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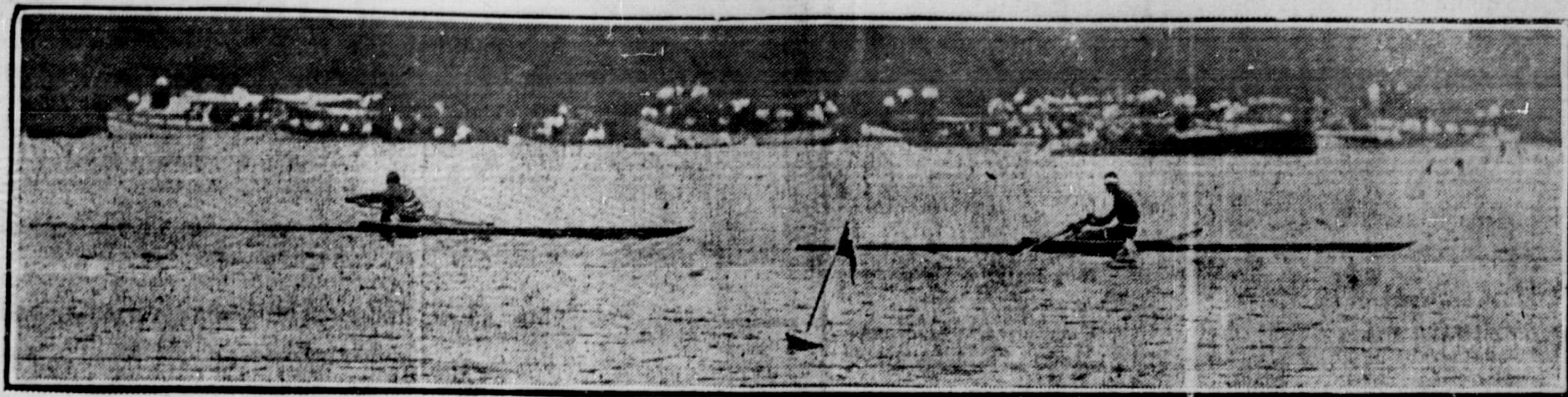

St. Louis, Mo., August 30.—J. W. Barnhardt, candidate for a seat in the state senate and a banker of Forest City, is under arrest. Under his real name, W. J. Kline, of St. Louis, he has confessed to realty forgeries amounting to over \$500,000.

Accused had lived a dual life for many years, defrauding farmers by the sale of forged deeds and mortgages and issuing worthless cheques. He has a private fortune of \$350,000.

WAR BETWEEN GREECE AND TURKEY SEEMS INEVITABLE

PREMIER PROTESTS AGAINST TREATMENT OF GREEKS IN ASIA MINOR—GERMANS TURNING ATTENTION TO THE BALKANS—VIOLENT ARTILLERY DUELS ON WESTERN FRONT

(Special to The Daily News.)

Athens, August 30.—The breaking off of diplomatic relations is possible and war between Greece and Turkey seems inevitable. The censor today permitted it to be known that Premier Venizelos is preparing a sharp protest against the persecution of Greek residents in Asia Minor.

300,000 Greeks have been compelled to leave the coast towns and to live in the interior cities of Asia Minor. The news was withheld for fear of public feeling during the Balkan negotiations.

Eastern Front.

London, August 30.—Reports from the eastern front indicate that the Austro-Germans are endeavoring to clear the last of the Russians from Galicia. Having lost Brest-Litovsk, Grand Duke Nicholas cannot afford to hold his

position on the River Bug in face of an enveloping movement from the south. This latest move marks the end of the German offensive in Russia and the commencement of a movement against the Balkans. Troops are massing near the Roumanian frontier.

Western Front.

Paris, August 30.—There has been violent artillery fighting at many points in the Argonne, resulting in the seizure of German trenches.

The week-end was marked by artillery fighting along the entire line from the North Sea to the Vosges.

The Dardanelles

London, August 30.—There has been heavy fighting in the Dardanelles, but no details are yet to hand.

EX-ALD. MORRISEY'S ADVICE RE DEBENTURES

Prince Rupert, August 30, '15. To the Contractors of Prince Rupert.

Gentlemen:—Re city bonds for re-planking of streets and the erection of a roadway to the cold storage—a word of caution may be beneficial for all concerned.

Do not forget that about \$1,500,000 of treasury certificates must be taken care of before 15th June next. The sinking fund and interest on all our outstanding bylaw indebtedness must be provided for, and should the war continue another year, it may be doubtful as to the value of any of our certificates, therefore I would suggest to you to allow the city council to sell this issue for re-planking and street erection to Terry, Brigs & Slayton at the best price available, get the money and pay for the work at the best obtainable price and the ratepayers and contractors will know where they are at.

Hopes are entertained that the provincial government may allow the dating of our present bond issue to be changed, to make them more attractive to the American buyers. Even should this be done and the war continues, it is still doubtful as to how saleable B. C. municipal securities may be, therefore I would advise allowing the council get the money and pay for the work.

WAR'S ECONOMIC ASPECT

Transformation from King's debt to people's debt is described in a comprehensive work on The Political Economy of War, by Mr. F. W. Hirst, editor of The Economist, published by J. M. Dent & Sons, London and Toronto. The author briefly tells of early borrowing by the pawning of royal jewels or pledging certain special sources of revenue under the Stuarts, and the change to public borrowing following the revolution of 1689, which finally dethroned the Stuart monarchs. For debts contracted by Charles II., on which interest had fallen into arrears, a public obligation of half the stipulated interest in perpetuity was established during the reign of William III. Debts contracted during King William's wars made the aggregate \$21,515,000, which was reduced by payments to \$16,394,000 at the time of the accession of Queen Ann. But the war ending with the peace of Utrecht in 1713 brought the total up to \$52,145,000. Again there was a reduction during a period of peace to \$47,954,000, but the war with Spain and France, beginning in 1739, ended by the peace of Aix-la-Chapelle in 1748, with Britain's debt swollen to \$79,293,000. Reductions during the succeeding peace left a total of \$74,332,000 at the beginning of the Seven Years' War in 1756. When the peace of Paris was concluded in 1763 the debt was \$138,865,000, which was reduced to \$128,583,000 at the commencement of the American revolution in 1775. War's increasing cost then became evident, for the debt at the peace of Versailles, in 1783 was \$249,851,000. This had

fallen to £244,118,000 at the commencement of the French war in 1793, but increased to £520,207,000 in 1802, when the peace of Amiens was concluded. After Napoleon retired to Elba in 1814 the debt was £742,615,000. This total is the funded debt, and the estimate of the gross debt is £885,000,000 in 1816, involving an interest charge of £32,938,000 or more than half the revenues from taxation. Many reductions brought the total down to £803,000,000 in 1854, but the Crimean War increased it to £836,000,000 in 1857. A period of comparative retrenchment reduced the total to £635,000,000 in 1899, the lowest since the Napoleonic wars, but the Boer war caused an increase to £789,000,000 in 1903. Retrenchment resulted in a reduction to £706,000,000 on March 31, 1914, although the telephones had recently been purchased by the government. The author's estimates regarding the cost of the present war are enlightening. Britain's ponderous heritage of debts from wars that have receded into history is exceeded by the cost of one year of the present war. It is estimated that each year of war will add £800,000,000 to Britain's debt, or £3,810,000,000 to the total debt of the belligerents, involving on them a permanent interest charge of £220,250,000. This takes no account of the destruction of property or loss of productive capacity through death and physical injury. Viewed in the light of political economy, war is a burden baffling in its magnitude. Aspects other than waste and loss are also subjected by the author to economic analysis, and his work is a material help in bringing the real meaning of

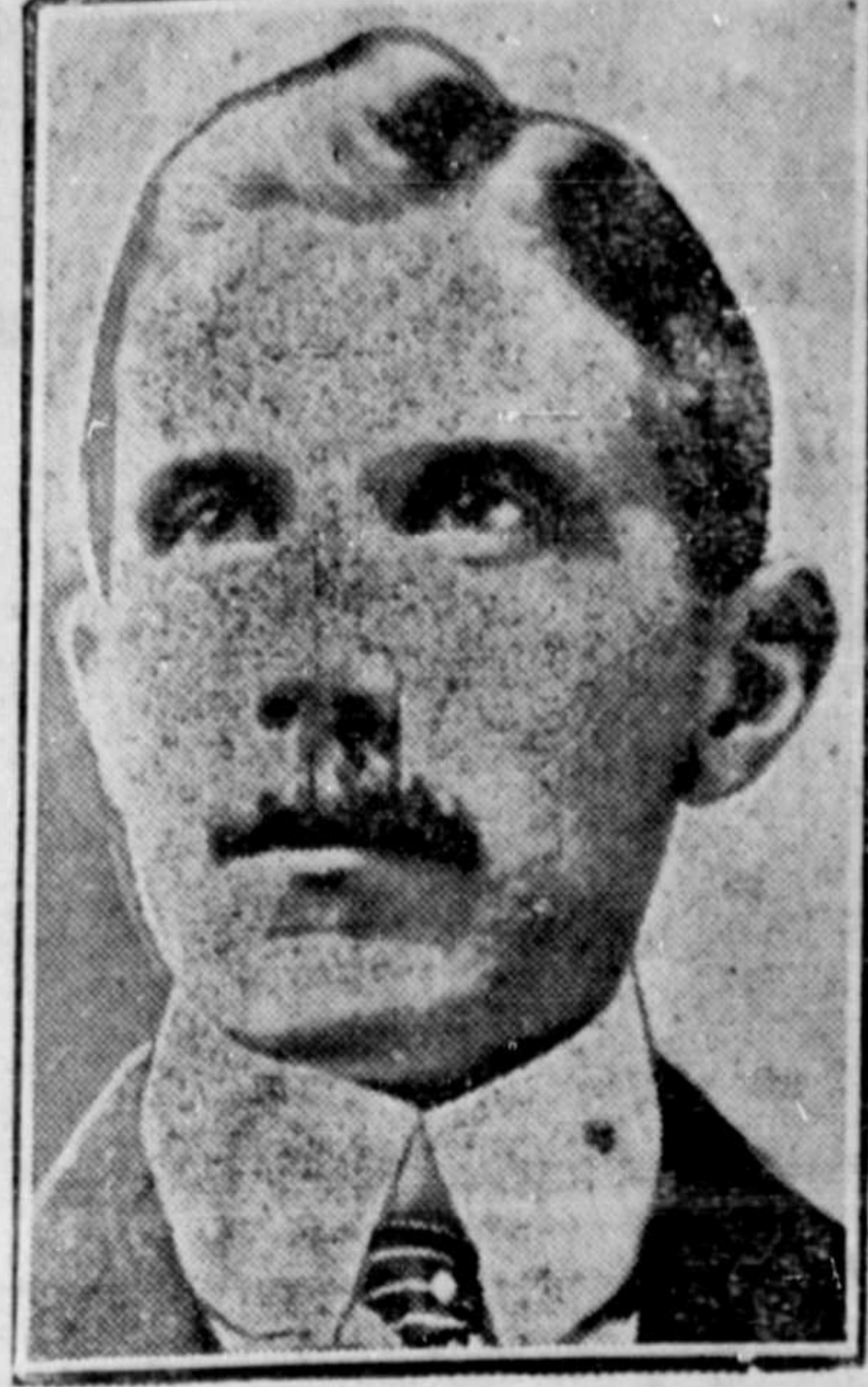

war within the grasp of the average citizen.

The same author may some day elucidate by economic analysis the gigantic waste of unemployment and half-employment during both peace and war. This, with an analysis of the burden of the non-producer on Lloyd George's estimate of one Duke to three Dreadnoughts, might give indirect assurance of the world's power in bearing burdens and restoring losses. It might also be well to inquire as to the personnel of the creditors to whom the world has become so deeply indebted. If the burden of debt were repudiated or thrown off tomorrow the ordinary worker would be little or no better off, for he would have to pay proportionately more for room to live in the improved world. The weight of the Dreadnought will not bother him so long as any lightening of the load will be counterbalanced by an increase in the weight of the territorial owners. While there is foundation for this conclusion the loss involved in war will not excite indignation, but its horrors must compel all to end it by carrying to victory the cause of human freedom.—Toronto Globe.

RECRUITS WANTED FOR 62nd OVERSEAS BATTALION, CANADIAN EXPEDITIONARY FORCE.

RECRUITING OFFICE AT PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT OFFICE NOW OPEN.

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.

2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.

3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.

4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.

5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.
