DESPERATE GERMAN ATTACKS REPULSED

FRENCH HOLD HEIGHTS FIRMLY -- GERMAN RANKS RIDDLED BY TERRIFIC FIRE

FRENCH STILL HOLD HEIGHTS OF MALANCOURT

Violent Attack Foiled by Deadly French Artillery and Small Gun Fire -- German Ranks Riddled.

(Special to The Daily News.)
Paris, March 29.—After a lull of six days, the Germans tried another violent offensive yesterday afternoon, making an unsuccessful attempt to break the French lines on the Malancourt front. After a week of shelling along the entire front, the German artillery was concentrated on a half-mile front between Malancourt and Avoncourt, after which an infantry attack by an entire new division was launched at 3 p. m.

French hold Firm.
The French artillery, including batteries of 75 centimetre guns, which were concealed from the view of the enemy, threw a screen of shells over the enemy's positions, preventing reserve troops from coming up, while machine guns and rifles decimated the attackers. Wave after wave surged forward but all were repulsed. The French still hold the heights of Malancourt as firmly as ever.

EXCITING EXPERIENCE OF LOCAL VOYAGERS

A few days ago four shipwrecked carpenters arrived in port, having had quite an exciting experience in an attempt to make Alice Arm in a gasoline launch. They left here about two weeks ago, with a smaller launch in tow. The first night out, they encountered a very heavy snow-storm; their engine broke down; the smaller launch broke adrift and they spent a trying and miserable night. Ultimately they stranded on the north end of Dundas Island, where they spent about ten days leading a kind of a Robinson Crusoe existence. In the long run they rigged up a sail and made Prince Rupert without any further adventures. The small boat which broke adrift has not been heard of.

HUN DESTROYER RAMMED BY NEW LIGHT CRUISER

London, March 29.—The British new light cruiser Cleopatra has rammed and sunk a German destroyer in an engagement between a squadron of British light cruisers and a flotilla of German destroyers off the coast of Belgium. The crew of the German vessel was saved.

German prisoners captured on the Dvinsk front state that the Germans are preparing for decisive operations as a result of the pressure being brought to bear upon them by the Russians.

Another Dutch steamer, the Duiveland, has been sunk. The crew was saved.

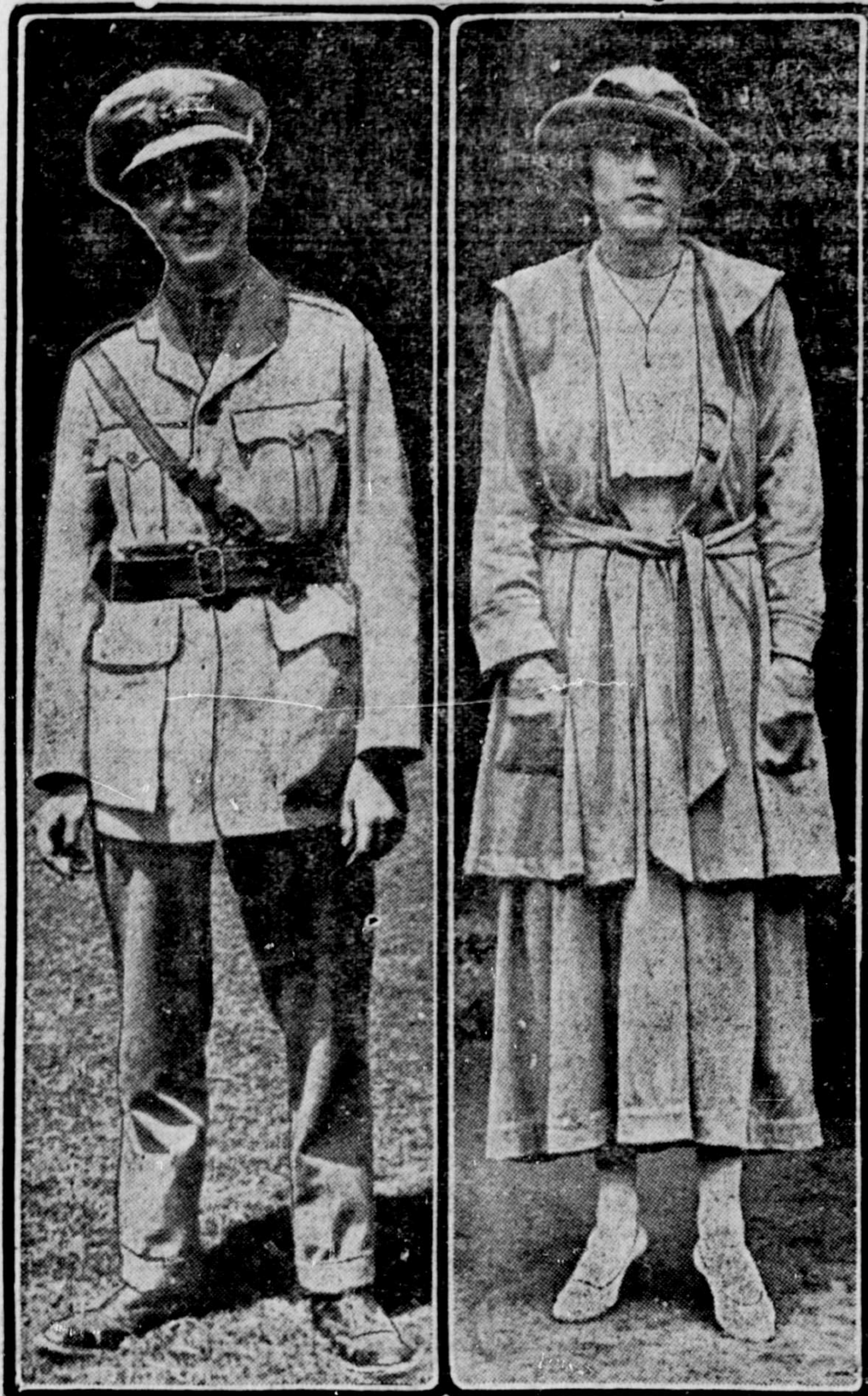
TWO DOLLARS SPENT FOR ONE RECEIVED

SEVENTEEN KILLED IN A RAILWAY COLLISION

Cleveland, Ohio, March 29.—Seventeen have been killed and many injured as a result of a collision between the Twentieth Century Limited of the New York Central Company and the Lake Shore passenger train bound from Chicago to New York. The accident took place at Amherst during a fog.

ROADWAY EXTENSION TO THE COLD STORAGE

The board of works and finance committee of the city council recommended to the council Monday night that the Seal Cove roadway be extended to the boundary of the Cold Storage property, at a cost to the city of \$2,535. The mayor explained that the road as at present led to nowhere and that the cold storage company found it necessary in taking down supplies from the city, to send two men by boat. JOINT ACTION BY COAST FISHERMEN

The Fishermen's Protective Association, with headquarters in Vancouver, is taking up the question of the restrictions put upon independent fishermen by government officials. The association asserts that the Fisheries Act is violated from time to time by the cannery companies and by the government officials and that the Pacific Committee of the Advisory Board is a body of government appointees whose sole guiding principle at all times is the welfare of the cannery companies.

In a circular to the press, the association states that the time has come when, if B. C. white fishermen intend to remain in existence in B. C. waters, joint action must be taken in defence of their means of obtaining a livelihood, or the cannery companies, in conjunction with the government officials, will totally eliminate white men from the industry and B. C. waters will be given over to Asiatics entirely.

The Fishermen's Protective Association is organized to this end and with the following declared objects:

To secure to all white fishermen of B. C. the right to obtain a living by fishing in B. C. waters; to sell their fish in open market and to whom they please in any place in B. C.; the right to have seaworthy boats propelled by power in all B. C. waters; the right to fish in all B. C. tidal waters; the abolition of seining rights; to demand that the government institute an annual licence which will permit fishermen to fish for all classes of fish in their seasons in all B. C. tidal waters; to resist the encroachment of Asiatics and other aliens by compelling the government to issue fishing licences to white fishermen in preference to Asiatics; to secure the abolition of

HUNS RENDERED DEAF AND DUMB BY CONCUSSION

Hundreds of Unwounded Germans Removed from Front—The French Gain Ground—Naval Activity.

(Special to The Daily News.)
London, March 29.—Reports from Milan state that trainloads of German wounded are arriving daily at the Swiss frontier from around Verdun.

Fifteen hundred unwounded Germans have arrived at Blotshheim. They have been rendered deaf and speechless from the effects of the terrific artillery fire and have become nerveless automatons.

French Advance.

Following a German assault on Avoncourt, the French made a night attack, carrying the German works. The Germans made no effort to recover the ground lost.

German Naval Activity.

German naval officers holding temporary land commands have been recalled to their ships.

RUMORED DISCOVERY OF THE WESTWARD HO

The Washington Posten, a Scandinavian paper published in Seattle, reports that a rumor has reached Seattle from Petersburg, Alaska, to the effect that the passenger steamer Al-Ki had found the fishing steamer Westward Ho 150 miles from Prince William Sound, with only Captain Frederickson on board, the rest of the crew, thirty-seven in number, having perished.

BILL PASSED

THE BUDGET

The members of the Bowser administration are loud in their protestations that they are still politically alive and will remain so, but their actions belie their words. The budget brought down by the Hon. Lorne Campbell, minister of mines, collector of election ships, and now minister of finance, pro tem, is nothing more nor less than the bill of costs for an elaborate political funeral at the public expense. With a provincial debt of well over eighteen millions, this alleged wealth producer gaily tells the people that the best the government can do for the ensuing year is to add about five millions more to the already overlaid adverse account. The government evidently proposes to die as it has lived, wholeheartedly handing out "the stuff," as the Hon. William Manson euphoniouly termed it in the days when he had nothing but plain Mr. in front of his name.

Bowser gained his political experience during a spell when many a man in the province was ready to mortgage his home to buy an automobile, and he seems absolutely unable to realise that that gloriously irresponsible day is long since over, and that the people are now counting the real cost of everything, including the cost of being misgoverned. In this latest budget, the government makes no effort to cope with the situation, but simply votes a big fat election fund, which its satellites will proceed to handle in the usual Bowser fashion. Unfortunately for them, the people are painfully aware of the fact that every dollar appropriated

comes out of their pockets and that the new budget, like its recent predecessors, simply mortgages the future earnings of the province.

MORE PROOF

The statements made by M. A. Macdonald and H. C. Brewster during the recent by-elections are being proven one by one. They repeatedly asserted that the \$300,000 which went to pay for the Kitsilano Reserve but which did not make the reserve a provincial asset, was never voted by the legislature, and the provincial auditor now admits that this is exactly the case.

Of course, Mr. Bowser will tell us that it could easily have been passed anyhow, as the government had an overwhelming majority in the house, which only goes to show that, with that huge majority, Bowser and his gang did not worry in the least about the conducting of the business of the province in a proper manner. The fact that this money was spent without any warrant or vote is a mere detail, and is just in keeping with the general methods of the government.

The most important fact in regard to the Kitsilano Reserve is that, like the Songhees deal, it was entirely illegal, and, as a matter of fact, the Kitsilano Reserve does not yet belong to the province of British Columbia, in spite of the fact that \$300,000 of the people's money was spent, \$80,000 of which went to the man Read, who left Bowser's office and opened an office of his own in order that he might put the deal through. This move gave Bowser the opportunity to say that Mr. Read was not in his employment when the commission was paid. For all the

(1) To authorize the changing debentures issuable under the bylaw in this clause mentioned, from the Sinking Fund plan to Annuity Instalment or Serial Bonds and the terms of years as herein stated:

(2) Validating Bylaw No. 243 of said City; being "a bylaw for the purpose of authorising the renewal of certain treasury certificates and for issuing an additional amount of such certificates," and authorising the issue of bonds on the said Annuity Instalment or Serial plan for the \$100,000 mentioned in Bylaw 243 for n of more than 30 years and also to ratify Bylaw 245, relating to such debentures; both without submission to the ratepayers.

(3) To provide for temporarily financing all said bonds by authorising the issue, renewal or reissue of temporary notes for not more than five (5) years from the date of such issue, renewal or reissue, pending the sale of the bonds heretofore mentioned and making provision for the payment of any loss which may be made on the sale of such temporary notes, renewals or reissue thereof;

(4) To provide for collecting instalments both for principal and interest before bonds have actually been sold. Such instalments so far as principal is concerned to be applied to reduce amount of treasury certificates or temporary notes then outstanding or to be issued.

(5) To provide for similar changes with regard to the following Bylaws, the debentures authorised by which have been hypothecated to the Bank of Montreal; but only with the consent of such Bank.

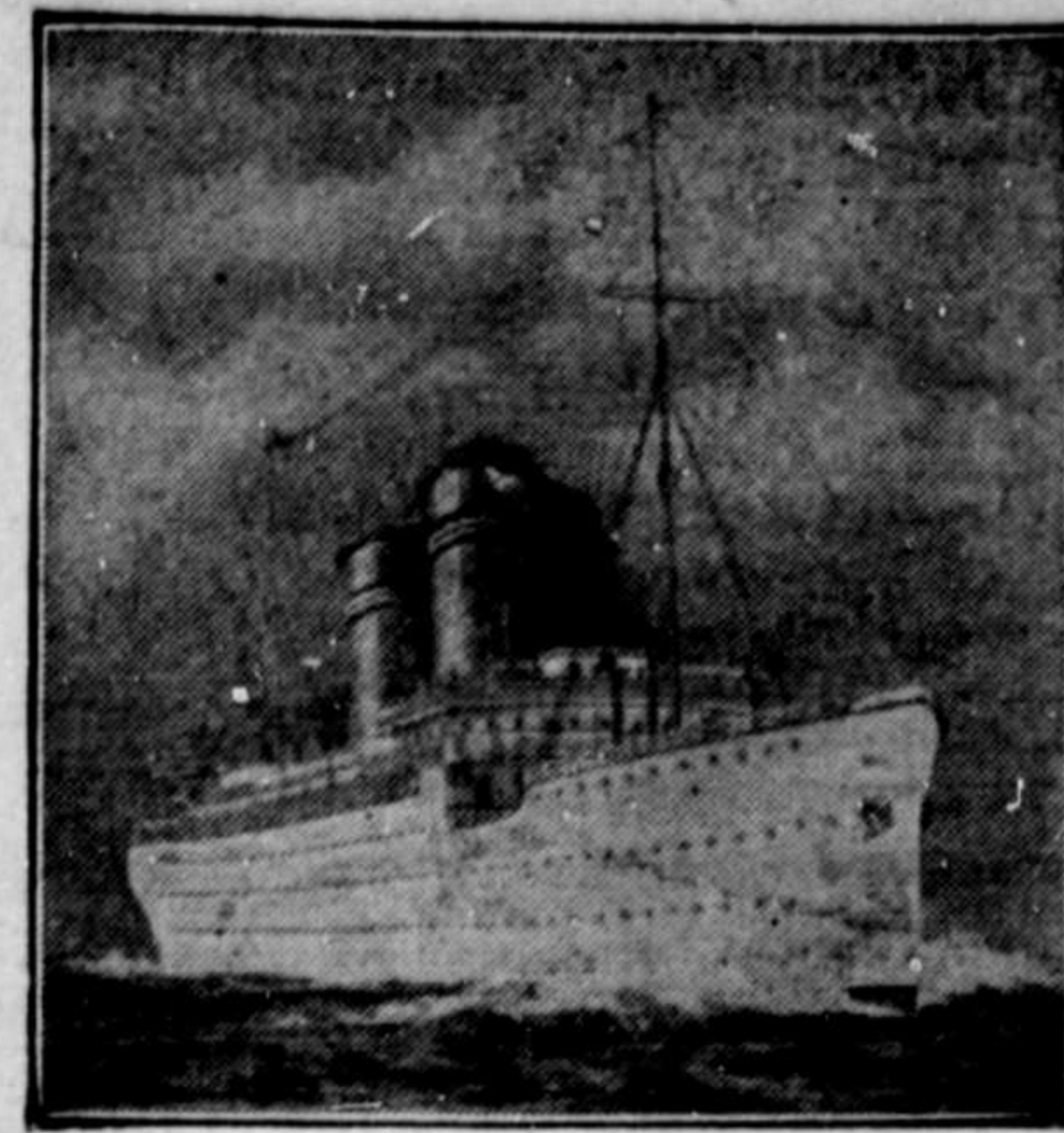

- 4.—What will happen if I am wounded or sick? You will be cared for by the Government and your pay continued until you are discharged. If you are permanently disabled an allowance will be paid you, varying according to the extent of your injury or disability.
- 5.—What will be done for my wife and children if I die while on Active Service? The Government will provide an adequate pension, that will enable the family to live comfortably until the children are old enough to look after themselves. The widowed mother of a single man, if the son be her sole support, is treated in the same way as a wife.

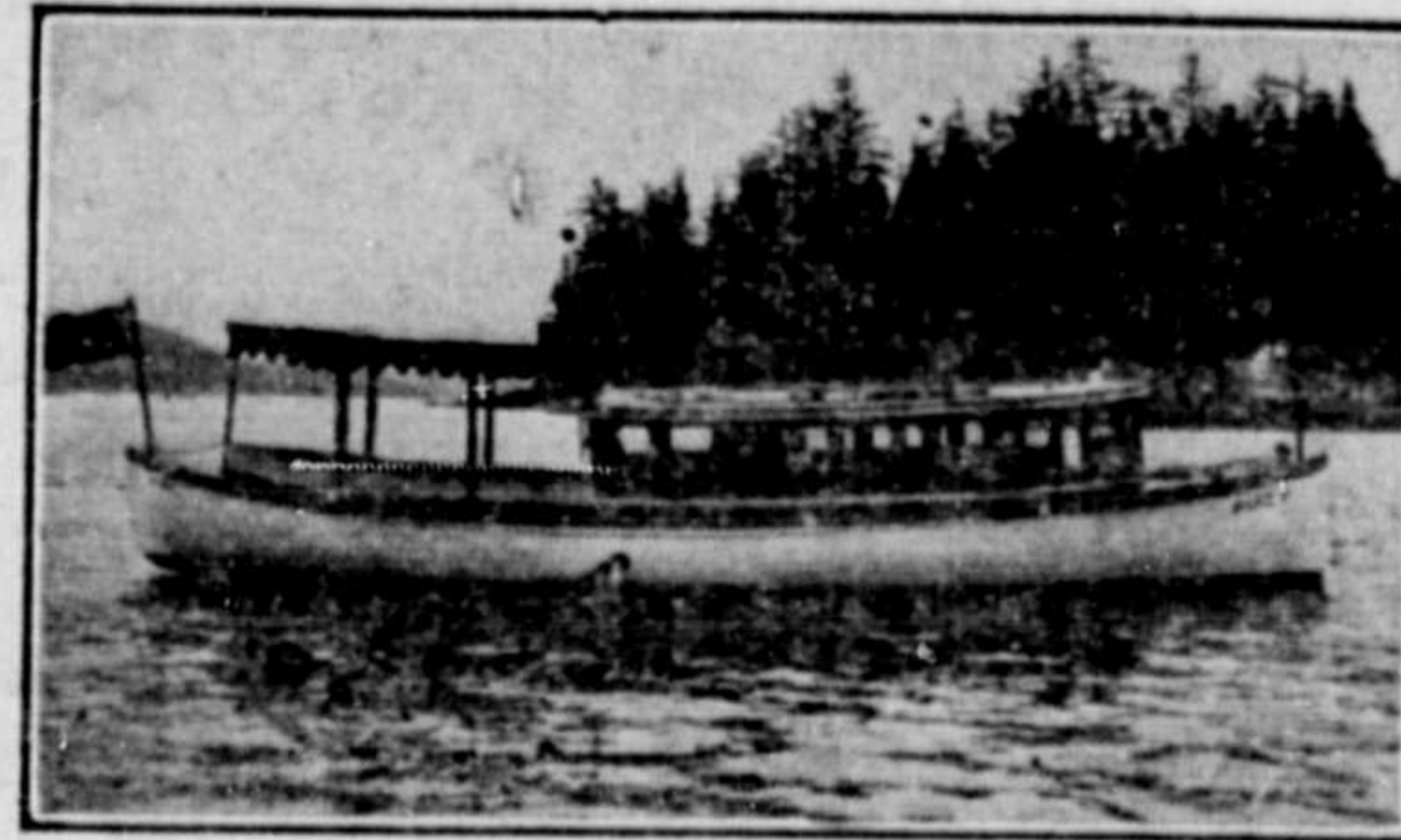
