TEN THOUSAND PRISONERS IN A FORTNIGHT

COMBLES A CHARNAL HOUSE -- GREEK BATTLESHIPS JOIN THE ALLIED FLEET

ALLIES DRIVING WEDGE INTO HUN LINES ON SOMME

Two Thousand Yards Gained—
German Aeroplanes Destroyed
—Combles a Charnal House.

(Special to The Daily News.)

London, Sept. 28.—The Allies are driving a wedge into the German lines on the Somme front and have captured two thousand yards of trenches. Ten thousand Germans have been taken prisoner in the past two weeks. Two enemy aeroplanes and two captive balloons, used for scouting purposes, were destroyed yesterday.

A Charnal House.

Paris, Sept. 28.—Combles, which is now securely in the hands of the Allies, resembled a charnal house when it was finally captured. The German garrison had almost been decimated and hundreds of enemy dead were discovered everywhere amid the ruins of the town. The fiercest hand to hand fighting took place around the church, which is now a mass of ruins. The building changed hands three times in twenty minutes, but the Allies finally conquered the German garrison which held out desperately.

Laurier Addresses Big Recruiting Meeting

(Special to The Daily News.)

Montreal, Sept. 28.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier, who seems to have quite recovered from the effects of his recent illness, addressed a gathering of fifteen thousand people here last night on the war situation. The aged Liberal leader was given a great reception. After outlining the military situation he emphasized the urgent need of more recruits in Canada and fervently urged the people of Montreal and of the province of Quebec to render still more military assistance.

DISASTROUS FIRE AT QUEBEC LAST NIGHT

(Special to The Daily News)

Quebec, Sept. 28.—Fire last night destroyed the Beaumont Home for orphan children and elderly people. The flames had got a firm hold on the building before the fire fighting force arrived and the structure was completely destroyed. The rescue work was carried out with the utmost despatch but it is feared that a portion of the two hundred inmates have perished in the flames.

P. McLACHLAN DIED OF HEART FAILURE

As reported in The News yesterday, Peter McLachlan died suddenly on a mining trip in the Gardner Canal country. It seems that, with David Stewart, he had paddled a canoe upstream and had worked so hard that the exertion seemed to affect his heart. He fainted and was taken ashore where they camped for the night. He seemed to have recovered next morning and said he was feeling all right. When breakfast was ready, Mr. McLachlan did not respond to the call and on Mr. Stewart going to the tent he found him unconscious. He never fully recovered consciousness and passed away while he was being taken on board the launch Wagwan.

Deceased was about 67 years of age. He has a brother in Victoria and a son in Ottawa. His family have been communicated with and no funeral arrangements will be made until they are heard from. Mr. McLachlan was a native of eastern Canada.

ZEPPELIN CREW GIVEN SEMI-MILITARY FUNERAL

London, Sept. 28.—The members of the Zeppelin crew who were killed in the south of England during the last raid were yesterday given a semi-military funeral. The pall-bearers were officers of the Royal Flying Corps.

SHACKLETON'S PARTY ARRIVES AT SANTIAGO

Santiago, Chili, Sept. 28.—Sir Ernest Shackleton and his party of explorers have arrived here. Sir Ernest was successful in rescuing his men, who have been marooned on Elephant Island for several months, at the third attempt. The first two relief expeditions outfitted by the Chilean government failed to reach the island owing to the vessels being unable to withstand the ice pressure.

Sir Ernest intends to proceed to England after thanking the president of the Chilean Republic for his government's assistance in carrying out the rescue.

BRITAIN WITHDRAWS TOBACCO EMBARGO

(Special to The Daily News.)

Washington, Sept. 28.—The British government has withdrawn its new regulations forbidding the importation of cigar tobacco into the United Kingdom. The measure was part of the British scheme to relieve the pressure on ocean tonnage which is getting very scarce. American tobacco growers made strong representations to Washington, stating that the new regulations would ruin their business, as much of their trade is with Britain where the leaf is brought in and cigars manufactured in England.

ANYOX HONOR ROLL UNVEILED ON SUNDAY

At the service in the Methodist Church at Anyox last Sunday evening the Anyox Honor Roll was unveiled by Rev. S. S. Osterhout, Ph. D., president of the Methodist Conference of B. C. Rev. H. C. Andrew in his opening address welcomed the president to Anyox, making fitting reference to the men who had fallen for the Empire and dwelling upon the need for a greater unity of national ideals throughout the world.

Rev. J. H. Atkinson then gave an address in which he called for greater self-sacrifice in social life, drawing his illustrations from the sacrifice made by the boys who had given their all in the cause of liberty.

After unveiling the Roll of Honor, Rev. S. S. Osterhout delivered an eloquent and earnest address on "Some Causes of the War." He pointed out that one of the greatest factors in bringing about the war was the founding of German education upon wrong ideals while another cause was a false interpretation of the teaching of Christ. During the evening, solos were rendered by Messrs. Mawer and Jones, the accompaniments being played by Mr. Thomas.

BANDITS HOLD UP MICHIGAN EXPRESS

Detroit, Mich., Sept. 28.—The Michigan Central, New York and Chicago express was stopped by bandits near Dearborn last night. The robbers uncoupled the engine, extinguished the fire and assaulted the engineer and his fireman, throwing them from the cab. They then proceeded to ransack the express, mail and baggage cars after which they made their escape.

"FORBIDDEN ADVENTURE" AT MAJESTIC THEATRE

The Majestic Theatre was packed last night to see Helen Holmes in the fourth episode of "The Girl and the Game" and none could have been disappointed. GREEK SHIPS HAVE JOINED ALLIED FLEET

Constantine will Co-operate with the Allies—Rumanians and Russians Advancing in Dobrudja.

(Special to The Daily News.)

Athens, Sept. 28.—A Reuter despatch reports that King Constantine, following a conference with his loyal generals and closest advisers, has promised to sign a decree calling for a general mobilization of the Greek army before ex-Premier Venizelos reaches Saloniki.

The king has decided to co-operate with the Entente Allies. The Greek battleships Hydra, Spetsai and Psara, along with four destroyers, have already joined forces with the Allied fleet in the Aegean Sea.

Dobrudja Advance.

The Russians and Rumanians continue to advance in the Dobrudja region from the Danube to the Black Sea and have captured another thousand prisoners.

DRYDOCK HOPES

Sir Henry Drayton says that the drydock should have been busy months ago and there will not be a man in Prince Rupert but will agree with him most heartily, and that his efforts to get things moving at Ottawa will be successful is the ardent hope of every citizen.

Sir Henry has the figures of the Cotton agreement before him and he is in telegraphic communication with Mr. Donnelly, through Mr. Pillsbury, in regard to the cost of the various parts of the plant. Though assured by Mr. Hinton that the railway company is satisfied with the terms of the Cotton lease, the chairman of the commission evidently wishes to compare the proposed rental with the cost of the plant, and, judging from his remarks to the mayor yesterday morning, he will make strong representations to Ottawa regarding the letting of the dock.

The drydock situation is decidedly more hopeful at the present moment than it has ever been, and in Sir Henry Drayton, who is a business man and not a politician, we have an advocate who will stir things up at Ottawa. Anyone who has read the letter which Premier Borden sent to President Chamberlin must feel certain as to where the blame for the delay lies, and, if the government is willing to recognize as completed, a plant which contractors are ready to use for the construction of ships, the drydock should be busy at an early date.

To Mayor McCaffery belongs the credit for having got quick action in the matter. Once he got a line on where the trouble lay, he kept up a steady bombardment of the enemy

trenches. Yesterday, he made very clear to the chairman of the commission that Prince Rupert wants a live drydock and not a dead one. It will be intensely gratifying to learn that the government has agreed that the dock is now completed and that the Grand Trunk Pacific have been permitted to carry out a two years' lease with M. P. Cotton and his associates.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

Athens reports that King Constantine has been misjudged and that his sympathies are with the Allies after all. Constantine is slightly to blame for the misapprehension as he did not show his preference to any marked extent, in fact rather the contrary.

Bob Rogers seems determined to display to the whole Dominion the small calibre of the man whom Sir Robert Borden was obliged to make Minister of Public Works. It ought to be the easiest job the Hon. Robert has undertaken for some time.

The citizens of Port Arthur may not think it fitting that the suggested union with Fort William should come from the head of the C. P. R. It was a difference between Port Arthur and the C. P. R. which led to the founding of Port William and though the Port Arthurites may be forgiving they are not likely to forget.

The stay of the railway commissioners here was short but if it results in life at the drydock it served its purpose so far as Prince Rupert is concerned.

Sir Richard McBride reports that the British troops are to have a fish day each week when they will be provided with British Columbia salmon and halibut. The 102nd after a dinner including halibut steaks should be irresistible.

A serious effort is afoot to popularise the pink varieties of B.

GERMANS USING NEW TYPE OF FLOATING MINE

The mine as an instrument of destruction has been used by the Germans in a manner consistent with her disregard of laws and international regulations in the conduct of the war. The mine apparently occupies an important place in the German programme, for so profusely have mines been sown in the seas that a large fleet of sweepers is kept constantly at work clearing the waters of a deadly peril. Too high a value cannot be placed upon the work done by these mine-sweepers. Their crews are well aware of the desperate and dangerous nature of the undertaking, and it is to the credit of the nation that the authorities have not required to ask twice for volunteers to carry

on the work. Nearly everyone is familiar with the ordinary kind of mine, namely, that with protruding horns, which when struck cause the explosion. The novel type which is being laid by the Germans consists of the usual body or shell case, from which proceed two metal arms. At the extremity of the arms there are fixed glass tubes containing a certain chemical substance. A slight shock is sufficient to break the glass tubes, and when this is done the chemical falls down into a battery, which is set in motion, and a spark emitted ignites the explosive. The capturing and destruction of these new mines is an operation calling for great delicacy and carefulness, but notwithstanding that our mine-sweepers have secured and disposed of a considerable number of them. Submarines, it is believed, have been the agents in the laying of the mines.—Scotsman.

A man struck, say, on the arm was not disabled, and on the second day thought lightly of his burn, but on the third day, or at latest on the fourth, he died. This new devilry produces clotting of the blood and consequent death. This is not magnificent and it is not war, but it is particularly German.
