RUSSO-GERMAN NAVAL FIGHT IN BALTIC SEA

ZEPPELIN DROPS BOMBS ON ENGLISH COAST--ITALIANS MAKE IMPORTANT MOVE

ALLIES CAPTURE TWO LINES OF TRENCHES IN DARDANELLES

AN HAMILTON REPORTS IMPORTANT GAIN ON LAND--AIDED BY WARSHIPS--SIR JOHN DICKSON REPORTS IMPORTANT CAPTURES IN ASIATIC TURKEY.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, June 7.—Sir Ian Hamilton reports that the Allies in the Dardanelles have captured two lines of trenches over a three-front, making a general advance of 500 yards. Warships aided the movement. Among several hundred prisoners taken, six German sailors from the *U-10*.
In Asiatic Turkey.
London, June 7.—Sir John Dick-

son, in command of British operations along the Tigris, in Asiatic Turkey, reports the surrender of the German governor with 30 officers and 700 men.

General Gorringer's column captured in one day, 80 officers, 2,000 men, 7 field guns, 6 naval guns, the gunboat *Mermais*, a large river steamer, 3 small steamers and 12 steel barges. Further surrenders are expected.

REPORTED CAPTURE OF GENERAL TURNER FALSE

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, June 7.—Major General Hughes has received a message stating that General Turner had been captured, and is with the British. The report of the capture of General Turner came from Berlin, and is evidently an example of German fiction.

D. LLOYD GEORGE TOURS INDUSTRIAL CENTRES

London, June 7.—Mr David Lloyd George is making a tour of the British industrial centres in order to impress upon the men the necessity of devoting all their energies to aiding the Empire.

Mr. Lloyd George, in addressing the Liverpool dockers on Saturday, made the statement that nothing can pull us through the present serious situation except the united efforts of every man in the British Empire.

Mr. Lloyd George, in working the munitions department, intends to throw the main responsibility for the production of goods upon the various districts themselves, telling them what is wanted, giving them power to discipline employers and workmen and putting it up to them to deliver the goods. This is expected to eliminate red tape and centralized meddling.

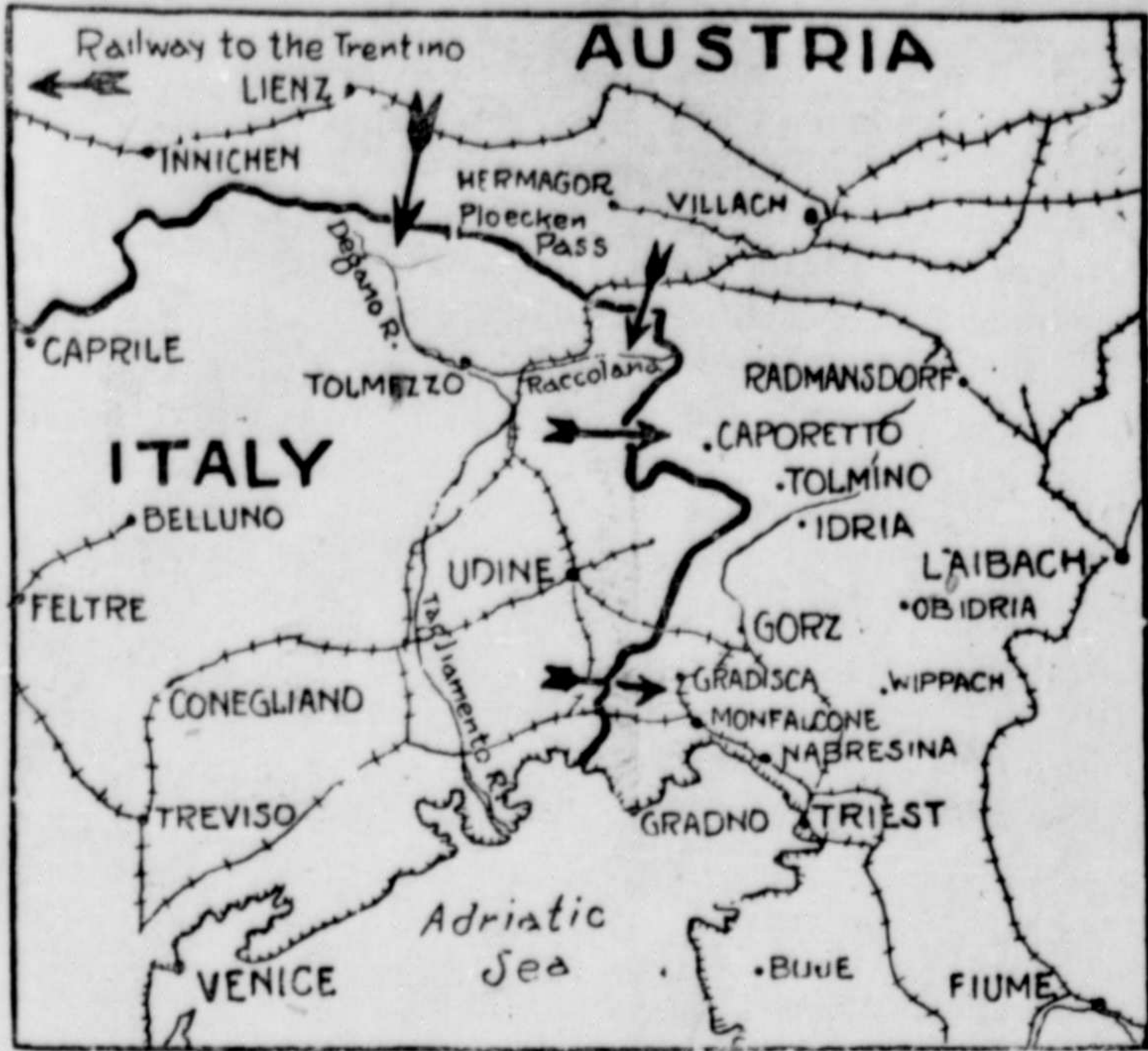

NAVAL BATTLE IN BALTIC--GERMAN FLEET LEAVES KIEL

RUSSIAN AND GERMAN FLEETS FIGHTING AT ENTRANCE TO GULF OF RIGA--GERMANS LOSE TRANSPORTS -- A FRENCH MINE LAYER STRIKES MINE.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, June 7.—There has been a naval engagement at the entrance to Gulf of Riga. The Germans lost several transports and one large unnamed warship. The Russians lost an auxiliary ship. The German fleet has left the Kiel Canal and joined in the engagement.

Mine Layer Strikes Mine.
Paris, June 7.—The French mine layer *Casabianca* struck a mine at the entrance to the Bay of Aegean. The captain and sixty-five of the crew were rescued by a British destroyer. It is believed the others reached shore and were made prisoners. She had a complement of 328 men.

GIGANTIC ZEPPELIN FOR BRITISH INVASION

Copenhagen, June 7.—A gigantic Zeppelin of an entirely new type caused surprise all along the Baltic Thursday when making a trial journey over the international route between Sweden and Denmark. It was visible from all the coast towns. The airship differs in form and dimensions from the earlier Zeppelins. It is heavily armored and is supplied with three reservoirs for poisonous gas.

Rotterdam, June 7.—Count Reventlow, writing in the *Deutsche Tages Zeitung* on the Zeppelin raid on London, which he describes as a "German attack on the outer forts of London," inferentially admits the raids are not for military purposes and that, so far, they have not had the slightest influence on the conduct of the war. He says:

"We hope that, in fine summer weather, activity in the air will be very great over Britain, not in small patches to make slight unrest, but on a great scale, regardless of everything, so that it either directly or indirectly will have some influence on the further course of the war. Pin pricks and half measures are worse than no good, they are even dangerous. The air war against Britain must either be on a great scale or nothing at all."

CONDITIONS THE SAME IN 1855.

European War, Prohibition and Mexico Popular Topics.

In the issue of April 24, 1855, of *Graham's Daily Mail*, a newspaper published in Philadelphia at that time, the leading articles were on "The European War and the Allies," "The Situation in Mexico," "Prohibition," and "Submarine Exploitations." The paper also commented on the high price of wheat, the intimation that Great Britain was too ambitious about "ruling the waves" and the need of more enlistments in the United States. The Crimean War was then in progress, and the allies were England and France.—Ex.

London, June 7.—A Zeppelin visited the east coast of England last night and dropped incendiary explosive bombs. Five persons were killed and forty injured. Two fires were caused by the incendiary bombs.

WALTER SMITH HAS DIED OF WOUNDS

Word has been received in the city that Walter Smith, son of Verner W. Smith, a former resident of this city, has died from wounds. He was only about 18 years of age and attended the public school here. He enlisted with the first contingent in Vancouver and went to Valcartier for preparatory training. Shortly after going to France, he was wounded in the head, the report being that his skull was fractured. His uncle, J. A. Smith, received word Saturday that he had died in hospital from the injuries.

CANADIAN LOSSES AT THE FRONT NOW NUMBER 7442

Ottawa, June 8.—Casualty lists received by the Militia Department Friday contained the names of 12 Canadians killed, 98 injured and 5 missing. This makes the total casualties reported to Ottawa to date 7,442, of whom 1,131 have been killed, 4,781 wounded, while 1,530 are prisoners of war or missing.

British Headquarters, June 5.—Premier Asquith has just finished a busy visit of four days to the British front. The Premier had a conference with General Joffre, the French commander-in-chief, and M. Millerand, the French War Minister.

Mr. Asquith was intensely interested in all he saw. From a high eminence he had a splendid view of the British positions, the weather being beautifully clear.

The Premier at various points addressed the troops. The soldiers greeted him with the greatest enthusiasm, cheering lustily and waving caps and rifles in the air.

FOREIGN TRADE.

To provide an organization to develop and carry on an export trade in Canadian manufactured goods and products upon co-operative lines, a joint stock company with the backing of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, is being formed. It will be known as the Export Association of Canada, Limited, and will have capital stock of \$500,000. The first business of the association will be to reorganize on a sounder basis the business already started with the market within the Empire, particularly in New Zealand, South Africa and Australia, and also to a considerable extent with the Argentine Republic. With proper handling, there is little doubt that the New Zealand and Australian business particularly are capable of great development under existing conditions.

The association will open an office in London, England, and will co-operate with the Canadian High Commissioner's office there in securing favorable consideration for Canadian trade wherever possible and advisable. A branch office will also be opened in Paris and possibly later, in Brussels, to deal not only with war orders but with the large demands for materials of all kinds which will be required during the reconstruction period in Northern France and Belgium. In the third place, it is intended to open at as early a date as possible, an office in Moscow, so as to get in touch without loss of time with the Russian market which is opening for manufactured goods of all kinds. Later, branch offices may be opened in other places, such as Buenos Ayres, Shanghai, etc., as the opportunity seems favorable and the resources of the association will permit.

Such a company or association with the strong backing it has and under good management—upon that, a great deal will depend—should become an important factor in Canadian

and international trade, in due course. Indeed, its success might surpass even the expectations of its promoters. It is suggested that the functions of the organization will be twofold. In the first place, by a proper utilization of the means at its disposal, create for the whole of Canadian industry a favorable strategical position in which the individual manufacturers who are able to do so can pursue their own independent objectives. It can in the second place do the work of a commission agent in bringing foreign markets within reach of the wide range of the smaller manufacturers who lack the means of doing this for themselves, and it should be able to do this much more effectively than existing commission agents, not only because of its strategic strength and influence but because its entire object and reason for being is the development of trade in Canadian products, whilst the ordinary commission agent usually is interested only in handling articles for which he can find the readiest sale and make the most profit regardless of their country of origin. The experiment is testimony to the enterprise of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, and will be watched with considerable interest. As a practical measure it is obviously less parochial than the "Made in Canada" advertising campaign, and likely to achieve more success.—The Monetary Times.

BOARD OF TRADE MONTHLY MEETING

The regular monthly meeting of the Board of Trade was held Friday, June 4, at the Board of Trade rooms on Second Avenue. There was a good attendance of members, with D. G. Stewart, the president, in the chair.

The mining committee delivered a report on the mineral resources of northern British Columbia, compiled by A. C. Garde, M. E. This report was ordered to be forwarded to Colonel Carnegie, of the Shell Committee, Montreal, in the effort to strengthen Prince Rupert's claim for consideration regarding the proposed location of a copper reduction works in the West. A vote of thanks was extended to Mr. Garde for the excellent and capable manner in which the report was drawn up, and the general opinion expressed was to the effect that the matter contained therein was of such value to the mining industry of northern British Columbia as to merit extensive publicity on completion of negotiations at present pending with Montreal.

The commissioner reported having forwarded 750 copies of the 1914 booklet to the Panama

A resolution was passed endorsing resolutions received from the Berlin (Ont.) Board of Trade with reference to fire losses in Canada.

The matter of co-operation in connection with the location of a cold storage plant by the Booth interests was discussed, and the fisheries committee instructed to proffer the services of the board to the Mayor in connection with co-operative work in this regard.

A letter was read from the well known author of travel books, Mrs. R. K. W. Thompson, who will shortly visit Prince Rupert in order to write up the district for a new book on the Northwest and Alaska. It was referred to the entertainment committee for action.

A letter was read from the St. John Ambulance Association thanking the board for the use of the Board of Trade rooms.

The deputation in connection with finances was authorized to wait upon the Mayor and councillors of Prince Rupert on Monday (today) with reference to the work of the bureau of information.

Several letters in connection with the entertainment of tourists were read but ordered filed owing to lack of funds in order to carry on the work of entertaining distinguished visitors, as occasion arises.

The monthly luncheons were ordered to be postponed during the summer months, owing to the difficulty of making suitable arrangements for the holding of the same, and the fact that the G. T. P. schedule does not permit of the use of the boats for that purpose during the rush season.



In the training of this unit special attention will be given to further instruct men studying for officers' certificates. A great many of the men have received the benefit of the training at the C.O.T.C. camp at Niagara-on-the-Lake, which was held from May 2 to 15.

When the company has been brought up to full strength it will probably be moved to one of the permanent camps to undergo further training before going to the front.

The first university company (D Company, 38th Battalion, C. E. F.), which has been selected as a draft to reinforce the Princess Patricia Canadian Light Infantry, is at present in camp at Niagara-on-the-Lake.


