KUROPATKIN TO LEAD RUSSIANS IN BALKANS

ROUMANIA REFUSES PASSAGE TO GERMAN WARSHIPS -- SERBS RETREAT SAFELY

RIVER DANUBE IS CLOSED TO HUN GUNBOATS

Roumania Refuses to Allow Germans to use Danube—Bulgars Abandon Their Attack on Monastir.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Nov. 27.—The Roumanian government has refused to permit Austro-German gunboats to sail down the Danube toward Galatz in order to menace the Russian concentration camps in southern Bessarabia.

The German gunboats must have been brought right across Europe by river and canal, as was outlined in the article on the Danube in the Daily News of November 15th.

Monastir Attack Abandoned.

The Bulgarians have abandoned their attack on Monastir and are concentrating their forces for an effort to cope with the big advance being carried out along the Vardar river by the Franco-British forces.

Greek Demobilization.

Greece has consented to a partial remobilization and will withdraw her troops from Saloniki on a plea of relieving the financial strain.

KUROPATKIN WILL COMMAND THE RUSSIANS

Interest Centred on Russian Movements in the Balkans—Main Army May Attack via The Danube.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Nov. 27.—Interest is centred in the new Russian army. It is reported that General Kuropatkin will be in command. The main army will attack either up the Danube or through Roumania from Bessarabia.

Smaller armies from Odessa and Sebastopol will attack the Bulgarian and Turkish coasts.

General Kuropatkin is known as Russia's Kitchener, and there is said to be much similarity between the Russian general and the British war secretary. Kuropatkin is not only a brilliant soldier, but a great commander, administrator and strategist.

He is the son of a small Russian merchant, and first distinguished himself in Turkestan, rising by force of genius to be Russian minister of war. At the outbreak of the war with Japan, he was given command in Manchuria. In retreat before the Japs, he extricated his army in the most skilful manner.

DRAMA AND COMEDY AT WESTHOLME THEA.

PROHIBITION CARRIED BY NEW FOUNDLANDERS

Victoria, Nov. 27.—Sir Richard McBride, in reply to the petition of the anti-prohibitionists, which carried 33,000 names, stated that the government will solve the question of prohibition itself, without importing legislation from the other provinces.

Newfoundland Dry.

St. Johns, Nfld., Nov. 27.—Prohibition has been carried in Newfoundland by 25,000 votes to 5,000. The measure becomes effective on January 1st, 1917. Four hundred votes were polled in excess of the forty per cent. of the electorate required to make the vote effective.

ENGLISH ACTOR WAS HERO OF AIR FIGHT

W. G. Humble has received a piece of the plane of that German Taube which was brought down near the Canadian trenches at Ploegstreet on October 26th. The hero of that air fight, in which the German pilot was killed, was Robert Lorrain, the famous English actor-aviator.

EVERYBODY WELCOME

MAIN SERBIAN ARMY ESCAPES INTO ALBANIA

Greece Giving Kitchener More Facilities—British Troops are Arriving Daily—Gain Near Bagdad.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Nov. 27.—The main Serbian army retreated safely across the border into Albania and Montenegro.

Kitchener has obtained Greek permission to land Allied troops at other ports in the Aegean Sea besides Saloniki, as facilities at Saloniki are so limited that supplies cannot be landed with any speed. The wharf at Saloniki is so small that only about 800 tons can be handled daily.

British Reinforcements.

Important British reinforcements are arriving at Saloniki daily.

British Success.

The British expedition in Mesopotamia reports a great victory near the ancient city of Bagdad, and the British troops are now encamped on the site of a former Turkish camp.

Thirteen hundred unwounded prisoners were taken and 2,500 wounded. General Townsend, who commands the expedition, continues to advance.

ST. ANDREW'S NIGHT

The St. Andrew's masquerade ball to be held in St. Andrew's Hall on November 20th, promises to be one of the brightest functions in the annals of this live society. Proceeds will be devoted to patriotic purposes.

YOUTH MISSING

Pat Fenton, a youth of 22, left Seymour Inlet for Hardy Bay on October 21st in the 30-foot power boat Bertha, and has not been heard of since. Anyone finding trace of the boat should communicate with the city police of Prince Rupert.

The American schooner Tom and Al brought in 95,000 pounds of halibut this morning and the Eagle about 12,000.

THEO COLLART HAS HAD SPELL OF FEVER

C. E. Bainter has received a letter from his old partner, Theo. Collart, who left here to take a commission in the Belgian army.

Mr. Collart has had a spell of fever and had rather a narrow squeak. However, he is now convalescent and is looking forward to a month's vacation at Folkestone, England, after which he hopes to return to the front. He was with the Belgian army at Calvados in France.

THE EISTEDDFOD WAS A DISTINCT SUCCESS

The Young People's Society of the Methodist Church last night brought off a form of entertainment entirely new to Prince Rupert. For a first performance of the type of the old Welsh Eisteddfod, it was decidedly creditable to all concerned. The attendance was good and the various competitions brought forth quite an array of talent.

Wm. Manson, M. L. A., presided over the gathering and introduced the competitors. The organ playing was won by Miss Ethel Eason; mezzo-soprano singing, for juniors, by Miss Viola Harvey. In elocution for juniors, Margaret Morgan was awarded the prize. Mrs. Johnson carried off the honors in senior piano playing. In bass singing Mr. Lancaster and Mr. Meth Davis shared the award, while in soprano singing, Mrs. F. S. Wright was successful, and Mrs. McMillin in the contralto division.

Tacoma, Nov. 27.—Incendiaries last night attempted to burn forty thousand barrels of gasoline, contained in forty Standard Oil Company's tanks here.

The watchman extinguished a quantity of blazing waste which he found under the floor of the tank room. The fire alarm was cut earlier in the evening, and the blaze, had it been allowed to get a firm hold, would have threatened the entire factory district.

TAXING WAR PROFITS

The Minister of Finance is asking the people of Canada for their aid in floating a domestic war loan, and he will undoubtedly carry the country with him but he is neglecting in an amazing way a veritable gold mine of revenue available to his hand. Mr. McKenna, the British Chancellor of the Exchequer, hopes to secure \$150,000,000 of revenue for the treasury during the current year from excessive war profits. In Canada Mr. White should be able to collect from fifteen to twenty million dollars in taxation of war profits without hurting any legitimate interest.

In a contemporary appeared the following paragraph, which may or may not have been intended to assist in stock market operations, but which assuredly should find a place in Mr. White's scrapbook:

"Sir Henry Pellatt, president of Steel and Radiation, Limited, has submitted in a report some figures of the profits the company expect to make on war munitions. It has on hand or in immediate prospect contracts amounting to \$2,060,000 and from these profits of \$1,050,000 will be realized, which is about 50 per cent. on the turnover and about 30 per cent. on the company's capitalization of \$3,526,400. The contracts include 200,000 of 12-lb. shrapnel (cases only) at \$3.80, total \$760,000, on which the profit is placed at \$400,000; 200,000 high explosive shells at \$4, total \$800,000, with profit of \$400,000; 50,000 6-inch shells (100-lb.) at \$10, total \$500,000 with profit of \$250,000."

Love of liberty, determination to preserve the Empire, and a profit of 50 per cent. on the turnover make an irresistible combination. But is there

no way of keeping copies of yesterday's Toronto World from reaching the people of the United Kingdom? When they see that they are under contract to pay \$2,060,000 for shells which cost \$1,050,000 to manufacture they may come to the conclusion that the Empire needs to be saved from others than the Germans.—Toronto Globe.

C. E. Bainter returned on the Princess May yesterday from a visit to his old home at Mount Vernon, Ohio. He also visited Cumberland, Md., Chicago, Minneapolis and several other centres in the east.

He reports that things are booming in the eastern states and that mechanics are in great demand. In most districts crops have been good, only in a few counties have they suffered from heavy rains. He states that everywhere he noticed a strong feeling of sympathy with the Allies, even amongst people of German origin.

In Portland, Ore., Mr. Bainter met Dr. Gilroy, formerly of Prince Rupert, who is taking a post graduate course in dentistry. He also visited Mr. and Mrs. John Chisholm there.

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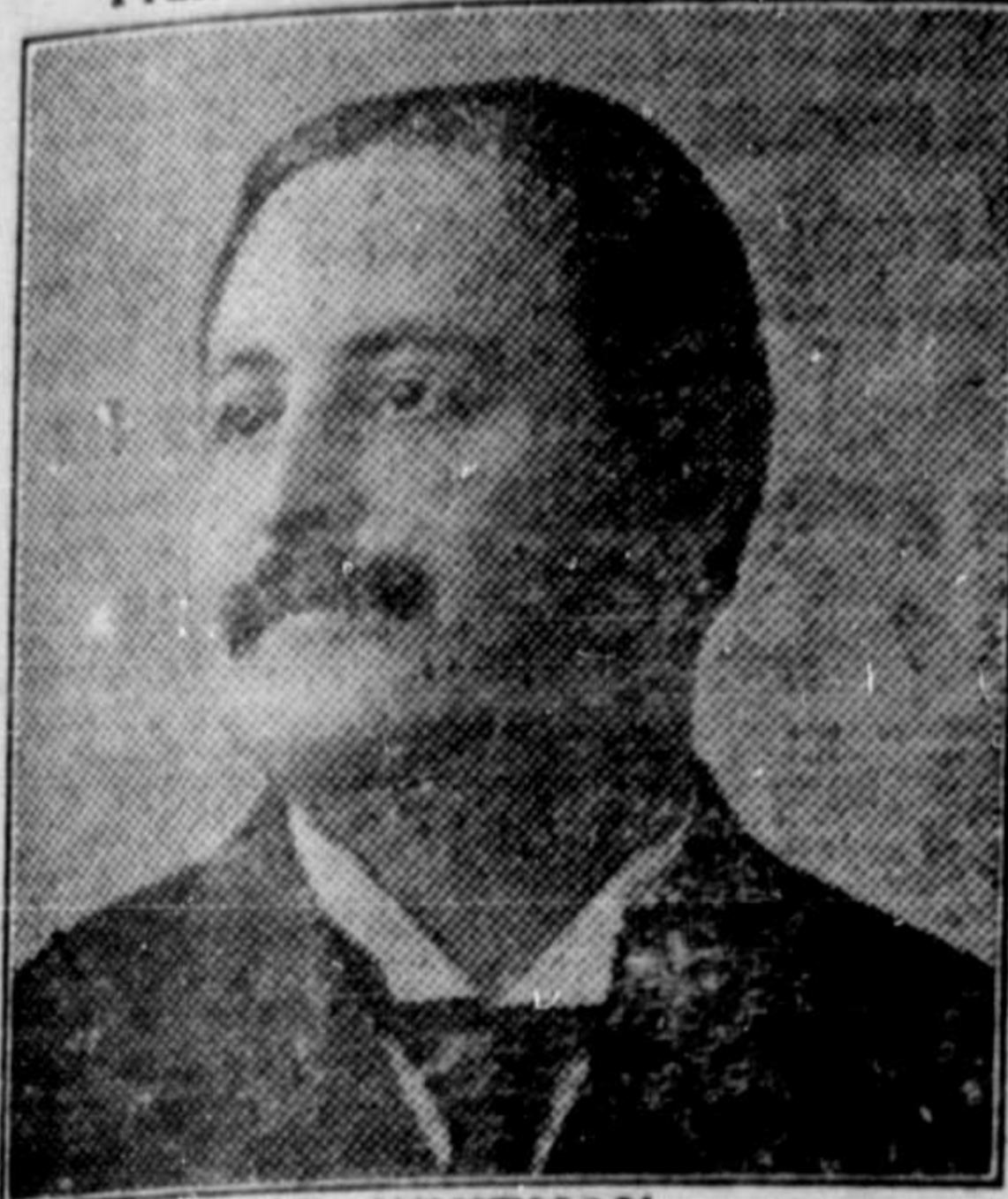

PHONOMETER ROBS FOG OF ITS TERRORS

New York, Nov. 26.—Prof. A. G. Webster of Clark University, Worcester, Mass., has demonstrated an invention which he asserts will practically eliminate fog dangers at sea. His invention detects the exact direction from which the sound of a faghorn is proceeding. The demonstration was made before the National Academy of Sciences in the American Museum of Natural History.

Dr. Webster said he had named his invention the "Phonometer." He has not yet patented it.

The phonometer consists of two steel megaphones joined together at the narrowest ends. These are then attached to the main instrument.

The latter consists of an adjustable tube, in the centre of which a small metal disc is suspended on three fine wires. A small mirror, one millimetre square, is fastened to the disc. In the front of this is a small telescope with a tiny electric bulb.

The light from the electric bulb is reflected from the mirror onto a graduated scale, which is seen through the telescope. When in operation the megaphone attachment is moved around until the light shows its maximum bright-

ness. A compass connected with the instrument then tells the exact direction from which the sound is coming.

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

- 1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.
- 2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.
- 3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.
- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.

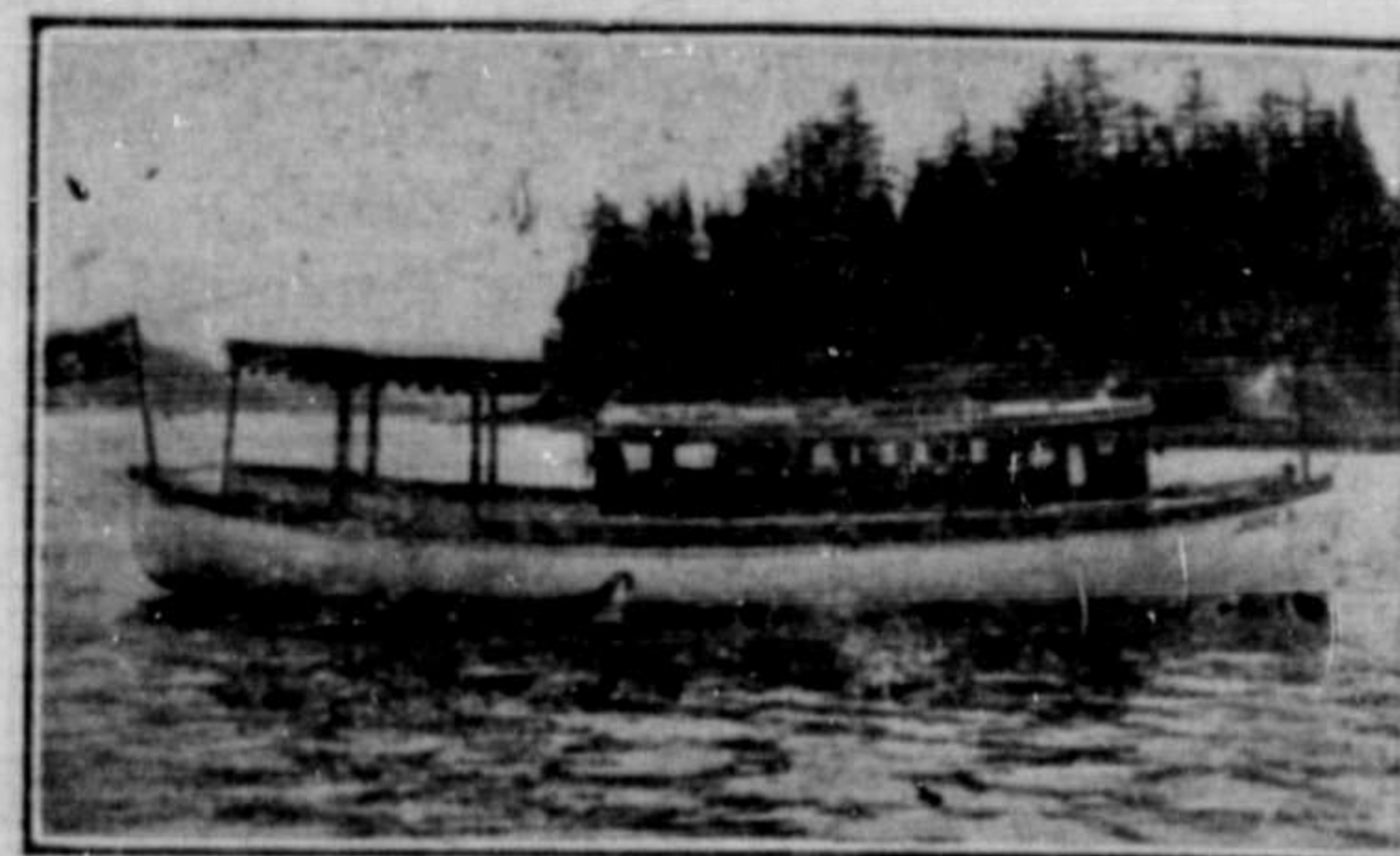
