches Regained.

Paris, May 6.—(Official)—At North Ypres we easily repulsed night attack. The British and allied forces regained the trenches on Hill 60 lost earlier in the day through the Germans using gas.

#### FISH TRADE

The way Prince Rupert is robbing Vancouver of its fish trade is evident from figures just to hand. In January last there were 540,000 pounds of halibut landed here as against 315,000 pounds in Vancouver. In February Prince Rupert got 625,000 pounds to Vancouver's 215,000. The catch landed in Prince Rupert for April was 750,200. At a flat rate of 4 cents per pound this amounts to more than \$30,000 for the month, most of which has been spent as a payroll in Prince Rupert. Considering that the fish business is just starting here the showing is remarkable and is a foretaste of the possibility of the industry. A couple of million pounds a month, which is well within the range of the possible, would make this one of the most thriving cities on the continent.

#### CETRIANA HAS NARROW ESCAPE IN MEXICO

San Diego, May 6.—Without a pound of coal aboard, an ounce of food or a pint of water, the British steamship Cetriana was towed into San Diego harbor by the United States cruiser Denver.

The Cetriana sailed from Mazatlan for Ensenada and San Diego April 14, said First Officer Seaberg. The customs officials refused the Cetriana clearance papers from Mazatlan, but the vessel proceeded to sea. When the Cetriana arrived at Ensenada Captain Kerr was taken ashore by a squad of soldiers and says Seaberg, was placed under detention and requested to sign a statement turning over the Cetriana's cargo to the Mexican authorities. Captain Kerr refused. Then a second squad of soldiers came aboard the vessel and took the two radio operators and the purser ashore.

After this, according to Seaberg, a Mexican colonel boarded the Cetriana and stated he had received orders from the military commander of Lower California to unload the Cetriana's cargo.

"While he was telling me of this order," said Seaberg, "a lighter came alongside. I told him that under no circumstances would I permit him to loosen the hatch coverings. After much parleying he went ashore and before he could return the cruiser Denver hove in sight.

Commander Ziezemeier of the Denver, after learning of the trouble, succeeded in getting the men and vessel released."

#### QUARTERS LEAVE TRACT IN SEWARD

Seward, Alaska, May 6.—The quarters who staked claims on the Alaska Railroad terminal tract have withdrawn from the land. Some of them, however, delayed moving their tents and lost them when newcomers, bound for the trail for Ship Creek, read the notices ordering the immediate removal of the tents, seized them and carried them away. Frank Ballaine, who, with his brother, John E. Ballaine, is being sued by the Alaska Northern Railway for title to the Seward Railroad townsite, declares that the land was not bought with railroad funds, as alleged in the complaint cabled to Valdez from San Francisco, but was staked with his own scrip and bought with his own money. Mr. Ballaine had had the original check and receipt to prove his title to the land, of which he claims to have had undisputed possession for twelve years.

**EDITORIALS**

The horrors of six thousand Canadian casualties in one fight seems to have knocked the notion of an immediate election out of the air. Indeed, it has had a very sobering effect all round upon the whole country. Six thousand out of twenty thousand men is a very large proportion to lose in a single fight, and gives some idea of the tremendous sacrifices that will yet be demanded of the country before victory is assured. Anybody who is expecting a speedy triumph over the Germans has not seriously sized up the situation. It is doubtful if there is a better soldier in the world than the German, apart from the Briton, and with the hordes of men at their disposal it is all folly to expect an end of the war in the near future.

Considering these facts, which seem to be admitted in official circles, it seems difficult to understand the fact that there is not a greater call for men. The British papers do not seem to be worried about the number of recruits offering, so that one is led to believe that they have already all the necessary men at their disposal. In Canada, too, there are still large numbers of men who are ready to enlist if the occasion demands it. Perhaps the huge orders for shells that are placed throughout the world will explain why more recruits are not being asked for. It may be that the intention is to pour so much artillery fire into the German ranks that there will be little left for the infantry to do. Since a shortage of ammunition seems to be Germany's vulnerable point this no doubt would be good tactics and will probably be carried out.

American advocates of peace and international friendship are in danger of being misled, in very much the same way as

people are sometimes misled in politics. When a government or a party does wrong, the cry is raised that all governments do wrong, and that one party is as bad as another. So long as that plea is allowed, no wrong will ever be righted. It is the same with nations. Those who say that all the nations of Europe are wicked and violent, and that they ought to be quiet, are evading the question and excusing wrongdoing. Who is right? Who is wrong? Is Belgium right? Is Germany wrong? Roosevelt goes right to the heart of the question when he addressed the Women's Peace party of the United States in these words:

"Belgium has been trampled into bloody mire. Frightful wrongs have been committed upon the men, women and children of Belgium. The Belgians have fought valiantly against their oppression. Yet this paper you enclose does not contain one protest against the commission of such wrongs as have been committed on Belgium, and does denounce war in such fashion as to include in the condemnation the Belgians just as much as the oppressors of Belgium.

"We have before us that concrete case. Let the people who advocate the platform and principles you enclosed hold a meeting specially to denounce the invasion of Belgium by Germany and to demand that in the interests of peace the United States do what it can to put a stop to those wrongs."

Although Roosevelt is not generally known as an advocate of peace, he has the right idea as to the only way to bring about peace and abolish war. We do that in a civilized nation by law and the enforcement of right, protecting the weak against the strong. A child walks the streets of Toronto in safety because he can



appeal to the police, and because the handful of police have behind them the force of every decent man in the community. We must do that, or something like that, in the community of nations. We must recognize the possibility of a criminal among the nations; We must have a criminal international law as well as a civil international law. A brutal assault such as Germany has made upon Belgium must be punished as the assault of a blackguard upon a child would be punished in Toronto. Some day, we are convinced, civilization will advance that far and rise to that height. We shall attain to a lasting peace. But we shall not achieve it by confounding the innocent with the guilty, and treating like the yells of the ruffian who assails it.—Toronto Star.

**AMERICANS MOVING INTO CANADA**

Saskatoon, Sask., May 6.—"Within the past week," said Mr. J. Bruce Walker, Dominion government Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, in the course of an interview, "441 immigrants have arrived from the Western States, bringing with them \$163,754 in cash, and \$20,435 in effects. During the same period, 366 homesteads were taken up in Western Canada. Eighty-five per cent of the American immigrants are farmers, and all of them are well equipped financially. This year, so far, the influx of such people is as great, if not greater than last year's. The prospects are entirely encouraging. When seeding is completed in the United States, we may expect a large number of landseekers from there. Correspondence with regard to lands is greater than at any time during the past two or three years. I also look for a very considerable increase in the migratory movement of agriculturists from Eastern Canada to Western Canada during this spring and summer. Already several large trainloads of Ontario men have arrived and are looking over the West, and a continuation of present grain prices will bring a great many more. Western farming, as an agricultural proposition, is becoming more attractive to the Canadian farmer."

# REPRISALS ARE TO BE MADE AGAINST ENEMY

Ottawa, May 6.—The attempt made by three German prisoners in Fort Henry barracks, Kingston, to injure the guards and escape from the camp for interns may have international developments. The decision of the supreme mili- tary court in Germany in impos- ing a sentence of death upon Pri- vate W. Lonsdale, of Leeds, Eng- land, for attacking a German non-commissioned officer at the military prison camp at Doebritz has aroused the military authori- ties here. It is claimed that if the sentence is carried out upon Private Lonsdale that a court- martial will be held in Canada and a similar sentence meted out to the German prisoners.

This can be done under mili- tary law, which is the only law in vogue where prisoners of war are concerned. Among the Ger- man prisoners is a well known German officer holding the rank of count in the German Empire, and an owner of large properties in the West. It is claimed that he was the ringleader in the at- tack upon the guards.

**Deliberate Attempt.**  
 In Private William Lonsdale's case the evidence goes to show that he only struck the non-com- missioned officer under extreme provocation, while in the case of the prisoners at Fort Henry bar- racks a deliberate attempt was made without the slightest provo- cation on the part of the military authorities to do away with the guards and escape from the prison.

It is considered here by the mili- tary authorities that it is about time the Germans were taught that Germany is not the only country in which prisoners of war are confined. If Private William Lonsdale receives the death pen- alty for defending himself under provocation from German tyrann- y, it is claimed here by the mili- tary authorities that surely nothing less than the death penalty could be measured out to men who without the slightest provo- cation at all made an attempt upon their guards.

General Hughes stated positive- ly that if Private Lonsdale is shot by the Germans there will be reprisals in Canada and the victims will be the mutinous German prisoners at Kingston, Ont.

## DR. LEE, RECTOR OF FASHIONABLE CHURCH, CLAIMS HEALING POWER

Los Angeles, May 6.—Rivaling the miraculous cures of the European shrines and reviving an ancient rite of the Church of England, forgotten for more than 100 years, Rev. Baker P. Lee, rector of the fashion Christ Episcopal Church here, declared yesterday that he is healing the sick, the halt and the blind by the laying on of hands and the anointment with sacred oils.

Dr. Lee is well known on the Pacific Coast and has been rector of Christ's Church for many years. In the recent campaign to make California dry he was opposed to the proposed prohibition amendments as drafted.

More than 250 men and women, declares Dr. Lee, have been healed before the altar in Christ Church within the last four weeks.

This is the first time in the history of America that such a healing service has been introduced into the Episcopal Church. It was brought back from England by Dr. Lee and his wife, who, on their recent trip abroad, found that the long forgotten rite had been revived in a small Episcopal church near London with marvelous success.

Already the Episcopal Church in Philadelphia is considering this divine healing service, according to Christ Church members.

### CERTIFICATE OF APPROVAL.

1. WHEREAS the Corporation of the City of Prince Rupert is incorporated under an Act entitled the "City of Prince Rupert Incorporation Act, 1910,"—B. C. Statutes 1910, Chapter 41:  
2. AND, WHEREAS, by Resolution of the Council of the said Corporation authority was given to stake water rights on the North Arm of Wark Channel:  
3. AND, WHEREAS, the said Corporation has applied for a water licence to divert water from Thulme River, a tributary of the said North Arm, for power purpose:  
4. AND, WHEREAS, the said corporation has, after due notice, petitioned for the approval of its undertaking as far as it relates to the said application for a licence:

6. THIS IS TO CERTIFY that the undertaking of the said corporation in so far as it relates to the said application for a licence is approved, subject to the terms and conditions of the "Water Act, 1914," and to the following additional terms and conditions:  
7. Any licence issued under said application shall, notwithstanding the issue of this certificate, be subject to adjustment by the Board of Investigation:

The said undertaking has been divided into two parts, the first part consisting of the surveys of such of the works proposed in the said application for a licence as the Comptroller of Water Rights shall consider necessary, and the second part consisting of the construction, maintenance, and operation of such works.  
9. The surveys required under the first part shall be commenced on or before the 1st day of June, 1915, and the plans thereof shall be deposited with the Comptroller of Water Rights on or before the 1st day of November, 1917.  
10. The second part of the undertaking shall not be commenced until a bylaw under the provisions of which the said Corporation propose to carry out the undertaking has been duly passed and approved, nor until a further certificate of approval under Section 23 of the "Water Act, 1914," has been issued.  
11. The territory within which the said Corporation shall exercise its powers in respect of the use of the said water is the City of Prince Rupert.

## CONDITIONS FOR CROP IN WEST EXCELLENT

Saskatoon, Sask.—With the exception of a few recent raw days, the weather for weeks past has been genial and beautiful in an almost unseasonable degree. The leaves have already burst their buds; a distinct suggestion of early green hovers like a mist among the trees. Most of the migratory birds have arrived. The grasses and woodland growths have thoroughly awakened. Garden enthusiasts have been busy for some time. Perennials are inches above the ground. Pansy beds are showing their first blooms. The pink buds of the peony are thrust through the brown earth. Children romp around in cotton garb. There has been no earlier or more perfect season for many years. The farmer is very busy on the land. Probably from 50 to 60 per cent of the seeding is completed under conditions which leave little to be desired. Except in a few scattered localities, there has been no rain, so far. However, this is of no consequence as the land is full of moisture. From a number of indications, it now seems that the increase in the seeded acreage for the present season will be considerably over, rather than under the present estimate of 20 to 25 per cent. There can be no doubt that much land which, in the ordinary course, would have been summer-fallowed this year, will be cropped instead. Prices are tempting; and the farmer needs the money. He has weighed the risk—and, decided to take it.
