## RUSSIANS WITHDRAWING FROM WARSAW

### GRIM CONFIDENCE IN RUSSIAN RESOURCES — ARMIES ESCAPED GERMAN TRAP

#### BOWSER RIDICULES MOSES COTSWORTH

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Vancouver, July 30.—Hon. W. Bowser in his reply to "The Crisis in British Columbia," gathered with ridicule Moses Cotsworth and the clerical sponsors for the document. He showed Cotsworth, while engaged in government employ had been engaged as a land speculator and alleged fraudulent stakings and started a venomous attack on the government since his dismissal. Bowser says the clerics are the dupes of a designing old man, who doctored figures to suit his malicious purpose. The name of Sir Donald Mann was hissed, but there was no disorder. The house was filled except the top gallery. The attorney-general spoke for two and a half hours refuting charges from the document.

#### WORK IS DONE NOW FOR SUBMARINES

Berlin, July 28.—Captain Perle, naval critic of the Tageblatt, says about the ships sunk by submarines: "As our submarine activities were not so fruitful during the last week as formerly, it will be believed here and there in Germany that special precautions were being taken not to injure neutral commerce. It is not possible to ascertain if such really is the fact, but all the more joyful therefore is the reported good success, which, at the same time, proves that there are no grounds for anxiety or the belief that the attacks of our submarines have been clipped."  
This evening's Kreuz Zeitung writes in similar vein: "The note had done one good thing which will be hailed with satisfaction by the whole German people. The pen has done its work, submarines now have their say."

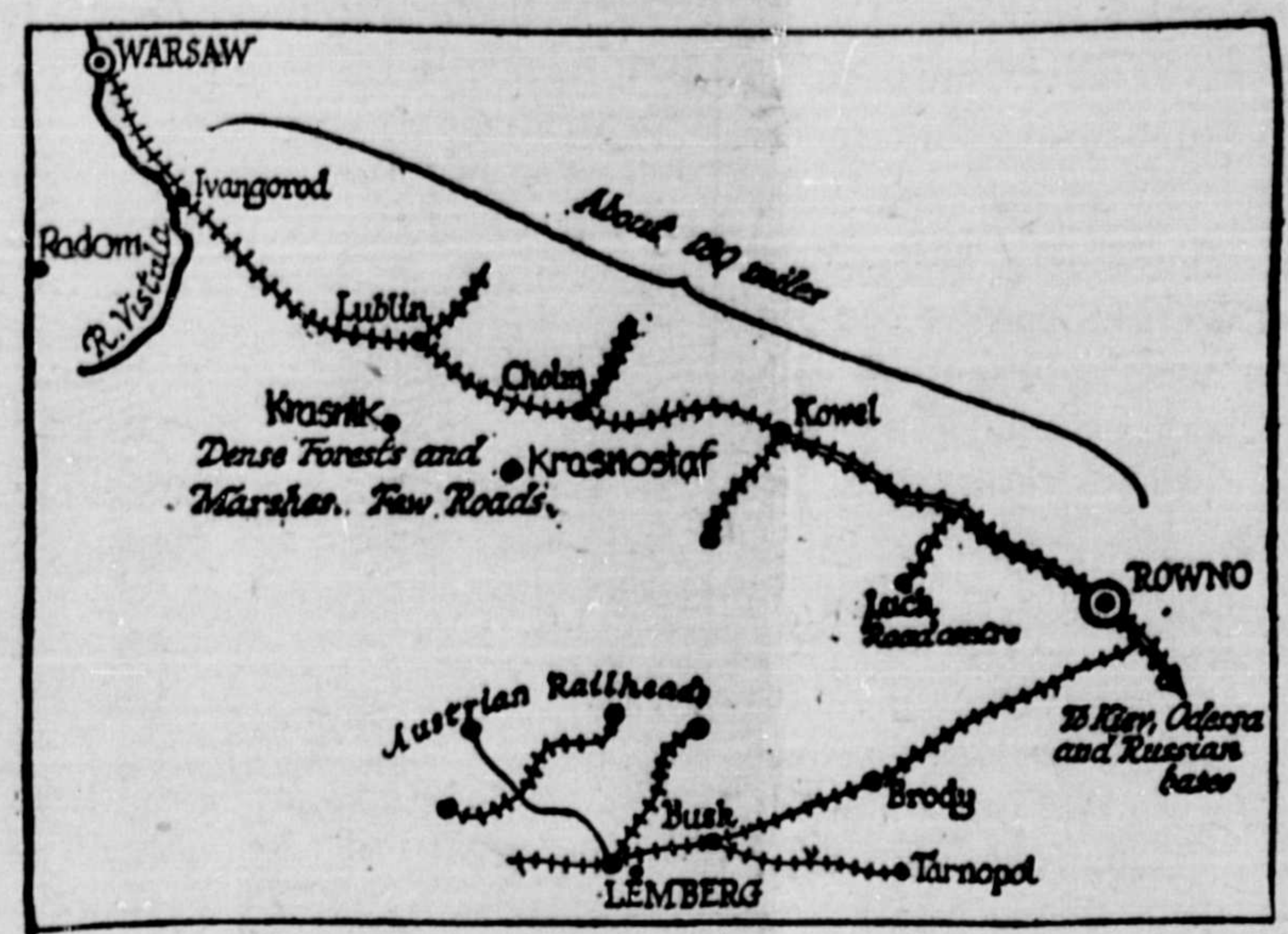

#### GERMANS IN OVERWHELMING NUMBERS ARE BEFORE WARSAW

**CITY IN THROES OF ABANDONMENT — PETROGRAD ADVISES THAT FURTHER RESISTANCE UNWISE — EXPERTS AGREE THAT EVACUATION IS THE PROPER STEP**

(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, July 30.—Warsaw, the third city in Russia, is in the throes of abandonment. The Germans in overwhelming numbers, are before the city. Petrograd advises that further resistance would be unwise. The problem now is to move the Russian armies intact, as they are menaced on the south and north.

A triumphal entry of the city by the Kaiser and his consort is being arranged by the Germans.

#### Petrograd Report.

Petrograd, July 30.—Grand

Duke Nicholas and his Slav armies have escaped the German trap though it understood that Warsaw and all Poland west of the Bug river had been lost. There is no panic, but a grim confidence that the vast resources of Russia will yet decide the conflict. Experts agree that the evacuation of Warsaw was the proper step, in order to avoid a battle until the Russian army is adequately equipped to drive the enemy out.

#### LARGE ARRIVALS FROM HALIBUT BANKS

#### FRED N. CLIFTON DROWNED AT VERNON

Information has been received in the city that Fred Clifton, who left here with the last contingent, has met with a sad end near Vernon. His nude body was found in Kalamalka creek, near the camp. He had been missing for some days, and no trace of him could be found. It is presumed that he had gone to the creek to bathe and had drowned.

Mr. Clifton was an old-timer in Prince Rupert, having come here from the prairies before the city was incorporated. During his stay in the city he was in the baking business.

#### THOSE TERRIBLE LITTLE MACHINES

The following is an extract from a recent speech by the Rt. Hon. D. Lloyd George, Minister of Munitions:

"At the outbreak of the war we believed that victory was due to us as a tribute from Fate, but we have since learned that our problem is to organize victory.

"We are short of machine guns, but if I could place my hand on an adequate number of skilled workmen the supply could be doubled in a few days. This is a most serious question for the army, as most of the slaughter is done by these terrible little machines.

"What the next move of the Germans will be it is not easy to forecast, but if it should be to concentrate upon our forces in the west it is vital—it is vital (he repeated it)—for the life of our people, it is vital in order to enable them to retain their position, that every available machine gun which can be produced should be returned without the least possible delay.

#### LOSES MEMORY ON BATTLEFRONT

Moose Jaw, Sask., July 29.—A remarkable case of loss of memory through an injury on the firing line in France, is related by the victim in a letter to a friend in this city. The writer is George Hitchcock, who was a clerk in the C. P. R. freight office here, and who went with the first contingent. He writes as follows:

"I am sorry to say I have been suffering from concussion, owing to a shell bursting almost on top of me. Owing to this I have lost my memory and cannot yet remember any of you. I cannot remember ever being in Canada at all. The first thing I can clearly remember is waking up in the hospital in France and asking where I was. I was told that I had been there for ten days. I do not remember my mother or anyone I knew before this happened. The doctors say it will all come back in time, so I'm not worrying very much, although it's rather awkward at times.

"You ask me how Tom was getting along. Well, I don't remember him, but my mother came to see me and was telling me about a fellow named Tom Haswell, who was in Canada with me, so, perhaps, it's the same. If so she brought me some wedding cake from him and told me he had got married. They tell me we were in an awfully warm corner when I got hurt, and that my company was almost wiped out, so I suppose I am lucky to get away as well as I did."

In a postscript Hitchcock says he has been in five different hospitals and one convalescent home.

COPPER REFINING

Vancouver is right after the proposed copper refinery, and it is up to Prince Rupert to get busy. A deputation from the southern city is now in Ottawa pressing its claims.

Naturally the transportation companies in the south are anxious to get the business, but, in point of grade, none of them can compete with the Grand Trunk Pacific.

COST OF LIVING

The prevalence of war during a considerable part of the year 1914 lends a special interest to the report on prices just issued by the Department of Labor.

to week, or from month to month, are given for some 300 commodities representative of production and consumption in Canada, divided into the following groups:—Grains and fodders, animals and meat, dairy products, fish, fruit and vegetables, miscellaneous groceries, textiles, hides, leathers, boots and shoes, metals and implements, fuel and lighting, lumber, miscellaneous building materials, paints, oils and glass, house furnishings, drugs and chemicals, furs, liquors, tobaccos and sundries.

The opening paragraphs of the report are as follows:—"The factor which chiefly affected Canadian prices during the year 1914 was the outbreak in August of the great European war. From January until April the general price-level was steady with a slight tendency upwards; thereafter there was a decline of two points in the index number, during June and July, the latter being the lowest month of the year.

U. S. DESTROYERS ON THE ALASKA COAST

Captain Mulhern of the halibut schooner Tuladi reported the other day that he had seen four cruisers steaming in a northwesterly direction. These were probably the United States destroyers Paul Jones, Perry Preble and Steart, which have arrived at Sitka, Alaska.

The chief increase for the year as a whole appeared in the groups grain and fodder, which rose 14 per cent., animals and meats, 6 per cent. Raw furs declined 33 per cent. Food, fuel and lighting 6 per cent., and cottons 5 per cent.

An appendix to the report gives the average retail prices of some thirty-two articles of food and of coal, wood and coaloil, and the rent of a representative workingman's dwelling in each of the localities of the Dominion having a population of 10,000 and over for each year back to 1910.

- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.
