Constantine will Co-operate with the Allies-Rumanians and Russians Advancing in Dobrudja.

Athens, Sept. 28 .- A Reuter despatch reports that King Constantine, following a conference with his loyal generals and closest advisers, has promised to sign a decree calling for a general mobilization of the Greek army before ex-Premier Venizelos reaches Saloniki .-

The king has decided to cooperate with the Entente Allies. The Greek battleships Hydra, Spetsai and Psara, along with four destroyers, have already joined forces with the Allied fleet in the Aegean Sea.




