## ASQUITH GOVERNMENT FACES CONSCRIPTION

### VENIZELOS REFUSES TO FORM CABINET—ARTILLERY ACTIVE ON WESTERN FRONT

#### ASQUITH FACE TO FACE WITH CONSCRIPTION

Fate of the Government Hangs in Balance—House is Sharply Divided on the Great Question.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Dec. 28.—The fate of the Asquith government is hanging in the balance. The question of conscription will be decided today.

It is an open secret that the Derby recruiting scheme, though it has produced a large number of men, has not done what was expected of it. Many thousands of eligible men have failed to put their names on the list and a large proportion of those who have are not available, because of their connection with trades which are exempt from service.

The idea was that, if sufficient men were not forthcoming, some measure of conscription would be inaugurated. The time for such action has arrived, and it finds the government divided. A force of two hundred members, composed chiefly of Radicals and Labor men, with the support of the entire Irish brigade, are absolutely opposed to any measure of compulsory service. The cabinet is also sharply divided on the subject, the premier and several of his ablest supporters being strongly in favor of abiding by the voluntary plan.

The famous "too late" speech recently delivered in the house by David Lloyd George has done much to strengthen the hands of the conscriptionists, and a large section of the press is clamoring for a change of government.

#### SALONIKI IS THE ANCIENT THESSALONICA

Saloniki, which is expected soon to be the scene of a big battle between the French and British and the Germans, Turks and Bulgarians, is the ancient Thessalonica, to whose Christian community St. Paul addressed the two Epistles to the Thessalonians.

It is connected by rail with Belgrade, the capital of Serbia, and has direct rail communication with Vienna, which is 820 miles distant.

Saloniki has a population of a million and a half and is a busy commercial city, its total maritime trade being in the hands of Britain. Direct British trade with Saloniki began after the Greek war of independence.

#### VENIZELOS IS ASKED TO FORM A NEW CABINET

Refuses to Accede to King's Request, as it is now too Late to Apply His Policy—Activity On Western Front.

Paris, Dec. 28.—King Constantine of Greece called upon ex-Premier Venizelos to form a cabinet. Venizelos refused to do so. He said that he would have accepted the premiership when he could have saved Serbia, but that now that Serbia was crushed, it was too late to apply his policy successfully.

#### PORTLAND LUMBER PLANT IS DAMAGED BY FIRE

Portland, Ore., Dec. 28.—Damage to the extent of \$100,000 has been caused by fire to the plant of the Emerson Hardwood Company here. 200,000 feet of lumber which was in a dry kiln has been destroyed. The cause of the outbreak has not yet been discovered.

#### DIES AT MOMENT OF SOLO GAME TRIUMPH

Dawson, Dec. 22.—Levi Vaughn Fogler trumped the ace of spades in a solo game in the Moose Club, leaned back in his chair and laughed at the discomfiture of his friend, Jerry Doody, who was playing a solo in hearts, and then quietly died in his chair.

It was Levi's only trump, and in capturing the ace of spades, which, among the more superstitious card players is known as the death card, he defeated Jerry's solo.

A general laugh from players and spectators followed.

When another player reminded Levi that it was his turn to lead, his spirit had fled from his body.

#### TEUTON SOCIETY WOULD DEPOSE KAISER WILHELM

London, Dec. 27.—The German Humanity League, says the Exchange Telegraph's correspondent at Rotterdam, has issued a manifesto containing a violent indictment of "the Prussian conspirators," bitterly attacking the imperial German chancellor, accusing Germany of "barbarous cruelties and insatiable lust," and concluding with the demand that the Kaiser "be deposed from his dishonored throne."

The German Humanity League consists of German Socialists residing outside of Germany.

"Our homes are being desolated," the correspondent reports the manifesto as saying, "in a campaign waged not in lawful defense of German territory, but to satisfy the insatiable savagery and greed of Prussian conspirators. We again appeal to every wage earner not yet stirred to the heart by these awful holocausts to register a vow no longer to remain silent spectators of the stupendous crimes which have robbed us of our sons and brothers and left upon the truthful pages of history an indelible stain.

"In the reichstag, men who had sworn to defend the rights of the people have joined hands with our oppressors. We have examined through trusted sources the economic condition of every state and province. From all comes the cry, 'deliver us from this terrible suffering!'

"In July, 1914, we were honored and respected throughout the world. Today the German name is the scorn of civilization, and the German flag a badge of infamy. For our crimes we are loathed by all honest men.

"What are more contemptible than the hollow, lying subterfuges for breaches of diplomatic etiquette and all the canons of civilized communities and of the customs and usages of honorable warfare as published by the imperial chancellor?

"Napoleon failed, and the Kaiser must fail. There can be no peace until he is deposed from the throne he has fouled and his fellow-conspirators meet their fate at the hands of an executioner."

#### MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS FIXED FOR JANUARY 13

At the city council last night, a motion by Ald. Dybhavn, seconded by Ald. Edge, in the finance committee, that nominations be received for mayor, aldermen and school trustees from 12 to 2 p.m. on January 10th, 1916, and that the elections be held on January 13th, 1916, from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. That E. A. Woods be appointed returning officer without salary and that R. H. Shockley, A. Clapperton, W. Denning, A. Slocumb, and T. J. Davidson be appointed deputy returning officers at \$7.50 each, was presented.

Ald. Beveridge, seconded by Ald. Montgomery, moved an amendment that more names be added to the list of deputies and a ballot taken.

Ald. Edge said that the finance committee had carefully considered a list of names and had decided that the above were deserving and also had sufficient knowledge of the work to prove useful to Mr. Woods.

Ald. Dybhavn said that the committee had fairly considered the question.

The mayor said that the committee had carefully selected those names with a view to giving the work where it was most needed. The motion carried.

#### BRITISH NAVY WILL TEST NOVA SCOTIA COAL

London, Dec. 27.—For some time past Nova Scotia has been anxious to secure an Admiralty test of washed nut coal obtainable in the province. Sir George Perley and Agent-General Howard who approached the authorities here, have received an intimation that a telegram has been sent to the commander-in-chief of West Indies station, instructing him to arrange for the earliest possible test of this coal on Admiralty vessels, and also to consider the possibility of making a similar test on warships on the same station. A quantity of the same coal is also to be sent to Portsmouth for testing.

#### 17 CHINAMEN ARE ARRESTED FOR BURGLARY

Vancouver Chinks Spent a Merry Christmas—\$3,000 Worth of Stolen Goods Taken by the Police.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Vancouver, Dec. 28.—The biggest haul of stolen goods made for many years was carried out by the police here last night in the basement of a Chinese rooming house at 270 Keefer Street. Clothing, cameras, soaps, perfumes and boots which had been stolen from three Main Street stores, have been recovered. The goods, which are valued at over \$3,000, were stolen over Christmas weekend.

#### 17 Chinese Arrested.

Detectives Ricci and Sinclair, who had tracked down the goods, last night arrested seventeen Chinese in the house. There has been an epidemic of house-breaking in Vancouver recently, which had been attributed to Chinamen.

#### PAUL KOENIG IS IDENTIFIED AS QUEBEC VISITOR

German Agent under Arrest at New York Sketched Docks at Quebec Before the War Broke Out.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Quebec, Dec. 28.—Paul Koenig, the German agent who is under arrest at New York on a charge of conspiracy, and who was implicated in the attempt to blow up the Welland Canal, has been identified as a man who visited Quebec in June, 1914, with another man, who posed as a son of Meunier, the French chocolate king.

#### Sketched Docks.

While in Quebec, these men visited Valcartier, the docks and ammunition testing grounds and made sketches wherever they went.

They also tried to purchase high lands in Ste. Lucie, which, they stated, was for the purpose of erecting a cement factory. They also tried to purchase a steamer.

They engaged a captain to take command of an Austrian barque, which was at that time loading at Rimouski, but the vessel was seized by the naval authorities before it was ready to sail.

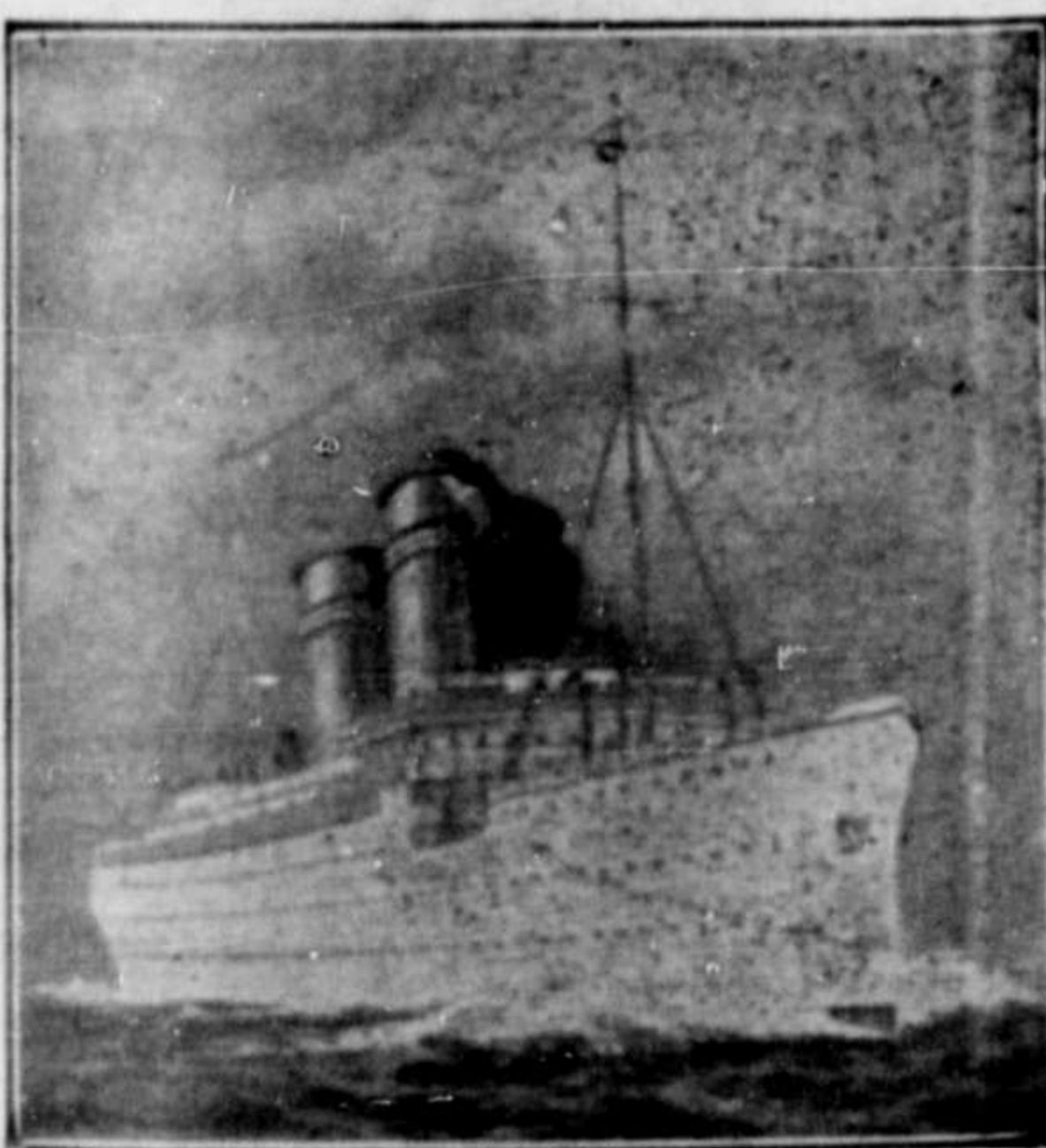

RECRUITING OFFICE AT PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT OFFICE NOW OPEN.

In view of the recruiting which is in progress at present throughout the Province, it is apropos to answer a few of the questions which are considered by those who contemplate entering the Service. The following is a list of pertinent queries, together with the information which each elicits.

#### QUESTIONS ANSWERED.

- 1.—How long am I to serve? Until the end of the war and six months after if required.
- 2.—What pay shall I receive? Your pay as a private will be \$1.00 per day and 10 cents field allowance. Besides this you will be clothed, equipped and subsisted by the Government.
- 3.—What will my wife receive during my absence? Every month there will be paid her a separation allowance of \$20 (also part of your pay) and if this be not enough to comfortably maintain your family, the Canadian Patriotic Fund will further assist them.
- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.
