TWO GERMAN SUBMARINES SENT UNDER

GREAT ACTIVITY ON THE BRITISH FRONT — MORE RUSSIANS ARRIVE IN FRANCE

TRAWLER SINKS BIG SUBMARINE WITH SIXTY MEN

Battle Lasted only ten Minutes—
One More sent under off East
Coast—British Battle-
ship Mined.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Amsterdam, April 28.—It is reported that one of the newest type of German super-submarine has been sunk by a British trawler while examining two Dutch ships.

The first shot from the trawler killed four men on the deck of the submarine and the second shot punctured the skin of the submarine. The action lasted only ten minutes, when the under-sea boat was sunk with its crew of sixty men.

Another sub. Gone.

It is officially announced that a German submarine was sunk off the east coast of England yesterday and her crew of eighteen taken prisoners.

H. M. S. Russell Sunk.

London, April 28.—The British battleship Russell struck a mine in the Mediterranean and sank. One hundred and twenty-four men were lost, and Admiral Freemantle, 24 officers and 676 men were saved. The Russell was built in 1901 and was refitted in 1912 as the flag-ship of the Mediterranean squadron.

LIVELY ACTION ON BRITISH PART OF WEST FRONT

German Attacks Repulsed—Gal-
lant Work by Irish Regiments
—Nineteen Air Combats—
More Russians Arrive.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, April 28.—There is a great increase of activity on the British portion of the western front, our artillery being active along the entire line.

At Freilingheim the Germans entered a British trench but were driven out. German attacks upon Hill 60 and St. Eloi were repulsed.

The Bedfordshire regiment was successful in a raid upon the enemy positions at Carney. The Irish regiments are specially mentioned in despatches for their gallantry in repelling gas attacks.

Nineteen Air Combats.

There were nineteen air combats on the western front yesterday. British aviators brought down a German double-seater after a fight four thousand feet in the air.

French Front.

Paris, April 28.—An intense artillery fire was concentrated upon Avencourt and Esnes throughout last night. There were no infantry attacks but several aerial combats. One Fokker was driven to earth. A further contingent of Russian troops has arrived at Marseilles.

SALVATION ARMY WILL OPEN BRANCH

Captain Cooper, the energetic head of the Salvation Army in the city, will open a branch across the creek on Sunday, in a building at the corner of Sixth and Ambrose. Sunday School will be held at 11 a. m. and a service at 7:30 p. m. on Sunday first. This hard-working officer and his brave little wife are deserving of every support in their good work.

WORD OF RUPERT BOYS IN THE TRENCHES

W. J. Smithers has received a letter from A. D. Golden, formerly of the Bank of Commerce staff and now "somewhere in France." Mr. Golden has met many of the Rupert boys including A. G. D. Vidler and Art Little. Mr. Vidler, by the way, is likely to get his captaincy at an early date. The boys are having a great time despite the mud and the shells.

THOROUGHBREDS IN THE BULKLEY VALLEY

John McNeil, of Telkwa, who is in the city, reports that horses and cattle in the Bulkley Valley wintered well and that no losses were sustained. Mr. McNeil is raising thoroughbred horses and cattle on his ranch. He states that several thousand head of stock wintered out this year, in spite of the fact that the winter was especially severe, all have done well.

KAISER'S PERSONAL NOTE TO PRESIDENT

Berlin, April 28.—The solution of the submarine controversy with the United States is announced. Details of the reply are withheld until the note reaches Washington. The Kaiser is to send a personal note to President Wilson.

Fears for Townshend.

London, April 28.—Stories in the London press of the obstacles which are confronting the Mesopotamia relief expedition are feared to presage news of disaster to the Townshend force which has been holding Kut-El-Amara.

BLOODY FIGHTING IN PARTS OF IRELAND

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, April 28.—Premier Asquith promises a lenient censorship in connection with the Irish trouble which is still regarded as serious. Bloody fighting is going on in various parts of the country. The total casualties are kept back by the censor. Sir John Maxwell, who has been given charge of the quelling of the disturbance, has been given despotic powers.

A bill to increase the term of British military service met with such opposition in the House yesterday that the government withdrew it.

HALIBUT FETCHES BIG PRICE IN SEATTLE

The arrivals of halibut at Seattle for the month of March totalled 851,000 pounds. While Prince Rupert receipts were 930,000 pounds. The highest price made for halibut in Seattle during the month was 12 1/2 cents which was 4 1/2 cents higher than the best price paid during the same month last year.

There is no sign of either side yielding in the controversy in regard to the sharing of the cost of replacement of gear. The company vessels, which are not affected by the strike, are reaping a rich harvest though the fares are light meantime.

M. A. MACDONALD WANTS A SEARCHING ENQUIRY

Mr. M. A. Macdonald, interviewed by The Sun stated that he did not care to discuss the matter of the alleged impersonations at the recent by-election in Vancouver in detail, now that a prosecution was pending.

"The state of the voters' lists," he said, "in this province for years past opened the door to impersonation both in the city and country constituencies. We showed absolute proof of this by specified instances in the past." He could only say that in the recent by-election the character of the men he recommended to supervise the work of preventing unlawful voting showed that the Liberals desired a clean election. "Our greater efforts," he said "were directed to this one point of preventing impersonation and if any individual or group operating outside our accredited officials in the supposed interests of either party, succeeded in carrying on impersonation to any material extent, it only shows how impossible it is to deal with it effectively under the present voters' lists. If any parties have information against individuals who induced impersonation and actively impersonated they should lay information at once. That is what we are doing in the only direction where the facts would appear to warrant it."

He had his own theory, however, in regard to the whole matter, but did not care to discuss it, now that a prosecution was pending.—Vancouver Sun.

BOWSER IS LOSING CONTROL OF HERD

Victoria, April 26.—An interview which was given here by Premier Bowser is creating unusual amusement. Ordinarily, the premier's interviews create comment but not amusement. So this time he tickles the risibilities, for he says that "whisperings that there are dissensions in the government ranks are mere idle gossip." And the premier, with his customary bombast, goes on to say that the administration is united on all big questions. Now, the fact is that there is scarcely a solitary big question of a contentious nature on which the government members are agreed. They all but fight in the caucus when they are away from public hearing. The only reason they do not fight on the floor of the house is because they must hang together, or, (this is an old joke) hang separately. And this is the premier's favorite plea: "If we don't all stick, and stand together by a show of united front, we'll lose prestige too fast to overcome in the campaign which is approaching." Yes, that is it. They are standing by the premier for each individual sake. He has lost his hold on the herd. Even the weakest ones in the past now are getting as bold as lions—in caucus—and all give the premier a piece of their mind. If they were not afraid of the public influence of such action the premier would be kicked overboard. And at that, he is head and shoulders over the most of the crowd. But they need not be prophets to see what is looming up for them next election and, as the days of parliament lengthen, the faces also lengthen, as they mark each day nearing the political end for the most of them. Therefore, when the premier says there is no dissension, it is amusing to most people here.

TORIES REFUSE FULL ENQUIRY INTO CHARGES

Brewster's Amendment is Voted
Down by Steam-roller—Oppo-
sition Leaders Move for en-
quiry into Victoria Case.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Victoria, April 28.—The committee to probe the Vancouver election charges has been appointed. On the motion of Mr. Pooley, immunity has been promised to all who testify as to the part taken in the Vancouver frauds. The hearing is expected to start this afternoon. Witnesses are on hand from Seattle.

Brewster's Request.

H. C. Brewster's amendment that the committee investigate all election charges covering the running of the shebeen in Victoria and alleged irregularities in Rossland, was voted down on a party vote.

Mr. Brewster has given notice that he will move for a special enquiry into the Victoria charges.

HOME FISHING FLEET FOR PRINCE RUPERT

Referring to Mr. Chamberlin's letter to Mayor McCaffery regarding the drydock, Mr. Chamberlin states that the company has tried to interest both the British and the Russian governments, but that the two main objections offered were the cost of assembling material at Prince Rupert and the cost of labor.

In this connection we may well ask one or two questions:

1. Did Mr. Chamberlin ask the Dominion government to intervene upon behalf of his company, and if so what was the reply received?

2. Was not Mr. Chamberlin able to validly meet the objections as to cost of assembling material and cost of labor? Mr. Donnelly, the company's own engineer, stated emphatically to the Board of Trade when here that there was no drydock anywhere in a better position to build wooden ships than the Prince Rupert drydock. He stated also to the writer that the drydock could advantageously manufacture shells and

FISHING FLEET

In view of the fact that there is no sign of an early settlement of the American fishermen's strike, T. D. Pattullo's suggestion that the drydock be used in the meantime for the construction of Canadian fishing boats is timely. A fleet of about a hundred, or even fifty, halibut schooners would help Prince Rupert materially. Before the strike, one was apt to think that, after all, the bringing of American boats to this port was not doing so much in the way of an increase of general business as had been hoped. With the men paid off at their home ports in the south, the bulk of their money was certainly not distributed here, still there was enough money circulated by the fishermen to make their presence felt in the city, or rather to make their absence felt, for it was not until the strike came along that the business men fully realized how much of an asset they were.

If the Canadian fleet could be materially increased by the building of boats here, it would be a big step forward for the city. Not only would the boat-building bring along a pay roll, but the Canadian fishermen would be paid off here. With an increased number of boats there would be a big impetus given to the fishing business generally and lines which are at present practically neglected could be developed to great advantage. For instance, cod fishing has not been followed up as it deserves. As a matter of fact Nova Scotia still ships salted cod to Prince Rupert and it is displayed in nearly every grocery store. If Nova Scotia can get revenue from curing cod, Prince Rupert should be able to do likewise.

The sea is to Prince Rupert what the prairies are to Winnipeg, therefore it is up to this city to do everything possible to keep the fishing harvest growing. If shipbuilding on a big scale is not possible, let us begin on a fishing boat scale and the bigger lines of the enterprise will naturally follow.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

Sir Roger Casement must have felt pretty lonely when his German friends left him in that collapsible boat.

The Irish rebels will probably think it decidedly unfair of the British to introduce machine guns into a Donnybrook.

Berlin is disappointed at the failure of the Casement filibustering expedition. Berlin must surely be getting used to disappointments by this time.

The Kaiser delayed sending off his note to Washington until he saw how the Irish raid fared. Several of the clauses will probably be now toned down.

Since the Prussian casualty lists do not include the Saxons, Bavarians and Wurtembergers, they convey little information as to the actual losses. Britain might as well publish a list leaving out the Scotch, Irish, Welsh and colonial losses.

Crown Prince Willie is to have a great fire-works display on his birthday. He is liable to get his fingers burned.

The ladies in the south are evidently determined that the Bowser government will not be allowed to shirk the question of woman suffrage. Now, ladies, the poor gentlemen at Victoria have quite enough to worry them just at present.

(Continued from Page One.) build submarines, and was particularly well situated to do business with Russia.

The Grand Trunk Pacific company apparently does not believe that Prince Rupert is too far remote for the gathering of material, otherwise it would never have embarked upon the project of the drydock in the first instance and as to the cost of labor, if it be true that the Grand Trunk is paying no higher wages for labor than is currently understood, I question very much whether wages generally obtaining in the east are not considerably higher than those paid here.

At the present moment the Opposition in the House at Ottawa are urging upon the government the necessity of immediate action being taken towards a shipbuilding program. I believe that the provincial government should also take a hand in this connection. For instance, we ought to have a fishing fleet of Canadian bottoms operating out of this port at least a hundred strong. This

"GAIN or no gain the cause before the farmers of Canada is as clear as it was last year—they must produce abundantly in order to meet the demands that may be made, and I believe this to be especially true in regard to live stock, the world's supply of which must be particularly affected in this vast struggle."—HON. MARTIN BURRELL, Minister of Agriculture.

THE FOLLOWING STATEMENTS ARE BASED ON REPORTS CONTAINED IN "THE AGRICULTURAL WAR BOOK, 1916," PUBLISHED BY THE DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE, OTTAWA, ONT.

LIVE STOCK—The herds and flocks of Europe have been greatly reduced. When the war is over there will be a great demand for breeding stock. Canadian farmers should keep this in mind.

MEATS—In 1915 Great Britain imported 664,508 tons of beef, mutton and lamb, of which 364,245 tons came from without the Empire. Out of 430,420 tons of beef only 104,967 tons came from within the Empire.

The demands of the Allies for frozen beef, canned beef, bacon and hams will increase rather than diminish. Orders are coming to Canada. The decreasing tonnage space available will give Canada an advantage if we have the supplies.

DAIRYING—Home consumption of milk, butter and cheese has increased of late years. The war demands for cheese have been unlimited. The Canadian cheese exports from Montreal in 1915 were nearly \$6,600,000 over 1914. Prices at Montreal—Cheese: January 1915, 15¼ to 17 cents; January 1916, 18¼ to 18¾ cents; Butter: January 1915, 24 to 28¼ cents; January 1916, 32 to 33 cents.

EGGS—Canada produced \$30,000,000 worth of eggs in 1915 and helped out Great Britain in the shortage. Shippers as well as producers have a duty and an opportunity in holding a place in that market.

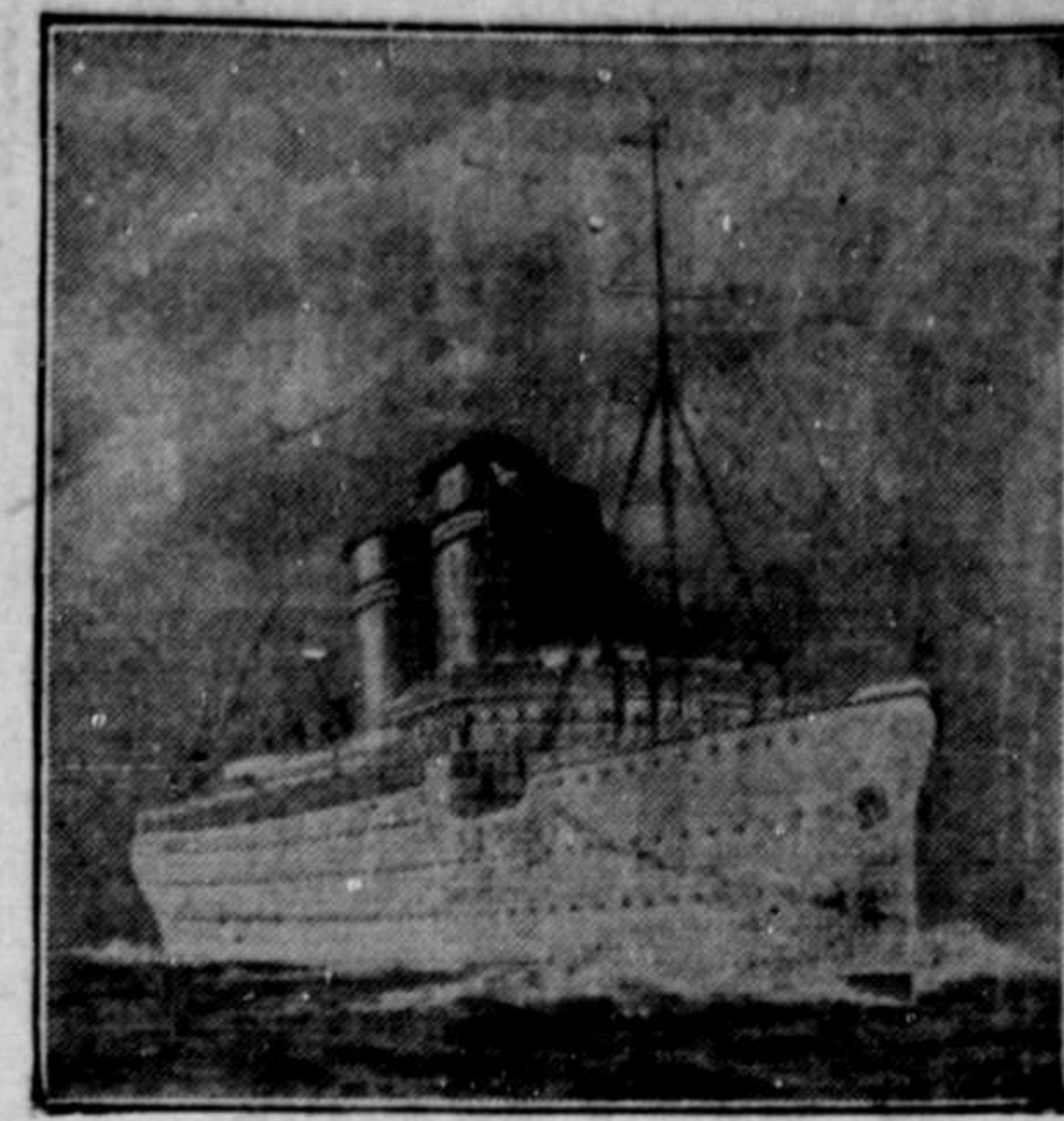

COMPENSATION WING PREPARE FOR REVOLT

Victoria, April 24.—The compensation wing of the Conservative party in the legislature has gone the length of preparing for what practically amounts to a revolt against Premier Bowser on the prohibition question, it is rumored here. Between seventeen and twenty members of the Conservative caucus are now planning, it is said to sign their names to a memorandum on the question, which they propose to present to the Premier and his prohibition followers in the legislature when the prohibition bill comes up in caucus.

This proposed memorandum purports, it is stated, to comprise a declaration that the compensationists under no circumstances will agree to prohibition without compensation for the hotel interests either in the way of money or a considerable extension of time. Failing the granting of such a concession the insurgents claim that they will oppose the prohibition bill in the house, and at the polls.
