LIVE STOCK—The herds and flocks of Europe | DAIRYING—Home consumption of milk, butter and cheese has increased of late years. The war demands for cheese have been unlimited. The Canadian cheese exports from Montreal in 1915 were nearly \$6,500,000 over 1914. Prices at Montreal - Cheese: January 1915, 151/4 to 17 cents; January 1916, 181/4 to 181/2 cents. Butter: January 1915, 24 to 2834 cents; January 1916, 32 to 33 cents.

EGGS—Canada produced \$30,000,000 worth of eggs in 1915 and helped out Great Britain in the shortage. Shippers as well as producers have a duty and an opportunity in holding a place in that market.




