## UNINTERRUPTED FIGHTING IN CHAMPAGNE

### GERMAN CASUALTIES TOTAL 120,000 -- DISQUIETING RUMOR FROM BULGARIA

#### UNWOUNDED GERMANS STILL SURRENDERING IN FRANCE

UNINTERRUPTED FIGHTING IN CHAMPAGNE DISTRICT—PROGRESS CONTINUES IN ARTOIS—THE GERMANS LOSE THREE ARMY CORPS—FRENCH CAPTURE HILL 140

(Special to The Daily News.)  
Paris, Sept. 29.—There is no interruption to the terrific fighting in the Champagne district, and progress continues in the region of Artois.

North of Massiges, 1,000 unwounded Germans have surrendered.

**Germans Lose 120,000.**  
The total German casualties, since the great advance began, in killed, wounded and prisoners exceeds three German army corps, amounting to 120,000 men.

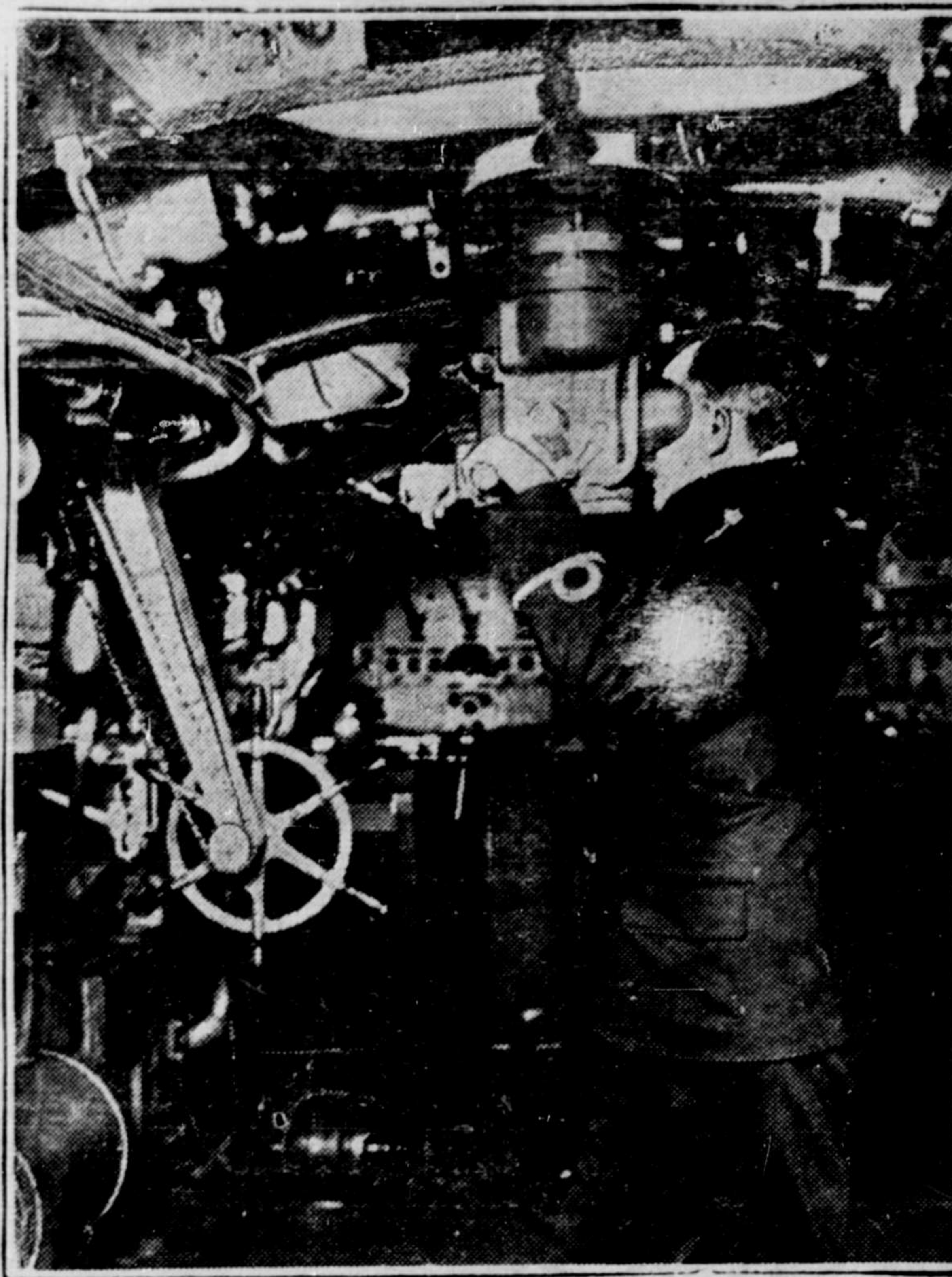
**Hill 140 Taken.**  
The French captures in Artois include Hill 140, which is the highest point of the Vinly range. For months, the Germans have been strongly entrenched in these hills, and, after being driven from the lower ground, clung tena-

ciously to the heights. In the capture of the highest point, 300 men of the Prussian Guard were taken.

**Liege Visited.**  
London, Sept. 29.—An aviator flew over Liege today from the lines of the Allies. Coming south he threw down into that city French flags and documents announcing that the Allies were advancing, and calling upon the population to keep up their courage.

Although subjected to heavy fire from the enemy, the aviator escaped unhurt.

This is the first visit of aviators from the lines of the Allies since the fall of that city. His appearance is described as having been greeted with great cheering by the Belgians there.

#### BULGARIAN CABINET DIVIDED TWO MEMBERS HAVE RESIGNED

RUMOR THAT BULGARIA WILL ATTACK SERBIA—BERLIN SAYS ALLIED TROOPS LANDED IN GREECE—ATHENS EXPECTS BIG ACTION SHORTLY IN THE DARDANELLES

Paris, Sept. 29.—It is expected that Bulgaria will commence an attack on Serbia within the next fifteen days.

The Bulgarian ministers of finance and commerce have resigned, owing to friction in the cabinet over Bulgaria's attitude towards Greece.

The Greek government today released a number of Sikhs and Ghurkas who have been interned since the sinking of the transport Ramazan in Grecian waters.

**Berlin Report.**  
Berlin, Sept. 29.—It is reported that the successes of the Allies on the western front are not of any great importance.

The overseas agency announces that British and French troops have been landed at Port Kathrin, near Salonika, in Greece, for service in Serbia.

**Athens Report.**  
Athens, Sept. 29.—An officer on the British General Staff, who is here from the Dardanelles, says that, with the landing of troops in Macedonia, the Allies are on the eve of the greatest operation of the war.

**Some March.**  
Operating with the Mesopotamia expeditionary force, an attack on Constantinople will begin shortly, after which a march on Berlin, through the Balkans, will commence.

**Explosion on Warship.**  
London, Sept. 29.—An accidental fire on the Italian battleship Bendetti Brin has caused an explosion. Eight officers and three hundred and seventy marines have been saved. Three hundred men are still unaccounted for.

#### SAN FRANCISCO MAYOR RE-ELECTED

San Francisco, Sept. 29.—Mayor James Rolph has been re-elected. Mayor Rolph is a man who has kept clear of politics, having been put into power by the Civic League after the great graft scandals six years ago. The citizens have shown their trust in him, as a man capable of conducting the city's affairs in a business-like, honest way by returning him to office for the sixth year.

#### TRADES AND LABOR COUNCIL MEETING

#### CHINESE WHISKY SEIZED BY POLICE

In the police court this morning, Wah Lee, a placid Chinaman, manager of the King Tai Company, was charged with selling liquor without a license.

Officer Bailey testified to having seized a package at the express office on Saturday, consigned to Lim Yue, Haysport. The package, produced in court, was an innocent looking Chinese tea box, containing six parcels of groceries and six bottles of liquid, which very evidently had no connection with tea. Four bottles of white liquor were labelled "Muikweilu" and two of red "Ngkapy."

By means of a hydrometer, the officer carried out a test of the Muikweilu, which showed a temperature of 71 and a specific gravity of 73, thus proving that the liquid contained 70.08 of alcohol. As a further crude test, the officer set fire to some of the liquid, which burned freely.

After making the seizure at the wharf, the police visited the King Tai store on Seventh Avenue, and found four cases and five sacks containing bottles of similar liquid.

The case was adjourned until Saturday.

### THAT CAMP KITCHEN

On Monday night, George Morrow, representing a citizens' committee, placed the matter of purchasing a camp kitchen before the city council. He reminded the members that, when the boys left, there was a distinct promise made that something along this line would be done. From the discussion which took place, it is fairly evident that, under existing financial conditions, the council feels indisposed to do anything in the matter. One member thought the idea of giving them a camp kitchen was absurd, and that the gift should take some other form; another thought that the government should provide all outfit for the soldiers, while all were satisfied that, as arrangements had been made for taking care only of city contingencies, and the bank was very anxious that no money should be expended except where absolutely necessary, it would be impossible to make any promise.

The statements made were all true, in their way, but they did not dispose of the fact that nothing has been done for the boys of the second contingent, while the first contingent received \$2,000 from the city. Financial conditions were substantially the same, when both contingents left, but in the

case of the first, excitement ran high, as was perfectly natural, and the city formed something of a precedent, without thinking of the results. There is no denying the urgent need for economy, but there is also no getting away from the fact that the citizens, if not the council, made a promise which should be fulfilled. The boys of the second are just as much thought of as those of the first, but, since they left, public feeling has become more normal and the war is no longer something new.

Whether the council does anything or not, it is almost certain that the camp kitchen promised will be purchased by the citizens, but it seems hard that those who have so willingly done their share in the way of subscribing to the various funds should be called upon to get together the necessary \$600, when the council, by exercising a little foresight, might have spread the cost over the property holders of the city, whose property is being protected by our soldiers, even if they are so many miles away. Something like 70 per cent of Prince Rupert's property holders are spread over Europe, California, and the east, and it seems but fair that they should be asked to contribute their mite towards the comfort of Prince Rupert boys

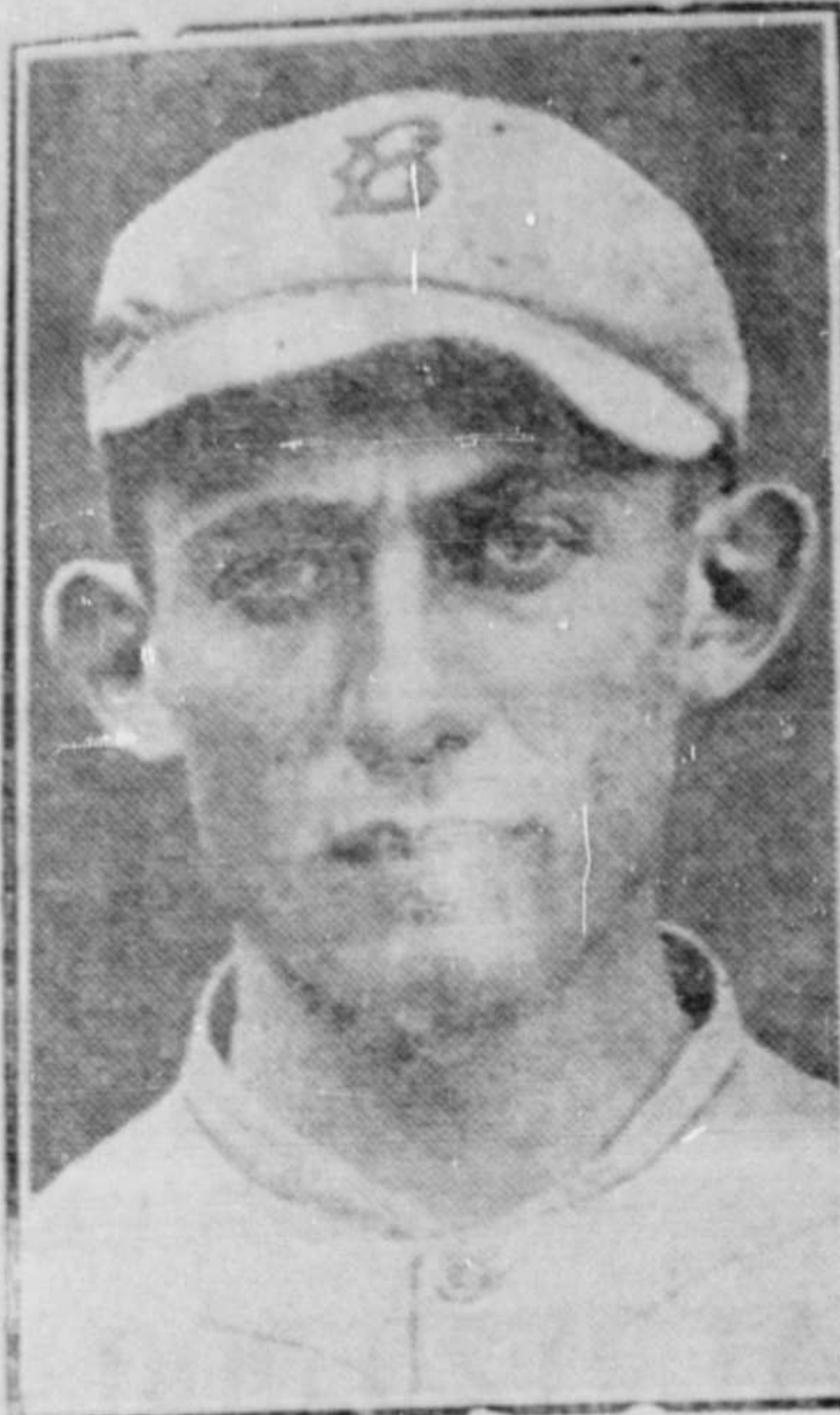
### CLIFF DWELLERS' RELICS DISCOVERED

Denver, Sept. 26.—Ruins of what are believed to have been the last works of the cliff dwellers recently have been excavated in the Mesa Verde National park, in southwestern Colorado, according to word brought to Denver today by Enos A. Mills, Colorado author and naturalist, who has been inspecting the excavations. The ruins are distinctly different from any previously uncovered in Western America, and, according to Mr. Mills, open the way for new efforts to solve the mystery of the early races of the continent.

The excavation work has been done by government agents under the supervision of Dr. J. W. Fewkes, of the Smithsonian Institute. Government scientists uncovered a building of cut and polished stone. The structure was in the form of a letter D, with the upright 132 feet long and curved part 215 feet in circumference. The walls are about 7 feet thick and hollow, with rooms inside.

Dr. Fewkes believes the ruin was an uncompleted fortress, abandoned when the cliff dwellers disappeared from the Rocky mountain region.

### GERMAN BARON IS INTERNED IN LONDON

London, Sept. 26.—Baron Von Bissing, half brother of General Von Bissing, German military governor of Belgium, and a naturalized British subject, after fighting for months for his liberty, has been interned.

He was mysteriously spirited away today from his luxurious home in Kensington by detectives, who left a battalion of newspaper men on guard over an empty shell.

It is reported that the Islington workhouse will be the baron's domicile during the remainder of the war.

The new informations grow out of evidence of Horwood, James H. Howden is to be charged with perjury, and Dr. Montague and Sir Rodmond Roblin with destruction of public documents.

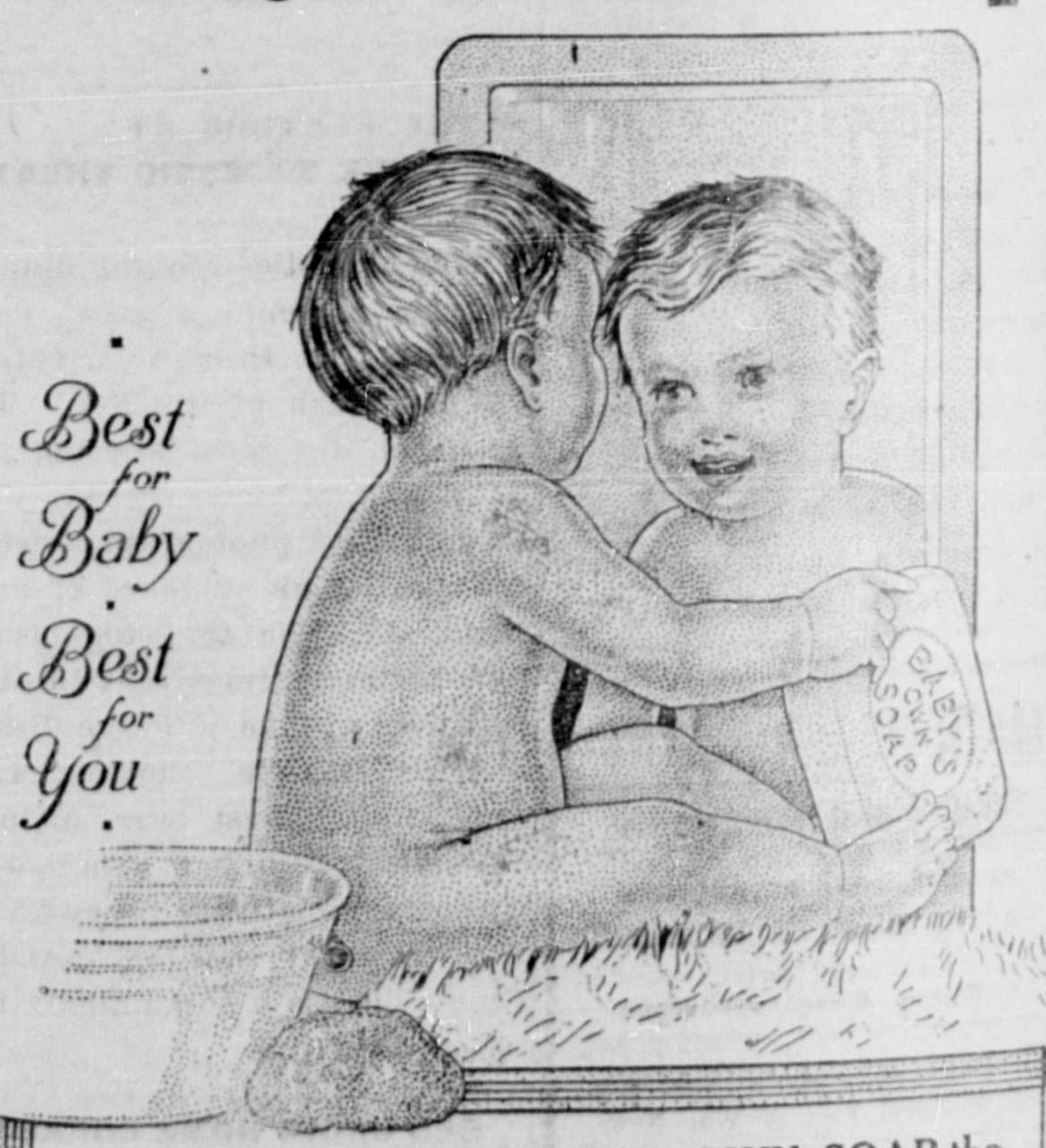

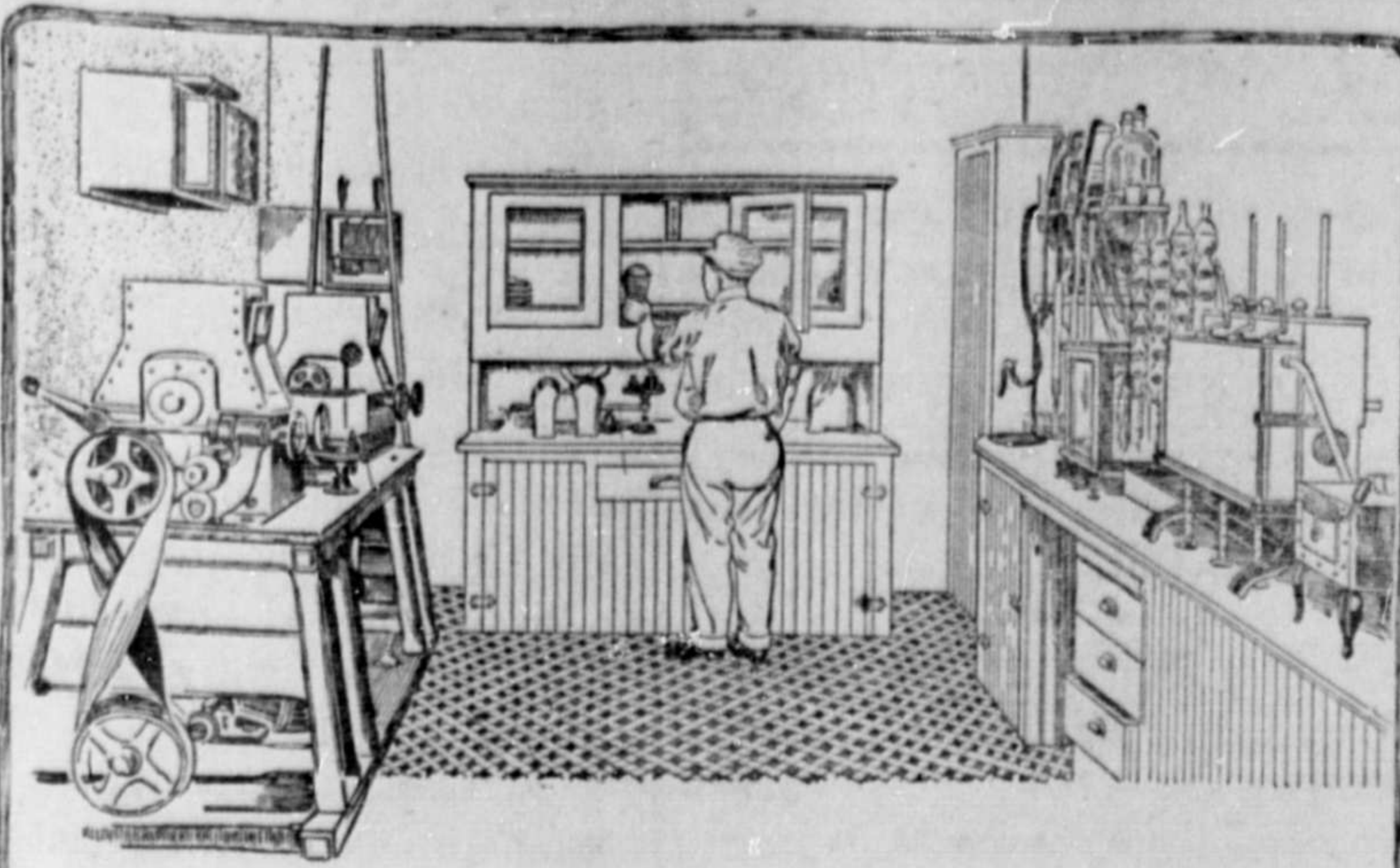
## FORD WILL BUILD NO SUBMARINES

New York, Sept. 26.—Henry Ford spent two hours at the navy yard today inspecting submarines and the latest forms of marine machinery. At the conclusion of his trip the manufacturer announced he did not expect to build any submarines in the near future and that he was still a strong peace advocate.

"I was very much interested in all I saw," said Mr. Ford, who was accompanied by his son, Edsel Ford. They were met at the entrance to the navy yard by Lieutenant Commander R. T. Craft, aide of Rear-Admiral Nathaniel R. Usher, commandant. The Ford party was shown through various departments and taken into the submarine K-5 by Lieut. Ralph C. Grady, the commander. Every detail of the craft was explained to the manufacturer, but it was not submerged. He also inspected two other submarines equipped with nickel batteries, recently invented by Thomas A. Edison.

Mr. Ford was insistent that an efficient under-sea craft could be built at one-sixteenth the cost of the present vessels. When he was asked how many of them he would suggest building he replied "none."

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

#### QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

- 1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.
- 2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.
- 3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.
- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.

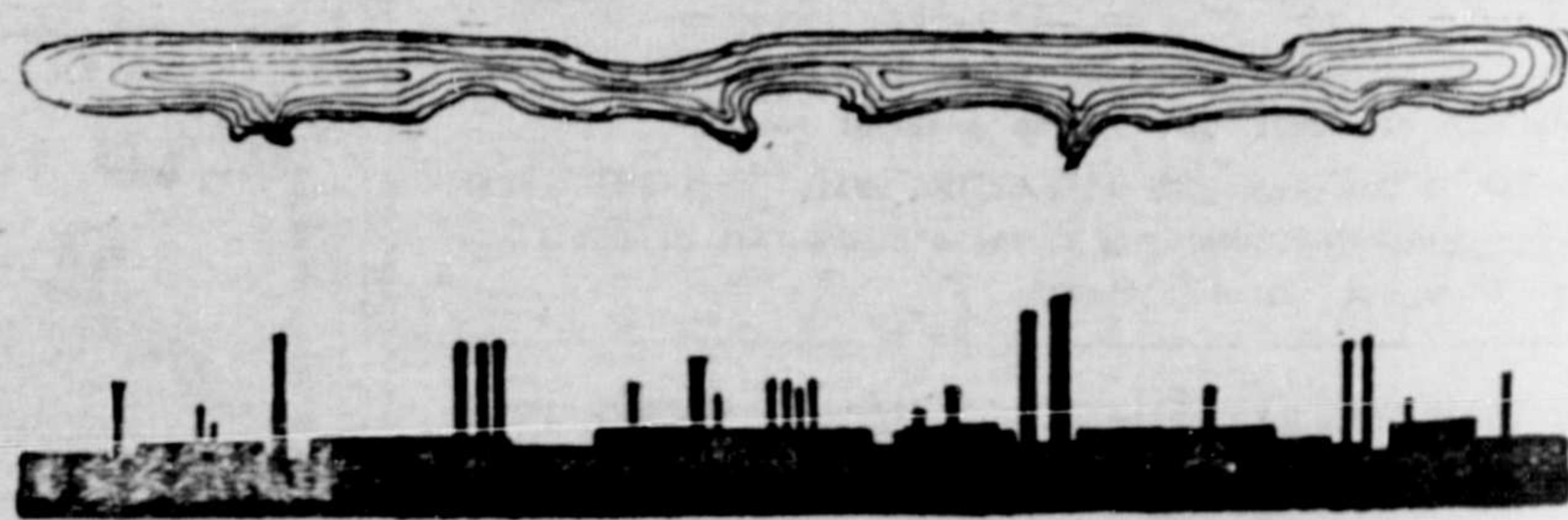
